

**KENTUCKY YMCA YOUTH ASSOCIATION
KENTUCKY UNITED NATIONS ASSEMBLY (KUNA)
STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT AND DRESS CODE**

The purpose of this Code of Conduct is to identify personal behavior that is consistent with the purpose and objectives of the Kentucky YMCA Youth Association. The items within the Code are designed to protect the welfare of the program for current participants and future generations. A participant's personal behavior reflects upon one's self, one's Student YMCA, and the Kentucky YMCA. Registration in any Kentucky YMCA conference program indicates personal acceptance of the Code of Conduct. Any student sent home for violation of this Code will be at the expense of parent or guardian.

EXPECTATIONS OF PARTICIPANTS

1. Each delegate shall conduct himself/herself in an orderly and responsible manner before, during, and after all functions of the Kentucky YMCA conference programs.
2. All participants share the responsibility for their actions equally when violations of the Code are witnessed. Those who choose to be present when a violation occurs and do not immediately act to remedy and report the violation shall, by their own choice, be considered participants in the violation. In relation to this Code, there are no "innocent bystanders."
3. No delegate shall participate in discrimination or harassment of any other participant. This includes protection on the basis of race, ethnicity, religion, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, or socioeconomic status.
4. No delegate shall leave a Kentucky YMCA function unless the approval of his/her advisor AND the director of the program is secured. The delegate must be picked up and returned by a parent or legal guardian who must take responsibility for the delegate in writing.
5. Each delegate is legally and financially liable for the removal, defacing, or willful damage to public or private property. Any act of vandalism, destruction of property, or misuse of a facility may be a crime and will be treated as a potential criminal violation.
6. Food (including gum and candy) and beverages other than water (including those sold by the hotel) are not permitted in any meeting sessions.
7. Cell phones, music players, or other wireless communications devices are not to be used during any meeting session.
8. The use of tobacco products, burning of incense, possession of alcoholic beverages, and the use of legal or illegal drugs not in accordance with a prescription is forbidden at any Kentucky YMCA function.
9. Youth delegates may not enter rooms other than those assigned by the Y-Staff or advisor.
10. Physical intimacy between participants of any gender is inappropriate at all times while at Kentucky YMCA Youth Association Programs and is prohibited.
11. All delegates shall be in and remain in their assigned rooms by scheduled curfew and doors shall remain closed until scheduled end of curfew.
12. Badges shall be worn ONLY by the individual whose name is on the badge. Badge switching or sharing is strictly prohibited. Participants will wear their assigned badges at all times when they are not in their sleeping rooms, and must be visible at all times. Badges are to be worn around the neck and are not to be defaced, decorated, or altered in any way. There may be a charge for replacement badges.
13. Unless there is a fire, participants will not pull the fire alarm. Pulling a fire alarm is a serious offense, and any participant who does so will be held financially and potentially criminally liable. Hotel alarms automatically summon the fire department and create a great inconvenience and fear for the hotel and other guests.
14. Use of personal vehicles by students during Kentucky YMCA conferences is strictly prohibited.
15. Weapons of any kind and items that could cause injury or damage to participants and/or property are strictly forbidden.

VIOLATION OF EXPECTATIONS

All violations of this code of conduct are to be brought to the attention of the Y-Staff. Participants found to be in violation of the above expectations will be subject to disciplinary actions at the discretion of advisors and the Y-Staff including but not limited to: calls to parents/guardians; incident report filed; participant sent home; school policies implemented. If state or federal law is broken, Y-Staff will notify parent/guardian and law enforcement and participant will be sent home. At all times the Y-Staff reserves the right to alter disciplinary actions at their discretion.

ROOMING POLICY

I understand that conference delegates are typically housed four (4) to each room and that in order to participate in this program; I must share a room and bed with at least one other student of the same sex from my delegation. I may be roomed with students of the same sex from another delegation, in which case I will not share a bed with a person from another delegation. I further understand that I may not room with anyone other than YMCA conference delegates -- not an advisor, parents, or other relatives -- without expressed notarized* parental consent (*notarization only required if student rooms with adult other than parent/legal guardian), and permission of Executive Director of the Kentucky YMCA. I also understand that I may not room alone.

REFUND POLICY

I understand that all fees are non-refundable. In the case of extenuating circumstances, a portion of the payment may be refunded by action of the Executive Director based upon written request from the student or parent.

PARTICIPANT DRESS CODE

KUNA is a professional development experience. While at KUNA, students are expected to abide by the following dress code. Conference name badges are part of this dress code and must be worn for all conference functions. Anyone not in compliance with the dress code may be asked to change clothes. Advisors will be notified of any violations. Kentucky YMCA staff reserves the right to consider removal of Delegation of Excellence from any delegation with three (3) or more reported dress code violations. ***Dress code will be enforced by delegation advisors.***

First night: Ambassadors wear appropriate native attire**; Business Professional for officers and candidates

Second night: Casual

Third morning: Casual; Business Professional for officers and candidates

Second day: Ambassadors wear Business Casual or Professional; Business Professional for officers and candidates

Business Casual

- Collared shirt (tucked in)
- Dress shirt or sweater that covers shoulders
NO sheer/lace/see-through portions on torso (front or back)
- Blazer, business jacket, and tie optional
- Business dress with skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back) and covered shoulders

- Skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back), including any slits.
- Trousers such as khakis or dress pants **NO JEANS, LEGGINGS, or FITNESS PANTS**
- Practical dress shoes and socks **NO casual footwear (Uggs, Chuck Taylors, Toms, flip flops, etc.)**

Business Professional

- Blazer, sport coat, or suit jacket
- Dress shirt or sweater that covers shoulders
NO sheer/lace/see-through portions on torso (front or back)
- Collared dress shirt (tucked in)
- Tie or bow tie
- Business dress with skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back) and covered shoulders

- Dress slacks or suit pants **NO Jeans, leggings or fitness pants**
- Business pantsuit
- Skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back), including any slits.
- Practical dress shoes and socks **NO casual footwear (Uggs, Toms, Chuck Taylors, flip flops, etc.)**

The following are items of attire are not appropriate for all delegates at ALL TIMES

(Including Native Attire, Business and Casual dress):

- Tops that are: backless, sheer/transparent, low-cut, midriff-bearing, do not cover shoulders
- Skirts shorter than bend of knee (front and back)
- Shorts shorter than finger-tips (front/back only)
- Visible undergarments
- Bare feet
- Any clothing with inappropriate language or imagery, derogatory of any ethnic, religious, or social group
- Any clothing otherwise deemed inappropriate by the Kentucky YMCA Staff

UN UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS

Preamble

Whereas recognition of the inherent dignity and of the equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human family is the foundation of freedom, justice and peace in the world,

Whereas disregard and contempt for human rights have resulted in barbarous acts which have outraged the conscience of mankind, and the advent of a world in which human beings shall enjoy freedom of speech and belief and freedom from fear and want has been proclaimed as the highest aspiration of the common people,

Whereas it is essential, if man is not to be compelled to have recourse, as a last resort, to rebellion against tyranny and oppression, that human rights should be protected by the rule of law,

Whereas it is essential to promote the development of friendly relations between nations,

Whereas the peoples of the United Nations have in the Charter reaffirmed their faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person and in the equal rights of men and women and have determined to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom,

Whereas Member States have pledged themselves to achieve, in cooperation with the United Nations, the promotion of universal respect for and observance of human rights and fundamental freedoms,

Whereas a common understanding of these rights and freedoms is of the greatest importance for the full realization of this pledge,

Now, therefore, The General Assembly,

Proclaims this Universal Declaration of Human Rights as a common standard of achievement for all peoples and all nations, to the end that every individual and every organ of society, keeping this Declaration constantly in mind, shall strive by teaching and education to promote respect for these rights and freedoms and by progressive measures, national and international, to secure their universal and effective recognition and observance, both among the peoples of Member States themselves and among the peoples of territories under their jurisdiction.

Article 1

All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood.

Article 2

Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration, without distinction of any kind, such as race, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status.

Furthermore, no distinction shall be made on the basis of the political, jurisdictional or international status of the country or territory to which a person belongs, whether it be independent, trust, non-self-governing or under any other limitation of sovereignty.

Article 3

Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person.

Article 4

No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms.

Article 5

No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.

Article 6

Everyone has the right to recognition everywhere as a person before the law.

Article 7

All are equal before the law and are entitled without any discrimination to equal protection of the law. All are entitled to equal protection against any discrimination in violation of this Declaration and against any incitement to such discrimination.

Article 8

Everyone has the right to an effective remedy by competent national tribunals for acts violating the fundamental rights granted by the constitution or law.

Article 9

No one shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest, detention or exile.

Article 10

Everyone is entitled in full equality to a fair and public hearing by an independent and impartial tribunal, in the determination of his rights and obligations and of any criminal charge against him.

Article 11

1. Everyone charged with a penal offence has the right to be presumed innocent until proved guilty according to law in a public trial at which he has had all the guarantees necessary for his defence.
2. No one shall be held guilty of any penal offence on account of any act or omission which did not constitute a penal offence, under national or international law, at the time when it was committed. Nor shall a heavier penalty be imposed than the one that was applicable at the time the penal offence was committed.

Article 12

No one shall be subjected to arbitrary interference with his privacy, family, home or correspondence, nor to attacks upon his honour and reputation. Everyone has the right to the protection of the law against such interference or attacks.

Article 13

1. Everyone has the right to freedom of movement and residence within the borders of each State.
2. Everyone has the right to leave any country, including his own, and to return to his country.

Article 14

1. Everyone has the right to seek and to enjoy in other countries asylum from persecution.
2. This right may not be invoked in the case of prosecutions genuinely arising from non-political crimes or from acts contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.

Article 15

1. Everyone has the right to a nationality.
2. No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his nationality nor denied the right to change his nationality.

Article 16

1. Men and women of full age, without any limitation due to race, nationality or religion, have the right to marry and to found a family. They are entitled to equal rights as to marriage, during marriage and at its dissolution.
2. Marriage shall be entered into only with the free and full consent of the intending spouses.
3. The family is the natural and fundamental group unit of society and is entitled to protection by society and the State.

Article 17

1. Everyone has the right to own property alone as well as in association with others.
2. No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his property.

Article 18

Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion; this right includes freedom to change his religion or belief, and freedom, either alone or in community with others and in public or private, to manifest his religion or belief in teaching, practice, worship and observance.

Article 19

Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right includes freedom to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers.

Article 20

1. Everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and association.
2. No one may be compelled to belong to an association.

Article 21

1. Everyone has the right to take part in the government of his country, directly or through freely chosen representatives.
2. Everyone has the right to equal access to public service in his country.
3. The will of the people shall be the basis of the authority of government; this will shall be expressed in periodic and genuine elections, which shall be by universal and equal suffrage and shall be held by secret vote or by equivalent free voting procedures.

Article 22

Everyone, as a member of society, has the right to social security and is entitled to realization, through national effort and international co-operation and in accordance with the organization and resources of each State, of the economic, social and cultural rights indispensable for his dignity and the free development of his personality.

Article 23

1. Everyone has the right to work, to free choice of employment, to just and favourable work conditions and to protection against unemployment.
2. Everyone, without any discrimination, has the right to equal pay for equal work.
3. Everyone who works has the right to just and favourable remuneration ensuring for himself and his family an existence worthy of human dignity, and supplemented, if necessary, by other means of social protection.
4. Everyone has the right to form and to join trade unions for the protection of his interests.

Article 24

Everyone has the right to rest and leisure, including reasonable limitation of working hours and periodic holidays with pay.

Article 25

1. Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control.
2. Motherhood and childhood are entitled special care and assistance. All children, born in or out of wedlock, shall enjoy the same social protection.

Article 26

1. Everyone has the right to education. Education shall be free, at least in the elementary and fundamental stages. Elementary education shall be compulsory. Technical and professional education shall be made generally available and higher education shall be equally accessible to all on the basis of merit.
2. Education shall be directed to the full development of the human personality and to the strengthening of respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms. It shall promote understanding, tolerance and friendship among all nations, racial or religious groups, and shall further the activities of the United Nations for the maintenance of peace.
3. Parents have a prior right to choose the kind of education that shall be given to their children.

Article 27

1. Everyone has the right freely to participate in cultural life of community, to enjoy the arts and share in scientific advancement and its benefits.
2. Everyone has the right to the protection of the moral and material interests resulting from any scientific, literary or artistic production of which he is the author.

Article 28

Everyone is entitled to a social and international order in which the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration can be fully realized.

Article 29

1. Everyone has duties to the community in which alone the free and full development of his personality is possible.
2. In the exercise of his rights and freedoms, everyone shall be subject only to such limitations as are determined by law solely for the purpose of securing due recognition and respect for the rights and freedoms of others and of meeting the just requirements of morality, public order and the general welfare in a democratic society.
3. These rights and freedoms may in no case be exercised contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.

Article 30

Nothing in this Declaration may be interpreted as implying for any State, group or person any right to engage in any activity or to perform any act aimed at the destruction of any of the rights and freedoms set forth herein.

Adopted by the UN General Assembly on 10 December 1948

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

A Call to Prevent Climate Change

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned that the world is struggling with global warming, with such effects as warming temperatures, more frequent and more intense severe weather, rising sea levels, and increased water and air pollution, all of which have the power to end human civilization,

Noting with concern that severe weather conditions caused by climate change⁰ are dramatically affecting agricultural production, which hurts economies and creates higher rates of unemployment than ever before,

Conscious that the of the burning of fossil fuels accounts for over 30% of greenhouse gas emissions, and the destruction of forests and land accounts for 12-29% of all greenhouse gas emissions,

Bearing in mind that hydropower is produced for an average of 40% the cost of fossil fuel, while emitting considerably fewer greenhouse gases, and that solar electricity creates no harmful emissions at the same cost,

Concerned that over 1.2 billion people, or 16% of the world, are without electricity,

Taking into consideration that all countries and people are affected by global warming, regardless of their location or energy usage,

1. Calls upon the UN for \$200 million dollars to build solar and hydroelectric plants to provide electricity and jobs for the people, with the goals of greatly reducing harmful greenhouse gas emissions while at the same time creating employment opportunities and providing electricity to those without;
2. Keeping in mind that this amount of money is only three percent of the UN's total budget of \$5.7 billion dollars, and that the money would pay for hundreds of hydroelectric and solar power plants, create hundreds of jobs, and help over 9 million people;
3. Keeping in mind that these electricity sources are self-sustainable and will pay for themselves;
4. Further requests that the UN assist local governments in protecting forests and creating jobs by implementing a security system made firstly up of the indigenous population;
5. Highly recommends that all countries consider implementing similar solutions;
6. Urges that this be put into effect immediately.

A Call to Reduce Nuclear Weapons Worldwide

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3 The General Assembly,

5 Noting that a total of 22,000 nuclear weapons exist in the world today that can generate more than 64,000
6 megatons of nuclear explosions,

8 Deeply concerned that even a small-scale, regional nuclear war involving only a total of 1.5 megatons of nuclear

Bearing in mind the commitment made by heads of state and the government to fulfill the Millennium Development Goal,

1. Calls upon UN Water to recognise unclean and low water supply in Gambia, as well as negotiate funding for clean and more water. Approximately \$290 is needed for every single house without a filter. Inflatable solar stills can be fitted into each home. The UN gets about 8 billion dollars each year. Plus, other countries can contribute;
2. Solar stills are an easy and effective ways to filter water. They are inexpensive and durable filter systems. They replicate the way nature makes rain. I quote, "impure water is contained outside the collector, where it is evaporated by sunlight shining through clear plastic or glass. The pure water vapor condenses on the cool inside where it is collected and removed";
3. Requests UN initially tests solar stills in 1000 homes. After 6 months they check results and see how it works, and see if enough water is produced for everyday living. If results are positive, more homes can be fitted with solar stills;
4. Calls upon UN to figure out how many houses are without clean water and install more solar stills, if they work;
5. Requests workers to be posted at the coast to transport ocean water to villages and cities for \$10 an hour. (Possible 12 hour work-shifts and 10 man crews);
6. Requests UN Water to report to the General Assembly on the results of the negotiation.

1 Convention on Enforcing the Freedom of Press in the Syrian Arab Republic

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The General Assembly,

Convinced that the lack of the freedom of press in the Syrian Arab Republic is a violation of a basic essential human right,

Affirming that we do not find it appropriate that citizens who want to express their freedom of press are not able to have this basic liberty,

Further explaining that any citizen in Syria who is publishing views in a blog, newspaper, or on a radio station that does not agree with the government and is not a federal bureaucrat may or may not be charged with defamation and is either forced to serve jail time, pay a fine and even sentenced to death,

Recognizing that limiting the power of the federal government would help the citizens of Syria obtain more freedoms such as being able to create their own website, blog, newspaper article, or just begin able to voice their own opinion about the government in written word,

Observing that the Syrian government is under Authoritarian Presidential Rule. The President is elected by popular vote and then he elects a Prime Minister of his choice. The People's Council is then elected through a closed-list proportional representation system,

Further recalling that Syria's President, Bashar al-Assad and prime minister Imad Khamis control everything coming in and out of the people of Syria. The citizens do not have a say in political matters and if they voice their opinion in written form they can be fined, imprisoned, or even sentenced to death,

1. Calls upon the UN Conference on legal matters to commence negotiations to put in place a congress-like system to enforce the freedoms that are promised to the citizens of the Syrian Arab Republic in Article 38 of the Syrian Constitution that is currently not being granted to the citizens due to the powerful control of the President and Prime Minister;
2. The representative body above will be established by April 20, 2020 and all 260 of the members of this new branch of government will be elected by the citizens of the Syrian Arab Republic. Twenty delegates from each of the 13 provinces will be elected to make up the system;
3. Requests the UN Conference on legal matters to report to the General Assembly on the results of these negotiations.

A Call to Reduce Child Labor Through Education

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The General Assembly,

Alarmed by the fact that an estimated 168 million children are affected by child labor each year and an estimated 3.3 million are affected in Zimbabwe alone,

Considering the fact that almost half of this work is titled "mentally, physically, socially or morally dangerous and harmful to children," and conscious that, worldwide, an estimated 22,000 children die from child labor work every year,

Observing that worldwide only 50% of child labor workers attend school, that rural working children tend to be disadvantaged in school, and that, in Zimbabwe, 84% of children do not complete high school,

Deeply disturbed that there is a significant negative correlation between levels of economic activity of children and youth literacy rates,

Noting the Universal Declaration of Human Rights grants everyone rest and leisure, limited working hours, and the right to an elementary and fundamental education,

Taking into consideration the resolutions of world organizations on child labor to prevent any more children from becoming child laborers, withdraw those currently working, and provide an effective, quality education,

1. Requests that the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) implements an international exchange program to educate upcoming and current teachers;
2. Urges the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF) to provide a meal for each student to encourage children to attend school rather than work;
3. Further recommends UNICEF improve the administering of educational materials no later than January of 2018.

Disease caused by unclean drinking water kills more than 3.75 million people every year – and nearly half of them are children under five years old.

WaterStep installs water treatment plants that supply developing communities with access to safe, clean water.
