






YOUTH DEVELOPMENT AT THE YMCA

CONFERENCE STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT AND DRESS CODE

The purpose of this Code of Conduct is to identify personal behavior that is consistent with the purpose and objectives of the Kentucky YMCA Youth Association. The items within the Code are designed to protect the welfare of the program for current participants and future generations. A participant's personal behavior reflects upon one's self, one's Student YMCA, and the Kentucky YMCA. Registration in any Kentucky YMCA conference program indicates personal acceptance of the Code of Conduct. Any student sent home for violation of this Code will be at the expense of parent or quardian.

EXPECTATIONS OF PARTICIPANTS

- 1. Each delegate shall conduct himself/herself in an orderly and responsible manner before, during, and after all functions of the Kentucky YMCA conference programs.
- 2. All participants share the responsibility for their actions equally when violations of the Code are witnessed. Those who choose to be present when a violation occurs and do not immediately act to remedy and report the violation shall, by their own choice, be considered participants in the violation. In relation to this Code, there are no "innocent bystanders."
- 3. No delegate shall leave a Kentucky YMCA function unless the approval of his/her advisor AND the director of the program is secured. The delegate must be picked up and returned by a parent or legal guardian who must take responsibility for the delegate in writing.
- 4. Each delegate is legally and financially liable for the removal, defacing, or willful damage to public or private property. Any act of vandalism, destruction of property, or misuse of a facility may be a crime and will be treated as a potential criminal violation.
- 5. Food (including gum and candy) and beverages other than water (including those sold by the hotel) are not permitted in any meeting sessions.
- 6. Cell phones, music players, or other wireless communications devices are not to be used during any meeting session.
- 7. The use of tobacco products, burning of incense, possession of alcoholic beverages, and the use of legal or illegal drugs not in accordance with a prescription is forbidden at any Kentucky YMCA function.
- 8. Youth delegates may not enter rooms other than those assigned by the Y-Staff or advisor.
- Physical intimacy between participants of any gender is inappropriate at all times while at Kentucky YMCA Youth Association Programs and is prohibited.
- 10. All delegates shall be in and remain in their assigned rooms by scheduled curfew and doors shall remain closed until scheduled end of curfew.
- 11. Badges shall be worn ONLY by the individual whose name is on the badge. Badge switching or sharing is strictly prohibited. Participants will wear their assigned badges at all times when they are not in their sleeping rooms, and must be visible at all times. Badges are to be worn around the neck and are not to be defaced, decorated, or altered in any way. There may be a charge for replacement badges.
- 12. Unless there is a fire, participants will not pull the fire alarm. Pulling a fire alarm is a serious offense, and any participant who does so will be held financially and potentially criminally liable. Hotel alarms automatically summon the fire department and create a great inconvenience and fear for the hotel and other quests.
- $13. \ Use \ of \ personal \ vehicles \ by \ students \ during \ Kentucky \ YMCA \ conferences \ is \ strictly \ prohibited.$
- 14. Weapons of any kind and items that could cause injury or damage to participants and/or property are strictly forbidden.

VIOLATION OF EXPECTATIONS

All violations of this code of conduct are to be brought to the attention of the Y-Staff. Participants found to be in violation of the above expectations will be subject to disciplinary actions at the discretion of advisors and the Y-Staff including but not limited to: calls to parents/guardians; incident report filed; participant sent home; school policies implemented. If state or federal law is broken, Y-Staff will notify parent/guardian and law enforcement and participant will be sent home. At all times the Y-Staff reserves the right to alter disciplinary actions at their discretion.

ROOMING POLICY

I understand that conference delegates are typically housed four (4) to each room and that in order to participate in this program; I must share a room and bed with at least one other student of the same sex from my delegation. I may be roomed with students of the same sex from another delegation, in which case I will not share a bed with a person from another delegation. I further understand that I may not room with anyone other than YMCA conference delegates

-- not an advisor, parents, or other relatives -- without expressed notarized* parental consent (*notarization only required if student rooms with adult other than parent/legal guardian), and permission of Executive Director of the Kentucky YMCA. I also understand that I may not room alone.

REFUND POLICY

I understand that all fees are non-refundable. In the case of extenuating circumstances, a portion of the payment may be refunded by action of the Executive Director based upon written request from the student or parent.

PARTICIPANT DRESS CODE

KYA is a professional development experience. While at KYA, students are expected to abide by the following dress code. Conference name badges are part of this dress code and must be worn for all conference functions. Anyone not in compliance with the dress code may be asked to change clothes. Advisors will be notified of any violations. Kentucky YMCA staff reserves the right to consider removal of Delegation of Excellence from any delegation with three (3) or more reported dress code violations. *Dress code will be enforced by delegation advisors.*

- Practical dress shoes and socks **NO casual footwear (Uggs, Chuck Taylors, Toms, flip flops, etc.)**

Business Professional

- Blazer, sport coat, or suit jacket
- Dress shirt or sweater that covers shoulders
 NO sheer/lace/see-through portions on torso (front or back)
- Collared dress shirt (tucked in)
- Tie or bow tie
- Business dress with skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back) and covered shoulders

- Dress slacks or suit pants **NO Jeans, leggings or fitness pants**
- Business pantsuit
- Skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back), including any slits.
- Practical dress shoes and socks **NO casual footwear (Uggs, Toms, Chuck Taylors, flip flops, etc.)**

The following are items of attire are not appropriate for all delegates at ALL TIMES (including Business and Casual dress):

- Tops that are: backless, sheer/transparent, low- cut, midriff-bearing, do not cover shoulders
- Skirts shorter than bend of knee (front and back)
- Shorts shorter than finger-tip length (front and back only)
- Hats
- Visible undergarments

- Any clothing with inappropriate language or imagery, derogatory of any ethnic, religious, or social group
- Any clothing otherwise deemed inappropriate by the Kentucky YMCA Staff



An act to Establish a Policy to Encourage Any Grocery Store/Food Mart to Donate Any/All Past Sell-By Date Food Items to Homeless Shelters.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Grocery Stores/Food Marts will donate any or all unsold past sell-by date food items to homeless shelters across the state of Kentucky. As a result, at the end of the year the grocery store owners will receive a 3% tax reduction on their profits.

Section 2: 40% of all food gets thrown out every day equaling 20 lbs. of food per person a month. One out of six of the Kentucky population lacks consistent access to enough food for a healthy lifestyle, that is 735,000 Kentuckians overall. In addition, an average grocery store throws out 1/3 of its food a year; most of that food could be used to feed Kentucky's 23 homeless shelters. Even though no other states in the U.S do this, Kentucky could lead our nation to a better, less hungry future.

Section 3: This is not mandatory, but the stores that donate their food they would receive a tax reduction of 3% on their profit at the end of the year. The people that transport the food can write off their taxes as a charitable donation at the end of the year for every 50 miles they drive.

Section 4: This Law will go into effect on, July 1, 2017.

An act to Require All School Faculty to be Certified in CPR.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will require all Kentucky school faculty and staff members to be trained certified in CPR.

Section 2: All faculty and staff members must have a minimum of six credited and required hours of proper CPR training. Along with CPR instruction, the instruction will include the proper administration of an AED and the Heimlich Maneuver.

Section 3: Training/Instruction will be carried out by the Certified District Nurse and/or School Health Coordinator through scheduled meetings set up by the principals of each school within the district.

Section 4: Funding for this bill will be provided by each Board of Education with the funds allocated for professional development trainings for all faculty and staff members within the district.

Section 5: Non-compliance by any faculty and staff member within a school district shall result in the following penalties/punishments:

 1st Offense: Faculty/Staff member(s) will receive a written warning from the Superintendent for non-compliance and will be required to pay for and attend a training outside of the school district.

 2nd Offense: Faculty/Staff member(s) will be suspended without pay until the training is completed. Since this will now be required for employment, the Superintendent has the right to fire or suspend personnel based on non-compliance with district policies.

Section 6: The Superintendent of each school district in the state of Kentucky will be responsible for the enforcement of this bill.

Section 7: This bill will go into effect on July 1, 2017.

An act to require mandatory 20 minute movement breaks for middle school students each day.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Students across Kentucky are engaged in learning for approximately 7 hours each day. This proposed bill would require Kentucky schools to implement a mandatory movement break on a daily basis for a minimum of 20 minutes.

Section 2: This bill is intended to provide students with movement breaks in order to keep them more engaged during academic instruction. It is proven that students are much more engaged in instruction, when they have had the ability to move their bodies for a given amount of time. We hope to see improved academic abilities through annual standardized testing.

Section 3: The penalty for school districts not implementing this will be a monetary fine. This fine will not exceed \$1,000 and the funds will be given to the Kentucky Department of Education.

Section 4: This bill will not pose any additional cost to the school districts, the Kentucky Department of Education, or the Kentucky tax payers. School districts will make sure their schools are in compliance through regular walkthroughs and district wide meetings.

An act to ban puppy mills in the state of Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: All puppy mills will be prohibited in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. A puppy mill is a large-scale commercial dog breeding facility where profit is given priority over the well-being of the dog. Dogs in puppy mills suffer from many diseases, and live in awful conditions.

Section 2: A committee from the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) will oversee this bill. They will take the calls, and then report the location of the mill to the police who will take care of handling the owner and transporting the dogs. The dogs will stay at ASPCA until the trial of the owners has been completed and they have been proven guilty. When a puppy mill is found, the person who found the mill can anonymously call in to report their findings. If a puppy mill was found in the location mentioned by the caller, then the ASPCA will call back the number and offer them a reward of \$500 (deducted from the \$2000 fine). The remaining \$1500 will go towards the salaries of the committee and cost to run this organization.

Section 3: The first offense for being found in possession of a puppy mill is a \$2,000 fine, 20 hours of community service, and the cost to rehabilitate the dogs living in the puppy mill into a safe shelter or home. The second offense of being found in possession of a puppy mill is prison for 3 years, another \$2,000 fine, 20 hours of community service, and the cost to rehabilitate the dogs living in the puppy mill. The third offense is prison for another 5 years, an additional \$2,000 fine, 20 hours of community service, and the cost to rehabilitate the dogs. If the puppy mill owner cannot afford to pay the fines, they will serve an additional 1 year in prison and they will have to pay off half of the money they owe to the government after their time in prison.

Section 4: The salary of committee members and other costs of the bill are covered by the remaining \$1500 from the puppy mill owner's fines. The first 6 months of this program, the ASPCA will get a grant to pay for the building rental and startup salaries. During these 6 months, the organization will be saving all money from the fines to keep the organization running for the following months, after they have used up all of the grant money.

Section 5: This law will go into effect on January 1, 2017.

An act to abolish corporal punishment in schools in the state of Kentucky.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Corporal punishment is defined as punishment inflicted on a person's body, such as caning, flogging or paddling.

Section 2: The current law allows the "Use of force by person with responsibility for care, discipline, or safety of others," holds pupils to a "strict account for their conduct on school premises" (161.180), and states the "Use of physical force by a public teacher or school administrator is justifiable if used to "maintain reasonable discipline in a school [or] class" and the force used does not create "substantial risk of causing death, serious physical injury, disfigurement, extreme pain, or extreme mental distress." (503.110)

Section 3: This bill would forbid the use of corporal punishment in all school districts in the state of Kentucky, including but not limited to paddling, caning or flogging.

Section 4: This bill will require no funding.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect immediately upon its passage.

An act that requires Kentucky Public Schools to offer all non-core content courses for the same amount of instructional hours.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to ensure that all non-core content courses, such as art, music, communication, and physical education, are provided to students for an equal duration each year.

Section 2: Each year students across the Commonwealth Of Kentucky are involuntarily enrolled in non-core content courses that are not of interest to them. Some of these courses have a longer duration than others. For example, some schools require students to have 18 weeks of art, and only 9 weeks of physical education. Our bill strives to ensure that all students have access to these types of courses for an equal amount of time. We believe that it is fair that all courses, as well as the interests of students, are prioritized the same.

Section 3: School districts that do not implement this bill will lose 8% of their funding from the state. In addition, a \$10,000 fine per month will be issued until the district is in compliance.

Section 4: This bill will affect all public schools within the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Section 5: The funding for this bill will come from money allocated to school districts. Although, it is anticipated that the cost of this bill will be minimal. It is a matter of scheduling these courses an equal amount of time.

An act to permanently terminate all current and future custody rights of Kentucky who have had children removed from their homes.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Each year, more than three million cases of child abuse are reported. Child abuse harms each child exposed to it. Whether it be mentally, when a parent verbally abuses a child; physical abuse, when a parent leaves visible scratches, bruises, or broken bones on their child after they harm them; neglect, a type of abuse that occurs when a parent refuses or fails to provide for their child's most basic needs; or sexual abuse, when an adult or older adolescent uses a child for sexual stimulation. No matter the case, abuse is all around us.

Section 2: Approximately five children die each day because of child abuse. If we don't come up with a solution for this, this number will unfortunately rise rapidly. When a child is taken away from their parent(s), the parent(s) can gain custody of them again over 50% of the time which allows them to abuse their child further. Children will also be affected by abuse in the future because of their parents impact on them now. In the end, innocent children will become abused and impacted for life because of their abusive parents.

Section 3: 1,825 children deaths are caused annually by their own parents and this is atrocious. Countless others are negatively affected for their entire lives. We would like to put an end to Kentucky parental rights after children have been removed from their custody. This would lessen the number of deaths because this would take away the chance of the parents abusing their child again, after the the child is taken away. The child will go to a foster family already prepared and provided.

Section 4: The additional costs would be paying foster families for taking the child into their custody. Foster families are paid based on how much the child has to have in order to survive. They could be paid \$9,125 per year, or they could be paid \$2,000; it all depends on the child's needs. The government already covers these payments, so there will be no additional taxes.

Section 5: This will go into effect January 1st, 2017.

An act to ensure drug-addicted individuals are able to partake in the rehab they need.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The rate of drug-induced deaths in Kentucky exceeds the national average. Most of these deaths occur as an increasing number of our state's citizenry are becoming more and more addicted to mind-altering substances. According to the American National Institute on Drug Abuse, "addiction is a chronic relapsing brain disease."

Section 2: According to the Office of Drug Control Policy, "Addiction has reached epidemic levels in Kentucky, where painkiller and heroin abuse are rampant. Kentucky is all to familiar with heroin overdoses. Especially hit hard have been Northern Kentucky, Louisville, and Lexington raising fears that the heroin scourge will soon ravage the entire Commonwealth."

Section 3: Therefore, since drug addiction is a disease and because it is running rampant in the Commonwealth, we propose legislation that would enforce health insurance companies that operate within the state of Kentucky to pay at least 80% of the incurred charges each time a drug-addicted individual is admitted into rehab. Currently, most national and state insurance plans will take on about 35-40% of the responsibilities on incurred charges by a patient, leaving quite the hefty bill for individuals who, oftentimes, cannot afford it.

Section 4: Seeing as how this bill would mandate insurance companies to pay for rehab treatment of their customers, there would not be any costs to Kentucky taxpayers. Any rehab costs not covered by insurance would be the responsibility of the patient. Furthermore, patients who wish a report a failure to comply with this legislation will be asked to report such noncompliance to the Kentucky Department of Insurance – http://www.insurance.ky.gov.

Section 5: This bill will be effective as of January 1st, 2017.

Section 1: Our bill will allow retired combat veterans an opportunity to get a job as a resource officer. The pay of the veteran will be split by the school and police force. Each veteran will be paid depending on years of military service and the police pay scale. Section 2: Each veteran will be screened for mental instabilities like PTSD or post traumatic stress disorder. Each Veteran will also be armed with a weapon or weapons of the school and police forces choice.

An act to sanitize coal mines in order to protect the water supplies that are affected by coal mining pollution.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will ensure that mercury, coal ash, and arsenic are contained within the mine and do not leak into neighboring bodies of water that are used as drinking water by both humans and animals.

Section 2: Currently, coal mine inspections focus on the health and safety of the coal miners and are administered by the federal government. This bill will require the reenactment of Kentucky state coal mine inspections, with the additional focus on coal mine sanitation.

Section 3: Inspectors will look for areas of vulnerability in the mine structure that would allow leaks of harmful mine pollutants. They will also focus on mining procedures that concentrate on limiting pollution release from the mine.

Section 4: Costs to enact this bill will vary according to each mine depending on their pollution control needs. Costs will be the responsibility of the coal mine.

Section 5: Coal mines will have 6 months to make any necessary changes and will be reevaluated by an inspector. Failure to comply with the inspector's recommendations will result in a \$1,000 fine. This fine will be administered every 3 months until the coal mine falls within regulation.



An act to Obtain a Parent/Guardian Driving Permit at age 15.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: 15 year olds will be given the opportunity to obtain a Parent/ Guardian Driving permit. They are only allowed to drive if a parent or guardian is with them. At the age of 16 they will receive their intermediate license and at 17 their full license the same as it is now. The changing of the age of receiving a learner's permit from 16 years of age to 15 years of age will allow teenagers to have an extra year of guided practice before they start driving with other people besides their parents or guardians in the vehicle.

Section 2: The leading cause of deaths for American teenagers is car crashes. The crash fatality rate is highest for 16-17 year olds within the first 6 months of getting their license, and it remains high through the age of 24. This age group makes up 7% of licensed drivers, but suffers 14% of fatalities and 20% of all reported accidents. Of teen drivers fatally injured in automobiles, more than 1/3 were speed related accidents. Teen drivers are more likely than older drivers to be the cause of their accidents. That is based on facts pointing to high rates of teen accidents involving one vehicle. Many reasons contributed to teen drivers' high accident and fatality rates in automobiles but lack of experience is a main cause.

Section 3: If the 15 year old is given a ticket during his/her year of learner's permit experience, they will lose their permit. They will have to restart the process of regaining an intermediate driver's license when they turn 16. Police officers and The Kentucky Department of Transportation will enforce this law once it goes into effect.

Section 4: The cost for a license in Kentucky is \$20. To inform the public of the new law, media coverage and social media will be used to pass it along throughout Kentucky.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect on April 1, 2017

An act to require public schools to mandate CPR, AED, and first aid training to all certified staff.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to have all certified staff trained in CPR, AED, and first aid.

Section 2: Over half of the students enrolled in schools will require CPR, AED, and/or first aid at least one time during the school year. If the staff is not certified, there could be life-threatening results.

Section 3: All certified staff (teachers and administrators) must have a minimum of six credited and required hours of CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation), AED (automated external defibrillator), and first aid training. Training will be provided by the certified district nurse and/or school health coordinator through professional development or district wide training days scheduled by the principal at each school.

Section 4: CPR, AED, & First Aid training costs \$40 per person every other year and will be funded by the Kentucky Department of Education during the professional development or district wide training days.

Section 5: Non-compliance by certified staff within a school district will result with the following offenses:

- 1st offense: Certified staff will receive a warning from the superintendent for non-compliance and receive a notice to have training completed or scheduled within 3 months at employees expense.
- 2nd offense: Certified staff will be suspended without pay until the training is completed.

Section 6: The Superintendent of each public school district in Kentucky will be responsible for the enforcement of this bill.

Section 7: The bill will go into effect on January 1, 2018.

An act to require genetically-modified food products to be labeled.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will require food manufacturers to label their food products as genetically-modified to give the public knowledge of the product's ingredients.

Section 2: Genetically-modified foods are any food that have had chemicals added to their original makeup. Many harmful effects have been found in studies about genetically-modified foods. The FDA (Food and Drug Administration) will enforce this bill.

Section 3: This bill will not require any funding, as the manufacturers could place the label in their current design.

Section 4: The first violation would result in a fine of \$3,000 within three months of the initial notification. The second violation would result in a larger fine of \$6,000 within three months of the first fine. The third violation would result in a \$10,000 fine within three months of the second fine. Three months after the final fine, the company will shut down until the labels are placed on the products. Notifications will be given to the suppliers weekly.

Section 5: This bill will go into on January 1, 2018.

An Act to Annually Test Home Schooled Students to Ensure All Children Are Getting a Proper Education.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This Commonwealth of Kentucky will provide a test that will check each home schooled student's academic level to ensure that proper education is being provided in the home school situation.

Section 2: During the state K-PREP testing window each home schooled student will be tested with a similar test and will report back to the local board of education.

Section 3: The test will be divided into core subjects by grade level with each core subject test lasting one hour with fifteen minute breaks between subjects.

Section 4: Each test will consist of grade appropriate questions and responses.

Section 5: Grading will be completed at the state level mirroring the K-Prep grading process. If the student receives a Novice score, it will be understood that student did not master the content. The parents must report to the local board of education officials and law enforcement officials to discuss consequences.

- 1st Offense: The parents of home schooled student will be fined \$1000 if the student does not pass the state assessment.
- 2nd Offense: The parents of home schooled student will be forced to enroll student in public or private education.
- 3rd Offense: The parents of home schooled student will be charged with failing to comply with compulsory attendance laws.

Section 6: This act will be made effective July 1, 2017.

An act to Equip New Kentucky State Police Law Enforcement Vehicles with Ballistic Resistant Materials.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will allow Kentucky State Police to perform their daily duties in a safer environment with less fatalities.

Section 2: This bill will require all newly purchased Kentucky State Police vehicles used for the sole purpose of law enforcement to be equipped with ballistic resistant materials. The ballistic resistant materials must meet a minimum rating of UL 752 Level 1.

Section 3: This bill is optional for the following agencies: Fish and Wildlife, Conservation, State Parks, Department of Corrections, Juvenile Justice, City Police and County Sheriff Departments. At the same time these agencies are encouraged to participate as funding permits.

Section 4: The Department of Transportation will inspect, enforce, and assure compliance. Any newly purchased vehicles not meeting the aforementioned requirement will be decommissioned until fitted with the ballistic resistant materials.

Section 5: Funding will come from the existing Kentucky State Police budget. State funding will only be approved for newly purchased vehicles that meet the ballistic resistant materials requirement. The approval includes funding from outside sourcing as well. Outside sourcing fund will be sought in an effort to increase existing Kentucky State Police budget.

Section 6: This act will be made effective July 1, 2017.

An act to have all Kentucky citizens who receive unemployment drug tested at least once a year.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: There are 116,945 Kentuckians who receive financial help from the government. We plan to drug test 58,000 or half of these people once a year. This would cost the government \$500,000 yearly. Five percent (5%) of Kentuckians (2.6 million people) are unemployed, and 2.65% of Kentuckians receive assistance from the government.

Section 2: One drug test costs from \$10 to \$50. The drug test uses saliva or urine to test for any illegal drugs. People currently are receiving about \$15,000 from the government for unemployment. If they were to fail the drug test, they would be removed from the unemployment program.

Section 3: Although, this would cost \$500,000 yearly, only 10% of recipients would need to fail the drug test for the state to recoup the cost of the program. The state would make the money back because as the drug tests are taken, the number of unemployed people being assisted by the government will decrease.

Section 4: The drug tests will take place at the Kentucky Unemployment Offices and they would be administered by the Kentucky State Unemployment Officers. People being drug tested will be administered the test when they come to collect their money. If people receive checks in the mail, they will be required to go to an unemployment office once a year to pass the drug test before the checks continue.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2019.

An act to make recess mandatory for 20 minutes in all public middle schools each school day

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Recess should be required in all Kentucky public middle schools. Recess time should be at least 20 minutes each school day for a total of 100 minutes each week. Adult supervision will be required to keep the students safe and to make sure they stay active. Inclement weather plans will be developed at the school's discretion. If schools don't comply they will be charged a fine of \$500 every semester they don't follow the bill. Schools will shave off 2–3 minutes of every class to be able to fit in the extra physical activity.

Section 2: Studies have shown students are more productive and attentive after participating in physical activities. Other surveys have said students' behavior has improved on days that they have physical activity. Students also develop problem solving skills, critical thinking skills, as well as social skills.

Section 3: There is little funding required for this bill. The only money necessary will be for extra playground equipment. There will need to be one teacher necessary for every 50 students, a ratio of 1:50.

Section 4: This will go into effect at the start of the 2018-19 school year.

An act to increase educational programs for high school aged refugees.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill entitles all public schools to be required to hire a private tutor for the refugees who have been approved for asylum in the United States. The refugees will need to surpass the language barrier of our country for future jobs or business opportunities. These tutors must be required to speak the native language of the refugee until that person has a basic understanding of the English language. This bill only affects high schools around the state of Kentucky.

Section 2: Adults and children in war stricken countries are provided safe places by host countries where camps are established. While in the camps they may or may not have received an education. Upon arrival to the United States they will have access to an education, so the United States needs to be prepared to provide educational programs for refugees. The United States Department of Education is what the teachers can use as a resource to help the refugees.

Section 3: The money for this bill would be paid to the high schools by the government. The reason for government funding is because refugees are not able to afford private tutoring. The money will go directly to the school then to the tutor for the cost of the session. The tutor will be required in a school where a new refugee has enrolled. A tutor may cost an estimated \$10 to \$15 per hour for each tutor, but since private tutors may cost more the price could vary per tutor. The time of the tutoring sessions must be worked out by the student and tutor.

Section 4: This bill goes into effect in January 27, 2018

An act to Require Public Schools to Offer Vocational Classes for High-Schoolers Who Want to be Career-Ready After High School

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will require Kentucky public schools to provide vocational classes to their students who wish to be career-ready when they graduate high school. Vocational classes should be introduced into schools so that students aspiring to have careers such as carpentry, mechanics, and food management can be ready to enter the workforce. This bill will benefit every high school student who wishes to be ready for employment by the time they graduate.

Section 2: In Kentucky public high schools, the classes that would be required to be offered are

- Mechanics
- Restaurant management
- Introduction to law and justice
- Introduction to teaching
- Introduction to nursing

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Section 3: The average money spent on college tuition alone is \$23,890. This doesn't even include room and board, books, meals, and transportation while attending the university. Citizens who are ranked under the poverty level will have an introduction to the duties and responsibilities of the desired career. These vocational classes will also be beneficial to all students who would appreciate being part of the work force without attending college.

Section 4: Public school teachers are paid through the government, and the government gets the funding for this through the taxes we pay. The current tax rate is 0.5%. We would increase the tax rate 0.05% making the school tax 0.55%. This tax will affect all residents who pay school taxes in Kentucky.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect in the 2017-2018 school year.

An act to allow all preschool age children to attend preschool for free, if parents want their child to attend.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Currently, in Kentucky, we have a public preschool program for students that qualify for the program. Students qualify and can attend for free based on parent income, social skills, and other educational needs. Many parents would like for their child to attend preschool, however, they can only attend by paying tuition. This bill does not require students to attend preschool, rather it provides each child an opportunity to attend preschool for free.

Section 2: This bill will help preschool age children develop social and self regulatory skills, as well as lay a foundation for future brain development. This bill will help students succeed in Kindergarten and beyond. At preschool, they become exposed to numbers, letters, and shapes. More importantly, they learn how to socialize by getting along with other children, sharing, and contributing as a team. Some children aren't given the opportunity because they don't qualify during the preschool assessment or their parents earn too much money.

Section 3: Each year, children attend a preschool screening. During that time, teachers and administrators decide who qualifies to attend the free preschool program. Other parents are given the option to enroll their children, but for a price—they must pay tuition for their child to attend. This bill would allow all students to attend preschool for free, regardless of parent income.

Section 4: The cost to implement this bill will fall on the school system. The state would pay for teachers, transportation, and food. The cost could be reduced by having morning preschool and afternoon preschool; therefore, using the same teachers for both sessions. This will benefit school systems in the long run, by preparing students and creating life-long learners.

Session 5: Upon passage, this bill will go into effect during the next school year.

An act to require all students in elementary public schools to have recess everyday at school.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Currently, in Kentucky, there is no law requiring students to have recess during the school day. In Kentucky, about 40% of children are obese and do not get enough physical activity. This bill will help decrease the number of obese children by helping them become more active during the school day, while also allowing students to work on their socialization skills. Furthermore, physical activity supports the cognitive development as well as social and emotional learning that takes place while having unstructured free time to play. Requiring students to participate in activities during recess will help decrease behavioral issues that occur during the school day.

Section 2: In order for the children of Kentucky to become healthier, we need to get them moving. Kentucky students are becoming less active and less social while at school because they do not get enough time for physical activity or socialization during the school day. If students are required to be more active during school then their overall health will begin to improve. Students will also begin to socialize with others more if they were given the opportunity.

Section 3: Due to increased academic requirements, students do not have time to release some of the built up energy they have during the regular school day, so classroom behavior becomes an issue. The number of behavioral issues are on the incline during the school day. If students were allowed to release some of the energy, these issues would decline.

Section 4: Schools will be required to incorporate 15-20 minutes of "free recess" during the school day. Principles and school councils will ensure that the recess is added to the curriculum in addition to PE. Principals will create a schedule that includes daily recess for every student.

Section 5: This bill will not require additional money, but it will include finding time to implement the "free recess."

Section 6: Upon passage, the bill will go into effect during the next school year, to provide time for principals and teachers to implement the new schedule.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The safety of our citizens should be the utmost concern. This proposed bill would require citizens who are eligible to renew their drivers license to pass the written portion of the standardized driving test every 4 years. Failure to do so will result in an accumulation of points to their license.

Section 2: This bill is intended to reduce the number of automobile accidents due to poor driving skills and keep current drivers up to date on recent and/or changed traffic laws.

Section 3: The penalty to drivers will be an addition of 4 points added to their state issued drivers license. Those who fail to pass the written portion after 2 attempts will be required to take the driving test.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will establish a real life stimulation course throughout all public high schools in the state of Kentucky. This class will help with "real world" situations, financially, that you as a student will have to deal with, in our oncoming future, after high school.

Section 2: In order to form the curriculum for this course, a committee will be formed consisting of educators from across the state. Selections for this committee will be chosen by the Department of Education. In order to be selected, educators will have to have a bachelor, masters, or PHD in a financial or educational field. The committee will be convened during the summer of 2018. They will have to finish the curriculum by the end of the summer. Any other decisions are delegated to the Department of Education and the committee itself.

Section 3: Certain requirements for the curriculum development will have to be met however. These subjects will have to be included in the curriculum:

- Filing Tax Returns
- Investing & Entrepreneurship
- Retirement, Financial Planning
- Real-Life Simulation based on skills above-Mentorship

Section 4: The funding for this bill will come from the Kentucky Department of Education. Any additional funding will be removed from the old Financial Literacy program. \$65,000-75,000 just to get the teacher and run the class, and depending on your school your teacher will be given an amount of money for their classroom like most schools typically do.

Section 5: The penalty for any student not taking and passing this course is to take it during the summer. Any school that does not implement this program will lose funding from the State of Kentucky. We do this because if the students haven't taken this course they will not know how to do this in "the real world".

Section 6: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2018/2019 School year/next year.

An act to Legalize Casino Gaming

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Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

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Section 1: According to Chapter 528 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes gambling is illegal. While casino gambling is illegal, charitable gambling is legal in Kentucky. "Gambling" means staking or risking something of value upon the outcome of a contest, game, gaming scheme, or gaming device which is based upon an element of chance, in accord with an agreement or understanding that someone will receive something of value in the event of a certain outcome. A contest or game in which eligibility to participate is determined by chance and the ultimate winner is determined by skill shall not be considered to be gambling.

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Section 2: According to USA Today in 2014, Indiana's government profited \$2.61 billion, Missouri \$1,77 billion, Illinois \$1,64 billion, West Virginia \$948 million dollars, Casinos create hotels and restaurants which create more jobs. Casinos create many jobs for unskilled employees. The large number of created jobs will strengthen Kentucky's economy. Casinos will attract more tourism, which also creates more business for Kentucky.

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Section 3: According to the information on the profits from casino gaming in our surrounding states, casino gaming in Kentucky can raise substantial money for education and addiction programs. Twentyfive percent of the profits will be given to the Department of Education to use as they see fit. In addition five percent of the profits will fund programs that treat addictions. The Legislature will decide how the money is allocated to addiction services.

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26 27 Section 4: Enforcement will come from the Department of Charitable Gaming. Violations of the casino gaming regulations will have three offenses:

First Offense: Warning

Third Offense: License revoked

Second Offense: Fine of \$100,000

An act to establish a maximum number of students in a seat on a school bus.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will limit the number of kids on a school bus, as well as creating extra space for large equipment; such as recreational items. According to the Kentucky Department of Education (education.ky.gov) we have 9,855 registered buses in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. For the safety of the students, a new ratio of student to a seat is needed – three students per seat on elementary school bus runs, and two per seat on middle school and high school bus runs. Besides a set limit of students on a school bus we need extra space as well. At least two seats on a bus (on located in the front, and one in the back) should be used solely on storing extra circular items such as large, bulky football gear, and larger instruments that cannot fit with two students.

Section 2: This bill will provide safety for kids that ride on the school bus. With the ratio we are proposing, students will be safely seated and will not be as injured in the event of an accident. Buffer spaces on the bus will provide safety as well as convenience. Buffer spaces will allow large equipment to not block the Emergency exit, which is dangerous in an accident.

Section 3: According to the JCPS Burks Compound, an average 22 seat bus is \$120,000. For this reason, we have purposed the ration so bus compounds do not have to spend so much of their budget on new buses when, easily, we could move kids around so we do not have to buy as many buses.

Section 4: Setting a bill to be passed is different than making sure it truly becomes effective. For this reason, monthly camera check-ups would be needed to confirm that everyone on the bus is abiding by the law.

Section 5: This bill will become effective at the beginning of the 2017 school year.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The fine for illegally parking in a designated handicap space will increase from \$150 to \$250.

Section 2: Additionally, fines will increase with each violation. First Offense-\$250 fine, Second Offense- \$500 fine. Third and subsequent offenses- \$1,000 fine.

Section 3: Police departments state-wide will complete bi-monthly sweeps of parking lots. These sweeps may be conducted by officers, cadets, or trained volunteers, If volunteers are utilized, they must undergo a background check and be trained in issuing citations. Volunteers will not be compensated.

Section 4: Trained volunteers that issue citations will be required to submit photographic evidence of the presence of a disabled parking sign AND the absence of a placard or plate on the violating vehicle along with the written citation. Volunteer-issued citations will have to be approved by the local department, and will be mailed to the owner of the vehicle in violation.

Section 5: Revenue created from fines will go to certified job training for people with disabilities, as well as training and background checks for volunteers. Any additional remaining funds at the end of the fiscal year will go directly to the MORE THAN A CHAIR campaign.

Section 6: All issued placards will have a holographic image of the wheelchair symbol as well as the driver's license number of the disabled applicant or guardian of the applicant to prove authenticity.

Section 7: There will be a mandatory 6-month reissuing window for ALL persons currently using a temporary placard. This will be from July, 2017- November, 2017.

Section 8: Temporary placards will cost \$15 (an increase from \$0). The cost for renewal is \$10, and the renewal period shall remain 6 months. This will amend KRS 189.456 which originally issued no fee.

Section 9: Placard and renewal fees will first cover the printing cost, and any additional revenue will fund a state-wide MORE THAN A SIGN campaign.

Section 10: This bill will go into effect July 1, 2017.

An act to require First Aid, CPR and AED training for K-12 certified and classified educators in the state of Kentucky.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Districts will be required to offer First Aid, CPR and AED training for all certified and classified employees.

Section 2: These certifications will be renewed every two years in order to maintain compliance with the American Red Cross standards.

Section 3: School districts must schedule trainings with their local Red Cross Chapter (Louisville Area Chapter, South Central Kentucky Chapter, Western Kentucky Chapter, Bluegrass Area Chapter, Eastern Kentucky Chapter) OR arrange for teachers and staff members to take the training at a class offered locally or on-line.

Section 4: Training sessions cost \$50 per person when a group schedules a course to be administered at the school facility by an American Red Cross representative, \$90 to take the class at a scheduled Red Cross Chapter site, or \$25 to have certified staff take the course on-line.

Section 5: Funding for this initiative will be generated from a .25% wholesale tax increase on beer and wine which will make this tax equal to distilled spirits tax in our state.

Section 6: Any funding not utilized by December 31st of the calendar year will be donated equally to the five local Red Cross Chapters.

Section 7: Certification information will be maintained at the local board office—copies of digital certificates and/or American Red Cross issued cards. Section 1: Vendors at flea markets and trade days will be prohibited from selling any and all firearms.

Section 2: All firearms legally sold in the state of Kentucky will require a licensed gun dealer. This includes private transactions, gun shops, gun shows, and on-line sales.

Section 3: Every purchaser of a firearm in the state of Kentucky will be required to go through a background check and mandatory waiting period. Purchasers must be at least 18 years of age.

Section 4: Licensed gun dealers will conduct the background check using the National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS).

Section 5: Additionally, there will be a required five business day waiting period for all firearm sales,

Section 6: All sale vouchers and information regarding NICS background checks must be filed by the licensed dealer and must be available for auditing purposes. Records must be maintained for a minimum of 5 years.

Section 7: This bill will be enforced by the Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms Bureau (ATF).

Section 8: Any gun sold at a flea market or trade day will be considered a felony offense for both the buyer and vendor.

Section 9: Any dealers attempting to sell through private transactions, gun shops, gun shows, or online sales without a valid license, will pay the following fines:

First offense: \$500 fineSecond offense: \$1,000 fine

An act to provide portable showers for homeless individuals in all Kentucky counties.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The state of Kentucky currently receives funds to provide services to the homeless from the Housing and Urban Development Department. It will be required that funds from this money be earmarked to provide portable shower units for the homeless.

Section 2: As part of the state's Continuum of Care plan (CoC), the state estimates the number of homeless individuals in each Kentucky county. As part of the CoC plan, each county will receive one portable shower unit the first year. Each subsequent year each county will receive additional shower units as additional funds are received through HUD. This will continue until it is determined by the Continuum of Care plan that the number of portable shower units in each county is meeting the needs of the homeless in each county. A person within the State Department of Housing and Urban Development who monitors the CoC plans will be named to oversee the provision and use of these shower units. .

Section 3: Each county will be responsible for using the portable shower system to best meet the needs of the homeless population within their county. They will be required to establish and publish a schedule for where the portable shower(s) will be located and its operating hours. The portable showers may travel or remain in a set location. This will vary from county to county depending on its homeless population and location.

Section 4: These funds from HUD will also be used to hire people to work to operate and clean the portable showers.

Section 5: Each county will provide annual reports to HUD detailing how the shower(s) was used, how many people are using their portable shower systems, and an analysis of its effect on their homeless community.

Section 6: Each county will have a year from the passage of this law to obtain their portable shower and put them into use.

Intoxicating substances include, but are not limited to: Illegal drugs, Legal drugs (prescription drugs), and Alcohol.

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Section 2: To be eligible for the rehabilitation sentencing; the defendant must attend a mandatory abuse assessment. The judge will receive a report and recommendation from the assessment to do rehabilitation or jail.

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Section 3: Defendants charged with DUI (Driving Under the Influence) will be eligible for the program. Unless they hurt someone or damage property during the crime. They will be sentenced to jail if found quilty.

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Section 5: Funding will come from the budget of the Kentucky Department of Corrections.

Section 1: According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, the state of Kentucky led the nation in ATV deaths for 2007-2011. Our will assist in reducing the occurrences of ATV fatalities in the state of Kentucky.

Section 2: We propose a bill that will require children at the age of 8 and up to take an ATV safety course. After the age of 8 minors will be required to enroll in a follow-up course every 2 years, until the age of 16, at which time they will be provided an ATV license. The ATV license must be renewed after 5 years. In order to drive or purchase an ATV you must have a license.

Section 3: The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife will administer the course. This department is currently in charge of the issuing Kentucky Boater Education Certificates. The ATV course will be administered via online. Individuals must pass the course to be granted a Safety Certificate.

Section 4: If you are found riding an ATV without a license, or a Safety Certificate, you will be fined \$500 for the 1st offense. The 2nd offense you will be fined \$1,000 and your license/certificate will be suspended for up to 6 months. If a 3rd offense occurs, you will lose your license/certificate for 2 years, and a fine of \$1,000 must be paid in order to get your license/certificate re-instated. The fines will be used to provide funding for the implementation of the bill.

Section 1: According to www.americanprogress.org 15 to 43 percent of gay and transgender workers have experienced some form of discrimination on the job. Our bill assists in alleviating discrimination against those in the LGBTQ community, as well as any other ethnic group in the workplace. In addition, this bill will required that employers provide professional development related to ensuring a "nontolerance discriminatory environment".

Section 2: Reports of discrimination will be filed to the business' Human Resources Administration [HRA].

Section 3: Businesses that do not follow this mandate will be fined. Fines are as follows:

- 1st Offense: \$10,000 fine and all members of the company undergo sensitivity training in an effort to reduce discrimination.
- 2nd Offense: \$20,000 fine

An act to ensure all Kentucky newborns are sent home to a safe environment

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: In 2013, 90% of infants who died by Sudden Unexplained Infant Death (SUID) had at least one hazardous risk factor related to their sleep space. These factors include: the baby not being put to sleep on their back; infants sleeping on a surface not intended for sleep such as an adult bed, couch, car seat or swing; sharing a bed with an adult, or pillows, blankets, or other soft bedding. 50% of infants deaths involved bed sharing. In the state of Kentucky, an infant is 70 times more likely to die a sleep-related death than in a motor vehicle accident.

Section 2: In Kentucky, every 5 days an infant dies in an unsafe sleep environment. Parents and caregivers need education regarding this issue and statistics show what we are providing them with now is not working. According to Kentucky Vital Statistics, SUIDs are the second leading cause of infant deaths in Kentucky children.

Section 3: We propose that every Kentucky infant have a home visit prior to leaving the hospital by a social worker, healthcare worker, or certified home visitor to assess for safe sleep environment and provide education to the caregivers on safe sleep. If a safe sleep environment can't be established the worker will work with the caregivers to help provide a crib through a program called Cribs for Kids. Follow up visits will be conducted weekly until the risk factors are determined to be reduced and the infant is considered to be living in a safe sleep environment. These visits can be done through the Kentucky HANDS program, local DCBS office, certified community health care workers.

Section 4: Each year the department of health and human services are allocated money to a maternal child health program one of the program focuses is on safe sleep environment. The money allocated to this program can be used to pay for staff salary to provide our proposed bill.

Section 5: We will begin our program July 1st, which is the start of budget year 2017-2018.

An act to increase the pay wages of Kentucky state prisoners

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: By being low paid while incarcerated, criminals struggle to break the cycle of poverty they are in and, in fact, the cycle itself may be the reason they became a criminal. The practice of paying inmates an increased wage makes society safer because inmates who make a minimum wage are far less likely to commit another crime.

The low wages that prisons pay help cause more dependents of inmates to end up on welfare and more and more prisoners find themselves in worse financial situations when they are set free. Therefore, families of the prisoners are being punished as well.

The low wages prisons currently provide instill an attitude of "crime pays better" and creates a sense of low self-worth and importance. By paying a higher wage the inmate is afforded some sense of self importance and they can begin to turn their life around and become self supporting. In fact they may actually be able to make some sort of restitution to the victims of their crimes.

Section 2: Approximately 91% of the Kentucky prison population crimes are related to property crimes, including drug possession. As of 2007, 13% of Kentucky crimes were strictly related to drug manufacturing.

Section 3: As of now, Kentucky inmates that have committed a non-violent crime (including drug-related offenses) receive a wage of approximately \$0.45 an hour. This small amount causes the inmates to go back to their normal lives of destitution. What this bill is intended to do is raise the wage of the inmates, prevent them from going back to their lives of crime, and returning to there ways that landed them in jail.

Section 4: Our plan is to increase the wage of Kentucky inmates, so that when their sentence ends they will be more prepared for returning to the real world. This bill would increase the prisoner's wage \$3.50.

Section 5: The state government would have to assume the added cost of the program through the department of corrections. The extra money could come from increased sales and services provided by the prisoners and the prisons.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect on January 1st, 2017.

An Act to Abolish the Disciplinary Use of Corporal Punishment in Kentucky Institutions

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Currently, Kentucky is one of nineteen states that allows corporal punishment. Corporal punishment is the use of physical force by an adult on a minor or mentally disabled person for disciplinary matters. This bill will revoke current Kentucky Revised Statute 503.110, which allows the use of corporal punishment.

Section 2: An institution is a school or facility including, but not limited to, hospitals and facilities for the mentally disabled.

Section 3: Any person who fails to comply with this bill will be charged with a misdemeanor and punished accordingly:

- First offense one month suspension without pay
- Second offense fired from the current institution
- Third offense no longer allowed to be hired by an institution in the Commonwealth

An Act to Require Hospitals and Surgical Centers to Provide Potential Patients with Written Documentation of Cost and Risk

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Currently, hospitals are not required to send written documentation to clients stating the cost, recent outcomes, and any risk of medical treatments or procedures. This makes it very difficult for people to decide if they want to undergo an operation or procedure.

Section 2: This bill will require hospitals and surgical centers in Kentucky to provide written documentation including: an accurate good-faith cost estimate, risks for individual circumstances, and history of serious complications from the procedures performed at that institution. The hospitals and surgical centers would be required to review the information in person or over the phone before the procedure occurs. This information would have to be given to patients at least two weeks before the procedure or operation, unless the procedure is deemed to be an emergency by the doctor.

Section 3: This bill would not cost the state any money.

Section 4: If hospitals or surgical centers are non-compliant they will be fined based on profits per year.

- Those making more than \$10,000,000 will be fined \$100,000 for the first offense, \$500,000 for the second offense, and \$700,000 for any additional offenses.
- Those making between \$5,000,000 and \$10,000,000 will be fined \$75,000 for the first offense, \$300,000 for the second offense, and \$500,000 for any additional offenses.
- Those making under \$5,000,000, will be fined \$25,000 for the first offense, \$100,000 for the second offense, and \$400,000 for any additional offenses.

Section 5: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Health and Family Services.

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An act to require handicap ramps and accessibility for all non-historical, public buildings.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to allow handicap and disabled people entrance into all public buildings without trouble. Buildings built before 1965 or buildings protected by national historical societies are exempt from this bill to protect the historical integrity of the building.

Section 2: This bill will be enforced by the public health inspector.

Section 3: The cost of this bill will vary depending on each building and their personal needs. Each company will be responsible for the cost of updating their building to meet the handicapped accessible requirements.

Section 4: The penalty for failure to comply with handicap accessibility requirements will gradually increase every three months until requirements are met. Penalties will begin with \$500 and will increase \$500 every 3 months until the fines max at \$2,000. Fines will remain at \$2,000 every three months until the company's building follows requirements.

Section 5: This bill will go into effect on March 1, 2018 in order to give businesses enough time to raise and save the funds to make any necessary updates to their public building.

An act to modify the procedures for Driver's License Renewal in Kentucky for Drivers ages 60 and over

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will adjust the Kentucky Driver's License renewal process for all Kentucky residents at age 60, requiring an eye exam from a certified optometrist or ophthalmologist with each renewal. Currently, there is no further check in Kentucky on people's eyesight other than the initial DMV Vision Test. At age 76, in addition to the eye exam, drivers will be required to complete the Driving Skills test administered by Kentucky State Police driving examiner just as younger drivers are. This will occur each renewal period.

Section 2: All drivers 60 and over will be required to show proof of an eye exam by a certified professional within six months of license renewal.

Section 3: Failure to show proper eye examination paperwork will result in a fine of \$100 and the forfeiture of their Driver's License until such time that the eye examination is proven to the DMV. If a wreck occurs and the driver is shown to be non-compliant, it will result in a fine of \$200 and suspension of their Driver's License for one year. For driver's 76 years and older, failure to successfully complete the Driving Skills test will simply lead to forfeiture of their Driver's License.

Section 4: This law will not cost the state anything because the individual drivers will have to pay for their own eye exams. The Driving Skills exams will be scheduled in accordance with existing procedures at each county's DMV office.

An act to require firearm training for all gun owners in the state of Kentucky

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will prohibit the possession of a firearm in the Commonwealth of Kentucky without proof of completion of safety training, administered by a licensed representative of the State.

Section 2: The purpose of this law is to ensure that every gun-owning citizen in Kentucky is educated on its proper use and storage, thereby reducing deaths by accidents and incompetence. Currently, 14 out of 100,000 people are killed in Kentucky by accidental or unintentionally discharging of firearms above the national average of 10 deaths per 100,000 people.

Section 3: If the training is provided by members of existing police forces, at an extra salary of \$5,000 per officer for 120 counties, the cost of this bill in the first year will be \$1.2 million. There will be additional costs of informing current gun owners of the new requirements, either by mail or when they renew their current licenses. However, there are 2 million current registered gun owners in the Commonwealth at this time. Assuming all are compliant with the new regulations, the revenue, at \$20 per license, would be \$40 million, for net revenue of \$38.8 million for the state.

Section 4: Revenue will decline over time, as only new gun owners are added to the database. However, a penalty of \$500 imposed on someone who is found operating a gun without the required permit would help to offset this decline.

Section 5: The penalties of this bill will go into effect one year after passage, allowing citizens time to comply. In the meantime, citizens will receive a warning citation at no charge. After a third offense, a mandatory incarceration upon conviction will be imposed.

An act to require digital satellite road signs to be placed on highways in case of inclement weather.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will decrease road accidents due to weather by requiring digital satellite road signs to be installed instead of standard road signs on major highways in the commonwealth of Kentucky. The Department of Transportation (DOT) will assign the digital satellite road signs to major highways that have shown a history to be dangerous during inclement weather. DOT Research data on accidents will be used to pick the places where these sign will be distributed.

Section 2: New weather based digital satellite controlled road signs will be placed where common road signs were previously constructed on these major highways.

Section 3: This bill will be funded by the Kentucky Department of Transportation.

Section 4: This act will go into effect 6 months after this bill is passed.

Section 5: The Kentucky Department of Transportation will insure that all road signs are installed properly by the the due date. Anyone caught exceeding the projected speed limit will face the same consequences as though they were caught speeding on a standard road sign.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Due to the rising costs of insurance for Diabetic customers, this bill will require insurance companies to cover at least 80% of insulin costs for Diabetic customers. Both private and public insurance companies will be required to abide by this bill.

Section 2: The Kentucky Department of Health (KDH) will enforce this bill by reviewing insurance policies and payments made for Insulin costs. Insurance companies will be required to submit policies in writing and show proof of payments for Insulin costs. Random audits will be done by KDH on the insurance companies to make sure they are following this bill.

Section 3: KDH will investigate insurance companies and when they are found guilty of not following the rules of this bill the following penalties will occur:

- First Offense Warning letter written by KDH and monthly audits done for 3 consecutive months.
- Second Offense Pay a fine of \$50,000 and monthly audits for 6 consecutive months.
- Third Offense Loss of Right to Sell Insurance in Kentucky

Section 4: The bill will go into effect three months after passage to give insurance companies time to adjust policies and procedures to make this bill work.

Section 1: This bill will eliminate the jailer role in counties with no jails.

Section 2: This bill will go into effect immediately, however ample time (6 weeks) will be given to the jailer to find employment.

Section 3: As of now there are 41 no-jail county's that still has an elected jailer, which is only a law in Kentucky.

Section 4: Currently, no-jail jailers cost Kentucky taxpayers \$2 million dollars each year.

Section 5: Jailers who don't have a jail to operate are paid salaries set by their fiscal courts within a state-approved range, between \$20,000 and \$70,398, their responsibilities vary from allegedly substantial to virtually nonexistent. This bill would also be enforced by the county's, or neighboring county's, court.

Section 6: The cost of this bill will be nothing, and the extra money that used to go to the no-jail jailers, could be used to improve drug and alcohol rehab programs for prisoners, which would create more working individuals and taxpayers.

An act to require mandatory Drug Testing in Kentucky Schools.

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Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

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Section 1: Because of an increase of deaths and drug addictions, we are asking for mandatory drug testing throughout every school in Kentucky. Kentucky is the third producer of marijuana in the United States. We believe by having mandatory drug testing, it will decrease the drug use in Kentucky and the production of drugs.

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Section 2: Currently, it cost \$10-\$50 per drug test. There are approximately 450 middle and high schools in Kentucky. If 10% of schools are randomly drug tested with 10 students, it will cost approximately \$5000 per year. We will be partners with Drug Free America and with the health insurance industry for the cost of the drug testing.

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Section 3: Just like random drug testing for athletes, we will use those medical professionals to randomly drug test the non-athletes as well as faculty and staff. The Dean of Students or Assistant Principal can randomly select students and faculty when their school is selected. No one knows about the drug test except people giving the drug test and the school administration.

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Section 4: The Department of Public Health will monitor this law.

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Section 5: A teacher caught with drugs in their system would be terminated from their position. Students with a positive drug test would receive counseling, along with their parent or quardian. The student would also receive punishment according to their school district's drug policy.

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Section 6: This law would go into effect the year after the bill is passed.

Section 1: Currently in Kentucky, 230 schools have a law enforcement officer in the schools. We want all Kentucky schools to have a law enforcement officer present in the schools.

Section 2: We will do this by determining which schools do not have police officers and placing an officer there. Not only will this make schools safer it will also open up more jobs for citizens to have.

Section 3: Since 2003, there have been 199 school shootings in the United States, and with those three shootings have happened in Kentucky, with two people injured and three killed. An act to change how the University of Louisville's Board of Trustees are appointed

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: KRS 164.821, section 1 will be replaced with the following:

"The government of the University of Louisville is vested in a board of trustees appointed for a term set by law pursuant to Section 23 of the Constitution of Kentucky. The board shall consist of seventeen (17) members elected by full time faculty and staff personnel, each who shall serve a term of three (3) years; one (1) member of the teaching faculty of the University of Louisville who shall be the chief executive of the ranking unit of faculty government; a member of the permanent staff of the University of Louisville who shall be the chief executive of the staff senate; and a student member who shall be the president of the student body during the appropriate academic year.

- a. All appointed and elected persons shall be required to attend and complete an orientation and education program prescribed by the council under KRS 164.020(25), as a condition of their service and eligibility for appointment or election to a second term.
- b. Board members may be removed by the President of the University for cause, which shall include neglect of duty or malfeasance in office, after being afforded a hearing with counsel before the Council on Postsecondary Education and a finding of fact by the council.
- c. New appointees to the board shall not serve more than two (2) consecutive terms."

Section 2: KRS 164.821, section 5 will be replaced with the following:

"(5) The president of the university shall make his at-large appointments so as to divide the citizen representation upon the board to reflect proportional representation of the two (2) leading political parties in the Commonwealth based on the state's voter registration and shall reflect no less than proportional representation of the minority racial composition of the Commonwealth. The membership may include one (1) graduate of the institution who resides outside the Commonwealth, but he shall not be reimbursed for out-of-state travel."

Section 3: KRS 164.821, section 6 will be replaced with the following:

"(6) Vacancies among the citizen members of the board occurring by death, resignation, or any other cause shall be filled by appointments made by the president of the university for the expiration of the term, subject to the qualifications set forth in this section."

Section 4: This bill will go into effect January 1st, 2017.

Section 2: Many young people vote based on their their parents' beliefs, the "norm", peer pressure, or media/propaganda/campaigning rather than understanding the issues that affect the successful running of our country.

Section 3: This bill will effect and not only help Kentuckians, but all U.S. citizens.

Section 4: Government is addressed in Social Studies Academic Expectations 2.14 and 2.15, however high schoolers need more education in the area of politics so they are more credible voters.

Section 5: This bill requires no cost. High schools already have social studies teachers, this bill would just ensure that the curriculum is aligned and scheduled so that political science can be covered in depth. If a school finds that they do need to hire another teacher, a part-time teacher should suffice.

Section 5: Each district's schoolboard will enforce this bill. The Kentucky Department of Education would also ensure that this course is being offered/taught. Schools not complying would be breaking the law and testing/accountability scores would suffer.

An act to require Kentucky public schools to provide a comprehensive sex education program by sophomore year.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: Every high school shall provide at least one comprehensive sex education course to be provided for their students, to be taught in freshman or sophomore year for the classroom.

Section 2: This course is required to provide information on contraceptives, sexually transmitted diseases, age of consent, and safe sex.

Section 3: Though required in high schools, this program and course will be highly recommended to be taught to 7th and 8th graders in middle school.

Section 4: To approve these programs, we will provide permission slips for parents to sign. If they do not sign the slip that permits their children to take part in the program, then they shall accept the responsibility of educating their children themselves. These students will be given alternative work instead.

Section 5: The money to fund these programs will be redirected from funding the Abstinence Only programs to these programs. Any additional funding will be provided by school fundraisers, or by the school board if necessary.

Section 6: If a school refuses to create and teach the program, after the first semester of non compliance, they will receive a warning. After the second semester of non compliance, representatives from the school board will check the school to make sure they have received adequate funding, and the school will be assisted in teaching the program. If, by the third semester of this bill being in effect, the school still refuses to make or put in effect this program, then representatives from the school board will be sent to check up on the school, and teachers or school employees may be removed from their posts where appropriate.

Section 9: This bill will be put into effect after the end of the 2016/2017 school semester, giving schools enough time to create and present the program by the beginning of the 2018/2019 school year, when the bill will be properly enforced.

An act to require mental health examinations for students under the age of 18.

Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Section 1: This bill will require that every two years, starting in 4th grade, before returning to school, students in Kentucky must meet with a licensed physician to check the state of their mental health.

Section 2: As of now, out of the 200,000 teens and children with a mental illness, only 45,000 are diagnosed. This is due to the warning signs of mental illness going unnoticed by peers, parents/guardians, and teachers. If enacted, this bill will mandate that students must receive a mental health examination.

Section 3: The examination will cost a similar amount to a sports physical, which typically costs no more than 35 dollars and is provided free at certain county events. If more tests become necessary due to dangerous results, most insurances cover the costs of these tests.

Section 4: The test will include a checklist with questions pertaining to one's mental health, based on a test made by the Mental Health Association of America. This will include questions relating to one's own opinion, the opinion of the parent/guardian, and the opinion of the doctor after the examinations completion.

Section 5: Professionals allowed to perform the test will be, will be doctors at a clinic, school nurses, licensed physicians, therapists, psychologists, and neurologists.

Section 6: If legal guardians fail to comply getting the necessary tests, the following penalties will apply:

- One month after deadline: a letter explaining the rules will be sent to the house of the student
- Two months after deadline: a meeting will be arranged with parent/quardian by the school
- Three months after deadline: a court mandate will be sent to the house of the family of the student, requiring the parent or quardian to appear before a judge.

Section 7: This bill will go into effect during the 2018-2019 school year.




Hotel Map & Floor Plan

Capitol Map & 3rd Floor Plan




