



CONFERENCE STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT AND DRESS CODE

The purpose of this Code of Conduct is to identify personal behavior that is consistent with the purpose and objectives of the Kentucky YMCA Youth Association. The items within the Code are designed to protect the welfare of the program for current participants and future generations. A participant's personal behavior reflects upon one's self, one's Student YMCA, and the Kentucky YMCA. Registration in any Kentucky YMCA conference program indicates personal acceptance of the Code of Conduct. Any student sent home for violation of this Code will be at the expense of parent or guardian.

EXPECTATIONS OF PARTICIPANTS

1. Each delegate shall conduct himself/herself in an orderly and responsible manner before, during, and after all functions of the Kentucky YMCA conference programs.
2. All participants share the responsibility for their actions equally when violations of the Code are witnessed. Those who choose to be present when a violation occurs and do not immediately act to remedy and report the violation shall, by their own choice, be considered participants in the violation. In relation to this Code, there are no "innocent bystanders."
3. No delegate shall leave a Kentucky YMCA function unless the approval of his/her advisor AND the director of the program is secured. The delegate must be picked up and returned by a parent or legal guardian who must take responsibility for the delegate in writing.
4. Each delegate is legally and financially liable for the removal, defacing, or willful damage to public or private property. Any act of vandalism, destruction of property, or misuse of a facility may be a crime and will be treated as a potential criminal violation.
5. Food (including gum and candy) and beverages other than water (including those sold by the hotel) are not permitted in any meeting sessions.
6. Cell phones, music players, or other wireless communications devices are not to be used during any meeting session.
7. The use of tobacco products, burning of incense, possession of alcoholic beverages, and the use of legal or illegal drugs not in accordance with a prescription is forbidden at any Kentucky YMCA function.
8. Youth delegates may not enter rooms other than those assigned by the Y-Staff or advisor.
9. Physical intimacy between participants of any gender is inappropriate at all times while at Kentucky YMCA Youth Association Programs and is prohibited.
10. All delegates shall be in and remain in their assigned rooms by scheduled curfew and doors shall remain closed until scheduled end of curfew.
11. Badges shall be worn ONLY by the individual whose name is on the badge. Badge switching or sharing is strictly prohibited. Participants will wear their assigned badges at all times when they are not in their sleeping rooms, and must be visible at all times. Badges are to be worn around the neck and are not to be defaced, decorated, or altered in any way. There may be a charge for replacement badges.
12. Unless there is a fire, participants will not pull the fire alarm. Pulling a fire alarm is a serious offense, and any participant who does so will be held financially and potentially criminally liable. Hotel alarms automatically summon the fire department and create a great inconvenience and fear for the hotel and other guests.
13. Use of personal vehicles by students during Kentucky YMCA conferences is strictly prohibited.
14. Weapons of any kind and items that could cause injury or damage to participants and/or property are strictly forbidden.

VIOLATION OF EXPECTATIONS

All violations of this code of conduct are to be brought to the attention of the Y-Staff. Participants found to be in violation of the above expectations will be subject to disciplinary actions at the discretion of advisors and the Y-Staff including but not limited to: calls to parents/guardians; incident report filed; participant sent home; school policies implemented. If state or federal law is broken, Y-Staff will notify parent/guardian and law enforcement and participant will be sent home. At all times the Y-Staff reserves the right to alter disciplinary actions at their discretion.

ROOMING POLICY

I understand that conference delegates are typically housed four (4) to each room and that in order to participate in this program; I must share a room and bed with at least one other student of the same sex from my delegation. I may be roomed with students of the same sex from another delegation, in which case I will not share a bed with a person from another delegation. I further understand that I may not room with anyone other than YMCA conference delegates

-- not an advisor, parents, or other relatives -- without expressed notarized* parental consent (*notarization only required if student rooms with adult other than parent/legal guardian), and permission of Executive Director of the Kentucky YMCA. I also understand that I may not room alone.

REFUND POLICY

I understand that all fees are non-refundable. In the case of extenuating circumstances, a portion of the payment may be refunded by action of the Executive Director based upon written request from the student or parent.

PARTICIPANT DRESS CODE

KYA is a professional development experience. While at KYA, students are expected to abide by the following dress code. Conference name badges are part of this dress code and must be worn for all conference functions. Anyone not in compliance with the dress code may be asked to change clothes. Advisors will be notified of any violations. Kentucky YMCA staff reserves the right to consider removal of Delegation of Excellence from any delegation with three (3) or more reported dress code violations. ****Dress code will be enforced by delegation advisors.****

First night: Business Casual; Business Professional for officers and candidates

Second day: Business Professional

Second night: Casual

Third morning: Casual; Business Professional for officers and candidates

Business Casual

- Collared shirt (tucked in)
- Dress shirt or sweater that covers shoulders
NO sheer/lace/see-through portions on torso (front or back)
- Blazer, business jacket, and tie optional
- Business dress with skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back) and covered shoulders





Family Dollar, et al v. Baytos

This year's case is *Family Dollar v Baytos*, a workers' compensation case. Workers' compensation is a unique area of the law. When a worker gets injured on the job, he or she is entitled to compensation to cover their medical care, their lost wages, and the loss of any future earning capacity. Because there are many on-the-job injuries every day, there is a special statutory scheme (or, set of laws) for the court system to handle these cases. In other words, workers' compensation cases go to a special "mini court system" so that they do not clog up Kentucky's district and circuit courts. The judges in the workers' compensation system handle only workers' compensation claims, and are specialists in this unique area of law.

A workers' compensation claim is a case where a person alleges they were injured as a result of their job duties, and are asking their employer for compensation for the injury. The types of claims vary greatly, from workers involved in accidents at work, to workers who contract diseases as a result of the work environment, such as black lung. Workers' compensation claims do not go through the normal tiered court system. Instead, the case is initially heard before an Administrative Law Judge (ALJ). If one of the parties wants to appeal the decision of the Administrative Law Judge, that party appeals to the Workers' Compensation Board. If a party is still displeased with the ruling, the case then can be appealed to the Kentucky Court of Appeals, and on to the Kentucky Supreme Court. The Kentucky Supreme Court is the final word in all Workers' Compensation matters.

Stephen Baytos suffered a serious injury while working as a manager at Family Dollar. He was lifting boxes, and felt chest pain, which was ultimately determined to be a torn thoracic aorta. He filed a workers' compensation claim, asking for Family Dollar to pay for his medical care, and for his lost wages. The ALJ first determined that the injury was, in fact, actually caused by his work activities. After it was determined that Family Dollar is liable for Baytos' injuries, Family Dollar tried to settle with Baytos as to the amount of compensation he would receive. Baytos agreed, and a settlement agreement was executed.

Sadly, Mr. Baytos died several years later as a result of the torn thoracic aorta. Normally, when a worker dies as a result of their job duties (for example, a fatal on-the-job accident), his or her dependents are entitled to receive compensation for their death. Therefore, Mr. Baytos' widow, Mamie Baytos, filed a motion to reopen his workers' compensation claim, and she asked for compensation for his death. Family Dollar objected, arguing that Mr. Baytos had settled the claim and it could not be reopened.

The ALJ agreed with Mamie, and awarded her compensation for her husband's death. Family Dollar appealed, and the Workers' Compensation Board reversed the decision. The Board reasoned that the settlement agreement was final, and Mr. Baytos had waived his right to ever reopen the claim. This waiver was binding on his dependents. Mamie appealed, and was successful before the Court of Appeals.

In this case, there is no dispute as to any material fact. Both sides agree as to all the relevant facts (that Mr. Baytos suffered a torn thoracic aorta, that he knowingly entered into the settlement agreement, and that he later died as a result of the injury). The only question before the court is whether Mrs. Baytos is entitled to reopen a claim that her husband settled before his death.

The main issue to address is whether Mrs. Baytos is entitled to reopen the claim even though her husband entered into a final settlement agreement before his death. Another way to think about the issue is: Even if Mr. Baytos settled *his* claims, is he entitled or capable of waiving *his wife's* rights to compensation?

The **Appellants**, Family Dollar, will argue that the settlement is final. It should emphasize that it is in the interest of public policy for settlement agreements to be final and not subject to endless litigation.

The **Appellee**, Mamie Baytos, will argue she has a right to compensation separate from her husband. Even if her husband received compensation for his *injury*, she is still entitled to compensation for his *death*.

Students might also consider the following questions in formulating their arguments:

- Are the rights of an injured worker different from the rights of the workers' family, or do the families' rights depend on the workers' rights?
- What exactly did Mr. Baytos agree to in the settlement agreement?
- Why is it important to Family Dollar, and other companies, to settle workers' compensation claims? What is Family Dollar's interest in having a "final" judgment?
- In creating the workers' compensation system, did the General Assembly promote the settling of claims through settlement agreements?



1 An act to expand welfare coverage with a new state benefits program.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Kentucky currently provides the Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) to
6 around 650,000 Kentucky residents to help pay for their meals. However, there are currently no
7 government benefit programs to aid in the cost of necessary personal hygiene items. This bill proposes
8 that a new government program, the SNAP Supplement Program, be created to aid in the cost of these
9 items.

10
11 Section 2: Personal care items included are as follows: Feminine Hygiene products (Tampons and Pads);
12 Toilet Paper and Paper Towels; Dental Hygiene Products (Toothbrush, Toothpaste, and Floss); Diapers
13 and Baby Wipes; other basic hygiene products (such as Deodorant)

14
15 Section 3: Recipients of the SNAP program will qualify for this Supplement Program. They will receive
16 an amount each month equal to 1/5 of their monthly SNAP benefit to go towards these items. The
17 average monthly amount received through SNAP is \$125, so most recipients would receive \$25 a
18 month. The benefits will be loaded onto an Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) each month.

19
20 Section 4: Defined, an EBT card is a debit card that allows state governments to provide and track
21 benefits to authorized recipients.

22
23 Section 5: Kentucky allocates \$2.1 billion for SNAP each year. In order to cover all expenses of the
24 Supplement Program, Kentucky would need to allocate \$1 billion dollars annually. In order to obtain
25 these funds, sales tax would be raised from 6% to 8% to match the State of Indiana.

26
27 Section 6: The program will be run by the Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services.

28
29 Section 7: This bill will go into effect one year after its passing.

An act to require paid maternity leave.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Considering that a study ran in 2011 shows that 91 percent of businesses with paid leave policies reported positive outcomes, it would be very beneficial to enact upon this and implement a policy that provides women with paid, job-protected maternity leave.

Section 2: In certain cases, women have to give up six-figure incomes to raise children because their job is not protected while on leave. The U.S. Department of Labor Statistics shows that 30% of women with children under 18 are not actively participating in the work force. Protecting a woman's job while she is on leave will ultimately cause the amount of women in the work force to rise.

Section 3: This new law would amend Kentucky's current maternity leave policy of a minimum of 12 weeks of unpaid leave with no job protection. The new policy would raise the minimum from 12 weeks to 18 weeks, add full job protection, and pay the woman on leave her full salary.

Section 4: Businesses with over 50 employees would have to pay 45% of a woman's salary on leave while the government pays the other 55%. Businesses with under 50 employees would be evaluated and told the amount that they are to pay while the government would pay the rest. For the government to pay their part of a woman's leave, it would cause an overall tax increase of less than 1%. For businesses to pay for their part of a woman's leave, it would cost each employee under a dollar.

Section 5: Penalty for businesses not following this policy will cause them to have to pay a \$15,000 dollar fine and pay the woman a settlement of what they failed to pay plus an extra \$500 dollars. Continuation to not follow the policy after previous warning and penalties will result in incarceration of the individuals refusing to conform to the policy's rules.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect 6 months after passage to allow businesses time to implement the policy.

6 Section 1: Due to the rise of violence, vandalism and bullying in public schools, whereas the need exists
7 for more resource officers in schools, and whereas financial resources from local law enforcement
8 agencies have dwindled in recent years, other options must be explored that contributes to safe school
9 environments.
10

11 Section 2: This legislation would create a program in school districts to recruit veterans for school
12 safety and security needs, and is intended to provide our protection and other specific Public Safety
13 and first responder functions to public school children and employees.
14

15 Section 3: Veterans will have to meet requirements that will be established by the Kentucky
16 Department of Justice upon passage of the School Protection Officer Act. This will ensure officers will
17 be a sound mind and body.
18

19 Section 4: Beginning with the 2017-2018 school year, each school district may employ a school
20 protection officer for each public school that offers kindergarten through 12th grade.
21

22 Section 5: The presence of the school protection officer is intended to provide armed protection and
23 other specialized public safety and first responder functions to the children and employees of each
24 public school, with specialized training.
25

26 Section 6: A Screening process will be in place to detect applicants who might be suffering from post-
27 traumatic stress disorder and other potential problems.

10 student's grade.

- 12 Section 3: Throughout all high school classrooms, homework is to be worth thirty-percent of a
13 student's grade, or, at the discretion of the teacher, a quiz section may be added.

- 15 Section 4: If a quiz section is added, quiz grades throughout all high school classrooms are to be worth
16 ten-percent of a student's grade, and homework is to be worth twenty-percent of the student's grade.

- 18 Section 5: Judgment of what defines homework, classwork, test, and quiz grades will be the teacher's
19 responsibility in relation to the subject being taught.

- 21 Section 6: In addition to this, the grading scale is to be normalized throughout Kentucky high schools
22 using this format; an "F" would be given if below sixty-four percent average, a "D" would be given from
23 sixty-four percent to sixty-nine percent average, a "C" would be given from seventy to eighty-one
24 percent average, a "B" would be given from eighty-two to ninety-one percent average, and finally an
25 "A" would be given from ninety-two to one-hundred percent average.
26
- 27 Section 7: This bill will be at no cost to the state, and shall be enforced by the Kentucky Department of
28 Education.

- 30 Section 8: If passed, this bill will be put into effect as of January 1, 2018.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: According to KRS 600.020, an abused or neglected child is defined as a child whose health
6 or welfare is harmed or threatened. Four percent of these crimes against children under the age of five
7 are committed by unrelated persons. The Commonwealth of Kentucky must address this issue by
8 keeping an on-line registry of convicted child abuse or neglect offenders, open to the public. This
9 registry will aid in assuring that parents/guardians employ only the safest caretakers for their children.

10
11 Section 2: This registry will include the offender's:

- 12 • Full name
- 13 • Date of birth
- 14 • Gender
- 15 • Race
- 16 • Height
- 17 • Weight
- 18 • Hair color
- 19 • Eye color
- 20 • Primary address
- 21 • Biometric Verification
- 22 • Photograph of offender (taken at the Kentucky State Police Post)
- 23 • Convicted Offence

24
25 Convicted child abuse or neglect offenders will have to register at their local State Police Post
26 immediately upon return into the general public. If a person fails to register, they can face a prison
27 sentence of no more than ten years.

28
29 Section 3: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky State Police Department.

30
31 Section 4: Allocations for funding shall be made in Kentucky State Police Department budgets to reflect
32 upkeep of online registry.

33
34 Section 5: This bill will go into effect one year upon passage by the governor to give the state time to
35 institute the program.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5 Section 1: The bill will implement a global cultural learning program in Kentucky public and private high
6 schools.
7

8 Section 2: Curriculum will be developed through the Department of Education by a committee of
9 professors representing Kentucky's public universities. Curriculum must emphasize world religions,
10 history, and cultural values of various people groups around the globe. Curriculum will utilize various
11 instructional strategies including lectures from professors, guest presenters who represent diverse
12 cultural backgrounds, and humanitarian service-learning projects for students. The committee will
13 choose 10 schools with which to run a pilot version of this program. After the one year pilot program,
14 the committee will determine how best to expand the program until has been successfully implemented
15 statewide.
16

17 Section 3: The course will rely upon distance learning technology as primary tools for instruction.
18 Lessons will be taught by university professors and guest speakers. Faculty in each high school will
19 facilitate instruction and help students implement service learning projects.
20

21 Section 4: This program will be funded by the Department of Education and grants from Kentucky
22 universities.
23

24 Section 5: The pilot program will be enacted during the 2017 - 2018 academic year.

1 An act to Establish a Clean Election Fund to Publicly Finance Campaigns

2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: All campaigns of candidates for public office, delineated in and pursuant KRS Chapter 118
6 on the Conduct of Elections, will be publicly funded through the Clean Election Fund in the State
7 Treasury. Each candidate will receive the average amount of money spent on campaigns for the same
8 position in the previous two elections. This amount will be adjusted for inflation annually. Candidates
9 receiving funding must file their usage of funds, sending filings to the Clean Election Fund within 10
10 days of spending of funds. The filings are to be made publicly available by the Clean Election Fund
11 within 20 days of receiving. The use of any funds on the part of a campaign is subject to required
12 justification and investigation as stated in Section 3.

13

14 Section 2: Money allocated to the fund will come from the following sources:

- 15 a) the current allocated budget and resources of the Kentucky Registry of Election Finance,
- 16 b) any allocated money unused at the ends of candidates' campaigns,
- 17 c) voluntary donations to the Clean Election Fund and to candidates,
- 18 d) donations from taxpayers required to file tax returns pursuant KRS 141.180 who will be
19 prompted with a description of the importance of the Clean Election Fund and the option to
20 donate a portion or all of their tax refund to the Clean Election Fund,
- 21 e) fines from Section 3.

22

23 Section 3: Any funds not spent in the justifiably forthright pursuit of campaigning will result in a fine
24 twice the amount misspent. Also, any donations to a campaign must be transferred to the Clean
25 Election Fund. Using any funds not allocated by the Clean Election Fund will result in a fine equal to
26 twice the amount spent in contravention. Monitoring funds of candidates and issuing fines thereof is
27 the responsibility of the Kentucky State Board of Elections and the Attorney General.

28

29 Section 4: This act will take effect in the next Regular Election and all elections subsequent.

1 An act to Make Recycling a Tax Write Off.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Recycling is more important to the environment today than it ever has been. Not only is land
6 pollution harshly affecting Kentucky, but factories contribute to air and water pollution. Kentucky is
7 already prone to high level air pollution due to its position in the Ohio River Valley, which prohibits the
8 pollutants from leaving this area. Since there's already a high level of air pollution in Kentucky, it's this
9 generation's obligation to make sure the environment stays as healthy as it can be.

10 According to a recycling website based in the UK, "it takes 70% less energy to use recycled paper
11 instead of using raw materials". Also, about 50% of the things in the trash are recyclable.

12
13 Section 2: First, the people who want to recycle pay the regular fee for recycling. Later, in the form of a
14 tax write off, the people who pay for recycling would get a certain part of that money back during the
15 tax season in January. In the beginning of the year, it will still be expensive to recycle, but there will be
16 the incentive of the tax write off. This should boost the economy when it's first implemented.

17 However, there is a problem regarding money and how the government would be able to come up with
18 the money to be able to execute the solution.

19
20 Section 3: The write-off would be deducting 50% of the current recycling payment. This means that we
21 would be taking away 50% of the tax payments that people normally have to pay. For example, if
22 someone were to pay a hypothetical amount of \$10,000 worth of taxes, the write-off would change
23 that amount to 5,000. This is definitely a huge decrease in tax money, so more people would be
24 interested in partaking in tax write-offs for recycling.

25
26 Section 4: This will be regulated by the Internal Revenue Services (IRS) and facilitated by the state
27 government.

28
29 Section 5: Every recycling company will be implementing the plan. There will be set amounts or plans
30 for recycling based on how much you recycle that will determine how much of a write off you get. This
31 plan will also cover every type of recycling (i.e. electronics, paper, plastic, metal, scraps)

32
33 Section 6: This tax could influence people to recycle more because there will be a reward for it now.
34 This will have many positive effects of the environments.

1 An act to require the creation and implementation of technology classes in Kentucky prisons.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Prisoners in Kentucky can be kept for years in prison, generally shut away from modern
6 society, and subsequently from changes that may happen in society. Because technology changes so
7 quickly, prisoners have trouble adapting to the new technology when they are released. Currently, only
8 basic college courses and vocational studies are given in correction facilities. This bill will create new
9 technology classes that will be given to prisoners who will be released in 2 years or less. This will help
10 prisoners adapt to the new society and even help them find jobs when they are released.

11
12 Section 2: Classes will be created with help from private and public education programs and
13 institutions, such as colleges. Current course material will be changed to be taught at a slightly slower
14 pace. These courses include programming and coding, and also some web design. New courses will also
15 be created by technology experts determining what information about modern technology is important
16 for functioning in society.

17
18 Section 3: Funding will come from allocations in the budget of the Department of Corrections.
19 Donations from citizens and companies will also be accepted.

20
21 Section 4: Teachers will be workers in the Department of Corrections that volunteer or are chosen
22 based on experience. They will be given classes that will teach them how to teach. They will be payed a
23 bonus for teaching.

24
25 Section 5: Funding specifically for the purchase of computers and necessary accessories will be
26 requested. This amount will be from \$150,000 to \$300,000. Software licensing will also be requested.

27
28 Section 6: A monthly inspection will be given to each prison, to make sure that the prisoners have been
29 taught. Tests will be given on what the prisoners should've been taught for the month. If a prison is
30 found to break this law by not teaching, then the warden of the prison will be directly fined. All money
31 taken will go to the budget of this program. Offenses will be reset with the hiring of a new warden, or
32 every two years.

- 33 • First Offense: The warden will be fined \$1,000.
- 34 • Second Offense: The warden will be fined \$2,000, and a special supervisor will be assigned to
35 the prison.
- 36 • Third Offense: The warden will be fined \$3,500, and the prisoners will be sent to take classes
37 with the prisoners of a different prison with no offenses. where they will will not be transferred
38 to avoid overcrowding of prisons.

39
40 Section 7: This bill will be enacted on January 1, 2018.

- 5 Section 1: This bill is to require schools across the state to provide recycling bins to enable students
- 6 and school staff to recycle various materials.
- 7
- 8 Section 2: The school would pay for these recycling bins, based on the population of the school. For
- 9 example, a smaller school with only two-hundred students would have less bins around campus
- 10 compared to schools with two-thousand students.
- 11
- 12 Section 3: Schools would be expected to recycle aluminum, paper, plastic (bottles) and cardboard. If
- 13 the costs to have the materials picked up are prohibitive, individual schools could request to choose
- 14 what they could afford to recycle.
- 15
- 16 Section 4: The bins will have to be emptied out every week by waste haulers, and they will take them to
- 17 a recycling mill or a MRF. Schools would be saving money because it is 36% cheaper than regular trash
- 18 disposal.
- 19
- 20 Section 5: This bill would take effect at the beginning of the 2017-2018 school year.

- 6 Section 1: Kentucky TANF welfare agency will contract a drug testing consulted for welfare applicants
7 that have a drug felony conviction.
8
- 9 Section 2: Applicants will be tested during application for TANF/ welfare benefits.
10
- 11 Section 3: Applicants who refuse the drug screen will not be eligible for assistance. However, a child
12 who's parent refuses or fails the drug test can still receive the same benefits through a designated
13 payee required investigation and home visits from Child Protective Services (CPS) for parents who
14 tested positive or failed to get a drug test.
15
- 16 Section 4: Applicants that test positive but complete a substance abuse treatment program, counseling,
17 and a job skill program can continue to receive benefits and subject to random drug testing.
18
- 19 Section 5: If section four's requirements are not meet recipient's benefits would decrease by 50%.
20
- 21 Section 6: Repeated positive drug results on random testing will result in loss benefits.
22
- 23 Section 7: The National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) has funding opportunities such as grants to
24 pilot legislation like this. However, the state would be required to fund this legislation after 3 years or
25 this program will be dissolved.
26
- 27 Section 8: This bill will go into effect January of 2017.

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1 An act to decrease drug overdoses through implementation of a universal system in medical practices,
2 hospitals, and pharmacies.
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5

6 Section 1: The current law states that doctors must examine patients, take full medical information,
7 screen for drug use, and check electronic records before writing prescriptions for opioids. This is done
8 to prevent patients from "doctor shopping" in order to obtain multiple prescriptions. Although, KASPER
9 is in effect, it is unsuccessful. No system can catch every culprit, but the goal is to reduce the number
10 as much as possible by creating a universal system. Through a social security number which links the
11 patient to the prescription, this bill will try to combat this issue which place not only Kentucky, but the
12 nation.
13

14 Section 2: The person must be present when dealing with the prescriptions and over the age of 18. If
15 he/she is a minor, legal guardians must get the prescription. Unless identity theft takes place, this
16 system will decrease the number of drug overdoses. Furthermore, this bill looks toward a stronger
17 enactment of police enforcement in order to decrement the number of drug cases in general.
18

19 Section 3: More than 1,000 Kentuckians die each year from prescription drug overdoses and 20% of
20 teenagers have admitted to using prescription pills non-medically. Due to these numbers, Kentucky is
21 ranked the third highest in the nation. However, little is being done to handle this prescription abuse in
22 Kentucky. This bill warrants the use of a universal system, KUSP, that will use social security numbers
23 to ensure citizens are not abusing their doctor's power to prescribe medicine, and the doctor from
24 abusing his/her right as a licensed prescriber. KUSP, Kentucky's Universal System of Prescriptions will
25 ensure fewer deaths due to prescription drugs and save jobs of good doctors helping save the lives of
26 our country.
27

28 Section 4: This universal system will be installed in all pharmacies and medical practices by the
29 Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy. The Kentucky ODCP will also be monitoring the success rates of
30 this system and report on these results at the end of each year.
31

32 Section 5: The funding will be provided by the money allocated to the Health and Family Services
33 Cabinet of the fiscal budget of 2016 – 2017. The potential funds have been currently set to
34 \$10,603,884,700.
35

36 Section 6: Upon passage, this bill will take effect on the next fiscal year starting July 1st of 2017.

1 An act to establish a law that guarantees job protection for new parents on paternity and maternity
2 leave.
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5
6 Section 1: FMLA is a federal law that requires covered employers to provide employees job-protected
7 and unpaid leave for qualified medical and family reasons. Among those reasons is maternity/paternity
8 leave. This act however, only covers 59% of US workers. It does not cover employees who work for
9 companies in with less than 50 employees working within a 75 mile radius. This means that some
10 mothers/fathers are not guaranteed job protection after spending time with their newborn child. In
11 fact, 25% of women are forced to return to work after 10 days of childbirth due to the fear of job loss.
12

13 Section 2: Our bill would protect the jobs of new parents while they're on paternity/maternity leave,
14 whether it's adoptive parents, single parents, or married couples. For paternity leave, the person would
15 be guaranteed job protection for 2 weeks. It would protect the jobs of those on maternity leave for 12
16 weeks.
17

18 Section 3: This bill applies to all employees who have worked for the same company for a minimum of 3
19 months. The leave covers the parental units or guardians of a newborn, soon to be born child, or
20 adopted child and is intended for the purpose of attending appointments and caring for the child. All
21 companies must comply.
22

23 Section 4: The Kentucky Labor Department would enforce this law.
24

25 Section 5: There is no direct cost to implement this bill.
26

27 Section 6: This bill will go into effect one year after its passing.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4

5 Section 1: All public schooling systems must offer alternative meal options upon a student’s request.
6 Alternative options include allergy free, lactose free, vegetarian or vegan, or following the guidelines of
7 a student’s prescribed meal plan.
8

9 Section 2: This will allow students with dietary restrictions access to meals within school that meet all
10 School Nutrition Standards, while coinciding with the National School Lunch Program.
11

12 Section 3: Students requesting alternative meal options may be required to pay a small additional fee,
13 if needed for the school to produce these commodities and stay within the current lunch budget
14

15 Section 4: Schools, except under extreme circumstances, are not permitted to do the following:
16 A. Deny a student meal alternatives.
17 B. Misinform students of or omit pertinent information about nutritional contents of food.
18 C. Charge excessively for meal alternatives.
19

20 Section 5: Failure to comply with any of the guidelines and/or violations of the restrictions listed above
21 will result in one of the following penalties:
22 A. The school shall be fined the cost of the student’s unprovided lunch(es).
23 B. The school will be required to pay the affected student’s medical bills if need be, and the
24 student’s initial price increase for specialized meals will be reduced back to the cost of a regular
25 school lunch for the set time of nine weeks.
26 C. The school must reimburse the student for the extra money that he/she has been wrongfully
27 charged.
28

29 Section 6: This bill shall be effective on August 1st of the upcoming school year after passage.

1 An act to regulate Kentucky Public High School’s Artificial Turf Fields.
2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: Diseases are spread through skin to skin contact and contact with infected blood, sweat,
6 and other bodily fluids. Some can be deadly.
7
8 Section 2: A turf burn is caused by falling or sliding on artificially turf, which then leads to an abrasion
9 on the skin. Due to the open wound, players that sustain turf burns have a risk of infection seven times
10 higher than a player who did not sustain a turf burn.
11
12 Section 3: There are many benefits of cleaning the fields monthly. Examples are having a decreased
13 chance of getting and spreading infection, having healthier athletes, and having a healthier school.
14
15 Section 4: The school administration must disinfect the turf fields monthly using the method of UVC
16 light. The school may choose the brand and supplier. A KHSAA officer will annually and randomly
17 inspect the school’s fields. The school must also show documentation of the monthly sanitation having
18 occurred. A five-hundred dollar fine will be put on the school by the state for every month the school
19 does not comply to the rules and regulations set by this bill.
20
21 Section 5: The funding for this bill will come from the school’s athletic department.
22
23 Section 6: The regulations in this bill will become effective one year after made law.

6 Only 24 states in the country already have this law in action. Unfortunately, Kentucky is not one of
7 these. Guidance counselors work with school staff, parents, and the community to create a caring and
8 supportive atmosphere for students' well-being. They help children develop the skills and strategies
9 necessary to succeed academically and socially. A counselor would be responsible for students' class
10 schedules, grade reports, addressing cases of abuse and neglect, managing special needs, KPREP
11 Testing, suicide prevention, counseling students about day-to-day issues, and many more.

12
13 Section 2: This bill will affect all public school students in the state of Kentucky. Students will have a
14 confidante available at all times through the day that is trained to help them with emotional problems,
15 as well as college and career plans.

16
17 Section 3: Each public school district will be responsible for funding the salaries of the necessary
18 guidance counselors through grants and budget monitoring.

19
20 Section 4: This bill will pertain to every public school without a full-time guidance counselor in the state
21 of Kentucky.

22
23 Section 5: This law will go into effect by the 2017-2018 school year.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5 Section 1: Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death among Kentucky youth and the current rate of
6 suicide attempts has gone up from 17.0 in 2013 to 17.7 in 2015 according to the Youth Risk Behavior
7 Survey.
8
9 Section 2: If enacted, this bill will make it mandatory for each student 6th through 12th Grade to have
10 a comprehensive mental screening for signs of depression and for mental health problems. They will
11 have to take this test before they can enter a state educational institution in the new academic year.
12
13 Section 3: If a party has religious and/or ethical objections to taking the test, they may submit a
14 request to opt-out to their local school board. If a mental health issue is discovered by going through
15 the mental screening, the family of the child may submit a written financial aid request to the Kentucky
16 Cabinet for Health and Family Services. Funds for financial aid will come from the Kentucky Lottery
17 Fund and the sizes of the grants will be based off a set scale based off of the family's income and on
18 how expensive the treatment is.
19
20 Section 4: If passed, this bill will take effect the school year immediately following its passage.

- 3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

- 5 Section 1: The current sentencing for the rape of a person who is mentally handicapped is 1 to 5 years
6 in a federal prison, which is a class D felony. This bill will change the sentencing to a Class A Rape, 20
7 to 50 years in a federal prison.
8
- 9 Section 2: This bill will significantly increase the sentencing for the accused. This bill would include the
10 act of raping someone who is generally mentally handicapped; has a lack of conceptual skills, social
11 skills, and/or life skills; and has a below average intelligence.
12
- 13 Section 3: Any penalties or punishment that will be incurred for violating the proposed law that are
14 already in effect. This would apply to the crime of forcing another person to have sexual intercourse
15 with the offender against their will, against a person who is rendered temporarily incapable of
16 appraising or controlling his or her conduct.
17
- 18 Section 4: This bill will be enforced by the State Government.
19
- 20 Section 5: The cost of this bill would be about \$40 per inmate; per day.
21
- 22 Section 6: This bill will go into effect on January 1st, 2017.
23
- 24 Section 7: Over 1,500 women get raped in Kentucky per year, and this bill will help to reduce the
25 number of these by increasing the sentencing of the guilty part.

1 An act to require a certified athletic trainer in all Kentucky high schools

2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: In cases where schools do not have an athletic trainer, the injured athletes seem to endure
6 longer lasting and more severe physical consequences. Currently, in the state of Kentucky, there is no
7 law requiring an athletic trainer to be on staff at the high school level. The purpose of this bill is to
8 reduce the amount and severity of sports related injuries for high school students.

9

10 Section 2: This bill requires all public and private schools in the state of Kentucky with 50 student
11 athletes or more, to hire a full-time athletic trainer. If a school has less than 50 student athletes, they
12 will be required to employ a part-time athletic trainer.

13

14 Section 3: If a school cannot afford an athletic trainer, local hospitals may be of assistance and grants
15 are available from the Kentucky High School Athletic Association (KHSAA).

16

17 Section 4: Every school year, each high school must submit proof of employment for their athletic
18 trainer, as well as a list of current student athletes to KHSAA by August 1. If the deadline is not met,
19 the school will receive a letter notifying them of the missing information with an additional 30 day
20 deadline to submit. If the school still fails to submit the proof of employment, KHSAA will enforce a fine
21 of \$500 and all sports will be halted until submission is completed.

22

23 Section 5: This bill will go into effect at the start of the 2017-2018 school year.

5 Section 1: In an effort to increase civic participation and community involvement, Kentucky High School
6 Students shall be required to complete a mandatory community service credit in order to receive their
7 high school diploma or GED.
8

9 Section 2: Students shall complete a minimum of 50 hours of community service.
10

11 Section 3: Community service shall be conducted as a mandatory part of the high school curriculum as
12 its own course, or paired with a Civics, or Humanities course.
13

14 Section 4: Students who are not able to fit the community service course in their schedule, can conduct
15 a supervised independent study, where they complete the service hours on their own, and a mentor, or
16 teacher signs off on their completion.
17

18 Section 5: Anyone seeking a GED must also complete the minimum of 50 community service hours,
19 supervised by a community/adult education mentor, in order to be eligible to receive their certificate.
20

21 Section 6: This bill will go into effect for the 2017-2018 school year.

7
- 8 Section 2: In Kentucky, citizens on welfare currently receive \$378.00 per month for every child that is
9 in their care. According to statistics gathered by the NCCP and census.gov there are currently 818,642
10 people on welfare in the Commonwealth, and 26% of these citizens have children. Some of these
11 citizens use this money for other activities, and do not use this money to take care of their children.
12 This bill will prevent the amount of citizens on welfare and decrease the amount of money the state of
13 Kentucky pays for citizens on welfare.
14
- 15 Section 3: If a woman chooses not to take the Depo Provera shot, her welfare will be suspended.
16
- 17 Section 4: This does not apply to children whose mother's do not comply.
18
- 19 Section 5: This bill will go into effect within 90 days of passage.

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1 An act to encourage Kentucky public schools to offer apprenticeship programs as an elective for high
2 school students.
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5

6 Section 1: An apprenticeship is a combination of on the job training and classroom instruction in which
7 students learn practical highly skilled occupations, sponsored by employers, labor unions and trade
8 associations.
9

10 Section 2: This program is for students who want to explore alternative careers that may not be
11 conducive at the conventional four year college or universities. Since students will get a head start
12 learning their trade, this will prepare them to enter the workforce sooner. Therefore, allowing students
13 to secure a financially stable job without having to wait four plus years. Additionally, students may be
14 able to perform actual work in their desired field while also attending the educational portion of their
15 apprenticeship.
16

17 Section 3: The program is open to students who have received their driver's licence or other reliable
18 transportation from their school to the company's building. Classes will have mandatory attendance.
19 Three missed classes within four months will lead to the student to no longer be in the apprenticeship
20 program. It will count towards their elective credits for the school year.
21

22 Section 4: Employers, unions, and associations will want to invest in this program because
23 apprenticeships serve as direct recruitment opportunities. In addition, state property tax refunds or
24 reductions as part of the 2012 state law is an incentive for organizations. These tax incentives are
25 available for employers that provide new jobs for trades. The apprenticeship program would fall into
26 this category and the state would reward employers accordingly.
27

28 Section 5: There are no further costs of this bill.
29

30 Section 6: The Department of Education will enforce and oversee this bill. They will work closely with
31 the companies involved.
32

33 Section 7: This bill will go in effect at the start of the 2018 school year.

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1 An act to provide companies that label products containing GMO with a 7.5% tax break

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: This does require all companies to label products containing GMO's, it only provides those
6 who choose to do so with a 7.5% tax break. This would deduct that 7.5% of the 35% tax that
7 companies are required to pay. Meaning that this is not 7.5% cut off of the 35%, it is 7.5% of that
8 35% tax that companies are required to pay This gives companies an incentive to labeling GMO's
9 opposed to requiring them to do so.

10
11 Section 2: The incentive is in place acting as a motivation for companies to labeling GMO's. The state of
12 Kentucky can not legally require companies to label their products seeing that they are nationally
13 distributed. In the case of this the tax incentive is in place to take the spot of that requirement.

14
15 Section 3: The tax break will be if and only these companies label all consumable products with a "GMO
16 inside" label. This does not apply to a select few of the companies products. All products must contain
17 this label for the incentive to be in place, otherwise the break does not apply to those companies.

18
19 Section 4: The term "GMO" is classified as any consumable that is contaminated, contains cosmetic, any
20 source of food additive, and all others that fall under the genetically modified category.

21
22 Section 5: There will be not cost for this seeing that the tax break is just that, a break. For labeling,
23 companies change their labels often so changing colors on the original label will not cost extra.
24 Choosing to label their products is the companies choice and is not the requirement of the state to
25 provide funding to do so. Changing size of the labels will not be required.

26
27 Section 6: This bill will go into effect exactly one year after passage.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: This act would require all public middle and high schools to start at 9:30 a.m.

6
7 Section 2: Sleep is very important to teens ages 12-18. This stage in a teen’s life is important for the
8 growth and development that is needed. Teens need about 8-10 hours of sleep each night to function
9 best. Many teens suffer from sleeping disorders because they are not getting the 8-10 that is needed.

10
11 Section 3: Starting school later can result in a higher grade point average. Students would have a
12 higher grade point average because starting school later allows your brain to awaken and students who
13 struggle focusing don’t struggle as much or quit struggling in general. Thomas Conrad, a principal at
14 North Estham said, “The preliminary findings show that with the 8:30 start time, there has been a 53
15 percent drop in the number of failing grades...” Our idea is to start school at 9:15a.m, therefore, the
16 percentage of failing grades would likely decrease more than the idea of starting at 8:30 a.m.

17
18 Section 4: With school starting later students and teachers attendance will improve significantly.
19 Students and teachers right now have to wake up so early so that results in sleep deprivation. Sleep
20 deprivation is the condition of not having enough sleep so students and teacher are missing school to
21 get better since not getting enough sleep is basically driving them to be ill. So starting school later
22 reduces sickness and allows attendance to be better.

23
24 Section 5: Would you want your kid out during morning rush hour when they are half asleep? Traffic in
25 the morning is a risk for both students and teachers. Starting school later can solve that issue by
26 avoiding morning rush hour and save the lives of your loved ones.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5 Section 1: The US Coast Guard’s most recent report of recreational boating statistics estimates that 9
6 people die and 38 people are injured from boating accidents last year, increasing by 48% from the
7 previous. These accidents also claimed \$621,540 in property damages among all accidents. Life-jackets
8 are extremely important in helping intoxicated people and inexperienced people maintain safety.

9
10 Section 2: This would require limited additional costs as lifejackets are already required to be on board
11 all watercraft. The difference is that people would be required to wear them at all times rather than
12 only when the vehicle is in motion.

13
14 Section 3: The law would be enforced through the Kentucky Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources
15 officers and all other peace officers who enforce the boating laws of Kentucky. U.S. Coast Guard
16 officers also patrol and have enforcement authority on federally controlled waters

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1 An act to prohibit smoking in any motor vehicle with a child as a passenger

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: In Kentucky, over one-third of households with children had at least one member who
6 smoked tobacco. Based on this statistic, it is reasonable to project that many of these adults will
7 smoke while in a car or other motor vehicle with a child. According to various studies, the levels of
8 toxicity of secondhand smoke in a car is up to ten times greater than what the Environmental
9 Protection Agency deems hazardous. These high levels of toxins are especially detrimental to children
10 who can develop numerous health conditions and diseases from exposure to secondhand smoke. The
11 purpose of this bill is to reduce a child's exposure to secondhand smoke by banning smoking in a motor
12 vehicle with a minor under the age of 13 - otherwise to be referred to in this bill as a child.

13
14 Section 2: The Kentucky Highway Patrol would be in charge of monitoring and pulling over any vehicle
15 in which a driver or passenger is smoking in the presence of a child. The majority of these citations will
16 occur after the driver of the vehicle has been pulled over for a more visually evident offense such as
17 speeding or failure to stop at a red light.

18
19 Section 3: If a vehicle with a child passenger is pulled over and either the driver or another passenger is
20 presently smoking, the smoker will receive a fine of \$75. In the case of a passenger smoking, the driver
21 will also receive a fine but at \$25. If an officer pulls over a vehicle and finds evidence of smoking (ex.
22 visible smoke, burning cigarette), the driver will be fined \$50-\$75 at the discretion of the officer.

23
24 Section 4: Implementing this bill will benefit Kentucky by reducing the amount of child illnesses and
25 deaths caused by exposure to secondhand smoke. This bill would also lower overall exposure to
26 tobacco smoke for smoking and non-smoking adults. Additionally, this bill would encourage current
27 smokers and children who are frequently exposed to smoking to live smoke-free lifestyles.
28 Furthermore, the fines collected from the offenses previously stated would go towards the Kentucky
29 Tobacco Prevention and Cessation Program, thereby increasingly promoting the bettering of citizens'
30 health by living tobacco-free.

31
32 Section 5: This bill will go into effect three months after passage.

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An act to have it mandatory for food companies to label their GMO products.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Our proposed bill is to have it mandatory for all food companies and agricultural manufacturers (ex: commercial farmers) to have any product containing GMO's labeled on the potentially sold product. As of our present time it is optional for a company to label their product. While the U.S. and Canada don't require food labeling, in 64 countries there are strict labeling laws or outright bans on GMO products (this includes a majority of Europe).

Section 2: GMO's (Genetically Modified Organisms) are a laboratory processed result in which foods are genetically modified and artificially forced into the genes of a plant or animal. These synthetic genes may come from bacteria, viruses, insects, animals, or even humans. They are used for preservation and modifying of a plant or animal. This over-usage of unhealthy GMO's overtime have caused organ damage to humans and mainly animals, immune system disorders, accelerated aging in animals, the passing on of toxins to an unborn fetus, infection in other plants, cancer, kidney and liver damage, multiple food allergies, lowered resistance to antibiotics, infertility, gluten disorders, birth defects, and much more devastating cons to be listed. Also, GMO's are used to up the quantity and life span of plans (ex; wheat, corn, soybean). This often ruins the environment and gives ourselves less work to grow the plant.

Section 3: If this bill were to pass, the effects of it would be more positive for one's health, knowledge, and financial situation. One will be more in control of their health as well as feeling safer from health injury or allergy. We can prevent further damage to the world, to people's health, animal's health, and prevent a great deal of poverty of less developed countries from commercial farming. We have the right to know what's in our food.

Section 4: If a company were to fail this law, the first offense would be punishable by a fine that will be adjusted according to the equivalent quantity of said "un-labeled products" sold. The second offense will be punishable by another fine similar to the first offense, yet doubled in amount. The third offense will be a temporary shut-down of sold un-labeled product(s).

Section 5: This law will be enforced by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services

Section 6: The bill will go into effect 6 months after passage in which during this time companies who did not label their products fairly will have the arranged time to unstock and re-label their products.


1 An act to establish early Dyslexia identification testing in earlier grades.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: This bill is to require earlier testing and identification of dyslexia in early childhood
6 education.
7
8 Section 2: Currently students are not tested until 3rd or 4th grade, which in many cases is too late to
9 retrain the brain in the proper manner to order letters and words to be able to read. When this bill is
10 passed students will be tested in the 1st or 2nd grade, as well as, be monitored more closely for
11 improvement and areas that will need growth.
12
13 Section 3: Students are currently tested at the 3rd or 4th grades levels for dyslexia, and by this time
14 many students has been labeled as special education students by their teachers and administrators,
15 and as slow or not as intelligent by their peers. When this bill is passed students will be tested in the
16 1st or 2nd grade, as well as, be monitored more closely for improvement and areas that will need
17 growth.
18
19 Section 4: Students currently have to suffer and languish with materials that they can not read and
20 that they can not understand until at least the 3rd or 4th grade. Students and parents of students
21 that suffer from dyslexia also, have to deal with the social ramifications of not being successful in the
22 classroom due to dyslexia. Students that suffer from dyslexia also, tend to be labeled at early ages as
23 "problem" students because the students tend to act out in and out of class because they do not
24 understand what they are reading. The state should offer testing and identification earlier ages and
25 programs that can allow student to flourish in their education and become successful students in and
26 out of the classroom.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: Electronic cigarettes or "vaping" has become a new trend among many smokers and
6 nonsmokers. It is claimed to be an alternative to smoking regular cigarettes.

7

8 Section 2: The purpose of this bill is to prohibit the use of electronic cigarettes on state owned
9 property. Currently, electronic cigarettes are illegal to be used in state buildings but not all properties.
10 This bill wishes to expand the law to all state properties i.e. Kentucky Horse Park, Kentucky
11 Fairgrounds, and outside areas of all state colleges and universities.

12

13 Section 3: Many people believe "vaping" has no serious effect on their health. Harvard University
14 conducted a study on the effects vaping has on your body. The chemical flavorings in these electronic
15 cigarettes destroy lung airways, which leads to scar-tissue build up, blocking airflow. This can result in
16 permanent and sometimes fatal lung condition called bronchiolitis obliterans better known as popcorn
17 lung.

18

19 Section 4: This bill will take effect January 1st, 2017.

20

21 Section 5: The penalties for use of electronic cigarettes ("vaping") on state properties will be equal to
22 penalties currently given for smoking electronic cigarettes ("vaping") inside state buildings.

15 years is to lower it to 12.2 percent. If this goal is not met, then more money from welfare will be spent

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

6 Section 1: Whereas 25 states and Washington, D.C. have passed laws legalizing or decriminalizing
7 medical marijuana, the time has come for the Commonwealth of Kentucky to explore an option that has
8 the potential to help thousands of Kentuckians.
9

10 Section 2: Medical marijuana, or medical cannabis, for first use of marijuana to treat diseases, improve
11 medical symptoms, or provide therapy. However, federal law does not permit the use or possession of
12 marijuana for any purpose, including medical use, outside of research programs approved by the
13 Federal Drug Administration (FDA).
14

15 Section 3: Expanding legalization of medical marijuana will be beneficial in treating illnesses that
16 include Alzheimer's, cancer, glaucoma, HIV/AIDS, cachexia or wasting syndrome, seizure disorders,
17 epilepsy, spasticity, severe muscle spasms, Crohn's disease, and multiple sclerosis. Any treatment
18 would be recommended and or prescribed by licensed physician.
19

20 Section 4: If approved by this Assembly, the Secretary of State would determine the earliest time of
21 putting said initiative before Kentucky voters into referendum.
22

23 Section 5: A "yes" vote will support legalizing medical marijuana for individuals with specific debilitating
24 diseases or comparable debilitating condition as determined by unlicensed state position.
25

26 Section 5: Upon approval of this referendum, the Kentucky Department of Health and Family Services
27 will administer oversight of medical marijuana with in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

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1 An act to implement a computerized Kentucky Animal Abuse Registry of convicted animal abusers.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: The Kentucky State Police will be required to maintain a website to track and identify
6 persons that have plead guilty, plead nolo contendere, or been found guilty by a court of law of animal
7 abuse. The definition of animal abuse, in accordance to Kentucky Statutes, includes: 525.125 Cruelty
8 to animals in the first degree, 525.130 Cruelty to animals in the second degree - Exemptions, and
9 525.135 Torture of dog or cat. The definition of animal per Kentucky Statute 446.010 defines an
10 animal as "Every warm-blooded living creature except a human being."

11
12 Section 2: For a convicted animal abuser to have their name expunged from the registry, he or she
13 must comply with the following as it pertains to each registry occurrence: a) register with the Kentucky
14 State Police within 30 days of conviction, and b) prohibited from owning animals, working with animals,
15 or having any animals on or in their residence or property while on the registry.

- 16
17 • 1st Offense
- 18 ○ Offender will remain on the Kentucky Animal Abuse Registry for 2 years per conviction.
 - 19 ○ Offender will be fined \$50 per year while on registry.
- 20 • 2nd Offense
- 21 ○ Offender will remain on the Kentucky Animal Abuse Registry for 5 years per conviction.
 - 22 ○ Offender will be fined \$50 per year while on registry.
- 23 • 3rd and Subsequent Offenses
- 24 ○ Offender will remain on the Kentucky Animal Abuse Registry for 10 years per conviction.
 - 25 ○ Offender will be fined \$100 per year while on registry.

26
27 Any person who is required to register, but fails to do so in the 30 day period, will be fined \$1000.00,
28 issued an arrest warrant, and returned to court. A judge will decide to either allow 30 more days to be
29 compliant or jail the non-compliant convicted animal abuser.

30
31 Section 3: The Kentucky Animal Abuse Registry (KAAR) will be accessible to the public and include the
32 following information (from a state or federal picture ID) on the www.kentuckystatepolice.org website:
33 a) Full Legal Name, b) County and state of residence, c) Date of birth, d) Conviction date, e) Offense, f)
34 Expiration date from registry, and g) Profile picture taken upon registering.

35
36 Section 4: Funding for the registry would be minimal and would be self sufficient from the fines
37 obtained as listed in Section 2 of this bill.

38
39 Section 5: The Kentucky Animal Abuse Registry will go into effect six months after passage.

1 An act to require sex traffickers to be placed on the sex offender registry.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: In an effort to decrease the number of persons sexually trafficked in the Commonwealth, all
6 convicted traffickers will be required to register with the state sex offender registry. This action would
7 help track and flag convicted felons of sex trafficking.

8
9 Section 2: KRS 529.010 defines "human trafficking" as "criminal activity whereby one (1) or more
10 persons are subject to or engaging in:

- 11
12 a) Forced labor, services; or
13 b) Commercial sex activity through the use of force fraud or coercion, (FFC) except that if the
14 trafficked person is under the age of eighteen (18), the commercial sexual activity need not to
15 involve FFC.

16
17 A person is guilty of human trafficking when the person intentionally subjects one (1) or more persons
18 to human trafficking (KRS 529.100).

- 19
20 a) Human trafficking is a class C felony unless it involves serious physical injury, in which it is a
21 class B felony.
22 b) If the victim is under (18) years of age, the penalty for the offense shall be one (1) level higher
23 than the level otherwise stated.

24
25 Section 3: It will be the duty of the convicted to register with the local KSP post as a sex offender upon
26 immediate release from incarceration. They will then have to give their full name, date of birth, gender,
27 race, weight, height, hair color, eye color, primary address, and charges. The convicted will then be
28 subject to all the guidelines laid out in the Sex Offender Registration and Notification Act (SORNA). If
29 failure to comply, they will face the repercussions laid out in Section 2250 of Title 18, US Code.

30
31 Section 4: Funding allocations are reflected in the KSP state budget for maintenance and
32 administration of the sex offender registry.

33
34 Section 5: This bill shall go into effect on January 1st, 2017.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Every Year, Americans pay their tax bills, but is often baffled about how the government
6 spends taxes it collects. Tax payers are told certain things to such as what their money is being put
7 forth. This bill is a clarification for the citizens of where their money happens to be going. Tax receipts
8 allow citizens the right to know where their money was spent and on what.

9
10 Section 2: The tax table below shows in detail the Kentucky state income tax rates by income tax
11 bracket(s). There are six income brackets for Kentucky.

- 12
13 • If your income range is between \$0 and \$3000, your tax rate on every dollar of income earned
14 is 2%.
- 15 • If your income range is between \$3001 and \$4000, your tax rate on every dollar of income
16 earned is 3%.
- 17 • If your income range is between \$4001 and \$5000, your tax rate on every dollar of income
18 earned is 4%.
- 19 • If your income range is between \$5001 and \$8000, your tax rate on every dollar of income
20 earned is 5%.
- 21 • If your income range is between \$8001 and \$75,000, your tax rate on every dollar of income
22 earned is 5.8%.
- 23 • If your income range is between \$75,000 and above, your tax rate on every dollar of income
24 earned is 6%.

25
26 The average U.S. worker faces a tax burden of 31.3%. This includes both income taxes and payrolls
27 taxes. Between these two types of taxes, the average U.S. workers pay over \$16,000 in taxes on labor.

28
29 Section 3: The Tax receipts will be handled by the treasurer, the treasurer is a senior financial manager
30 charged with managing cash- Kentucky State treasurer is currently Allison Ball. Every citizen has the
31 opportunity to get a tax receipt by mail or via-email. The Kentucky state income tax and federal income
32 tax filing deadline falls on April 15th of every year unless it isn't a mail service day. The tax receipts
33 will be sent out along with the tax returns letting you know where your money was spent and on what.
34 This allows for more job openings in the state of Kentucky.

35
36 Section 4: The cost of this bill won't be much if a person chooses the paper receipt then the cost per
37 paper is \$.25.

38
39 Section 5: This bill will go into effect on the start of the new year January 1, 2018. From this point the
40 percentage you get taken out of your pay will follow with a tax receipt of how your money was used.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: Energy providers, by means of their own data collecting, will provide the energy consumption
6 levels of their customers to the Energy and Environment Cabinet.

7

8 Section 2: The Energy and Environment Cabinet will collect and analyse energy consumption levels by
9 individual households. Based on the energy efficient quotas for that fiscal year, as set by the Energy
10 and Environment Cabinet, households and subsequent taxpayers will qualify for tax credits to be filed
11 on the following tax return.

12

13 Section 3: The Energy and Environment Cabinet will use the analysed energy data to determine which
14 household is energy efficient. The households that meet energy efficient requirements will qualify and
15 receive tax credits to their next tax filing. Information regarding qualified individual households will
16 have tax credit information transferred to tax collecting agencies under the Department of Revenue.

17

18 Section 4: Households that are deemed energy efficient shall receive written notice of tax credit
19 qualifications from Department of Revenue immediately.

5 Section 1: We move to revise section 1B of KRS 510.060 in order to raise the age of consent in
6 Kentucky to 18 years of age. The revised law will read "Third-degree rape is someone 21 or older
7 engaging in sexual intercourse with someone under the age of 18."
8

9 Section 2: The age of consent is the age at which a person can legally consent to having sexual
10 intercourse. Section 1B of the Kentucky Revised Statutes 510.060 currently states that "Third-degree
11 rape is someone 21 or older engaging in sexual intercourse with someone under 16."
12

13 Section 3: There will be a close-in-age exception as follows:
14 Minors, ages 16 or older, can legally consent to engage in sexual intercourse with persons between the
15 ages of 16 and 20.
16

17 Section 4: By raising the age of consent to 18, those legally considered children will be protected from
18 harm by predatory adults.
19

20 Section 5: The current penalty for third-degree rape is one to five years in prison. Under the revised
21 law, the penalty will remain the same.
22

23 Section 6: The revised law will go into effect one year after passage.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: Dog and cat overpopulation in the state of Kentucky is a growing problem. Overpopulation
6 leads to more stray animals being abandoned, neglected, or euthanized. Requiring major pet store
7 chains to spay or neuter a certain percentage of their animals prior to selling them would lower the
8 number of animals that are out on the streets.
9
10 Section 2: Spaying or Neutering 65% of all the dogs and cats the stores carry will be required of all
11 major pet store chains in the state of Kentucky. This percentage is slightly over half, so it will lessen
12 the amount of strays that end up on the street, while also leaving enough animals to reproduce for the
13 store and also allow the freedom for pet owners to choose whether or not they want a spayed or
14 neutered animal. Which dogs or cats are included in that 65% is up to the individual store's discretion.
15
16 Section 3: This bill would be paid for by the pet stores as an additional regulation they must follow.
17
18 Section 4: Failure to comply will first result in a warning. Second offense would result in a fine of \$500
19 (per animal), and \$1000 for the third offense (per animal).
20
21 Section 5: This bill would be enacted on January 1st, 2018.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: Also known as the Right to Try, this bill will authorize access to and use of experimental
6 treatments for patients with a terminal illness; to establish conditions for use of experimental
7 treatment; to prohibit sanctions of health care providers solely for recommending or providing
8 experimental treatment; to clarify duties of a health insurer with regard to experimental treatment
9 authorized under this act; to prohibit certain actions by state officials, employees, and agents; and to
10 restrict certain causes of action arising from experimental treatment.
11
12 Section 2: These experimental drugs, biological products, and/or devices must (at least) complete phase
13 one of the Food & Drug Administration’s (FDA) clinical trial, that is a test for toxicity.
14
15 Section 3: The bill will be enacted January 1st, 2016.
16
17 Section 4: This act does not expand the coverage required of an insurer. A health plan, third party
18 administrator, or governmental agency may, but is not required to, provide coverage for the cost of an
19 investigational drug, biological product, or device, or the cost of services related to the use of an
20 investigational drug, biological product, or device under this act.
21
22 Section 5: This act does not require any governmental agency to pay costs associated with the use,
23 care, or treatment of a patient with an investigational drug, biological product, or device. This act does
24 not require a licensed hospital or facility to provide new or additional services, unless approved by the
25 hospital or facility.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: This bill will legalize prostitution in government regulated brothels in Kentucky.
6
7 Section 2: Due to the scarily inflated rates of abuse, mental and physical health issues, and murders
8 associated with prostitution, this bill seeks to combat the violence against sex workers in order to
9 protects our commonwealth's citizen. Through the legalization and regulation of contracts between
10 workers and consumers, the government can protect workers that wish to provide services.
11
12 Section 3: To combat the spread of disease, mandatory STI checkups will be taken bi monthly and paid
13 for by the brothel. To protect from abusive customers, contact information and a contract will be
14 signed before the service is provided. Any worker that feels they have been abused can go straight to
15 the police and file a report.
16
17 Section 4: A portion of all transaction taken place within the brothel would be deposited to the state
18 government. The state would make money off income tax of sex workers. There is no cost to this bill,
19 but a chance for Kentucky to increase revenue.
20
21 Section 5: Workers providing services outside of the brothel would still be subject to previous laws
22 regarding prostitution, pimping or pandering.
23
24 Section 6: Individual counties will have the power to vote if they think brothels are right for their
25 county.
26
27 Section 7: This bill will go into effect March 10th 2017.

1 An act to Make Family and Consumer Sciences a Required Course to Graduate High School
2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: This bill will make Life Skills a graduation requirement for all Kentucky high schools. The
6 curriculum will be standardized to include obtaining skills in financial management (buying a house and
7 car and paying taxes and bills), establishing healthy relationships, acquiring a job, and learning basic
8 home economics skills.
9
10 Section 2: Similarly to health class now, Life Skills can be taken online or for a semester in school in
11 order to get the credit. Family and Consumer Sciences sponsors an organization for students called
12 Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America. Students will not be required to go to the
13 conference or be a part of the organization.
14
15 Section 3: There are already Life Skills classes in place at many Kentucky high schools, but the
16 curriculum will need to be standardized and replicated online. There also will be a need for a few more
17 teachers at some schools. The average school without a Life Skills instructor already in place would only
18 need 1-2 teachers.
19
20 Section 4: To pay for this bill, taxes would have to increase slightly in some counties to pay for extra
21 teachers. Students opting to take the online course would have to pay a fee (about \$80). Fee waiver
22 would cover this for students who are unable to pay.
23
24 Section 5: This bill would go into effect at the beginning of the 2017-18 school year.

8 Section 2: All state employees that have a pension are by law entitled to it therefore it has to be paid
9 forward no matter how the state pays it out, the ways they pay this forward could be through cutting
10 majors state funded organizations.
11
12 Section 3: Only 17% of state workers are covered under this state fund to this day, and this statistic is
13 decreasing daily. The other 83% are pulling money from other funds.
14
15 Section 4: If the pension fund cannot pay out the money needed, the state will have to cut funding to
16 other state funded systems in order to pay out the capital to these former employees.
17
18 Section 5: At this point in time there is no system in place to fix this issue.
19
20 Section 6: This bill will go into effect May of 2017.

2 proceeds to fund teacher pensions
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5

6 Section 1: Currently, 62.7% of Kentucky lottery proceeds go to lottery participants, 26.6% go to the
7 Commonwealth of Kentucky, 4.4% go to operating costs, and 6.3% go to pay retailers. In Fiscal Year
8 2015, \$899.1 million was raised from the lottery.
9

10 Section 2: The proceeds going to the participants will be reduced to 54% of lottery sales, the operating
11 costs to 3.9%, and the retailer payments to 5.9%. This would increase the amount of proceeds going to
12 the Commonwealth to 36.2% (based on 2015 data that would mean going from \$239.4 million for
13 Kentucky to \$325.8 million for Kentucky).
14

15 Section 3: 65% of the money going to the Commonwealth of Kentucky will go to fund education; the
16 other 35% will go to fund the public teacher pension deficit.
17

18 Section 4: For those who have been a Kentucky public teacher for more than 10 years, retirement will
19 be extended from 27 years to 30 years of service. For those who have been a teacher for less than ten
20 years, retirement will be extended to 31 years of service. For those who become a teacher after the
21 passage of this bill, retirement will be extended to 32 years of service.
22

23 Section 5: The formula used to calculate a teacher's current retirement is as follows: teacher's final
24 average salary multiplied by total years of service multiplied by 2.5%. Change the percent in the
25 formula to 2.2%.
26

27 Section 6: These two reforms will result in an annual savings of \$160.53 million to Kentucky's teacher
28 pension system.
29

30 Section 7: This bill will go into effect two years after its signing into law.

1 An act to cap tuition rates at public colleges and universities in the Commonwealth of Kentucky
2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: For the 2016-2017 school year, Kentucky's public colleges and universities are limited to a
6 4.6%-6.1% tuition increase for in-state undergraduate students. However, each year state officials re-
7 determine the percentage that public colleges and universities can increase tuition.
8
9 Section 2: This bill will allow public colleges and universities to continue to increase tuition each year,
10 but the tuition rate for undergraduate students entering their first year will not increase over the span
11 of 4 years. This means that colleges may increase their tuition as applied to first year undergraduates
12 and any student who has not completed an undergraduate degree within 4 years.
13
14 Section 3: Those students who enter their first year at any public university or college in the
15 Commonwealth of Kentucky will be subject to the tuition rate set by that university or college. The
16 college or university may only charge that student the same or a lesser tuition rate for the following
17 four years. This applies to in-state undergraduate students only. Out of state undergraduate students
18 are subject to the tuition increase each and every year.
19
20 Section 4: To receive the "locked in" rate, the undergraduate must complete his or her degree within 4
21 years, and must do so consecutively. If the student chooses not to attend the college or university for
22 a semester or year, he or she will be subject to the tuition increase. If a student earns his or her
23 degree during the 5th year of study, the 5th year will be subject to the tuition increase.
24
25 Section 5: This bill will go into effect for the 2017-2018 school year.

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1 An act to require a 1/2 credit sexual education course be added to the minimal high school graduation
2 requirements

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5

6 Section 1: Currently, the minimum high school graduation requirement for health in the Commonwealth
7 of Kentucky is a 1/2 credit which is to include the content contained in the Kentucky Academic
8 Standards for health. Within the Kentucky Academic Standards for health, students are expected to
9 understand that decisions regarding sexuality have short and long term consequences and
10 responsibilities and how decision-making relates to responsible sexual behavior.
11

12 Section 2: This bill would require that in addition to the minimal sexual education received in health all
13 students in the Commonwealth of Kentucky must also take a 1/2 credit sexual education course in
14 order to graduate high school. The curriculum for this course would be determined by the Kentucky
15 Department of Education by and through KRS 156:160, which grants the Kentucky Board of Education
16 power to promulgate administrative regulations for the minimal requirements of high school
17 graduation, and would be added to the Kentucky Academic Standards.
18

19 Section 3: This bill would apply only to students entering the 9th grade and so on after its passage.
20 Those students who are currently enrolled in high school must only adhere to the current minimal high
21 school graduation requirements.
22

23 Section 4: This bill would go into effect for the 2017-2018 school year.

6 Section 1: Kentucky Administration Regulation 908 KAR 1:340 created in relation to KRS 218A.180
7 describes the rules and regulations of narcotic treatment programs. Under the current law, there are
8 no restrictions on where these facilities must be located.
9

10 Section 2: A narcotic treatment program is defined as a substance abuse program using approved
11 controlled substances and offering a range of treatment procedures and services for the rehabilitation
12 of persons dependent on opium, morphine, heroin or any derivative or synthetic drug of that group.
13

14 Section 3: This bill will ensure that these narcotic treatment programs are no longer within a 1,000
15 feet radius of schools, playgrounds, and other places where children gather.
16

17 Section 4: This bill will go into effect January 1, 2017.

15 the 30th percentile of the mandated state testing appropriate for their age.

17 Section 4: Home-schooled students who elect to participate in extracurricular activities must do so at
18 the school they would normally attend.
19

20 Section 5: The financial impact should be minimal and any increased cost would be paid for by the
21 school.

23 Section 6: This bill will go into effect beginning in the 2017-2018 school year.

1 An act to increase regulations on opioid prescriptions by physicians in Kentucky.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: The current law states that doctors must examine patients, take full medical information,
6 screen for drug use, and check electronic records before writing prescriptions for opioids. These are
7 effective ways to decrease the amount of people abusing opioids on the medical front. But, people are
8 still getting their hands on these harmful medications. Through regulating how opioids are disbursed
9 more efficiently, this bill will try to combat this issue which place not only Kentucky, but the nation.

10
11 Section 2: Upon passage of this bill, funding will be directed toward the creation of heroin
12 rehabilitation centers around Kentucky. Some will also go to funding staff educating the public about
13 the dangers of opioid abuse. These programs will be enacted in high schools, prisons, and community
14 centers. Doctors involved in prescribing such opioids will result in loss other medical licenses.

15
16 Section 3: Over 1,000 Kentuckians die each year from prescription drug overdoses and 20% of
17 teenagers have admitted to using prescription pills non-medically. In accordance with these numbers,
18 Kentucky is ranked the third highest in the nation for age-adjusted drug poisoning death rates, at 23.6
19 per 100,000 people. However, little is being done to handle this prescription abuse in Kentucky. This
20 bill will prevent people who are convicted of selling heroin and fentanyl from receiving parole. Fentanyl
21 will be made a Schedule I drug because of its high potential and cause for abuse. It is 50–100 times
22 more deadly than heroin. Drug education programs will also be expanded to include fentanyl and the
23 danger it can cause.

24
25 Section 4: This bill will create five to rehabilitation centers in the big cities of Kentucky including
26 Louisville, Lexington, and Bowling Green as well as counties around the state such as Pike County and
27 Marshall County. The incarceration fees for a single person over a span of 10 years amounts to almost
28 \$182,500. Thus, the centers will be able to reduce such costs in the long run.

29
30 Section 5: The funding will be provided by the money allocated to the Health and Family Services
31 Cabinet of the fiscal budget of 2016 – 2017. The potential funds have been currently set to
32 \$10,603,884,700.

33
34 Section 6: Upon passage, this bill will take effect on the next fiscal year starting October 1st of 2017.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: This would exempt feminine hygiene products such as sanitary napkins, tampons, menstrual
6 sponges, and cups from the sales tax.

7
8 Section 2: This bill reflects the government's responsibility to provide for the common welfare of the
9 citizens through health concerns. The menstrual cycle, when not properly attended, creates a health
10 concern for the woman. Diseases and other maladies, can come from lack of or overuse of these
11 products. Woman without affordable access are susceptible to Toxic Shock Syndrome, UTIs, and
12 bacterial infections as result of these desperate acts.

13
14 Section 3: In order to maintain a balanced state budget an additional 2% tax will be levied against
15 tobacco. There would be negligible economic repercussions, because of the revenue neutral nature of
16 the simultaneous tax reduction and increase of similar proportions.

17
18 Section 4: This bill will go into effect a year after being passed.

5 Section 1: This bill aims to provide requirements for the quality of foster families/ foster homes as to
6 increase the quality of care and life for foster children across Kentucky.

7

8 Section 2: Inspections of foster homes will continue to be performed by licensed social workers already
9 employed at the foster care agencies. The frequency of these inspections will increase to one
10 inspection randomly placed within 3-4 months of the previous one. The consequences of failing an
11 inspection will follow previously established procedures:

12

- 13 • Loss of fostering license
- 14 • Cannot work with children
- 15 • Possible criminal charges

16

17 Section 3: Foster families and people living in homes with foster children must not be allowed to smoke
18 nicotine products (e-cigarettes, cigarettes, pipes, cigars, etc.) in the presence of foster children, in
19 foster homes, or in vehicles used to transport foster children. If firearms are present in the home, they
20 must be locked away from accessibility by foster children in cabinets, gun safes, or other containers.
21 Ammunition must be kept separate from firearms. Foster parent (s) must participate in annual first aid
22 training, provided by the foster care agency, which is to include, but is not limited to the teaching of
23 CPR and fire prevention and safety. In addition, the foster home must be equipped with a portable,
24 working fire extinguisher.

25

26 Section 4: The allocation of funds required for the passage of this bill will be obtained from already
27 existing grants by the Children's Bureau. This bill will be enacted the year after the bill is passed and
28 will apply to all foster homes and future foster homes in the state of Kentucky.

- 8 Section 2: This will not be a replacement punishment to avoid prison. If a judge decides that prison will
- 9 not be an extensive enough punishment, castration will be an additional option.
- 10
- 11 Section 3: If an offender is no longer incarcerated but still subject to chemical castration, the offender
- 12 will need to meet with a physician to receive the chemical castration treatment. If the offender does
- 13 attend the allotted appointments, or commits another sex crime, they will face further penalties.
- 14
- 15 Section 4: Funding will be budgeted through the Department of Corrections.
- 16
- 17 Section 5: This bill will become a law six months after it is passed.

1 An act to call for the prohibition of U-47700

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: U-47700 also known as PINK is a part of the synthetic opiod family that includes
6 carfentanil, ifentanyl, and furanyl fentanyl. This opioid is eight times stronger than heroin and provides
7 a short "high" without leaving the user with a hangover aftereffect. It is currently legal to possess and
8 sell this drug in Kentucky, whereas Wyoming, Georgia, Florida, and Utah have banned it. This drug is
9 implicated in the deaths of over eighty people since January, and if it follows the trend of other
10 synthetic opioids it will increase by eighty-fold. People of all ages, even including elementary children,
11 have access to this drug as it is being imported from countries including China for as little as \$5 per
12 gram.

13
14 Section 2: This bill aims to illegalize PINK for production consumption, and distribution. PINK is a
15 newborn drug taking the nation by storm; therefore it is necessary to prohibit this drug before it gains
16 a strong foothold within our communities and becomes increasingly difficult to impede. To obtain
17 funding for this act, we would seek donations from civic organizations such as MADD as well as from
18 the community, propose a vice tax (cigarettes, alcohol, and tobacco), a 1% tax on internet usage.

19
20 Section 3: Persons found producing, distributing, or consuming will undergo repercussions. First time
21 offenders will receive a \$1,000 fine. Second time offenders will receive another \$2,000 fine and 6
22 months in jail with no access to probation. Foe additional offenses, the severity of the charge will be
23 based upon the proportion of substance and the number of offenses.

24
25 Section 4: From the revenues gained through the taxes and donations, we would form support groups
26 for those addicted to PINK, similar to Alcoholics Anonymous. This act will help strengthen the
27 community and protect our state's values.

28
29 Section 5: This bill will be enacted 6 months of passage.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4
5 Section 1: Members elected to the House of Representatives may not serve more than six consecutive
6 two-year terms of office.
7
8 Section 2: Members elected to the Senate may not serve more than three consecutive four-year terms
9 of office.
10
11 Section 3: This act would be pursuant to Section 30 of the Kentucky Constitution, amending it to be
12 applicable to all newly elected members only. After members have left office for a minimum two-year
13 period, they would be eligible to run again.
14
15 Section 4: The affect of this bill would be to prevent legislators from amassing too much power to
16 control their respective House or Senate, allow different citizens of the Commonwealth an opportunity
17 to serve and bring new ideas forward, and deter complacency in our legislative bodies. This would also
18 promote an effective legislature that would accomplish more goals, while decrease gridlock.
19
20 Section 5: No additional funding is required for passage of this bill, as no costs are associated with it.
21
22 Section 6: This bill will be enacted following the adjournment of the session at which it is passed and
23 subsequent signature of the Governor.

1 An act to reduce the rate of serial sexual offenders in Kentucky.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to reduce the amount of repeat offenders in the state of Kentucky.
6 Currently, about 12 to 24% of sex offenders will reoffend. This number is just an estimate, seeing as
7 63-94% of rapes go unreported.

8
9 Section 2: Kentucky will require that those convicted of a sex crime undergo some form of therapeutic
10 treatment, based on a counselor’s discretion, for their first, and each subsequent, sex related
11 conviction.

12
13 Section 3: The amount of treatment in prison will depend on their class as a sex offender. After prison
14 each offend will have to continue treatment depending on their classification on the sex offender
15 registry

- 16
17 a. Tier one sex offender: This would include public indecency, voyeurism, child pornography, and
18 groping. An initial evaluation will be required and further counseling will be up to the
19 counselor’s discretion.
20
21 b. Tier two sex offender: This includes trafficking of minors, bribery to elicit of sexual activity,
22 any sexual activity between someone who is 12-15 years old, and prostitution of minors. An
23 initial evaluation will be required and further counseling will be up to the counselor’s discretion.
24
25 c. Tier three sex offender: This includes most sexual assaults, any assault were the victims is
26 impaired, any attack where a victim is not consenting, and any sexual contact with a person
27 under the age of 12. Mandatory counseling while in jail. If let out early for good behavior,
28 counseling can be required as provision of their parole if they are expected to reoffended.
29 After the second offense tier three sex offense, therapeutic drug treatments may be
30 recommended.

31
32 Section 4: Not going to sentenced treatment while in prison can result in the loss of one’s accumulated
33 good behavior time. If a sex offender is ordered to continue treatment on probation, failure to go to
34 treatment can be considered a violation of one’s parole agreement.

35
36 Section 5: The Kentucky Department of Justice and Public Safety will oversee this program. Funding for
37 initial evaluations and additional counseling is already allocated annually, seeing as counseling services
38 are already a part of Kentucky prisons. Additional funding for parole therapy will cost \$500,000.

39
40 Section 6: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2017.

1 An act to allow current and future teachers multiple options for their retirement investments
2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
4

5 Section 1: Under Kentucky’s current teacher retirement policy (Teacher’s Retirement System or TRS), all
6 public school educators who are employed within the state are required by state law to put their
7 retirement investments into a state mandated pension fund that forfeits their social security benefits.
8

9 Section 2: Presently under these terms, this pension fund is used to fund other general projects in the
10 state’s budget. Because of this, the money that teachers put into this pension is being spent without
11 their consent. If the prevailing spending trend and retiree payout levels continue, the money in the
12 pension is projected to run out by 2025, causing teachers not to get the full benefits of their
13 investments.
14

15 Section 3: This bill would provide teachers with four more sustainable retirement investment
16 opportunities. A 403b, Roth IRA, giving their money to a financial adviser to manage in a mutual fund,
17 or continuing their investment into the pension. This will give teachers the option and freedom to
18 invest their money how they choose and how they feel will better prepare them for retirement.
19

20 Section 4: Teachers who have been hired within the last 10 years will have a buyout clause that will
21 give them the ability to withdraw all money that is currently in the TRS pension with a designated 10
22 percent withdrawal fee, which will go directly to fund existing pension members, based off the amount
23 of money currently in the fund. Teachers must show proof of a setup replacement retirement option in
24 order to activate this buyout clause. Teachers who have been teaching longer than 10 years will not be
25 given this option and will continue to contribute to the existing pension.
26

27 Section 5: This bill goes into effect January 1st, 2018.

1 An act to create a new state alternate portfolio assessment for students with moderate to severe
2 disabilities
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5

6 Section 1: The Kentucky Alternate assessment test was created in 1990 for the NCLB (No Child Left
7 Behind) and the (IDEIA) Individuals with Development Education Improvement Act. This test is taken by
8 students with moderate to severe mental and physical disabilities during two testing windows, once in
9 Fall and again in Spring.

10
11 Section 2: Students who cannot comprehend, speak, read, or who can not even use the restroom
12 without assistance are given this multiple choice test and are expected show the content that they
13 have learned throughout the year. There are two forms this assessment, Form A and Form B. The two
14 forms are based off the students' abilities; more capable and advanced students will take Form A, while
15 less capable and advanced students will take form B. While this sounds fair, it is by no means fair at all.
16 The only difference between the two forms is one multiple choice option is removed making each
17 question from Form A has four options and Form B uses 3 options for each question. Testing is
18 stressful for the students and teachers who feel helpless and can bring on many bad experiences for
19 students such as seizure or anxiety attacks.

20
21 Section 3: This bill would create a state portfolio assessment to send the state each student's
22 portfolios twice a year, in December and in May. This will adequately gage what the students learn and
23 how they have grown over each year. The state will require a scoring rubric to track student growth on
24 existing assessment standards identified at the beginning month of each school year. Student who
25 demonstrate measurable progress toward their targeted standards goals in each portfolio piece will
26 have achieved proficiency under this new assessment system.

27
28 Section 4: The student's case worker and teacher will be in charge of putting together these portfolios
29 for the student. These portfolios will contain pieces that demonstrate their growth in reading, science,
30 math, and social studies skills alternating content areas twice a year. Writing would be assessed
31 through the portfolio twice a year.

32
33 Section 5: This bill will go into effect at the start of the 2017-2018 school year.

1 An act to require any candidate running for the position of coroner to have a bachelor’s degree in a
2 medical or related field
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5

6 Section 1: A coroner is a person whose standard role is to confirm and certify the death of an
7 individual within a jurisdiction. A coroner may also conduct or order an inquest into the manner or
8 cause of death, and investigate or confirm the identity of an unknown person who has been found dead
9 within the coroner’s jurisdiction. This is currently an elected position at the county level in the State of
10 Kentucky.
11

12 Section 2: Currently, the only requirements to run for this position are to be twenty-four years old and
13 must be a citizen of the district or county in which they will be running. They are also subject to a
14 mandatory eighteen hour training course once elected.
15

16 Section 3: Coroners will now be required to have at least a bachelor’s degree in a field such as
17 criminology, anatomy, forensic science, experimental pathology, pathology, physiology, or any other
18 related degree. If the candidate does not meet these requirements, then they will not be listed on the
19 ballot.
20

21 Section 4: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2017.

1 An act to revitalize the Eastern Kentucky Coalfield energy sector

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: 11,000 coal jobs in the Eastern Kentucky Coalfield Region have been lost since 2009. Coal
6 production has fallen 20%, and recently reached a 30 year low. Under this bill, the state government
7 will incentivize the installation and maintenance of wind power plants to help economic conditions in
8 the eastern area of the state. Currently, there are no wind power plants in Kentucky.

9
10 Section 2: This bill would give incentives to private wind energy companies that hire local displaced coal
11 workers to construct and maintain wind turbines. These turbines would be built on the numerous
12 abandoned mountaintop removal sites, and could also be placed in valleys to take advantage of wind
13 coming down the mountains.

14
15 Section 3: This bill provides funding by restructuring property taxes into a marginal system. This is
16 NOT a straight "tax increase." The effective rate will only be slightly raised on more expensive estates,
17 most properties will see a negligible increase. The brackets will be as follows:

18
19 Property Value (\$) Tax Rate (%)

20 0-100,000	0.5
21 100,001-200,000	0.9
22 200,001-300,000	1.4
23 300,001+	2.0

24
25 Given that the system is marginal, on a given \$250,000 estate, \$100,000 of it will be taxed at 0.5,
26 \$100,000 will be taxed at 0.9 percent, and the final \$50,000 will be taxed at 1.4 percent. The tax will
27 be based on the most recently appraised value, and owners may request a reappraisal once a year.

28
29 Section 4: If passed, this bill will go into effect the tax season after it is enacted. This is when the
30 marginal property taxes will go into effect. After this revenue is sufficiently generated, incentives will
31 be created to bring in private companies to develop wind farms. The 30 counties of the Coalfield
32 Region will be divided to into tri-county "Energy Districts," each with a central wind plant housing 15
33 turbines. This leads to a cost of roughly 50 million per plant when installation and infrastructure costs
34 are integrated, which will be subsidized through this program.

2 disappearance.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5
6 Section 1: This bill will require that all parents and legal guardians, including heads of adoption
7 agencies, of minors in the Commonwealth of Kentucky report said minor missing to law enforcement
8 within 24 hours.
9

10 Section 2: If the guardian fails to do so, local police will conduct an investigation as to whether
11 negligence is present in the case.
12

13 Section 3: If law enforcement deems that negligence is not present, no charges will be pressed against
14 the guardian, or appear on the guardian's legal record.
15

16 Section 4: If enforcement believes there negligence may be present, the case will be taken to a court of
17 law for a jury trial.
18

19 Section 5: If found guilty, the guardian may face up to two years in state prison, dependent on severity
20 of negligence. If the guilty party works for an adoption agency, their license to work will be suspended
21 for a year after their release.
22

23 Section 6: This bill will go into effect 3 months after its passage.

15 Section 4: A legal guardian will be appointed to make decisions for the child whether it be the father, a
16 grandparent, etc. The legal guardian must pass a drug test before they are granted guardianship.
17
18 Section 5: If there is not a person willing or able to be the legal guardian, the baby will placed in the
19 foster care system.
20
21 Section 6: This bill will be overseen by the Child Protective Services (CPS) and enforced by law
22 enforcement services.
23
24 Section 7: This bill requires no funding.
25
26 Section 8: This bill will go into effect immediately after passage.

7 student’s first semester of college, and must be attended the full duration of the class.

9 Section 2: The class will be taught by the college’s version of a Student Health and Counseling Center.
10 The teacher must have a Counseling degree in order to administer the program. If this facility does not
11 exist at a school, the college’s administration will be held responsible for assuring the program is
12 delivered by a counselor

13

14 Section 3: Each college will be responsible for funding this program through their own allotted budgets.
15 The only cost to the school for providing this program will be paying the instructor and paying for the
16 facility if needed. There will be no additional cost to the student for attending this class

17

18 Section 4: This class will be a required credit that must be completed during a student’s first semester.
19 If this class is not completed, the student will have to pay a \$500 fine every semester they do not
20 complete the credit

21

22 Section 5: This bill will go into effect the school year after its passage.

10 Section 2: Career readiness would be determined by achievement of Kentucky state regulations.
11 Students would be eligible to take an assessment upon the completion of six trimesters or four
12 semesters of music education courses. This assessment would cover music curriculum mandated by
13 the state of Kentucky. Excellence on this assessment would be defined by a score of 70% or higher.
14

15 Section 3: These assessments will be funded through federal Carl D. Perkins funds and will be
16 administered by the Kentucky Department of Education Office of Career and Technical Education.
17

18 Section 4: This bill will go into effect the summer of 2017 and the first assessment will be given in May
19 2020.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: According to KRS 17.170, the current law allowing DNA samples to be collected without a
6 warrant in Kentucky is that the person in question must be convicted before the DNA sample can be
7 taken without a warrant in felony cases. According to KRS 17.175, if the accused person is found
8 innocent, he or she may submit a written request to the Kentucky State Police to expunge all
9 information and DNA samples.

10
11 Section 2: Our bill proposes that collection of the DNA sample be mandated in all felony cases, without
12 requiring a warrant, upon the suspect's arrest - not after conviction. If enacted, this bill would require
13 the person arrested to have a DNA sample taken under proper procedures upon arrival at the jail.

14
15 Section 3: The passing of this bill will provide concrete, unbiased evidence to prove the arrested person
16 either innocent or guilty. The sample would speed up the judicial process as it takes away the need for
17 a warrant. The sample can also be linked back to previous unsolved crimes committed as long as it
18 doesn't violate double jeopardy. The samples will help prevent people being wrongly accused of crimes
19 and deter people from committing crimes.

20
21 Section 4: The funding will be, and has always been, provided by the State Treasury.

22
23 Section 5: This bill will take effect December 1, 2016.

6 \$39,207. Sponsors such as: The Louisville Youth Group, PFLAG Louisville and the LGBT Center of Rofl
7 would be willing to donate/fundraise for the costs.
8

9 Section 2: While some people may be against spending money on this type of project, it would be very
10 beneficial for numerous students because the number of teen in the LGBTQ community and the number
11 of students being bullied for mental health issues is increasing. Safe Places would be available as
12 desensitization for those with mental disabilities and a calming place for those with anger/anger
13 management issues. The Safe Place would include a single stall bathroom that would be labeled as non-
14 gender specific.
15

16 Section 3: Statistics regarding Safe Place:

- 17 • LGBT students (6 1.1%) were more likely than their non-LGBT peers to feel unsafe or
- 18 uncomfortable as a result of their sexual orientation.
- 19 • Nearly all Kentucky LGBT students can identify at least one LGBT supportive staff member, but
- 20 only 41% can identify 6 or more supportive school staff members.
- 21 • LGBTQ students had fewer suicidal thoughts and attempts when schools had gay-straight
- 22 alliances and policies prohibiting expression of homophobia in place for 3 or more years.
23

24 Section 4: This bill will go into effect June 2017 for the 2017-2018 school year.

6 donate all unused food to either animal shelters or charities, based upon the freshness of disposed
7 food. Stores will evaluate this themselves, with the discretion of the organizations they donate to also
8 working as a determining metric.

10 Section 2: For every documented fifty pounds (50 lb) of usable food donated, the store will receive a
11 tax deduction equivalent to HALF the net worth of donated food. Documentation requires reports from
12 both the retailer and the charity, and is overseen by the IRS.

14 Section 3: Stores will have the ability to choose the organization that they wish to donate to, from a
15 list of registered charities and animal shelters determined by the county judge of their jurisdiction.

5 Section 1: This bill will increase the cultural competency of Kentucky's education system. Kentucky's
6 student population is currently 79% Caucasian, while racial and ethnic minorities accounted for 91.7%
7 of the nation's population growth over the past decade. This is just one example of how our country is
8 rapidly diversifying.
9
10 Section 2: In order to educate Kentucky students on cultural competency, this bill will require schools
11 implementing the current high school humanities curriculum to choose between introducing a full
12 semester cultural competency course or integrating cultural competency lessons throughout the entire
13 school year.
14
15 Section 3: Suggested course units would be: Communication Styles and Customs Across Cultures,
16 Stereotypes and Discrimination, Socioeconomic Awareness and Impact. Sub topics and supplemental
17 projects/activities within these courses will be left to the discretion of each humanities teacher.
18 Curriculum guides for these units would be developed by the Kentucky Department of Education Arts &
19 Humanities curriculum specialists.
20
21 Section 4: Since this cultural competency course would only be an addition to an already existing
22 humanities curriculum, which is already a required curriculum in Kentucky, there would be no additional
23 cost to add a cultural competency course.
24
25 Section 5: The Kentucky Department of Education will begin to enforce this bill starting the 2018 –
26 2019 school year.

1 An act to modify university and college policies on the reporting of sexual assault.

2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: The purpose of the proposed bill is to enforce policies in Colleges or Universities to require
6 the reporting of all sexual assault cases to authorities once reported to the scholarly institution.
7 Colleges or Universities involved must take action against the assaulter if officially found guilty.

8

9 Section 2: This act will protect victims and countless others from assault in the future; It also ensures
10 some sort of justice for the victims that reported their assault. If assaulter is proven guilty, the adult in
11 question shall be expelled from the institution. If actions are being taken for these terrible crimes,
12 others may come forward about their experiences and the University or College can get a better grip on
13 preventing and reporting sexual assaults on campus.

14

15 Section 3: Failure to report the assault and/or take action on the assaulter if found guilty, will result in
16 fining of the University or College in question. Fines start at \$10,000 and reach up to \$50,000
17 depending on the severity, specific case, or if the institution is a repeating offender. If a University or
18 College has 10 or more unreported instances of sexual assault on campus, they lose their
19 accreditation.

20

21 Section 4: This will be enacted June 26, 2017.

1 An act to establish a mandatory labeling of all pesticides and herbicides used during cultivation of any
2 food product.
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5

6 Section 1: Many pesticides are widely known to harm those who are exposed to these certain
7 chemicals. As of now, pesticides and herbicides used in cultivation are not specifically labeled on
8 packaging. With the information provided on the labeling, the people purchasing the goods can be more
9 aware of what is used on their food.

10
11 Section 2: Many companies will discontinue the use of certain chemicals, as they now realize that they
12 must display this information. This can lead to a more healthy alternative that will be more beneficial to
13 not only consumers, but the environment, as well. Consumers will also be more aware of what they are
14 ingesting into their bodies.

15
16 Section 3: Although a lot of information is provided on labeling, explicit details of which pesticides that
17 are being used is minimal. By giving consumers more information about what is used on their produce,
18 the consumers will be more informed which will help them judge whether or not they should purchase
19 the goods.

20
21 Section 4: The cost of this bill will be minimal as the label is already on each product. Each pesticide or
22 herbicide label is only an addition to those that already exist. The government itself will not pay for this
23 label, but the food company itself. Moreover, failure to adhere to this law will result in fines.
24 Offenders will be fined for every unit sold. Each unit sold without correct labeling will require it.

2 company in the private sector.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5
6 Section 1: If passed, this law would go into effect on the first of January, 2017.
7

8 Section 2: There shall be no union security agreements between private sector employers and labor
9 unions that require the membership of an employee in order to work there.
10

11 Section 3: No 'union shop' agreements shall be made between unions and employers - that is, union
12 membership cannot be required to be had within 30 days with employment being subject to termination
13 thereafter.
14

15 Section 4: No fee shall be required to work for a union employer (this fee relating to union membership
16 dues). In particular, fees that some companies may have automatically deducted from an employee
17 paycheck/income would not be allowed.
18

19 Section 5: The probability of a job applicant's union membership shall not be taken into consideration
20 or used as a potential ramification in the hiring process, as this would interfere with the Constitutional
21 right the freedom to, or not to, associate.
22

23 Section 6: The passage and implementation of this law will require no funding. Possible violations of
24 this law, however, shall henceforth be subject to the Kentucky Department of Labor and in their
25 discretion/jurisdiction

1 An act to require psychological background checks for all purchasers of firearms in Kentucky.

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: Prior to the purchase of the firearm in the state of Kentucky, citizens must complete a past
6 the mental health screening by licensed physician.

7
8 Section 2: Kentucky citizens purchasing a fire arm must submit documentation of results of the mental
9 health screening to the seller/retailer prior to purchase.

10
11 Section 3: Buyers to purchase a firearm without providing signed documentation of results of the
12 mental health screening from a licensed physician are subject to: a) A \$500 dollars fine for a first
13 offense b) 2 to 5 years in prison for two or more offenses and weapons purchased will be revoked.

14
15 Section 4: Sellers of firearms or negligent in obtaining sign documentation of results of the mental
16 health screening from a licensed physician are subject to: a) \$500 fine for a first offense b) 2 to 5
17 years in prison for two or more offenses and the closing of their business.

18
19 Section 5: Guidelines outlined in Sections 3 and 4 are at the discretion of the courts and jurisdiction of
20 the offender.

21
22 Section 6: Sections #2 and #3 apply to both public and private firearms transactions.

23
24 Section 7: All fines collected will be donated to support charitable organizations to help the victims of
25 gun violence.

26
27 Section 8: Following a first-time conviction, the names of purchasers/sellers will be entered into a
28 statewide database accessible to all law enforcement agencies in Kentucky.

1 An act to institute a "Breaking Chains" program

2
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4
5 Section 1: The system has failed to end the cycle of incarnation, rehabilitation, and repeat. According
6 to this bill, the Commonwealth of Kentucky shall provide an optional rehabilitation course in the final
7 15 months of their sentence.

8
9 Section 2: This program will take only accept 20 Class B and Class C inmates from all medium security
10 prisons, of which would be up for application for every five openings. The inmates will be relocated
11 from their cells to a home that they'll need to build and maintain on the campus of the prison. The
12 system will assist inmates in understanding:

- 13
14 1) Employment Education
15 2) Financial Literacy
16 3) Home Skills
17

18 The sole purpose of the "Breaking Chains" initiative is to fully prepare inmates for the obstacles that
19 will lie ahead of them when they begin their lives rehabilitating.

20
21 Section 3: The Job Education program will assist inmates in proper interview etiquette, resume
22 formatting. As well as using the connections that have already been established with companies such
23 as Aramark Food Services, Goodwill, ACE Hardware, etc. to provide the inmates with jobs within the
24 community. Financial Literacy will consist of the process of paying taxes, child support, budgeting, and
25 setting up a bank accounts. Home skills will assist those with children and how to properly raise them;
26 mechanical and constructional work around the home. Using these home skills, inmates will build their
27 home, live together, and pay for it together.

28
29 Section 4: Each inmate's family will need to pay a base fee of \$750 dollars. Inmates will be responsible
30 for paying taxes and bills that every homeowner would have to pay.

31
32 Section 5: This bill will go into effect starting the next starting point of the fiscal year (October 1,
33 2017)

1 An act to amend 704 KAR to state that all students who are deemed to have a moderate to severe
2 disability (MSD), be awarded with a standard diploma after completion of 4 years of high school.
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**
5

6 Section 1: Standard Diplomas (instead of alternative diplomas) will be issued to students who have
7 moderate to severe disabilities (MSD) as a way to grant equality in our education system. MSD
8 students will have specified notation on their transcript marking that they were alternatively assessed.
9 This will allow students to be included in each high school’s annual graduation rate.
10

11 Section 2: An administrator will create and distribute standard diplomas to each MSD student who
12 completes four or more years of high school when they graduate, instead of an alternate diploma which
13 deems these students as dropouts.
14

15 Section 3: At random super intendants will verify authenticity of standard diplomas for MSD students.
16 Additionally, the Kentucky Department of Education will verify authenticity of standard diplomas for
17 MSD students from the previous year during random audits that they annually conduct.
18

19 Section 4: This bill will not require any additional funding.
20

21 Section 5: School administrators that are not in compliance with this bill will encounter the following
22 consequences:
23

- 24 • First Offense: Administrative Staff will have a corrective action plan documented on their
25 professional record.
- 26 • Second Offense: Administrative Staff will have additional corrective action plan documented on
27 their professional record and receive a \$1,000 fine per transgression.
- 28 • Third Offense: Administrative Staff will have additional corrective action plan documented on
29 their professional record and receive a \$1,000 fine per transgression. Additionally,
30 Administrative Staff will have employment reviewed by county board of education.
31

32 Section 6: This bill will go into effect for the 2017-2018 academic year.

SECOND FLOOR – JUDICIAL BRANCH

- 13 From the top of the steps on the second floor, observe the view of the nave, or **Main corridor**.
This spectacular space is over 300 feet long. It is lined with 36 huge, one piece columns made of Vermont granite. Note the colorful art skylights and grand staircase.
- 14 Also from here you can see the murals in the lunettes on either end of the nave. Painted by Gilbert White, the murals depict moments in the early history of Kentucky.
- 15 The one over the East wing is a representation of Daniel Boone's first view of the Bluegrass region, or "beautiful level of Kentucky," in 1769.
- 16 The mural to the West shows Boone and Richard Henderson concluding the Treaty of Watauga in 1775 which allowed the Transylvania Company to purchase much of the land that is Kentucky from the Cherokee Indians.
- 17 Stepping outside of the State Reception Room, a small **chapel, press offices**, and the **office of the Chief Justice** (not open for tours) are on the West end of this floor.
- 18 Perhaps the most elegant room in the Capitol, the state reception room was intended as a place for special events and as the reception area for the governor's office, originally next door. Inspired by grand salons in European palaces, the room was restored in 1995 to its original grandeur. The placement of the mirrors on either end of the room creates the illusion of an infinite view, like that in the Hall of Mirrors of the Palace of Versailles in France.
- 19 Stepping outside of the State Reception Room, a small **chapel, press offices**, and the **office of the Chief Justice** (not open for tours) are on the West end of this floor.


Why is Kentucky called a "Commonwealth"?

In this country, "commonwealth" is another word for "state". The term implies a commitment to the "commonweal," or common good of the people. Several states (Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, and Virginia, in addition to Kentucky) call themselves commonwealths. Since Kentucky was formed from Virginia, our state's founders decided to use the term too.

Capitol vs. Capital.

A capitol houses legislative chambers and may also have courtrooms and government offices. A capital is a city that is the seat of government of a state or nation. This building is a capitol. Frankfort is a capital.

The Legislative Branch of Kentucky State Government:
Like most states, Kentucky has a bicameral legislature - that is one with two components. The "lower" and larger body is the House of Representatives; the "upper," smaller body is the Senate. The Speaker of the House presides over that chamber, and the President of the Senate chairs deliberations there. Other legislative officials include the House and Senate majority and minority leaders. Together, the House and Senate are known as the Kentucky General Assembly. The General Assembly meets in regular session for sixty working days in even years, and for thirty working days in odd years. The governor of Kentucky can call Special Sessions to address specific issues. Legislative chambers and offices occupy the third floor of the Capitol.



THIRD FLOOR – LEGISLATIVE FLOOR

- 19 **Senate chamber** (on the West end of the building). You may enter the Senate if the chamber is not in use.
Raised galleries allow the public to view the Senate's deliberations during legislative sessions. There are desks for thirty-eight senators, who also have individual offices in the Capitol Annex.
Please proceed to the other end of the third floor - the East end.
- 20 **House of Representatives.** You may enter the House chamber if it is not in use.
The House of Representatives, like the Senate, also includes spectator galleries and desks for members. However, with 100 members, the size of the House requires some additional features. Votes are recorded electronically and displayed on panels on either side of the Speaker's desk. Each member of the General Assembly has a desktop computer.
