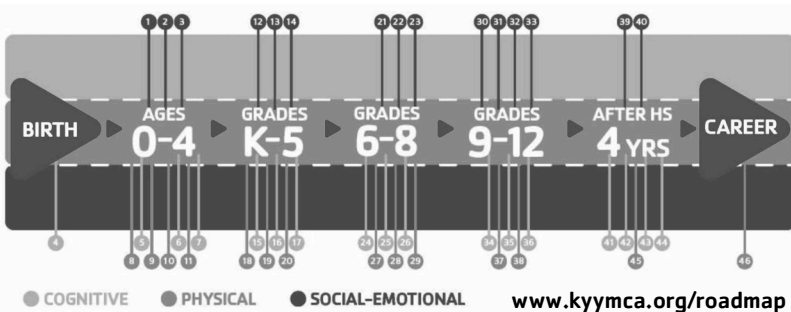

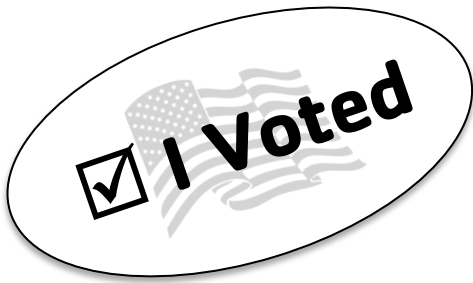

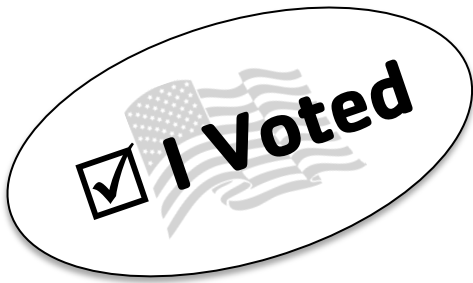

**CONFERENCE STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT AND DRESS CODE**

The purpose of this Code of Conduct is to identify personal behavior that is consistent with the purpose and objectives of the Kentucky YMCA Youth Association. The items within the Code are designed to protect the welfare of the program for current participants and future generations. A participant's personal behavior reflects upon one's self, one's Student YMCA, and the Kentucky YMCA. Registration in any Kentucky YMCA conference program indicates personal acceptance of the Code of Conduct. Any student sent home for violation of this Code will be at the expense of parent or guardian.

**EXPECTATIONS OF PARTICIPANTS**

1. Each delegate shall conduct himself/herself in an orderly and responsible manner before, during, and after all functions of the Kentucky YMCA conference programs.
2. All participants share the responsibility for their actions equally when violations of the Code are witnessed. Those who choose to be present when a violation occurs and do not immediately act to remedy and report the violation shall, by their own choice, be considered participants in the violation. In relation to this Code, there are no "innocent bystanders."
3. No delegate shall leave a Kentucky YMCA function unless the approval of his/her advisor AND the director of the program is secured. The delegate must be picked up and returned by a parent or legal guardian who must take responsibility for the delegate in writing.
4. Each delegate is legally and financially liable for the removal, defacing, or willful damage to public or private property. Any act of vandalism, destruction of property, or misuse of a facility may be a crime and will be treated as a potential criminal violation.
5. Food (including gum and candy) and beverages other than water (including those sold by the hotel) are not permitted in any meeting sessions.
6. Cell phones, music players, or other wireless communications devices are not to be used during any meeting session.
7. The use of tobacco products, burning of incense, possession of alcoholic beverages, and the use of legal or illegal drugs not in accordance with a prescription is forbidden at any Kentucky YMCA function.
8. Youth delegates may not enter rooms other than those assigned by the Y-Staff or advisor.
9. Physical intimacy between participants of any gender is inappropriate at all times while at Kentucky YMCA Youth Association Programs and is prohibited.
10. All delegates shall be in and remain in their assigned rooms by scheduled curfew and doors shall remain closed until scheduled end of curfew.
11. Badges shall be worn ONLY by the individual whose name is on the badge. Badge switching or sharing is strictly prohibited. Participants will wear their assigned badges at all times when they are not in their sleeping rooms, and must be visible at all times. Badges are to be worn around the neck and are not to be defaced, decorated, or altered in any way. There may be a charge for replacement badges.
12. Unless there is a fire, participants will not pull the fire alarm. Pulling a fire alarm is a serious offense, and any participant who does so will be held financially and potentially criminally liable. Hotel alarms automatically summon the fire department and create a great inconvenience and fear for the hotel and other guests.
13. Use of personal vehicles by students during Kentucky YMCA conferences is strictly prohibited.
14. Weapons of any kind and items that could cause injury or damage to participants and/or property are strictly forbidden.

**VIOLATION OF EXPECTATIONS**

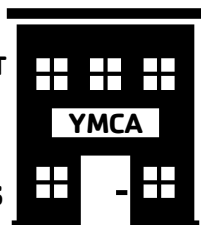

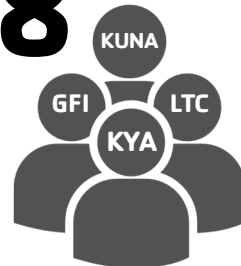

# Family Dollar, et al v. Baytos

This year's case is *Family Dollar v Baytos*, a workers' compensation case. Workers' compensation is a unique area of the law. When a worker gets injured on the job, he or she is entitled to compensation to cover their medical care, their lost wages, and the loss of any future earning capacity. Because there are many on-the-job injuries every day, there is a special statutory scheme (or, set of laws) for the court system to handle these cases. In other words, workers' compensation cases go to a special "mini court system" so that they do not clog up Kentucky's district and circuit courts. The judges in the workers' compensation system handle only workers' compensation claims, and are specialists in this unique area of law.

A workers' compensation claim is a case where a person alleges they were injured as a result of their job duties, and are asking their employer for compensation for the injury. The types of claims vary greatly, from workers involved in accidents at work, to workers who contract diseases as a result of the work environment, such as black lung. Workers' compensation claims do not go through the normal tiered court system. Instead, the case is initially heard before an Administrative Law Judge (ALJ). If one of the parties wants to appeal the decision of the Administrative Law Judge, that party appeals to the Workers' Compensation Board. If a party is still displeased with the ruling, the case then can be appealed to the Kentucky Court of Appeals, and on to the Kentucky Supreme Court. The Kentucky Supreme Court is the final word in all Workers' Compensation matters.

Stephen Baytos suffered a serious injury while working as a manager at Family Dollar. He was lifting boxes, and felt chest pain, which was ultimately determined to be a torn thoracic aorta. He filed a workers' compensation claim, asking for Family Dollar to pay for his medical care, and for his lost wages. The ALJ first determined that the injury was, in fact, actually caused by his work activities. After it was determined that Family Dollar is liable for Baytos' injuries, Family Dollar tried to settle with Baytos as to the amount of compensation he would receive. Baytos agreed, and a settlement agreement was executed.

Sadly, Mr. Baytos died several years later as a result of the torn thoracic aorta. Normally, when a worker dies as a result of their job duties (for example, a fatal on-the-job accident), his or her dependents are entitled to receive compensation for their death. Therefore, Mr. Baytos' widow, Mamie Baytos, filed a motion to reopen his workers' compensation claim, and she asked for compensation for his death. Family Dollar objected, arguing that Mr. Baytos had settled the claim and it could not be reopened.

The ALJ agreed with Mamie, and awarded her compensation for her husband's death. Family Dollar appealed, and the Workers' Compensation Board reversed the decision. The Board reasoned that the settlement agreement was final, and Mr. Baytos had waived his right to ever reopen the claim. This waiver was binding on his dependents. Mamie appealed, and was successful before the Court of Appeals.

In this case, there is no dispute as to any material fact. Both sides agree as to all the relevant facts (that Mr. Baytos suffered a torn thoracic aorta, that he knowingly entered into the settlement agreement, and that he later died as a result of the injury). The only question before the court is whether Mrs. Baytos is entitled to reopen a claim that her husband settled before his death.

The main issue to address is whether Mrs. Baytos is entitled to reopen the claim even though her husband entered into a final settlement agreement before his death. Another way to think about the issue is: Even if Mr. Baytos settled *his* claims, is he entitled or capable of waiving *his wife's* rights to compensation?

The **Appellants**, Family Dollar, will argue that the settlement is final. It should emphasize that it is in the interest of public policy for settlement agreements to be final and not subject to endless litigation.

The **Appellee**, Mamie Baytos, will argue she has a right to compensation separate from her husband. Even if her husband received compensation for his *injury*, she is still entitled to compensation for his *death*.

Students might also consider the following questions in formulating their arguments:

- Are the rights of an injured worker different from the rights of the workers' family, or do the families' rights depend on the workers' rights?
- What exactly did Mr. Baytos agree to in the settlement agreement?
- Why is it important to Family Dollar, and other companies, to settle workers' compensation claims? What is Family Dollar's interest in having a "final" judgment?
- In creating the workers' compensation system, did the General Assembly promote the settling of claims through settlement agreements?

## BE A BETTER DEBATER!!! READ THESE HELPFUL HINTS AND TIPS:

- **ALWAYS ADDRESS THE CHAIR!** “Harry Potter, Hogwarts Gryffindor, Sir/Madam Chair.”
- **TECHNICAL QUESTIONS**
  - READ the bill before you decide on your question. DON’T ask questions that are already in the bill. For example, “When will this bill go into effect?” and “How much will this bill cost?” are *usually* answered in the Body of the Bill.
  - Don’t ask questions that begin with “WHY...?” Those are almost *always* debatable.
- **WHAT YOU MAY DO DURING PRO/CON DEBATE**
  - Each time you are recognized, you may do ONE or TWO of the following things:
    - Ask the sponsor(s) a *technical* question about the bill
    - Ask the sponsor(s) a *debatable* questions about the bill
    - Give a speech for or against the bill
    - Yield your remaining time to another delegate
  - If you would like to ASK A QUESTION (or a series of 2 questions), when you are recognized, say, **“Will the sponsor(s) yield to a question (or `series of questions`)?”**
  - If you would like to SPEAK OR YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER ASKING A QUESTION, you should also say, “And I reserve my right to speak (or `yield my time`) afterward.”
  - If you would like to YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER SPEAKING, you should reserve your right to do so after addressing the chair.
    - EX: “Hermione Granger, Hogwarts, Sir Chair. I reserve my right to yield the remainder of my time to Delegate Malfoy from Hogwarts Slytherin.”

PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY	To request advice on procedure from the CHAIR. SENATORS or REPRESENTATIVES may make this point at any time another delegate is not speaking.
REPRESENTATIVE	A member of the House.
ROLL CALL	Calling the names of all members to determine their presence.
SECOND	A personal approval of a motion, generally making it subject to debate.
SENATOR	A member of the Senate.

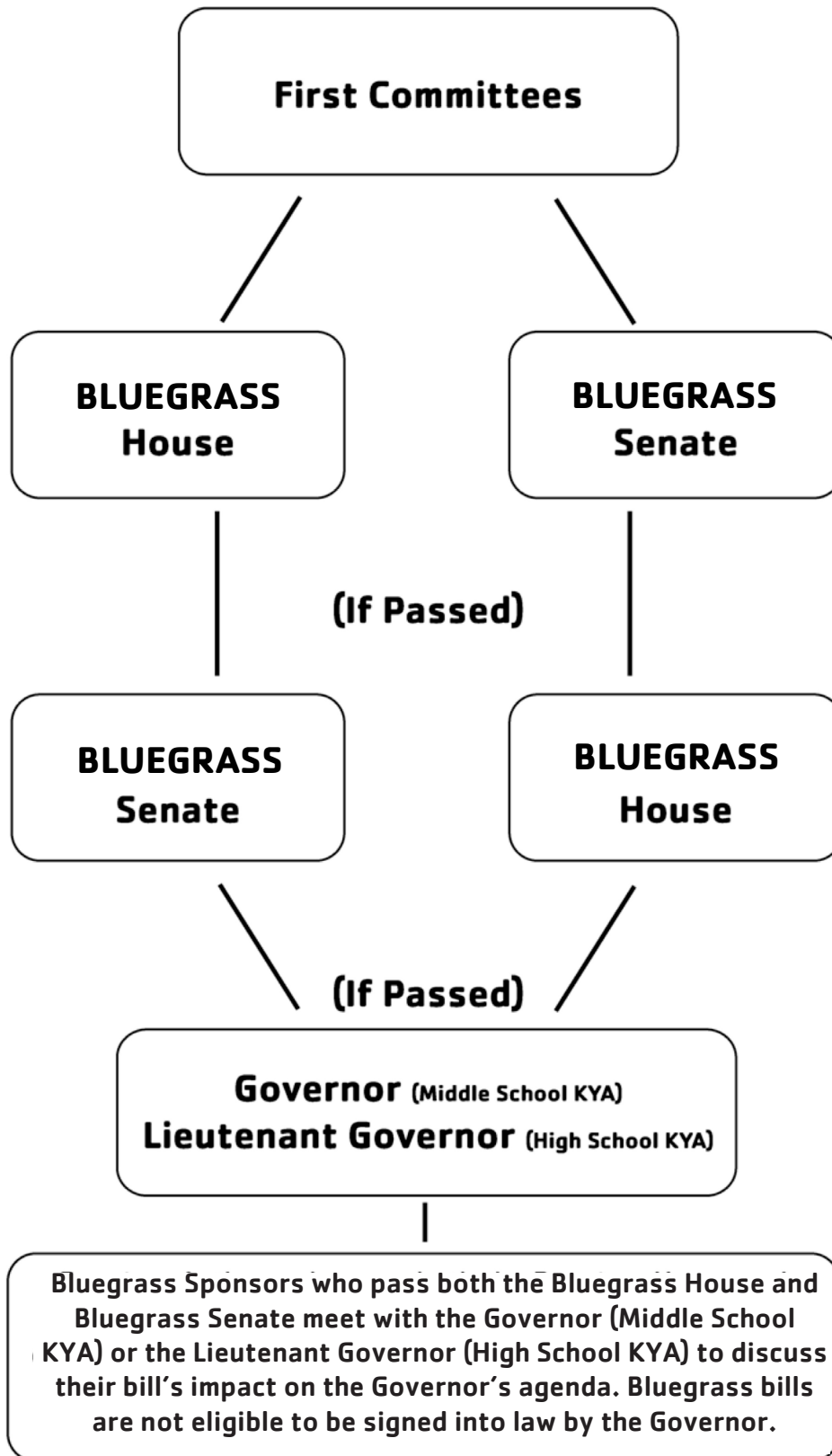

3                                **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5    Section 1: Currently, the state of Kentucky allows local boards of education to set the start and end  
6    dates of the public school year. As a result, the variety of school duration periods have taken away from  
7    potential economic revenue in the state and follow irrelevant agricultural customs that are no longer  
8    practiced today.

9  
10   Section 2: This act will nullify KRS 158.070(i)(b)(2), pertaining to the number of days required by the  
11   state of Kentucky in which school must be in session. In addition, this act will create a uniform school  
12   schedule in which all public schools in Kentucky will begin the year on the Tuesday after Labor Day and  
13   end the year on the Friday before Memorial Day. If passed, this bill will be effective at the start of the  
14   2018-2019 school year.

15  
16   Section 3: This bill will cut an average of ten (10) days from the current school session. However, local  
17   boards of education may choose whether or not to observe federal holidays. In addition, local boards of  
18   education can continue to control the specific days which their schools will be in session, as well as the  
19   hours which the school will operate.

20  
21   Section 4: This bill will go into effect beginning Monday, September 3, 2018.

5 Section 1: This bill will require that every employer offer six weeks paid maternity or paternity leave for  
6 every employee. Those working above minimum wage will earn at least 70% of their full pay and those  
7 working at minimum wage will earn at least. 80% of their full pay. Employers will also be required to offer  
8 a paid week off before the expected date of the baby, where at least 25% of their full pay must be  
9 offered.  
10

11 Section 2: If a business or employer fails to offer and/or pay an employee, the business will be fined in  
12 the following order:

13       • First time offender- \$250 fine plus the money that the employer was supposed to pay the  
14 employee and an additional \$250 for the employee.


15       • Second-time offender- \$500 fine plus the money that the employer was supposed to pay the  
16 employee and an additional \$250 for the employee..Third time offender- \$750 fine plus the  
17 money that the employer was supposed to pay the employee and an additional \$250 for the  
18 employee.  
19

20 Section 3: The cost associated with this bill will be covered by the employer

21

22 Section 4: As of right now, the state of Kentucky only has the Adoption Leave Law. However, there are no  
23 laws regarding mandatory paid maternity or paternity leave.  
24

25 Section 5: This bill will go into effect immediately after passage.

5   Section 1: 31 states have banned corporal punishment in their schools; however, 19 states still allow the  
6   use of paddling or spanking as a disciplinary measure.  
7

8   Section 2: In 2011, there were 1,581 reported accounts of corporal punishment in schools, one-third of  
9   these cases dealing with students with special needs.  
10

11   Section 3: Corporal punishment can cause problems to a child's mental, physical, and psychological  
12   health. Studies have shown that paddling students or other means of physical punishment can lead to  
13   increased aggression, antisocial behaviors, depression, low self-esteem, reduced academic achievement,  
14   and can lead to student on student violence.  
15

16   Section 4: If a student was found to be punished by paddling at school upon the bills passing then the  
17   responsible school official could face charges of assault or battery to a minor which further result in a  
18   fine, probation, or incarceration.  
19

20   Section 5: This bill will go into effect on August 1, 2018.

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5   Section 1: Named the number one infrastructure emergency in the United States, the 53 year-old Brent  
6   Spence Bridge was originally designed to handle 85,000 cars and trucks each day, but it is now  
7   overcrowded with more than 170,000 vehicles a day. This is the Brent Spence Bridge - one of the most  
8   hazardous bridges in the nation, and the Ohio River crossing for I-75. Interstate 75 is one of the longest  
9   highway systems in the U. S. I-75 is the major north-south route, from southern Florida to the northern  
10   tip of Michigan. Though many local Kentuckians work in Ohio and vice versa and travel this highway daily,  
11   this road carries the weight of many people from out-of-state and tractor trailers packed with  
12   merchandise. Opened in 1963, the bridge today is too crowded, too cramped, too confusing and far too  
13   complicated for any easy fix. The Brent Spence Bridge is one of only 15 major interstate bridges in the  
14   country labeled by the federal government as "functionally obsolete" as it has deteriorated and does not  
15   meet safety or traffic flow standards. Recent estimates project this cost to be 1.9 billion dollars. The  
16   Federal government acknowledges this need but insists the cost of replacement lies primarily in the hands  
17   of Kentuckians and Ohioans. Brent Spence Bridge will double the number of lanes on the bridge,  
18   improving accessibility for everyone who uses it.

19  
20   Section 2: The funding for this project will come from multiple sources, because so many people  
21   and corporations depend on the bridge. A portion of the funds may come from taxes. However,  
22   many of its users are not from the Ohio river valley region, so the tax should not just affect  
23   residents living near the bridge. Apart from taxing people individually, a tax on harmful goods  
24   such as alcohol and tobacco will be applied. No single source of funding can carry the burden  
25   equitably, so companies should provide private funding because they rely on employees that  
26   commute across the bridge.

5 Section 1: All persons who have a car registered to them must have auto insurance that will cover at  
6 least \$25,000 of property damages caused by that person during any automotive accident that is their  
7 fault.

8  
9 Section 2: It will be that person's responsibility to pay for this insurance.


10  
11 Section 3: In the first infraction of this law, the person will be fined \$500-\$1,000 and a suspension of  
12 that person's registration for 1 year or until proof of insurance is submitted to the DMV.

13  
14 Section 4: In the second infraction of this law, the person will be fined \$1,500-2,500, and that person's  
15 driver license will be suspended indefinitely until proof of insurance is submitted the the DMV.

16  
17 Section 5: In the third infraction of this law, the person will be fined \$3,000, their car impounded, and  
18 their driver's license suspended until proof of insurance is submitted to the DMV. There will also be a jail  
19 time that does not exceed 90 days, decided on a case by case basis.

20  
21 Section 6: This bill will take effect January 1st, 2018 to give citizens time to change their insurance plans  
22 and adjust to the new fees.

6 Section 1: Currently KEES money is earned by students who aim to be college and career ready; however  
7 this money is not being utilized for career readiness. The Kentucky Labor Cabinet has a registered list of  
8 approved apprenticeship programs. By expanding the KEES fund to apprenticeship programs, the state  
9 can direct our own talent and funds to deserving students on career pathways.  
10


11 Section 2: The Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) will enforce this legislation, just  
12 as they currently distribute KEES money to other students. The same standards (GPA, residency,  
13 citizenship, and exclusion of felons), and specific standards for students who earn a GED, will apply to  
14 apprenticeship students for the duration of their education. Kentucky registered apprenticeship programs  
15 are those defined by the United States Department of Labor (USDOL) and the Kentucky Labor Cabinet  
16 (KLC), listed on the KLC website.  
17

18 Section 3: The funding for KEES money awards is provided by the Kentucky lottery and the Kentucky  
19 Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). The funding is already in place for the expansion of this  
20 program. This bill is not creating need for new funds but redirecting awarded money within the state.  
21

22 Section 4: This bill will go into effect at the start of the 2017-18 school year. Those who are enrolled in  
23 an approved apprenticeship program will begin to receive awarded scholarship but not be reimbursed for  
24 the prior expenses

10 Kentucky on the first weekend of August and are generating revenue, revenue lost from Kentucky.

11  
12 Section 3: Price restrictions include:


- 13 • \$30 per school supply item,
- 14 • \$100 per clothing item,
- 15 • \$80 per pair of shoes,
- 16 • \$2000 towards electronic devices (Calculator, computer, tablets, educational software,
- 17 • and computer accessories exclusively), and
- 18 • \$2000 towards emergency supplies (generators, lanterns, batteries, flashlights, propane
- 19 • and kerosene heaters, and propane canisters.)

20  
21 Section 4: If the buyer goes over the exceeded limit, they will proceed to pay the taxes on the items that  
22 put them over the budget stated in section three. There will be exemptions from items that are deemed  
23 unnecessary.


24  
25 Section 5: There will be a registry for businesses that would like to participate in the tax free weekend  
26 through the Kentucky Department of Revenue.

27  
28 Section 6: This bill will be enacted July 1, 2017 and the tax free weekend will take place August 4-6,  
29 2017.

30  
31 Section 7: There is no cost of the enactment of this bill.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: This bill will provide student representation for grades 9-12 by requiring each school district  
6 to elect two particular individuals, that meet certain requirements, from their school body to be the  
7 student voice on their school board.

8  
9 Section 2: The two individuals mentioned in Section 1 will be elected through a student body election. The  
10 nominees will be appointed by administrators throughout the high school. Once chosen, the candidates  
11 will be voted on in a school wide election. Soon after the student representative is chosen, they will  
12 undertake the responsibilities of a school board member.


13  
14 Section 3: Only the first year after this bill is enacted will there be two elections. One election to choose  
15 one senior representative that will carry out the main duties of a school board member. The second  
16 election will select one junior representative to aid the senior candidate by attending board meetings that  
17 the senior representative cannot take part in. If the senior representative fails to attend five board  
18 meetings, then an impeachment process will take place and the junior representative will assume the role  
19 of the main student representative.

20  
21 Section 4: The junior appointed in the second election of the first year will assume the main role of the  
22 student body representative. An election will be held each school year to replace the junior candidate. If a  
23 candidate refuses to accept a role or there are no eligible contenders then it will be up to the school's  
24 discretion.

25  
26 Section 5: Both the senior and junior representatives will have to meet these requirements:

- 27
- 28 • GPA of 3.5 or higher
  - 29 • 95% attendance and above
  - 30 • Exhibits characteristics of responsibility, leadership, excellence, ambition, maturity, passion,  
dedication, respect, and honesty
  - 31 • Have completed 10 hours of community service

1 An act to to establish a registry for those convicted of cruelty to animals

2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: For the past 9 years, Kentucky has been ranked 50th in the United States in animal protection  
6 laws by various reputable news agencies. This is deplorable and must be acted upon. The introduction of  
7 a registry for convicted perpetrators of animal abuse will act as a strong deterrent for abuse related  
8 crimes. Locations such as the state of Tennessee and New York City have already created a registry of  
9 this nature and they have been quite successful in preventing crimes related to animal cruelty.

10

11 Section 2: This bill will require a registry to be created that documents and keeps record of all people who  
12 are convicted of animal abuse. This registry, which will be available to the public, will be a key tool in  
13 stopping those who intend to do harm to animals.

14


15 Section 3: Those convicted of their first offense of animal cruelty to the first or second degree will have  
16 their name, date of birth, address, county, offense, and conviction date placed on the Kentucky Animal  
17 Abuse Registry for three years. If one is convicted of a second separate offense, the amount of time that  
18 their information will remain on the registry is 6 years. On their third offense, the information will be  
19 available for their lifespan.

20


21 Section 4: The implementation of software for the registry will cost \$400,000 and will then be reduced to  
22 an \$85,000 annual maintenance fee. This sum will be accounted for when state budgets are determined.

23


24 Section 5: Upon passage, this bill will be enacted on January 1, 2018.

5 Section 1: Amend Section 43 of the 1891 Kentucky Constitution which states: "The members of the  
6 General Assembly shall, in all cases except treason, felony, breach or surety of the peace, be privileged  
7 from arrest during their attendance on the sessions of their respective Houses, and in going to and  
8 returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either House they shall not be questioned in  
9 any other place."

10  
11 Section 2: In order to ensure justice in the state of Kentucky, amending Section 43 will discontinue  
12 Kentucky's Legislative immunity of arrest for most crimes. Revoking this privilege will ensure safety and  
13 acceptance of responsibility among all residents of Kentucky. Legislative members will no longer be  
14 exempt from following the laws that have been written for everyone, including DUI's, which are usually  
15 classified as misdemeanors in Kentucky. No more blanket immunity and privilege from arrest.

16  
17 Section 3: Should a member of the General Assembly, either Representative or Senator, commit any  
18 crimes while in session, they must be treated by the justice system as any other Kentuckian. During the  
19 time in which they have not paid a fine or served a sentence for their crime, the Governor will appoint a  
20 temporary replacement from their district, of their party.

21  
22 Section 4: Upon passage, this will go into effect on January 1, 2017.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5

6 Section 1: Currently Kentucky has enacted law that requires all HS Seniors to have CPR training as a  
7 graduation requirement. Kentucky's current law only requires one staff member per school to be trained  
8 in CPR/ AED. Many students have issues such as allergies or asthma that can lead to respiratory arrest.  
9 Respiratory arrest is when the heart is pumping but the individual isn't breathing. Victims of respiratory  
10 arrest require CPR immediately. This bill will ensure that all school children lives will be saved by requiring  
11 all school staff in Kentucky to obtain CPR certification  
12

13 Section 2: This bill will require all school staff to be certified in CPR/AED. The Kentucky Department of  
14 Education will enforce this law.  
15


16 Section 3: It is approximately \$19 per individual. The funds are allocated by the board of education but  
17 are part of the school health services budget. A yearly PD will be offered by each school system.  
18

19 Section 4: Any teacher failing to meet the certification requirements will result in the following  
20 consequences:  
21 • 1st offense: \$25 fee and required to pay for own training must be completed within 2 months.  
22 • 2nd offense: \$100 fee and required to pay for own training must be completed within 1 month.  
23 • 3rd offense: Revoke teaching license and must pay reinstatement, cost of training,  
24 reimbursement to school system for lost wages and substitute costs.

26 Section 5: All laws or parts of laws in conflict with this bill are hereby considered null and void.

9 the hospital to secure the child’s welfare. If possible, the newborn will be placed with a family member.  
10 The mother will be cited for child endangerment if the questioned substances are not regulated or  
11 prescribed by the mother’s physician. The purpose of our bill is to deter mothers from taking illegal drugs  
12 while pregnant and to protect the newborn child. In order for newborns to acquire a legal birth certificate  
13 mothers must be tested.  
14

15 Section 2: An illegal drug is a drug that has limitations on its ownership or use by a government and is  
16 illegal in certain situations. A drug is any chemical that affects the human body or mind when it is  
17 swallowed, breathed in, or consumed in another way.  
18

19 Section 3: A birth attendant or hospital administrator will be responsible for only administering birth  
20 certificates to newborns whose mothers have been tested. The state department of Child Protective  
21 Services and local law enforcement will administer the placement of the newborn and the citation for  
22 child endangerment.  
23

24 Section 4: This bill will go into effect January 1st, 2017.

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4

5 Section 1: There will be no change in the existing requirements for drivers who receive their initial permit  
6 and license at the age of 16.  
7

8 Section 2: Drivers 21 through 65 would be required to take the written driver's license test every four  
9 years as part of their license renewal. These drivers will have three attempts to obtain a passing score of  
10 70 percent.  
11

12 Section 3: Drivers ages 21 through 65 who fail to pass the written renewal exam within three attempts  
13 will be required to pass a driver's education course in order to renew their license.  
14


15 Section 4: Drivers ages 65 and over would be required to take a driving test every four years as part of  
16 their license renewal. This test would be equivalent to the driving test administered to first-time license  
17 seekers for their intermediate permit but would also include applicable changes in motor vehicle laws and  
18 driving regulations since their last renewal. A passing score shall be 70 percent.  
19

20 Section 5: Drivers over the age of 65 who fail to pass the driving exam on their first attempt must  
21 complete a driver's education course before attempting the driving test a second time.  
22

23 Section 6: Drivers over the age of 65 who fail to pass the driving exam on their second attempt may  
24 attempt the exam for a third time. If drivers over the age of 65 do not pass the exam on their third  
25 attempt, they may begin the process for a new license renewal after a six-month waiting period.  
26

27 Section 7: An additional fee of five (5) dollars will be assessed on every license renewal/application fee.  
28 This money will be used to offset the additional costs incurred to implement the increased testing. Any  
29 remaining funds beyond the cost of implementation will be used to provide community-based grants for  
30 alternative or public transportation initiatives.  
31

32 Section 8: This bill will be enacted July 1, 2017.

Section 1: Any testing using animals in the development of cosmetics will become illegal.

Section 2: The organization convicted shall be fined an amount of \$20,000 annually for the next five to seven years.

Section 3: The fines will be issued by the Kentucky Department of Agriculture that already handles the administration for animal related statutes such as the Animal Control Advisory Board.

Section 4: This bill will go into effect June 2017.

1 An act to require all Kentucky public schools to include a recycling bin in each classroom.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: Currently, public schools in the Commonwealth are only encouraged to develop recycling  
6 programs. This is why many public schools do not have even a single recycling bin on the grounds. One  
7 school on average uses about \$25,000 worth of paper in teacher copies a year; this does not include  
8 paper the students bring, or notebook paper. It is estimated that over one million dollars is spent on  
9 paper by Commonwealth public schools annually.

10  
11 Section 2: The purpose of this bill is to require Commonwealth public schools to place a recycling bin in  
12 each classroom, and notify students, teachers, and staff that they are to be used daily to dispose of  
13 paper.

14  
15 Section 3: The state funds to each county will be portioned to have a certain amount of money to pay for  
16 the bins. The transportation and pickup of the paper will be provided by the Kentucky state recycling  
17 department. The recycling will be collected once a week on the same day as trash pickup.

18  
19 Section 4: This bill will be enforced by the State Board of Education. The penalties for not following this  
20 law will be as follows:

- 21
- 22 • 1<sup>st</sup> offense – warning and 3 months to have bins in schools
  - 23 • 2<sup>nd</sup> offense - \$200 and 2 months to have bins in schools
  - 24 • 3<sup>rd</sup> offense - \$500 fine and 1 month to have bins in schools
  - 25 • 4<sup>th</sup> and further offenses - \$1,000 dollar fine and investigative action by state board of education  
26 into the noncompliant Board of Education, to determine why the bins are not in the schools, and  
27 fix it.

28 Section 5: this bill will go into effect the beginning of the 2017 – 2018 school year.

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An act to require prisoners to pay for their meals

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: To require all inmates in prisons in the Commonwealth of Kentucky to pay for their meals either by working or by using their own money.

Section 2: This bill is needed in Kentucky because prisoner’s meals are payed for by our tax money.

Section 3: This bill will be enforced by the Human Rights Commission (HRC)

Section 4: An inmate will pay for the meals themselves using any bank accounts or money they have at the time of their money imprisonment

Section 5: If the inmate has insufficient funds, then his or her friends and family will be able to donate money to help pay for the prisoner’s meals.

Section 6: If there is no money given and they do not have enough money themselves, then the inmate will have to work for their meals by doing various jobs around the prison such as cleaning up trash and working during meals.


Section 7: If they cannot work and cannot pay for their meals, then a bill will add up over their time in the prison, then they will have to pay it off when they are released.

Section 8: The money used for the meals will be a virtual currency that will be tracked instead of actual money.


Section 9: One hour of work will be worth the price of one meal, which will be two dollars (2.00)

Section 10: All laws or parts of laws that are in conflict with this bill are hereby repealed.

Section 11: This bill will go into effect six (6) months after passage and the signature of the governor of Kentucky.

11 important that our government assist these individuals in their transition in order to reduce the negative  
12 impact of their unemployment.

14 Section 3: Individuals who are seeking to attend college [These individuals must have been laid off from a  
15 position related the coal industry] will be reimbursed up to \$10,000 per school year for tuition to a  
16 Kentucky public university. Individuals must provide documentation of completed courses in order to

Section 1: Currently, public employees are offered 12 weeks maternity leave without pay. This act is called family medical leave act. During this leave there is no guarantee that their job is secure, even for key employees. It is completely legal to be terminated during leave. Of all the people who take maternity leave, only 59% are eligible for FLMA.

Section 2: This bill will require that all publicly owned employers offer 12 weeks minimum of paid maternity leave. Employers will take account of the total hours of work in a year to determine if they get full pay. This means they could be paid exactly what they would earn, as if they were still there. On the other hand, employers will determine the amount paid if needed.

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Section 3: The availability of extensions is determined by individual employers. Under these circumstances that means extra time will not be paid for and therefore there might be no guarantee of the employees job after the initial 12 weeks.

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Section 4: Employees will be entitled to their former positions upon return after the paid leave of 12 weeks.

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An act to restrict the volume of coal mining slurry ponds.

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: A slurry pond is a body of water filled with coal ash, sludge, and other harmful mining byproducts. These ponds can be over 100 million gallons which is a high risk to the health of the environment if it were to leak or collapse.

Section 2: Leaving ponds of this size unregulated is a danger to not only the environment but public health in the surrounding areas. Ponds of 132,000,000 gallons have broken through dams and flooded over 500 homes, 30 businesses, and left more than 4000 homeless in one flood. Leaving ponds of this size unregulated proposes an extreme risk to public safety and can be easily fixed.

Section 3: Restricting these ponds to sizes of 10 million gallons would greatly reduce the risk of a large scale spill or in the event that one does happen it will be much less dangerous to the people and environment due to the lowered volume of the slurry pond.


Section 4: In addition, no two slurry ponds can be within a square mile of each other.

Section 5: Any companies who currently have slurry ponds that are too large or are too close together will have 10 months to change the ponds the comply with this bill after it is passed.

Section 6: If a company is found to be in violation of any of these laws, there will be three offenses:

- First offense: Warning and \$1,000 fine
- Second offense: Warning and \$5,000 fine
- Third offense or any after: \$20,000 fine

Section 7: This bill will go into effect 6 months after enactment

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5 Section 1: Kentucky is currently the 5th most obese state in the United States, with 34.6% of adults  
6 suffering from obesity. In order to solve this problem this bill would place a 15% tax on all fast food  
7 deemed unhealthy by the Kentucky health department to try and push customers to choose healthier  
8 options.

9  
10 Section 2: Businesses deemed to be a fast food restaurant by the Kentucky department of public health's  
11 obesity prevention program will be required to add the 15% tax to all unhealthy food options.

12  
13 Section 3: Businesses will be required to send their menu to the Kentucky department for public health  
14 listing the nutrition facts and ingredients of each item on their menu. If a business alters their menu or  
15 changes the ingredients on an existing menu they must send the updated menu to the department of  
16 public health before they can begin selling the item(s). Should a business be found not in compliance they  
17 will be fined \$100,000 dollars for each restaurant open in Kentucky.

19 Section 4: The money generated from this bill would be used to pay for expenses in Kentucky, provide a  
20 10% tax break incentive the first year for new companies looking to invest in Kentucky and will fund the

1                   An act to provide incentives for AP exams in the form of KEES money to all students  
2  
3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5 Section 1: The KEES program currently gives a range of \$200-300 for AP scores of three or higher to  
6 students who qualify for free or reduced lunches. This is an incentive to motivate kids to take these  
7 higher education classes and stay in Kentucky for college.  
8  
9 Section 2: Students who qualify for free or reduced lunches currently receive \$200 for scoring a 3, \$250  
10 for a 4, and \$300 for a 5 on any AP test. This would be altered to be provided for all students who score  
11 a three or higher. To prevent overspending, the scale would change to \$100 for a 3, \$150 for a 4, and  
12 \$200 for a 5 on any AP test.  
13  
14 Section 3: Currently Arizona, California, and Massachusetts provide scholarship incentives for achieving  
15 certain AP scores.  
16  
17 Section 4: This extra incentive would motivate all students to try harder in AP classes, because they can  
18 receive extra money for getting a higher score, and to take the class in the first place. This would also  
19 make students more likely to choose colleges in-state, keeping higher educated students in Kentucky.  
20 Taking AP courses in high school, would also be cheaper than taking the class in college, which would  
21 lead to less debt after college.  
22  
23 Section 5: The KEES program is 100% sponsored by the Kentucky Lottery.  
24  
25 Section 6: This Bill will go into effect the school year following passage. Any student that scored a three  
26 or higher on an AP exam before this bill is enacted will not receive the incentive.

1                   An act to Create a Harmful Algal Bloom Prevention Team in the Kentucky Division of Water  
2  
3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5 Section 1: Kentucky’s waterways and groundwater are at serious risk from the increase in harmful algal  
6 blooms (HABs). In 2015 a record breaking toxic algal bloom stretched 636 miles on the Ohio River  
7 surpassing the previous record of 30 miles. Many Kentucky lakes and ponds are impaired by HABs.  
8 Harmful Algal Blooms produce cyanotoxins. These toxins are harmful to all forms of life. Nutrient run off  
9 is one of the leading causes of HABs.  
10  
11 Section 2: This act will create within the Kentucky Division of Water a “HAB Prevention Team.” This Team  
12 will assess nutrient pollution, identify and prioritize waterways at potential risk for HABs through water  
13 quality testing, with the goals of preventing HABs, improving frequency of water sampling and monitoring  
14 in all waterways in the state, and preventing other water sources from exposure to HABs.  
15  
16 Section 3: This act will require Kentucky’s colleges and universities to create a service learning  
17 component for students and provide training to citizen volunteers in data collection of water samples and  
18 identification of waterways at highest risk from nutrient pollution sources and HABs. The Kentucky  
19 Division of Water HAB Prevention Team is responsible for oversight of this component and will  
20 incorporate collected data. The Cooperative Extension Service, Future Farmers of America (FFA), 4-H, and  
21 community groups shall be the target audience for recruitment of citizen volunteers. Findings shall be  
22 reported to local communities.  
23  
24 Section 4: The KY Division of Water will be the official aggregator of collected data, and will coordinate  
25 and analyze data in collaboration with the KY Department of Fish and Wildlife, the KY Department of  
26 Agriculture, the KY Department of Public Health, and Kentucky colleges and universities. The Kentucky  
27 Division of Water will issue an Annual Report on nutrient pollution (Nitrogen and Phosphorus), Harmful  
28 Algal Blooms (HABs), health risks, and nutrient management strategy in Kentucky.  
29  
30 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on May 1, 2017.

2  
3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: In the state of Kentucky Hepatitis C is spreading through our jails/prisons. Hepatitis C is life  
6 threatening and is passed easily by bodily fluids and needle use. An inmate with hepatitis C presently  
7 costs the state and its taxpayers \$24,000 per year. Treating the infected inmate each year helps  
8 prolong the life of the inmate, but it is not a cure and usually the inmate ends up requiring a liver  
9 transplant that will cost the state an additional \$600,000. .


10  
11 Section 2: There is now a one time treatment for hepatitis C. The one time treatment cost approximately  
12 \$90,000. This treatment will be cost effective in slightly under four years. It will also mean a savings of  
13 \$510,000 per inmate that will not require a liver transplant. Therefore, we are proposing that prisoners  
14 who are infected with Hepatitis C and have a 4 years of more sentence to be served will receive the one  
15 time treatment.

16  
17 Section 3: This bill pertains to all Kentucky Prisoners.


18  
19 Section 4: Any prisoner who has a sentence of 4 years or more and has hepatitis C will be given the  
20 hepatitis C treatment. Prisoners who have less than a 4 year sentence will only be given the hepatitis c  
21 treatment.

22  
23 Section 5: Currently, inmates are covered during the time of their incarceration by the Kentucky State  
24 Medicaid System which is financed by Kentucky taxpayers. This bill will not cost our taxpayers nor will it  
25 mean tax increases. This bill will save money that can be used for other needed purposes for our  
26 Commonwealth.


27  
28 Section 6: This bill will go into effect immediately upon passage.

An act to require that schools not start earlier than 8:30 a.m.

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: Due to the suppression of the hormone melatonin, students between ages 15-19 are not getting the adequate amount of sleep to perform academically. Melatonin is a natural hormone made by the brain that is barely detectable throughout the day. When the sun goes down around 9 p.m., the brain begins to actively produce melatonin, which is released into the blood. As a result, melatonin levels in the blood rise sharply, causing individuals to begin to feel tired. Melatonin levels stay elevated for about 12 hours, while we sleep. They start to decrease around 9 am. When the brain suppresses this hormone, we don't feel tired and when teenagers eventually go to sleep they don't want to wake back up.

Section 2: Eighty-seven percent of high school students in the United States get far less than the recommended eight to ten hours of sleep, and the amount of time they spend asleep is decreasing, leading to more and more cases of sleep deprivation. Sleep deprivation increases the likelihood that teens will suffer negative consequences, including an inability to concentrate, poor grades, drowsy-driving incidents, anxiety, depression, thoughts of suicide and even suicide attempts.

Section 3: On average, schools in Kentucky have a starting time of 8:00a.m or earlier. Some students will be able to wake up 30 minutes later. This bill isn't giving extra time to sleep. School will still be held the same amount of hours; however, it will be later in the day. As a result, students will be sleeping at a time more geared towards fulfilling students' biological needs.

Section 4: Researchers say 30 minutes of later sleep can make a big difference because teens tend to be in their deepest sleep around dawn when they typically have to get up for school. That half an hour of sleep can lead to students being more alert and more academically focused.

Section 5: This bill, if enacted, would require that all schools have the same average school instructional minutes and hours as they do currently. These hours will continue to be documented as prior to the enactment of this bill.

1 An act to create more employment opportunities and provide incentives to hire non-violent felons to aid their re-  
2 entry to society.  
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5  
6 Section 1: After inmates are released from prison their struggles are far from over. Often, these offenders are  
7 faced with numerous obstacles in their re-entry into becoming functional members of society as well as part  
8 of the workforce. Not only do these ex-cons face the challenge of being stereotyped by many potential  
9 employers, but their lack of recent work experience and necessary skills to aid the job hunt coupled with  
10 nearly 40,000 collateral consequences make the job search for ex-offenders nearly impossible. The stress of  
11 unemployment also increases their risk of alcohol and drug abuse, especially for those who already have a  
12 history of these issues.  
13

14 Section 2: Despite recent efforts, two of Kentucky's greatest problems, unemployment and incarceration rates,  
15 have soared. According to a recent statistic, 70% of inmates were unemployed during the time of their arrest,  
16 illustrating the direct correlation between prison populations and employment; therefore, making employment  
17 a crucial factor in combating Kentucky's rising incarceration rates. Kentucky's state prison population has "far  
18 outpaced the national average, rising 45 percent in the decade ending in 2009, compared to a 13 percent  
19 nationwide," stated in an article in PBS Frontline, making Kentucky's incarceration rate 7th in the world.  
20

21 Section 3: In response to this dilemma, the proposed solution is that we focus on prioritizing rehabilitation  
22 through employment within the walls of prison so that prisoners develop a cohesive plan for employment upon  
23 release. This solution would establish more employment opportunities and give employers an incentive to hire  
24 non-violent ex-cons, so they do not become a part of the many repeat offenders and are able to find a source  
25 of employment. According to a 2007 article in Criminology & Public Policy, there are as many as 800  
26 occupations that automatically disqualify people with felony convictions for life; therefore, we would like to  
27 propose that unless the crime is substantially related to the licensed activity, non-violent offenders should be  
28 given the opportunity to obtain these career licenses after 6 months. For instance, a person with a history of  
29 selling drugs, should not allowed to become a pharmacist; however, a person with this same history should not  
30 be prohibited for the rest of their lives from being a barber. The final change we would like to put forward is to  
31 provide a tax write-off (based on a ratio of: # of employed felons to employees without a record up to 2%) for  
32 small businesses hiring non-felons to decrease the stigma that accompanies a criminal conviction.  
33

34 Section 4: According to an article in wfpl.org, we spend approximately \$18,000 per inmate and Kentucky  
35 lawmakers have Section 4: According to an article in wfpl.org, we spend approximately \$18,000 per inmate  
36 and Kentucky lawmakers have increased this budget by \$362 million. Our bill will combat these expenses by  
37 reducing the amount of returning offenders and programs needed to support convicts returning into society. If  
38 passed, this bill will be enacted January 1, 2017, in order to ensure there is time for application of these  
39 changes.  
40

41 Section 5: This bill is crucial to Kentucky because the inability to find obtain a legitimate source of income,  
42 often leads to illicit or illegal means creating a never-ending cycle of poverty and repeat offenses. It should  
43 not be easier for a citizen to sell drugs than find a job.

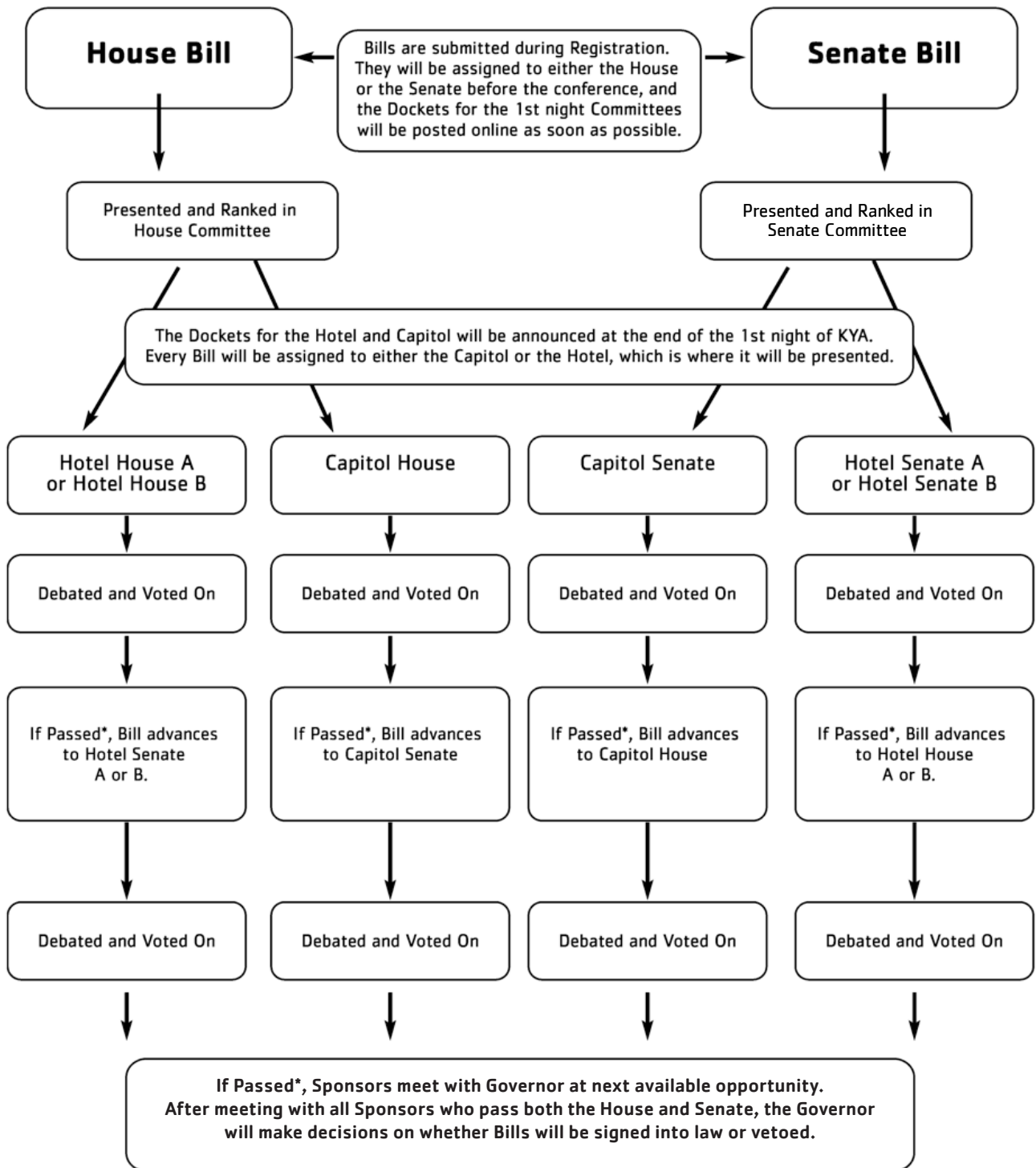

3                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5 Section 1: According to a U.S. Department of Transportation study, an average of 19 school-age children

6 die in school transportation-related traffic accidents each year. 43% of school-age pedestrians killed in

7 school transportation-related crashes were between 5 and 7 years old.

8

9 Section 2: To combat this problem, two HTC Re Cameras will be placed on the outside of all school busses

10 used in the public school systems. One camera will face towards the front of the bus, while a second

11 camera will face the rear of the bus.

12

13 Section 3: When the camera catches the car who ran the stop sign on the bus, the picture of the license

14 plate will be taken and sent to the local police station. A description of what happened and the

15 associated offense will then be created in a report, and a ticket will be mailed to the perpetrator.

16

17 Section 4: The cost would be \$129.00 per cameras. Two cameras will be put on each bus.

18

19 Section 5: An extra \$10.00 expense will be added to general school fees for the families that can pay.

20 Families that do not pay school fees as notified by the school districts would not be affected. This would

21 be to help cover the costs of the cameras for each district.

22

23 Section 6: The transportation department all public school systems will be in charge of making sure the

24 cameras are on the buses and are properly maintained. Once a year, local police will examine each bus to

25 ensure that the cameras are equipped and properly maintained.


26

27 Section 7: The penalties for running the bus stop signs will be the same as running a regular stop sign in

28 Kentucky, which will differ depending on the county.

29

30 Section 8: This bill will be enacted starting the 2018-2019 school year.

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1 An act to mandate a financial literacy curriculum to prepare students for life after high school and college.  
2


3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4

5 Section 1: Based on the growing number of college students in debt. Financial literacy will become a  
6 guaranteed curriculum in order to graduate high school. In this class students will be taught many  
7 important things needed to be financially prepared for life on their own. A guaranteed curriculum isn't the  
8 same as a required class. It is just a section of content that is ensured to be covered with each student  
9 prior to graduation. The content can be included in a class that already exists and is not a new course.  
10

11 Section 2: It is mandatory that this area is covered within a class however it is under the discretion of  
12 each local Board of Education to have control over the specifics of the curriculum. Topics to be included  
13 are budgeting and credit, loans, taxes, balancing a checkbook, and basic banking.  
14

15 Section 3: No funding is necessary for this mandate to be implemented because free educational  
16 consultants will be provided to schools who need assistance in how to implement the curriculum. Current  
17 teachers will be given curriculum guides issued by their local Board of Education. Since this is a  
18 guaranteed curriculum it may be interjected into another class eliminating the need for developing a new  
19 class for the school. However the teacher of the course is responsible for the specific curriculum,  
20 therefore they will decide upon the materials required to accurately teach each objective/standard.  
21

22 Section 4: This bill will go into effect at the start of the 2020- 2021 school year to ensure that the  
23 teachers are well prepared and familiar with the curriculum

An Act to Provide Paid Family Leave for Workers

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: Paid Family Leave (PFL) provides benefits to individuals who lose wages when they need to take time off work to care for a seriously ill child, parent, parent-in-law, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or registered domestic partner, or to bond with a new child entering the family by birth, adoption, or foster care placement.

Section 2: Benefits are payable for a maximum of 6 weeks during a 12 month period. A worker's weekly benefit amount will be approximately 55 percent of his/her earnings. Weekly benefits will be capped at \$1,500 in order to ensure individuals with high incomes don't make the program insolvent.

Section 3: The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services (KCHFS) will oversee the implementation of this program. Those seeking Family Leave benefits must submit a form to the KCHFS. With the form, they must provide proof of relationship with the new child for bonding claims, or a submit a physician/practitioner's consent for care claims.

Section 4: PFL contributions will be paid for with a new 2% payroll tax. Payroll tax is a tax that an employer withholds and pays on behalf of his employees, and it is based on the wage or salary of the employee.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect six months after its passage.

1 An act to eliminate Kentucky's state income tax for all households making less than \$200,000 per year.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5 Section 1: In Kentucky today, most households lose a fair share of their income due to statewide income  
6 tax. The current tax system further exacerbates previously existing income inequalities. However,  
7 abolishing the income tax and raising the current sales tax of 6% to 9% would mean equal taxes for all  
8 Kentuckians. The increased sales tax would regulate spending without tampering the ability to afford the  
9 necessities of everyday life. This bill would help Kentucky increase the average household income where it  
10 is clearly lacking. Kentucky is ranked 47th in the country for household income and according to the  
11 Census ACS 1-year survey, the median household income for Kentucky was \$45,215 in 2015, the latest  
12 figures available. Compared to the median US household income, Kentucky median household income is  
13 \$10,560 lower.

14  
15 Section 2: In order to reach budget neutral from the strive for equality within the Kentucky government's  
16 tax system, there must first be revenue created to pay off the loss of income for the state from the  
17 elimination of the income tax. Therefore, households that are considered in the high financial class  
18 (\$200,000 or more annual household income) will be charged a 5% income tax(this is still a decrease in  
19 the previous income tax). To prevent these citizens from not paying the tax, there shall be no deductions.  
20 With the revenue from taxing the high financial class and increasing the sales tax, the budget will be  
21 neutral meaning that all money lost by the government is gained back through consumption taxes. With  
22 this policy in place, it will allow equal taxes throughout the state of Kentucky.


23  
24 Section 3: Americans often move to areas with lower taxes, so Kentucky would see a large influx of new  
25 citizens. This means that they would also be paying the sales tax and thus are making money for the  
26 state. For example, Florida gained \$86 billion from an influx of new state residents caused by their tax  
27 cuts of a smaller magnitude. While Kentucky might not have this level of growth, the new citizens would  
28 help generate revenue in a variety of ways.

29  
30 Section 4: Due to the requirement of high expenses at certain points in the year, (such as back to school  
31 shopping) an amnesty period would be implemented to help cover these expenses. A voluntary committee  
32 for education in the state legislature would determine the date of the annual amnesty period. This would  
33 help provide the most effective time for the majority of citizens.

34  
35 Section 5: The Kentucky Department of Revenue will enforce this law by applying these new conditions by

- 15 Section 4: This bill will come into effect beginning with the 2017-2018 school year.

1 An act to end the statewide practice requiring high school students with Functional Mental Disabilities to  
2 drop out of high school after 12th grade.

3  
4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5  
6 Section 1: Currently, under Kentucky Department of Education Regulations, students who are considered  
7 mentally handicapped and cannot meet state benchmark guidelines are not allowed to graduate from a  
8 Kentucky public high school.

9  
10 Section 2: This bill will enact a law that will require public high schools to offer an alternate route for high  
11 school completion leading to graduation and high school diploma.


12  
13 Section 3: School districts with greater numbers of FMD students will be most affected by this law.  
14 These school districts will have a decreased dropout rate; therefore increasing the amount of state  
15 funding these schools receive. More money for these schools means more money can be used to bridge  
16 the gap in special education.

17  
18 Section 4: This bill will also create an alternative diploma for graduating FMD students. There will be a  
19 statewide essay contest, beginning summer 2017, to name the diploma after a disabled individual who  
20 has helped inspire their respective community by being an active member in the workforce. This contest  
21 would honor Kentucky disabled citizens and advocate for the importance of educating our state's  
22 mentally challenged and disabled students.


23  
24 Section 5: This bill will set aside a statewide fund to accommodate one mentally competent student from  
25 each high school to help put him/her through a state funded college. This bill will help to build  
26 relationships between the community/workforce and schools by employing disabled adults in the  
27 workplace that would put them on the right track for life and let them achieve their God given potential.

28  
29 Section 6: This bill will go into effect in the 2017-2018 school year.

- 1 An act to require public schools to commence instructional proceedings the Tuesday following Labor Day.  
2
- 3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4
- 5 Section 1: This bill would prevent the starting of school from happening until the Tuesday following Labor  
6 Day, generating more income from tourism and from those students who work during the summer.  
7 According to Forbes, by starting school in early August there is a significant loss in terms of \$369 million,  
8 which includes more than \$104 million in wages and benefits, \$7.7 million in tax revenue, and around  
9 \$257 million from tourism.
- 10  
11 Section 2: According to the Kentucky High School Athletic Association, when the weather has reached a  
12 heat index of 95, precautions for health hazards are to be taken immediately. If the heat index reaches  
13 104 or higher, all school related outdoor activities are to cease because of hazardous health risks,  
14 including recess. In 2012, 3.0 million people died of heat related deaths from May to the beginning of  
15 September (EPA.org). Allowing us to push the start date back, will help prevent those risks.
- 16  
17 Section 3: Currently, in the state of Kentucky, all students must attend school for 170 instructional days.  
18 Although, the days students attend are up to the calendar committee and school administrators, the  
19 school calendar must be approved by the board of education within the district. Currently, the Kentucky  
20 Department of Education does not regulate start dates for schools, but should. Additionally, studies show  
21 moving the start date to September shows no loss in educational attainment.
- 22  
23 Section 4: If a school does not desire to start after Labor Day, the district can apply for a waiver from the  
24 Kentucky Department of Education.
- 25  
26 Section 5: There will be no extra cost to the state of Kentucky, nor its taxpayers.
- 27  
28 Section 6: This bill will go into effect the 2017-2018 school year.

3                           **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5   Section 1: Medical marijuana will be used to relieve the symptoms of cancer, glaucoma, AIDS, hepatitis C,  
6   HIV, Alzheimer’s disease, Crohn’s disease, muscular dystrophy, Rheumatoid Arthritis and many more.  
7  
8   Section 2: Growing centers will be placed in cities all throughout Kentucky, and must be registered with  
9   Department of Agriculture as a cannabis approved growing facility. In order receive the medical marijuana  
10 you must get a prescription from a licensed doctor, in order to pick up your prescription you must be 18  
11 years or older, if you are younger than 18 your parents or guardians must pick it up for you, and it will  
12 not be inhaled through smoke but instead it will be a oil based substance. prescriptions are for no more  
13 than 4 ounces of cannabis per 30 days.  
14  
15   Section 3: The state and national health organizations will have to approve of the medical marijuana  
16 growing facilities before they are constructed and registered with the Department of Agriculture. In order  
17 to avoid abuse of the medically prescribed cannabis other regulation include;

8   Section 2: Federal financial incentives are given to states that require schools to maintain a supply of  
9   epinephrine pens. Passage of this bill would qualify Kentucky to receive such assistance to offset cost to  
10   schools. Schools are also given discounts for the prices of epi-pens.

12   Section 3: The money from this financial incentive will be distributed evenly among the schools.

1                            An act to Improve Mental Health of Students in Kentucky

2

3                            **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5    Section 1: In an effort to improve the mental health of the students of Kentucky, this act will provide a  
6    tax credit to psychologists that do pro bono (without charge) work in schools to help students that have  
7    mental disorders such as, but not limited to, anxiety, clinical depression, and eating disorders.

8

9    Section 2: For every session that a psychologist completes with a student they will receive a sixty dollar  
10   tax credit per hourly session, that goes toward their state income tax. The yearly tax credit allocated to  
11   each psychologist will not exceed their state income tax or five-thousand dollars, whichever comes first.

12

13   Section 3: This act will cost around \$1,200,000 every year. This price is taking into consideration the  
14   fact that some students will need more than one session and the fact that some students will not want  
15   to receive or seek out the treatment that is being offered them. To pay for this we will raise the cost of  
16   beginning of the year fees by six dollars which will total to around \$1,800,000.

17

18   Section 4: If a psychologist wishes to do pro bono work in schools they will need to fill out a short  
19   application for the Kentucky Department of Education with their license to practice and preferred region  
20   of work.

22   Section 5: When a school is in a psychologist’s preferred region then they will have to advertise this  
23   program to their students in any way possible whether that be through the guidance office or through  
24   teacher recommendations.

26   Section 6: A waiver will be included with the beginning of the year paperwork that will allow the students  
27   to request and receive help from the psychologist.

An act to prevent Skin Cancer

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: The Commonwealth of Kentucky is ranked ninth in reported incidences of melanoma and sixth in deaths caused from melanoma. Kentucky's death rate is also 17% higher than the national average.

Section 2: Sunscreen is proven to lessen the chance of getting skin cancer, despite common myths. Our objective is to implement one sunscreen stand per 100 acres in all government owned state parks and historic sites and county parks. One sunscreen stand would contain one gallon of SPF 30 sunscreen. The stands would be kept up and replaced by park rangers regularly.

Section 3: Each gallon container of sunscreen would cost, on average, \$95. Each stand would cost, on average, \$200, but after the stands are implemented their full cost would be covered.

Section 4: Funding for this project would come from annual revenue the park agencies collect and state government funding.

Section 5: After passage, this bill will be enacted March 1, 2017.

1 An act to ban practicing conversion therapy on minors.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: Conversion therapy is based upon the premise that being lesbian, gay, bisexual, or transgender  
6 is a disease or disorder. It has been recognized since 1987, by major mental health associations and  
7 researchers in the United States, that being lesbian, gay or bisexual in fact is not a disease or defect.  
8 Conversion therapy is a psychological or spiritual counseling that aims to change someone's sexual  
9 orientation or gender identity/expression. However, conversion therapy is not approved by any mental  
10 health organization. Therefore, there are no guidelines on how it should be conducted and no standard of  
11 success.


12  
13 Section 2: The techniques that are most commonly practiced with this therapy are: nausea, vomiting, or  
14 paralysis while showing the patient homoerotic images; providing electric shocks; having the individual  
15 snap an elastic band around the wrist whenever aroused by the same-sex erotic images or thoughts;  
16 using shame to create aversion to same-sex attractions, making patients behavior more stereotypically  
17 feminine or masculine, teaching heterosexual dating skills, and using hypnosis to try to redirect desires  
18 and arousals. The practices associated with this therapy have been widely discredited among mental  
19 health professionals for having no scientific proof of working but instead overwhelming evidence of the  
20 harm it causes to patients. Some health risks include but are not limited to depression, substance abuse,  
21 social withdrawal, anxiety, decreased self-esteem, and suicidal thoughts.

22  
23 Section 3: This bill would ban any mental health provider from conducting conversion therapy or sexual  
24 change efforts with a patient under the age of 18. Any attempt to conduct conversion therapy on a  
25 minor would result in an immediate revokement of that individual's mental health license.

26  
27 Section 4: Mental health provider would include a physician and surgeon specializing in the practice of  
28 psychiatry, a psychologist, a psychologist assistant, intern, or trainee, a licensed marriage and family  
29 therapist, a registered psychologist, a licensed clinical social worker, an associate clinical social worker, a  
30 licensed professional clinical counselor, a registered clinical counselor, intern, or trainee, or any other  
31 person designated as a mental health professional under Kentucky law or regulation.

32  
33 Section 5: This bill will be enforced by the Division of Health Care in Kentucky who are currently  
34 responsible inspecting, investigating and certifying all health care facilities as well as mental health  
35 facilities. This bill will go into effect January 1, 2017.

1                   An act to make Appalachia great again through the use of a revitalization plan.

2  
3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5   Section 1: Eastern Kentucky has seven of the top twenty poorest counties in the United States. The lack  
6 of stability in this region affects all Kentuckians. A revitalization plan will be developed to entice  
7 employment and opportunities for people in this former coal country.

8  
9   Section 2: The first component will be to bring broadband capabilities to this area. The General Assembly  
10 is currently proposing a bill to add broadband to Appalachia. If this is not passed, then this would be  
11 step one of the revitalization plan.


12  
13   Section 3: Private/public economic ventures will become the main aspect of the revitalization plan.  
14 Creating tourism and business opportunities such as: a large scale convention center and lodge in a  
15 centralized location (ex. Breathitt County), a Great Wolf Lodge (such as the one currently at Kings Island),  
16 numerous cabin rentals, development of lakes for boating, fishing & camping, scenic train rides, Elk  
17 watching & nature studies, hiking, hunting, golfing, and day trips for adventure tourism such as: ATV  
18 trails, dirt biking, go-karts, and zip-lines.

19  
20   Section 4: Advertising Appalachia will be of utmost importance. Tourism will be promoted in a similar  
21 style to that of the Ky Bourbon Trail and places such as Gatlinburg & Pigeon Forge, Tennessee. Emphasis  
22 will be placed on encouraging mini-vacations, weekend getaways, business conventions.

23  
24   Section 5: The unique cultural aspects of Eastern Kentucky such as country and bluegrass music,  
25 appalachian crafts & food will become another draw for tourism. Famous Kentuckians from Eastern  
26 Kentucky will be featured in the convention center & lodge and throughout the businesses in this area.

27  
28   Section 6: Private businesses who invest in these projects will be exempt from paying taxes for 15 years.  
29 Cities will be allowed to keep a portion of their sales taxes to help with infrastructure. Both will be  
30 allowed to re-negotiate this agreement as needed. The Coal Severance Tax will help finance these  
31 projects. The Kentucky Departments of Transportation & Tourism will lead the effort to help finance the  
32 infrastructure and advertising. Federal grants such as the POWER initiative grants will continue to be  
33 used in this area.

34  
35   Section 7: Upon passage, the revitalization plan will begin in January of 2017.

1 An act to make targeting first responders a hate crime - Blue Lives Matter

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: Kentucky's hate-crime law, which already includes protections for race, color, religion, sexual  
6 orientation and national origin, will now also include police officers, firefighters and emergency medical  
7 services personnel and make them a protected class.

8  
9 Section 2: By classifying the targeting of public safety workers as a hate crime, it will give judges more  
10 leeway to impose tougher sentences. This law would change the state's criminal code to enhance certain  
11 penalties when an officer is the target of violence, even if that officer is not on the clock. It would  
12 become a felony to threaten a specific law enforcement agency or other emergency personnel.

13  
14 Section 3: If a first responder is attacked in a way where premeditation is confirmed or there's evidence  
15 that a suspect had said, posted to social media, or demonstrated extreme negative speech or hatred  
16 toward another person, or group, then they will be subject to an additional charge of a hate crime and  
17 receive up to 5 years of additional sentence.

18  
19 Section 4: This law may also punish protesters who seriously damage a police car or trespass during a  
20 demonstration against police brutality.

21  
22 Section 5: Police officers are still responsible for their actions under Kentucky law and are not immune  
23 from prosecution by the Kentucky State Police or the Justice Department. Police officers and First  
24 Responders will continue to be investigated for any allegations of wrong doing that occur on the job.

25  
26 Section 6: Financing of will not change in our judicial system due to the passage of this bill

27  
28 Section 7: Upon passage, this bill will immediately go into effect in January 2017.

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1 An act to legalize the practice of physician assisted suicide for adults with terminal illnesses, "Death with  
2 Dignity" in the state of Kentucky.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5

6 Section 1: Any adult who is of sound mind, will be able to self-administer lethal medication  
7

8 Section 2: The medication would have to be expressly prescribed by the attending physician of the  
9 patient for the express purpose of committing assisted suicide.  
10

11 Section 3: A state licensed psychiatrist would have to attend at least two sessions with the  
12 aforementioned patient and confirm whether or not the patient was suffering from any mental illness or  
13 impaired judgment.  
14

15 Section 4: One member of the family will be present (blood or marriage), as well as one non-family  
16 member. This excludes the physician who prescribed the drug that will be used for the suicide.  
17

18 Section 5: No individual other than the one who is taking them, may handle the medication or other items  
19 needed for the administration of the drugs shall be touched except for the one administering them, which  
20 will be the patient unless they are physically unable to do so.  
21


22 Section 6: Reports will be collected every year, which will include but not be limited to: number and age of  
23 patients, drugs used for suicides, diseases of patients, etc.  
24

25 Section 7: Licenses will be required to prescribe drugs for the purpose of ending one's life.  
26

27 Section 8: Licenses will also be required of the psychiatrist or psychologist who determine if a patient is  
28 "able minded."  
29

30 Section 9: Expenses for the medication will be paid for by the patient.  
31

32 Section 10: This bill will go into effect January 1, 2018

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: This bill will require schools in Kentucky to provide gluten-free options at breakfast and lunch.  
6 Currently, schools are only required if a student meets the needs with a physicians statement.

7  
8 Section 2: Eighteen million Americans have a gluten sensitivity and an estimated 1% of population has  
9 celiac disease. Celiac disease is an autoimmune disorder which interferes with the body's ability to  
10 absorb nutrients from food, and the only existing treatment is being 100% gluten-free.


11  
12 Section 3: Funding for this bill will come out of the current school lunch funding/ budget. Students will be  
13 charged the similar breakfast/ lunch fee amount as regular meals.

14  
15 Section 4: The National School Lunch Program (NSLP) will enforce this bill along with each local board of  
16 education.


17 Failure to comply: First Offense: written warning and one month to comply. Second offense: \$1000  
18 offense and three months to comply. Third offense: \$1500 and three additional months to comply.

19  
20 Section 5: This bill will be enacted beginning in the 2018-19 school year.

1 An act to ensure educational accountability of homeschool students enrolling in Kentucky public schools.  
2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5 Section 1: This bill devises a structured system designed to provide guidelines for home school students  
6 and parents enrolling into the public school setting.  
7  
8 Section 2: An enrolling home school student must submit a cumulative portfolio to document student  
9 progress which shall include but not be limited to the child's work samples, photographs of activities,  
10 assessment records, and other progress monitoring evidence.  
11  
12 Section 3: A universal screener will be completed by all enrolling homeschool students to determine their  
13 grade level placement in the public school setting.  
14  
15 Section 4: Within one month of placement of the homeschool student in the public school setting, he/she  
16 will complete an entrance interview with the classroom teacher and/or counselor. The interview shall  
17 address the students' educational experience in the homeschool setting and their transition to the public  
18 school setting as well as a review of their academic performance in the public school setting. Any  
19 concerns of the teacher and/or counselor regarding the placement of the child will be communicated to  
20 the school principal and/or the school district's central office and may result in adjustment of the original  
21 placement in the public school setting.  
22  
23 Section 5: This bill will go into effect July 1, 2017.

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1 An act to improve Kentucky's infrastructure through increased and refocused funding

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: This bill would create a priority list for the inadequate areas of infrastructure and task the  
6 Kentucky Infrastructure Authority with bringing these areas up to at least a B level within ten years in  
7 order to assure every Kentuckian has access to safe transportation and drinking water.  
8 (Roads, bridges, and dams are at a D and drinking water is at a C).

9  
10 Section 2: With the priorities in mind, this bill would increase the funding to the Kentucky Infrastructure  
11 Authority (KIA) by \$30 million a year, coming out of the excess \$114 million in the Kentucky State  
12 Budget. Combined with the current budget of the KIA, this would enable to reach our goals in roads,  
13 bridges, dams, and drinking water within ten years.

14  
15 Section 3: With a revitalized Commonwealth infrastructure, the economy will grow as businesses will be  
16 able to better transport goods while consumers will be spending less money on infrastructure upkeep  
17 costs and reparations because of poor infrastructure. The project will be budget neutral based on  
18 increased economic activity during the ten year period, and after the upgrades are complete, create tens  
19 of thousands of jobs and increase Kentucky's GDP by an estimated \$2,000,000,000.

20  
21 Section 4: If the KIA is unable to fulfill this bill's requirements, the use of funding will be investigated, and  
22 additional necessary funding will be considered. Otherwise, the long term scope of this bill will be open  
23 to change in order for the KIA to complete the modernization of Kentucky's infrastructure in the timeliest  
24 manner possible. If it becomes evident the money is not being spent properly, funding will be postponed  
25 and corruption investigated.

26  
27 Section 5: This bill will go into effect with the KIA's agenda updates and re-allocated funding at the  
28 beginning of the 2018 fiscal year.

An act to lower the minimum age to obtain a permit license

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: The age to obtain a permit license shall be lowered to 15 years and 6 months (15.5 years of age), with which the young driver must drive with a licensed adult in the vehicle.


Section 2: The permit license would be held for a period of a year, and the Restricted License shall be obtained at the age of 16 years and 6 months, after which the young driver may drive alone, but is subject to the current restrictions as designated by the State Police and Kentucky Transportation Department.

Section 3: During the permit license time period, the student driver must attend a driving class online or at their school per the Kentucky Graduated Driver License Program.

Section 4: The Restricted License shall be held for a period of six months, after which the student driver would obtain an unrestricted license at the age of 17.

Section 5: This bill shall be enforced by the Kentucky State Police, who currently handle licensing in the state of Kentucky, as well as supervised by the circuit court system and Transportation Cabinet.

Section 6: This bill shall go into effect January 1st, 2017, starting with student drivers who turn 15 during the year of 2017. Current guidelines shall remain unchanged for those completing their license requirements before and during the passage of this bill.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: This bill shall legalize the act of prostitution, repealing KRS 529.020.

6  
7 Section 2: Prostitutes shall be defined as adults (18 years and above) who consensually exchange sex  
8 and sexual activity for profit as members of a state-supervised business organization.


9  
10 Section 3: Prostitution shall be subject to monthly, random state health and safety regulations from the  
11 health department.

12  
13 Section 4: All funds previously designated to the prosecution and prevention of prostitution in state and  
14 local police budgets shall be redistributed into the prosecution and prevention of human trafficking, as  
15 well as into maintaining monthly random regulation of prostitution.

16  
17 Section 5: Failure to meet the requirements of the state including the health department and police will  
18 result in the loss of a license to practice prostitution and a fine of \$500.

19  
20 Section 6: A tax of 15% will be placed upon these businesses' yearly income, with 50% of prostitution-  
21 generated state revenue funding the prevention of human trafficking.

22  
23 Section 7: This bill will go into effect January 1st, 2018

1 An act to alter and increase regulations on the purchase, sale, and usage of firearms

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: All buyers and vendors of firearms must have acquired a Firearms Possession License (FPL)  
6 from the Kentucky Department of Criminal Justice Training in order to trade in any type of firearm. This  
7 license allows the presence of loaded firearms on the citizen's private property to be used in self-  
8 defense, hunting, or at a shooting range, and is distinct from the currently active Concealed Carry Deadly  
9 Weapons (CCDW) License.

10  
11 Section 2: In order to acquire an FPL, a citizen must meet the following requirements, among others:

- 12 • Must be 18 years old  
13 • Must have no criminal record for violence or robbery in the past 10 years  
14 • Must have no untreated mental illness  
15 • Must be a permanent resident of Kentucky

16  
17 Section 3: Open carry of firearms, previously allowed, will now be prohibited under all circumstances, save  
18 in aid of the police, within a mile's radius of a public gun show or in prevention of a crime. Open carry will  
19 be punishable by:

- 20 • 1st offense: \$1000 fine  
21 • 2nd offense: \$1500 fine  
22 • 3rd offense and beyond: 1 year in prison

23  
24 Section 4: To enter a public gun show, a person must either have an FPL or be a minor in the company of  
25 one such person.


26  
27 Section 5: The public or private trade of firearms without an FPL will now be a crime, punishable by:

- 28 • 1st offense: 1 year in prison  
29 • 2nd offense: 5 years in prison  
30 • 3rd offense and beyond: 10 years in prison

31  
32 To investigate a suspected private firearms trade on private property, police must have a valid search  
33 warrant as dictated by the U.S. Constitution.

34  
35 Section 6: All previous Kentucky firearm laws not altered by the provisions of this bill will remain intact.

36  
37 Section 7: This bill will go into effect July 1st, 2017

1 An act to require full reimbursement of AP testing fees to students who pass the exam.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: Students who take the AP national exam are required to pay a fee of around \$90. The only  
6 incentive most students receive to pass AP exams is the potential to receive college credit. This bill will  
7 allow students who pass the exam to receive full reimbursement of the exam fee.


8  
9 Section 2: Students eligible for free and reduced lunch benefits, according to the College Board  
10 standards, are subject to a reduced testing fee (approximately \$15). In the case that a student who pays  
11 a reduced fee passes the test, the student will be reimbursed the amount he/she paid out-of-pocket.

12  
13 Section 3: The fee breakdown for AP exams is as follows: \$93 will be paid by the student to the school;  
14 \$84 of the \$93 is paid to the college board for the exam; the remaining nine dollars is given to the school  
15 in the form of a rebate. Students that qualify for financial assistance only have to pay \$15. Said fee  
16 breakdown is as follows: the AP College Board reduces the fee to \$53 by eliminating the school rebate  
17 and lowering the test fee by \$31; the remaining \$38 is covered by the Title IV "block grant".

18  
19 Section 4: In the 2015/2016 school year, 50,912 AP exams were administered and 24,437 were passed.  
20 Not accounting for reduced test fees, the cost of reimbursement throughout Kentucky would have been  
21 \$2,248,204.

22  
23 Section 5: Funding for this initiative will be provided by each individual school district.

24  
25 Section 6: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2017-18 school year.

An act to encourage constable training and oversight

Section 1: This act requires constables in Kentucky to obtain a level of law enforcement training consistent with their law enforcement powers.

Section 2: Kentucky constables will be required to attend a minimum of 10 hours of study in the following areas of state-approved law enforcement training: firearm skills, criminal law, cultural diversity, emergency vehicle operations, and constitutional law.

Section 3: A constable advisory board would be established to meet every year with General Assembly members to review the training curriculum and assessment methods.

Section 4: This bill will go into effect January 1, 2018.

1 An act to institute random drug testing of Kentucky high school athletes.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: As drugs have become an epidemic in many areas of the state, especially rural areas, this bill  
6 will seek to confront th problem facing many of our schools. This bill would mandate that all Kentucky  
7 High Schools preform random drug testing on their High School varsity athletes with each athlete being  
8 tested at least twice per season. The goal of this bill is to reduce the number of drug users in Kentucky  
9 high schools.

10

11 Section 2: Tests will be conducted by blood or urine test. The decision of which test to use will be left to  
12 individual school districts. Students athletes and their parents will be required to sign a waiver of  
13 consent to drug testing in order to remain on their sports team.

14


15 Section 3:The cost of the drug testing will be the responsibility of the school district and The Kentucky  
16 High School Athletics Association (KHSAA) with the cost split evenly between the two. The average cost  
17 per test would be around \$12 per student.

18

19 Section 4: If a student test positive for using a controlled substance they will be required to attend  
20 mandatory counseling for the first failed test. They will also be suspended for 30 days of competition and  
21 will be required to submit to a further drug test before becoming eligible again. Any subsequent positive  
22 tests will result in suspension for the remainder of the season.

23

24 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on July 1, 2018 giving districts ample time to prepare policies and  
25 procedures for testing.

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An act to require all vehicles to be inspected prior to registration.

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


Section 1: Vehicles must be inspected yearly for proper vehicular functions, such as emission functions. The vehicle inspection must be done within ten days of registration or the inspection must be done again.

Section 2: The state will license certain mechanic shops to inspect the vehicles.

Section 3: Any vehicle unregistered and and not inspected will be subject to a fine based on how long the sticker has expired. If within 60 days of expiration, it is a \$50 fine. If over 60 days or a sticker is absent, the fine is \$100.

Section 4: Inspection fees would vary from \$17-47. Car registration would remain as already required.

Section 5: The cost to the state would be delegated to licensing the mechanic shops alone, as everything else would already be in place. This bill is self-funding, but any additional funds would be siphoned from the Kentucky Department of Motor Vehicles.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5 Section 1: Beginning with the freshman class of 2021, all students attending a public school in Kentucky  
6 will receive equal treatment within the means of a standardized grading scale.

8 Section 2: Each public school facility will distribute an equal standardized grading scale. It will  
9 demonstrate as follows:

11 A: 90%-100%  
12 B: 80%-89%  
13 C: 70%-79%  
14 D: 60%-69%

17 Unweighted GPA scale: A: 4 points | B: 3 points | C: 2 points | D: 1 point | F: 0 points  
18 Weighted GPA scale: A: 5 points | B: 4 points | C: 3 points | D: 2 points | F: 0 points

19  
20 Section 3: There would be no extra money that would be needed to enact this bill.

21  
22 Section 4: If any school systems fail to follow this new law, they would be penalized with a loss in points  
23 on the school's accountability rating. This would give an incentive for a school's administration to comply  
24 to the newly introduced grading system. Depending on how many times that the school was reported of  
25 infringement, they would receive different levels of penalties.

26  
27 Section 5: The main purpose to standardize the grading scale across public school facility's in Kentucky is  
28 so each student has an equal opportunity to earn the deserved amount of Kentucky Educational  
29 Excellence Scholarship (KEES) money; despite what school they attend. It is illogical if a student at one  
30 school could receive a B for a 92%, but at another school someone receive an A with a 90%. Due to this,  
31 students result in a higher GPA which means more money towards higher education. Yet in reality, the  
32 student getting a 92% has a higher grade percentage over the student receiving a 90%.

1 An act to revise sex education policies in Middle and High Schools in the state of Kentucky.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: Kentucky is ranked 8th in the nation in unplanned teen pregnancy rates. Teen pregnancy is an  
6 issue that can potentially hurt the future success of those affected, such as a higher dropout rate in high  
7 school and a greater chance of unemployment as a young adult. These teen pregnancy rates also hurt the  
8 people of Kentucky by raising taxes to help aid the young mothers and fathers. This costs the state \$150  
9 million each year.


10  
11 Section 2: This bill requires the revision of sex education policies for both Public Middle and High Schools  
12 in the state of Kentucky from an abstinence only approach to a mandatory, comprehensive sex, health,  
13 and wellness educational program. The program will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of  
14 Education, who will check to make sure policies are followed by each school in the state of Kentucky.

15  
16 Section 3: The program will be taught to students in 7th and 10th grade. It will take place over a three  
17 week period during a mandatory health class. The program will be taught by a certified sex education  
18 teacher, who will undergo a training program in the summer in order to learn the new curriculum and  
19 meet the education requirements stated in the revised project.

20  
21 Section 4: If districts refuse to comply and are unable to provide sufficient evidence as determined by the  
22 department of education that shows that they are attempting to acquire the necessary materials, staff,  
23 and instruction, they will receive a 5% cut in state funding for other educational purposes.

24  
25 Section 5: The curriculum will be revised in order to provide information on a wide variety of sex  
26 education topics. The revised program will work in correlation with the current abstinence program to  
27 incorporate different ideas such as contraception while also sticking with previously taught topics. The  
28 program will also include more hands-on activities in order to better prepare students for real life  
29 relationships. The program will be funded through a 5% increase in property tax for the state of  
30 Kentucky. Money will be used to fund the summer training program, as well as to provide materials for  
31 lessons, professional development for the instructors and to better educate the students through  
32 demonstrations.

33  
34 Section 6: This bill will be enacted in the 2017-2018 school year.

1 An act to cut corporate taxes to reduce unemployment.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5 Section 1: Currently Kentucky’s unemployment is at 5%. As a state, we fall in the bottom half of states in  
6 terms of volume of manufacturing jobs. This bill will provide a 40% reduction in corporate taxes to  
7 incentivize companies to bring manufacturing jobs to Kentucky.

8  
9 Section 2: This 40% decrease in taxes will apply only to companies who submit a plan to create 500  
10 manufacturing jobs in their first 36 months of production. This plan will be submitted to a committee of  
11 Kentucky lawmakers. Their plan will be reviewed and a response will given within 8 months of the  
12 application. The tax decrease will be in effect for the first 8 years of corporate operations. After that, the  
13 tax deductions will decrease by 5% annually, until the company is paying normal corporate taxes. This bill  
14 is meant to target businesses of net value greater than \$250 million. It is in these mid to large sized  
15 companies where the most job growth is available and can be achieved.

16  
17 Section 3: With this bill, we plan to reduce unemployment to 2.5% in the next decade. We want Kentucky  
18 to set a standard for other states to follow to bring manufacturing jobs back to these United States.

19  
20 Section 4: If a corporation does not create the promised 500 jobs within the 36 month period, then the  
21 corporation must resubmit their application for the tax deduction. If the resubmitted application is  
22 accepted, the company will receive 12 months to try and achieve the benchmark. If the resubmitted  
23 application is denied, then the company will be forced to pay normal corporate taxes from the next tax  
24 period and onward.

25  
26 Section 5: This bill will go into effect January 1, 2017.

1 An act to require all welfare recipients to be administered a drug test every 90 days.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5  
6 Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to require all welfare recipients to participate in mandatory drug  
7 testing every ninety days in order to keep receiving their government assistance.

8  
9 Section 2: Within the state of Kentucky, over 900,000 residents receive government assistance each  
10 month. Studies conclude that over 15% of welfare recipients show signs of substance abuse. The average  
11 amount received in a welfare check is around \$1000 per month.

12  
13 Section 3: Within the Commonwealth of Kentucky, both blue-collar and white-collar workers are required  
14 to participate in random drug testing to keep their jobs. The purpose of our bill is to reduce the number  
15 of welfare recipients that abuse the system. We believe that any person that is dependent on government  
16 assistance should be required to a drug test every ninety days.

17  
18 Section 4: This bill will affect all Kentucky residents receiving government assistance. Participants that  
19 are found in non-compliance of this bill will have their monthly assistance revoked until they are willing to  
20 participate in the mandatory drug test. Offenses for failing to pass the drug screening:

- 21  
22 • 1st offense: Warning will be given to participant(s) and government assistance will be withheld (up  
23 to 3 weeks) until participant(s) undergoes substance abuse counseling and drug testing.  
24 • 2nd offense: Government assistance will be revoked (6mo-1 yr) and participant(s) will undergo  
25 additional substance abuse counseling/drug testing.  
26

27 Section 5: The funding for this bill will come from money allocated within the department of Health and  
28 Human services.

30 Section 6: This bill will go into effect January 1 2017.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


5  
6 Section 1: Many students in the Commonwealth of Kentucky are affected by dyslexia. In fact, research  
7 shows that it occurs in 1 out of 10 people in our nation. Out of 53 public colleges in Kentucky, only 2 of  
8 these colleges offer sign language as a foreign language credit. This is becoming a problem for many  
9 college students because those affected by dyslexia have a more difficult time learning spoken language  
10 rather than sign language.  
11

12 Section 2: Funding for this bill will come from the students. Tuition at these colleges will only rise, on an  
13 average, \$7.00 per student. Of course, they will also have to pay for the materials for the class, but they  
14 would have had to do this anyway for their foreign language class.  
15

16 Section 3: The college boards will enforce this bill. If a school fails to comply, they will be fined \$10 per  
17 student. The money fined will go into public school funding.

5    Section 1: Currently, there are no laws in place prohibiting conversion therapy on minors. This bill aims to

6    ban all reparative therapy on minors, involving both sexuality and gender identity.

7

8    Section 2: This bill will prohibit state licensed therapists from administering reparative therapy on minors

9    by adding the ban of reparative therapy to the Kentucky Board of Licensure for Occupational Therapy

10    (KBLOT) as another set of regulations needed to ensure the safety of patients and will be enforced

11    through KBLOT.

12

13    Section 3: If a licensed therapist is found to be administrating reparative therapy on minors, they will be


14    issued a fine of \$5,000. If they are found administrating reparative therapy a second time, they will be

15    issued a fine of \$10,000 and have their licensed suspended for twelve months. And if they are found

16    administrating reparative therapy for a third time, they will have their license revoked.

1 An act to hold Kentuckians accountable for the crimes committed with their guns.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: As only three percent of guns used to commit homicide were purchased at a gun store, and the  
6 other ninety-seven percent were obtained through other means, such as theft and straw purchases  
7 (purchases made on behalf of another person), a Kentucky gun registry should be created.


8  
9 Section 2: When going to purchase a gun, one would have to register the title of the fire arm under their  
10 name. If a Kentucky resident is to purchase a gun out of state, they must register their gun within a  
11 month of returning to Kentucky.

12  
13 Section 3: If a crime is committed with a gun, the owner on record would be help partially responsible for  
14 this crime. The extent of the punishment would be determined in a Kentucky State Court.

15  
16 Section 4: The registration process will not replace state and federal laws already in place, rather be in  
17 addition to them. With the creation of this registry, there will be the implementation of a Kentucky Gun  
18 Defense Department to keep track of all records; this department will also deal with issuing concealed  
19 weapons licenses. The process to obtain a concealed weapons license will remain the same, only be  
20 overseen by this new department.

21  
22 Section 5: Any establishment already selling guns, or seeking to sell guns, will have to be licensed by the  
23 Kentucky Gun Defense Department to register gun owners in addition to any current requirements.

24  
25 Section 6: The Kentucky Gun Defense Department will go into effect on January 1, 2020. By July 1, 2020  
26 firearm distributors must have obtained their license to register fire arms, and all gun owners must have  
27 their fire arms registered. Therefore, the bill will be in full effect by July 1, 2020.

1 An act to amend the current KRS 186.405.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5 Section 1: KRS 186.405 requires that any U.S. male citizen or immigrant between the ages of 18 and 25  
6 shall be registered for the United States Selective Service System when applying for a driver's license or  
7 identification card in the state of Kentucky.

8  
9 Section 2: This bill will require that not only men must register at age 18, but would give women the  
10 option to do so as well. Immigrants with visas will not be required to register in the Selective Service  
11 System as long as their visa is valid for the time they are spending in the United States.

12  
13 Section 3: The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet shall forward, in an electronic format, the necessary  
14 personal information required for registration of the applicants identified to the Selective Service System.  
15 Registering for selective service does not mean you will be drafted. A draft cannot take place unless  
16 ordered by Congress and the President.

17  
18 Section 4: Failing to register or comply with the Military Selective Service Act is a felony punishable by a  
19 fine of up to \$250,000 or a prison term of up to five years, or a combination of both.

20  
21 Section 5: This bill will go into effect June 1, 2017. All men, and women who choose, turning 18 after this  
22 date must register.

1 An act to supply Kentucky Schools with an emergency supply of Naloxone

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: Since 2010, deaths from heroin overdoses among teens have more than tripled, increasing  
6 from 3,036 in 2010 to 10,574 in 2014. This opioid epidemic is not limited to Kentucky; heroin usage  
7 plagues our youth after school hours, and in the last 5 years heroin use in Kentucky has quadrupled  
8 among teens due to its availability and cheap prices. Under current legislation in the state of Kentucky,  
9 there is no treatment or protocol for overdose situations in schools. The drug Naloxone brings an addict  
10 out of their overdose immediately with zero risks if an opiate isn't present in the student's system, giving  
11 EMS personnel extra time to arrive at the scene.

12  
13 Section 2: A high percent of opiate overdoses result in death or permanent life-threatening damage. This  
14 statistic reveals the importance of Narcan being readily available in schools. Narcan saves lives- and is  
15 inexpensive and virtually foolproof.

16  
17 Section 3: The treatment will be housed in the nurse's office (or the equivalent), and similarly be locked in  
18 the medicine cabinet and used when needed. School nurses (or the equivalent) will be trained on  
19 examining the signs of an overdose and how to properly and safely administer Naloxone. If a case is  
20 suspected to be a heroine or other opiate drug overdose, the drug is to be administered immediately.

21  
22 Section 4: The following ranges yield a breakdown of the number of doses that should be on-hand at all  
23 times in Kentucky public schools:


- 24  
25 • Schools less than 500: 2 doses  
26 • Schools between 500-2000: 4 doses  
27 • Schools between than 2000- 5000: 6 doses  
28 • Schools greater than 5000: 8 doses

29  
30 Treatment will be funded by the budget given to public high schools by the state government.

31  
32 Section 5: Under no circumstances can a parent or legal guardian press charges against the said school  
33 or any school official due to their child receiving this drug- keep in in mind Naloxone and the  
34 administration process of the drug are virtually risk-free.

35  
36 Section 6: The treatment will be available in all public high schools in the state of Kentucky.

37  
38 Section 7: This bill will go into effect beginning at the start of the 2017-2018 school year. Nurses and  
39 their equivalents are to be trained prior to the first day of school.

1                   An act to Eliminate Kentucky Narcotics Possession Charges in Favor of Rehabilitation  
2

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4


5 Section 1: In Kentucky, a possession charge is incurred if a person has less than a set amount of illegal  
6 narcotics on him. This amount varies by the specific drug. For example, someone must have 100 grams of  
7 heroin on him to incur a trafficking charge, but the limit for marijuana is 50 kilograms. Any person in  
8 possession of an amount above this limit is considered to be part of a trafficking or distribution  
9 operation. This bill deals only with possession charges, and trafficking charges would still be punished to  
10 the full extent of the law.  
11

12 Section 2: Every year, there are about 10,000 inmates in Kentucky prisons sentenced for narcotics  
13 possession charges, and the state spends roughly \$311 million in order to keep such inmates in prison.  
14 The sentence for such possession charges is in most cases one year in prison, and it costs the state  
15 government \$14,000 to keep one inmate in prison for a single year.  
16

17 Section 3: This act amends KRS 218A.140 to change the sentencing guidelines to a mandatory 90-day  
18 outpatient rehabilitation program for all first and second-time offenders. A 90-day rehabilitation  
19 program costs, on average, \$5,000 per person and is more active in treating physiological narcotic  
20 dependency than simply being removed from the substance in prison. Then the state would have only  
21 spent roughly \$100 million on those same 10,000 inmates. Through rehabilitation, an offender also has a  
22 better chance of staying sober, because such treatment centers treat withdrawal. Confinement in a jail  
23 cell will only raise an addict's sense of dependency, so he will be very likely to revert to drug use right out  
24 of prison.  
25

26 Section 4: To clarify, this bill does not de-criminalize drug use, but rather changes sentencing guidelines  
27 regarding possession charges. A first-time offender will be sentenced to 90-day mandatory treatment,  
28 and a second-time offender will be sentenced with a fine of \$5,000 and a 120-day mandatory treatment  
29 period. A third offense would result in a jail sentence of 5 years or more. There will also be an imposition  
30 of a prison sentence if any offenders refuse the mandatory treatment. This bill will go into effect  
31 immediately upon its enactment.  
32

33 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2017.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5 Section 1: This bill will be lifting regulations regarding the sale and distribution of alcohol in dry and semi-dry counties (counties where the sale of alcohol is heavily restricted or prohibited altogether.)

6  
7  
8 Section 2: The institution of this bill will increase state revenue, stimulate local community economies, and reduce crimes related to alcohol, such as drunk driving.

9  
10  
11 Section 3: There will be no funding required for this bill, as it is lifting a ban, and the institution of facilities that sell alcohol to consumers is up to private companies, rather than the Local, State, or Federal government.

12  
13  
14 Section 4: Organizations found in violation of this bill will be fined a maximum of \$15,000, based on the number of offenses.

15  
16  
17  
18 Section 5: This bill will go into effect 90 days following passage.

1 An act to Privatize Infrastructure in the Commonwealth of Kentucky

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5 Section 1: The roads, highways and bridges in the state of Kentucky are in desperate need of repair. The  
6 typical solution to this would be to increase funds by increasing the state income tax. Given that such has  
7 been done almost every year for the past twenty years, this bill offers a different solution. The purpose  
8 of this legislation is to redirect ownership and maintenance of state infrastructure to private companies.  
9 Rather than the government using tax money to build roads and bridges, private companies would  
10 provide the service instead. This would improve quality, lower cost and make building roads and bridges  
11 more peaceful.

12  
13 Section 2: Government controlling infrastructure means that in order for new roads to be laid down, land  
14 must be taken, or annexed from the pre-existing owners. This bill would have companies peacefully  
15 purchase land from citizens before building roads.

16  
17 Section 3: Government paying for infrastructure means that it must tax the citizens of Kentucky in order  
18 to pay for them. This is seen by some as unfair, since everyone pays the same percentage in taxes yet  
19 not everyone uses the roads equally. For instance, a mother who works out of her home should not pay  
20 the same amount for road maintenance as a delivery company that uses infrastructure constantly. Under  
21 this bill, every person or company would pay their share according to their usage since payment for  
22 infrastructure would be direct like any other service provided by private companies.


23  
24 Section 4: Both State and County governments of Kentucky will auction off roads based off of private  
25 appraisals. Private companies would control their own traffic laws, so in order to make smooth the  
26 transition, companies will be required to maintain already-existing traffic laws for the first five years  
27 after implementation of this bill. Private companies will also be responsible for policing their own roads.

28  
29 Section 5: This bill will go into effect January 1, 2017.

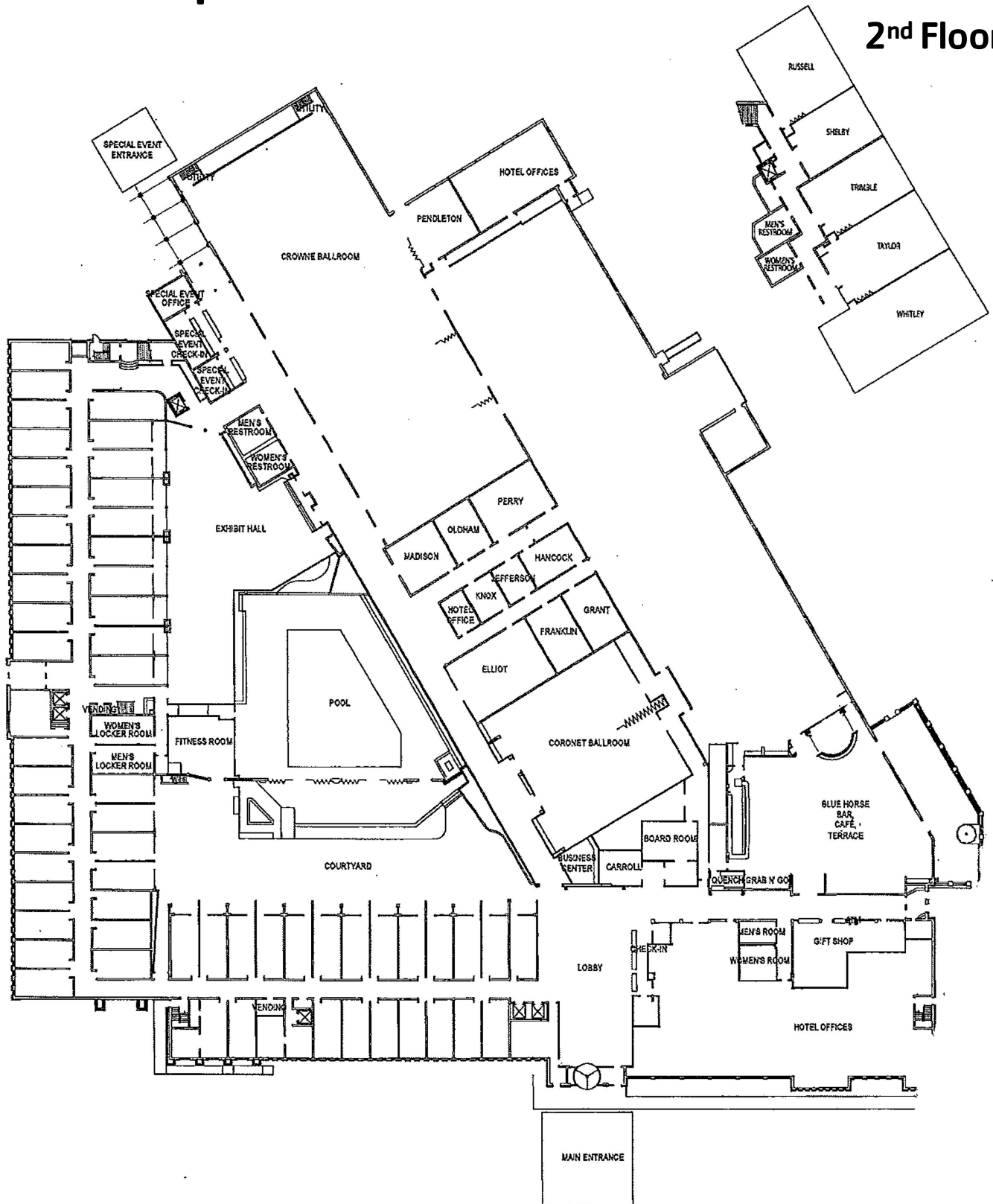

### SECOND FLOOR – JUDICIAL BRANCH

- 13 From the top of the steps on the second floor, observe the view of the nave, or **Main corridor**.
- 14 This spectacular space is over 300 feet long. It is lined with 36 huge, one piece columns made of Vermont granite. Note the colorful art skylights and grand staircase.
- 15 Also from here you can see the murals in the lunettes on either end of the nave. Painted by Gilbert White, the murals depict moments in the early history of Kentucky.
- 16 The one over the East wing is a representation of Daniel Boone's first view of the Bluegrass region, or "beautiful level of Kentucky," in 1769.
- 17 The mural to the West shows Boone and Richard Henderson concluding the Treaty of Watauga in 1775 which allowed the Transylvania Company to purchase much of the land that is Kentucky from the Cherokee Indians.
- 18 On the second floor of the Capitol you will notice many paintings. These are **portraits of Justices of the Kentucky Supreme Court** and judges of the former Court of Appeals.
- 19 Perhaps the most elegant room in the Capitol, the state reception room was included as a place for special events and as the reception area for the governor's office, originally next door. Inspired by grand salons in European palaces, the room was restored in 1995 to its original grandeur. The placement of the mirrors on either end of the room creates the illusion of an infinite view, like that in the Hall of Mirrors of the Palace of Versailles in France.
- 20 Stepping outside of the State Reception Room, a small **chapel, press offices**, and the **office of the Chief Justice** (not open for tours) are on the West end of this floor.

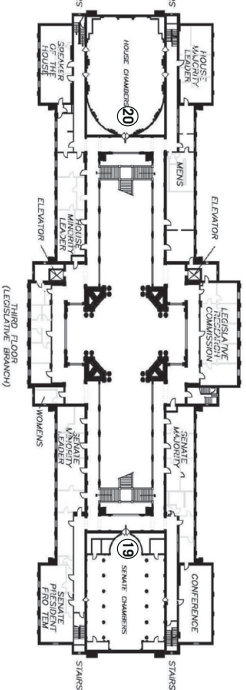
### Why is Kentucky called a "Commonwealth"?

In this country, "commonwealth" is another word for "state". The term implies a commitment to the "commonweal," or common good of the people. Several states (Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, and Virginia, in addition to Kentucky) call themselves commonwealths. Since Kentucky was formed from Virginia, our state's founders decided to use the term too.

### Capitol vs. Capital.

A capitol is a building used as a headquarters of a government. A capitol houses legislative chambers and may also have courtrooms and government offices. A capital is a city that is the seat of government of a state or nation. This building is a capitol. Frankfort is a capital.

**The Legislative Branch of Kentucky State Government:**  
Like most states, Kentucky has a bicameral legislature - that is one with two components. The "lower" and larger body is the House of Representatives; the "upper," smaller body is the Senate. The Speaker of the House presides over that chamber, and the President of the Senate chairs deliberations there. Other legislative officials include the House and Senate majority and minority leaders. Together, the House and Senate are known as the Kentucky General Assembly. The General Assembly meets in regular session for sixty working days in even years, and for thirty working days in odd years. The governor of Kentucky can call Special Sessions to address specific issues. Legislative chambers and offices occupy the third floor of the Capitol.



### THIRD FLOOR – LEGISLATIVE FLOOR

- 19 **Senate chamber** (on the West end of the building). You may enter the Senate if the chamber is not in use.
- 20 Raised galleries allow the public to view the Senate's deliberations during legislative sessions. There are desks for thirty-eight senators, who also have individual offices in the Capitol Annex.
- 21 Please proceed to the other end of the third floor - the East end.
- 22 **House of Representatives.** You may enter the House chamber if it is not in use.
- 23 The House of Representatives, like the Senate, also includes spectator galleries and desks for members. However, with 100 members, the size of the House requires some additional features. Votes are recorded electronically and displayed on panels on either side of the Speaker's desk. Each member of the General Assembly has a desktop computer.
