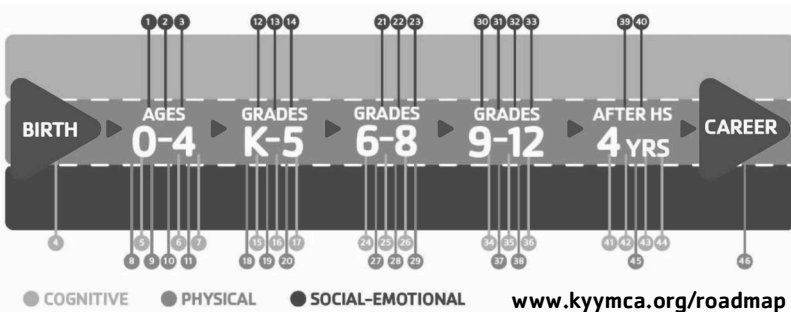

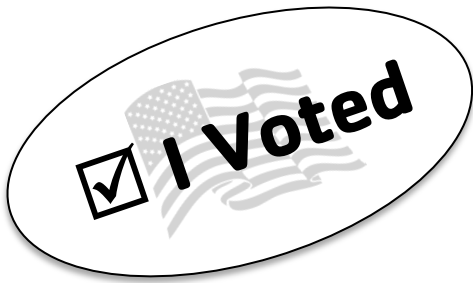

**CONFERENCE STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT AND DRESS CODE**

The purpose of this Code of Conduct is to identify personal behavior that is consistent with the purpose and objectives of the Kentucky YMCA Youth Association. The items within the Code are designed to protect the welfare of the program for current participants and future generations. A participant's personal behavior reflects upon one's self, one's Student YMCA, and the Kentucky YMCA. Registration in any Kentucky YMCA conference program indicates personal acceptance of the Code of Conduct. Any student sent home for violation of this Code will be at the expense of parent or guardian.

**EXPECTATIONS OF PARTICIPANTS**

1. Each delegate shall conduct himself/herself in an orderly and responsible manner before, during, and after all functions of the Kentucky YMCA conference programs.
2. All participants share the responsibility for their actions equally when violations of the Code are witnessed. Those who choose to be present when a violation occurs and do not immediately act to remedy and report the violation shall, by their own choice, be considered participants in the violation. In relation to this Code, there are no "innocent bystanders."
3. No delegate shall leave a Kentucky YMCA function unless the approval of his/her advisor AND the director of the program is secured. The delegate must be picked up and returned by a parent or legal guardian who must take responsibility for the delegate in writing.
4. Each delegate is legally and financially liable for the removal, defacing, or willful damage to public or private property. Any act of vandalism, destruction of property, or misuse of a facility may be a crime and will be treated as a potential criminal violation.
5. Food (including gum and candy) and beverages other than water (including those sold by the hotel) are not permitted in any meeting sessions.
6. Cell phones, music players, or other wireless communications devices are not to be used during any meeting session.
7. The use of tobacco products, burning of incense, possession of alcoholic beverages, and the use of legal or illegal drugs not in accordance with a prescription is forbidden at any Kentucky YMCA function.
8. Youth delegates may not enter rooms other than those assigned by the Y-Staff or advisor.
9. Physical intimacy between participants of any gender is inappropriate at all times while at Kentucky YMCA Youth Association Programs and is prohibited.
10. All delegates shall be in and remain in their assigned rooms by scheduled curfew and doors shall remain closed until scheduled end of curfew.
11. Badges shall be worn ONLY by the individual whose name is on the badge. Badge switching or sharing is strictly prohibited. Participants will wear their assigned badges at all times when they are not in their sleeping rooms, and must be visible at all times. Badges are to be worn around the neck and are not to be defaced, decorated, or altered in any way. There may be a charge for replacement badges.
12. Unless there is a fire, participants will not pull the fire alarm. Pulling a fire alarm is a serious offense, and any participant who does so will be held financially and potentially criminally liable. Hotel alarms automatically summon the fire department and create a great inconvenience and fear for the hotel and other guests.
13. Use of personal vehicles by students during Kentucky YMCA conferences is strictly prohibited.
14. Weapons of any kind and items that could cause injury or damage to participants and/or property are strictly forbidden.

**VIOLATION OF EXPECTATIONS**

All violations of this code of conduct are to be brought to the attention of the Y-Staff. Participants found to be in violation of the above expectations will be subject to disciplinary actions at the discretion of advisors and the Y-Staff including but not limited to: calls to parents/guardians; incident report filed; participant sent home; school policies implemented. If state or federal law is broken, Y-Staff will notify parent/guardian and law enforcement and participant will be sent home. At all times the Y-Staff reserves the right to alter disciplinary actions at their discretion.

**ROOMING POLICY**

I understand that conference delegates are typically housed four (4) to each room and that in order to participate in this program; I must share a room and bed with at least one other student of the same sex from my delegation. I may be roomed with students of the same sex from another delegation, in which case I will not share a bed with a person from another delegation. I further understand that I may not room with anyone other than YMCA conference delegates

-- not an advisor, parents, or other relatives -- without expressed notarized\* parental consent (\*notarization only required if student rooms with adult other than parent/legal guardian), and permission of Executive Director of the Kentucky YMCA. I also understand that I may not room alone.

**REFUND POLICY**

I understand that all fees are non-refundable. In the case of extenuating circumstances, a portion of the payment may be refunded by action of the Executive Director based upon written request from the student or parent.

PARTICIPANT DRESS CODE

KYA is a professional development experience. While at KYA, students are expected to abide by the following dress code. Conference name badges are part of this dress code and must be worn for all conference functions. Anyone not in compliance with the dress code may be asked to change clothes. Advisors will be notified of any violations. Kentucky YMCA staff reserves the right to consider removal of Delegation of Excellence from any delegation with three (3) or more reported dress code violations. ***\*Dress code will be enforced by delegation advisors.\****

**Second day:** Business Professional

**Second night:** Casual

**Third morning:** Casual; Business Professional for officers and candidates

Business Casual

- Collared shirt (tucked in)
- Dress shirt or sweater that covers shoulders  
\*\*NO sheer/lace/see-through portions on torso (front or back)\*\*
- Blazer, business jacket, and tie optional
- Business dress with skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back) and covered shoulders

- Skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back), including any slits.
- Trousers such as khakis or dress pants \*\*NO JEANS, LEGGINGS, or FITNESS PANTS\*\*
- Practical dress shoes and socks \*\*NO casual footwear (Uggs, Chuck Taylors, Toms, flip flops, etc.)\*\*

Business Professional

- Blazer, sport coat, or suit jacket
- Dress shirt or sweater that covers shoulders  
\*\*NO sheer/lace/see-through portions on torso (front or back)\*\*
- Collared dress shirt (tucked in)
- Tie or bow tie
- Business dress with skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back) and covered shoulders

- Dress slacks or suit pants \*\*NO Jeans, leggings or fitness pants\*\*
- Business pantsuit
- Skirt at bend of knee or longer (front and back), including any slits.
- Practical dress shoes and socks \*\*NO casual footwear (Uggs, Toms, Chuck Taylors, flip flops, etc.)\*\*

The following are items of attire are not appropriate for all delegates at ALL TIMES (including Business and Casual dress):

- Tops that are: backless, sheer/transparent, low-cut, midriff-bearing, do not cover shoulders
- Skirts shorter than bend of knee (front and back)
- Shorts shorter than finger-tip length (front and back only)
- Hats
- Visible undergarments
- Bare feet
- Any clothing with inappropriate language or imagery, derogatory of any ethnic, religious, or social group
- Any clothing otherwise deemed inappropriate by the Kentucky YMCA Staff

**BE A BETTER DEBATER!!!**  
**READ THESE HELPFUL HINTS AND TIPS:**

- **ALWAYS ADDRESS THE CHAIR!** "Harry Potter, Hogwarts Gryffindor, Sir/Madam Chair."
- **TECHNICAL QUESTIONS**
  - READ the bill before you decide on your question. DON'T ask questions that are already in the bill. For example, "When will this bill go into effect?" and "How much will this bill cost?" are *usually* answered in the Body of the Bill.
  - Don't ask questions that begin with "WHY...?" Those are almost *always* debatable.
- **WHAT YOU MAY DO DURING PRO/CON DEBATE**
  - Each time you are recognized, you may do ONE or TWO of the following things:
    - Ask the sponsor(s) a *technical* question about the bill
    - Ask the sponsor(s) a *debatable* questions about the bill
    - Give a speech for or against the bill
    - Yield your remaining time to another delegate
  - If you would like to ASK A QUESTION (or a series of 2 questions), when you are recognized, say, "**Will the sponsor(s) yield to a question (or `series of questions`)?**"
  - If you would like to SPEAK OR YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER ASKING A QUESTION, you should also say, "And I reserve my right to speak (or `yield my time`) afterward."
  - If you would like to YIELD YOUR TIME AFTER SPEAKING, you should reserve your right to do so after addressing the chair.
    - EX: "Hermione Granger, Hogwarts, Sir Chair. I reserve my right to yield the remainder of my time to Delegate Malfoy from Hogwarts Slytherin."

MOTION	To introduce a proposal for consideration by the CHAIR.
PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY	To request advice on procedure from the CHAIR. SENATORS or REPRESENTATIVES may make this point at any time another delegate is not speaking.
REPRESENTATIVE	A member of the House.
ROLL CALL	Calling the names of all members to determine their presence.
SECOND	A personal approval of a motion, generally making it subject to debate.
SENATOR	A member of the Senate.
STATE OF THE COMMONWEALTH ADDRESS	Made by the Governor and containing a review of the general condition of the state and his/her recommendations to the Assembly.
TABLE	A MOTION to defer action on a BILL.
TWO-THIRDS MAJORITY	The majority vote is at least double the minority vote.
VETO	Privilege of the Governor to reject passed legislation.

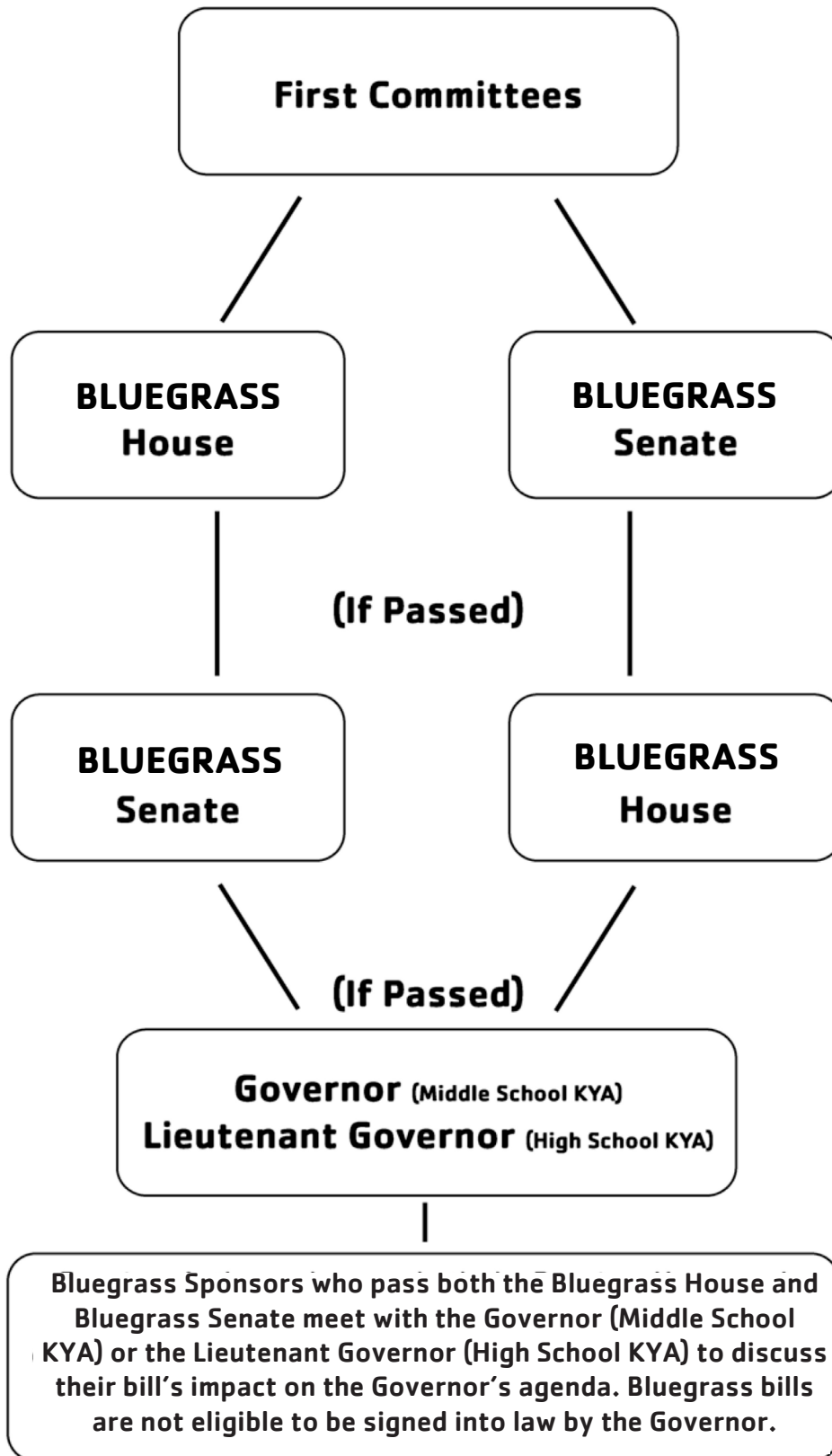

- 6 Section 1: Current KY Law 527.070 prohibits the possession of a weapon by school staff on school  
7 campuses.

- 9 Section 2: This bill will amend KY Law 527.070 to allow school staff who have a current concealed  
10 carry permit to undergo specialized training with the local law enforcement in order to gain permission  
11 to carry a concealed weapon on the school campus where they are currently employed.  
12
- 13 Section 3: Considering that participation in this is voluntary, the costs for the weapons and the  
14 concealed carry permit certification will be incurred by the staff member.  
15
- 16 Section 4: Excluded from this bill is anyone not employed by the school and any staff member who has  
17 not completed the specialized training with the local law enforcement.  
18
- 19 Section 5: Upon passage, this bill will go into effect on July 1, 2017.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

6 Section 1: Grocery Stores/Food Marts will donate any or all unsold past sell-by date food items to  
7 homeless shelters across the state of Kentucky. As a result, at the end of the year the grocery store  
8 owners will receive a 3% tax reduction on their profits.  
9


10 Section 2: 40% of all food gets thrown out every day equaling 20 lbs. of food per person a month. One  
11 out of six of the Kentucky population lacks consistent access to enough food for a healthy lifestyle,  
12 that is 735,000 Kentuckians overall. In addition, an average grocery store throws out 1/3 of its food a  
13 year; most of that food could be used to feed Kentucky's 23 homeless shelters. Even though no other  
14 states in the U.S do this, Kentucky could lead our nation to a better, less hungry future.  
15

16 Section 3: This is not mandatory, but the stores that donate their food they would receive a tax  
17 reduction of 3% on their profit at the end of the year. The people that transport the food can write off  
18 their taxes as a charitable donation at the end of the year for every 50 miles they drive.  
19

20 Section 4: This Law will go into effect on, July 1, 2017.

An act to Require All School Faculty to be Certified in CPR.

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

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Section 1: This bill will require all Kentucky school faculty and staff members to be trained certified in CPR.

Section 2: All faculty and staff members must have a minimum of six credited and required hours of proper CPR training. Along with CPR instruction, the instruction will include the proper administration of an AED and the Heimlich Maneuver.

Section 3: Training/Instruction will be carried out by the Certified District Nurse and/or School Health Coordinator through scheduled meetings set up by the principals of each school within the district.


Section 4: Funding for this bill will be provided by each Board of Education with the funds allocated for professional development trainings for all faculty and staff members within the district.

Section 5: Non-compliance by any faculty and staff member within a school district shall result in the following penalties/punishments:


- 1st Offense: Faculty/Staff member(s) will receive a written warning from the Superintendent for non-compliance and will be required to pay for and attend a training outside of the school district.
- 2nd Offense: Faculty/Staff member(s) will be suspended without pay until the training is completed. Since this will now be required for employment, the Superintendent has the right to fire or suspend personnel based on non-compliance with district policies.

Section 6: The Superintendent of each school district in the state of Kentucky will be responsible for the enforcement of this bill.

Section 7: This bill will go into effect on July 1, 2017.

1           An act to require mandatory 20 minute movement breaks for middle school students each day.  
2  
3                           **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5   Section 1: Students across Kentucky are engaged in learning for approximately 7 hours each day. This  
6   proposed bill would require Kentucky schools to implement a mandatory movement break on a daily  
7   basis for a minimum of 20 minutes.  
8  
9   Section 2: This bill is intended to provide students with movement breaks in order to keep them more  
10   engaged during academic instruction. It is proven that students are much more engaged in instruction,  
11   when they have had the ability to move their bodies for a given amount of time. We hope to see  
12   improved academic abilities through annual standardized testing.  
13  
14   Section 3: The penalty for school districts not implementing this will be a monetary fine. This fine will  
15   not exceed \$1,000 and the funds will be given to the Kentucky Department of Education.  
16  
17   Section 4: This bill will not pose any additional cost to the school districts, the Kentucky Department of  
18   Education, or the Kentucky tax payers. School districts will make sure their schools are in compliance  
19   through regular walkthroughs and district wide meetings.

1 An act to ban puppy mills in the state of Kentucky

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5 Section 1: All puppy mills will be prohibited in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. A puppy mill is a large-  
6 scale commercial dog breeding facility where profit is given priority over the well-being of the dog.  
7 Dogs in puppy mills suffer from many diseases, and live in awful conditions.

8  
9 Section 2: A committee from the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) will  
10 oversee this bill. They will take the calls, and then report the location of the mill to the police who will  
11 take care of handling the owner and transporting the dogs. The dogs will stay at ASPCA until the trial  
12 of the owners has been completed and they have been proven guilty. When a puppy mill is found, the  
13 person who found the mill can anonymously call in to report their findings. If a puppy mill was found in  
14 the location mentioned by the caller, then the ASPCA will call back the number and offer them a reward  
15 of \$500 (deducted from the \$2000 fine). The remaining \$1500 will go towards the salaries of the  
16 committee and cost to run this organization.

17  
18 Section 3: The first offense for being found in possession of a puppy mill is a \$2,000 fine, 20 hours of  
19 community service, and the cost to rehabilitate the dogs living in the puppy mill into a safe shelter or  
20 home. The second offense of being found in possession of a puppy mill is prison for 3 years, another  
21 \$2,000 fine, 20 hours of community service, and the cost to rehabilitate the dogs living in the puppy  
22 mill. The third offense is prison for another 5 years, an additional \$2,000 fine, 20 hours of community  
23 service, and the cost to rehabilitate the dogs. If the puppy mill owner cannot afford to pay the fines,  
24 they will serve an additional 1 year in prison and they will have to pay off half of the money they owe  
25 to the government after their time in prison.

26  
27 Section 4: The salary of committee members and other costs of the bill are covered by the remaining  
28 \$1500 from the puppy mill owner's fines. The first 6 months of this program, the ASPCA will get a  
29 grant to pay for the building rental and startup salaries. During these 6 months, the organization will  
30 be saving all money from the fines to keep the organization running for the following months, after  
31 they have used up all of the grant money.

32  
33 Section 5: This law will go into effect on January 1, 2017.

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: This bill requires grocery stores with two or more locations to donate their unsold food. This  
6 will reduce the amount of people that go hungry in Kentucky each year. This bill would also reduce the  
7 amount of wasted food that goes into the landfills.

8

9 Section 2: In Kentucky 1 in 6 people struggle with hunger. If this bill is passed, this number will  
10 decrease.

11

12 Section 3: The grocery stores would be required to donate their food to a local food bank, a church, a  
13 soup kitchen, or any other organization that collects food for the hungry.

14

15 Section 4: The organization that the grocery is donating to would send a person to pickup the food.  
16 The organization would pick up food from the grocery store every week.

17

18 Section 5: The grocery stores can donate food that is not yet expired, but reaching its sell by date. The  
19 food must still be consumable. They can also donate food that is not going to sell. Grocery stores are  
20 not allowed to donate expired food.

21


22 Section 6: The grocery stores would be required to keep a record of what they donate. A Public Health  
23 Officer would be required to check their records to see if they are up to date. If the officer finds that  
24 the records of their donations are not accurate and up-to-date, the store will be fined \$500 for each  
25 week of missing or inaccurate records.

26

27 Section 7: This bill will not require any additional costs for the state of Kentucky.

28

29 Section 8: This bill will take effect on January 1, 2018.

5 Section 1: Corporal punishment is defined as punishment inflicted on a person’s body, such as caning,  
6 flogging or paddling.

7

8 Section 2: The current law allows the “Use of force by person with responsibility for care, discipline, or  
9 safety of others,” holds pupils to a “strict account for their conduct on school premises” (161.180),  
10 and states the “Use of physical force by a public teacher or school administrator is justifiable if used to  
11 “maintain reasonable discipline in a school [or] class” and the force used does not create “substantial  
12 risk of causing death, serious physical injury, disfigurement, extreme pain, or extreme mental distress.”  
13 (503.110)

14


15 Section 3: This bill would forbid the use of corporal punishment in all school districts in the state of  
16 Kentucky, including but not limited to paddling, caning or flogging.

17

18 Section 4: This bill will require no funding.

19

20 Section 5: This bill will go into effect immediately upon its passage.

1 An act that requires Kentucky Public Schools to offer all non-core content courses for the same  
2 amount of instructional hours.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


5  
6 Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to ensure that all non-core content courses, such as art, music,  
7 communication, and physical education, are provided to students for an equal duration each year.

8  
9 Section 2: Each year students across the Commonwealth Of Kentucky are involuntarily enrolled in non-  
10 core content courses that are not of interest to them. Some of these courses have a longer duration  
11 than others. For example, some schools require students to have 18 weeks of art, and only 9 weeks of  
12 physical education. Our bill strives to ensure that all students have access to these types of courses  
13 for an equal amount of time. We believe that it is fair that all courses, as well as the interests of  
14 students, are prioritized the same.

15  
16 Section 3: School districts that do not implement this bill will lose 8% of their funding from the state. In  
17 addition, a \$10,000 fine per month will be issued until the district is in compliance.

18  
19 Section 4: This bill will affect all public schools within the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

20  
21 Section 5: The funding for this bill will come from money allocated to school districts. Although, it is  
22 anticipated that the cost of this bill will be minimal. It is a matter of scheduling these courses an equal  
23 amount of time.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5


6 Section 1: Each year, more than three million cases of child abuse are reported. Child abuse harms each  
7 child exposed to it. Whether it be mentally, when a parent verbally abuses a child; physical abuse, when  
8 a parent leaves visible scratches, bruises, or broken bones on their child after they harm them; neglect,  
9 a type of abuse that occurs when a parent refuses or fails to provide for their child’s most basic needs;  
10 or sexual abuse, when an adult or older adolescent uses a child for sexual stimulation. No matter the  
11 case, abuse is all around us.

12  
13 Section 2: Approximately five children die each day because of child abuse. If we don’t come up with a  
14 solution for this, this number will unfortunately rise rapidly. When a child is taken away from their  
15 parent(s), the parent(s) can gain custody of them again over 50% of the time which allows them to  
16 abuse their child further. Children will also be affected by abuse in the future because of their parents  
17 impact on them now. In the end, innocent children will become abused and impacted for life because of  
18 their abusive parents.

19  
20 Section 3: 1,825 children deaths are caused annually by their own parents and this is atrocious.  
21 Countless others are negatively affected for their entire lives. We would like to put an end to Kentucky  
22 parental rights after children have been removed from their custody. This would lessen the number of  
23 deaths because this would take away the chance of the parents abusing their child again, after the the  
24 child is taken away. The child will go to a foster family already prepared and provided.

25  
26 Section 4: The additional costs would be paying foster families for taking the child into their custody.  
27 Foster families are paid based on how much the child has to have in order to survive. They could be  
28 paid \$9,125 per year, or they could be paid \$2,000; it all depends on the child’s needs. The  
29 government already covers these payments, so there will be no additional taxes.

30  
31 Section 5: This will go into effect January 1st, 2017.

3                           **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**


4  
5   Section 1: The rate of drug-induced deaths in Kentucky exceeds the national average. Most of these  
6   deaths occur as an increasing number of our state's citizenry are becoming more and more addicted to  
7   mind-altering substances. According to the American National Institute on Drug Abuse, "addiction is a  
8   chronic relapsing brain disease."  
9

10   Section 2: According to the Office of Drug Control Policy, "Addiction has reached epidemic levels in  
11   Kentucky, where painkiller and heroin abuse are rampant. Kentucky is all too familiar with heroin  
12   overdoses. Especially hit hard have been Northern Kentucky, Louisville, and Lexington raising fears that  
13   the heroin scourge will soon ravage the entire Commonwealth."  
14


15   Section 3: Therefore, since drug addiction is a disease and because it is running rampant in the  
16   Commonwealth, we propose legislation that would enforce health insurance companies that operate  
17   within the state of Kentucky to pay at least 80% of the incurred charges each time a drug-addicted  
18   individual is admitted into rehab. Currently, most national and state insurance plans will take on about  
19   35-40% of the responsibilities on incurred charges by a patient, leaving quite the hefty bill for  
20   individuals who, oftentimes, cannot afford it.  
21

22   Section 4: Seeing as how this bill would mandate insurance companies to pay for rehab treatment of  
23   their customers, there would not be any costs to Kentucky taxpayers. Any rehab costs not covered by  
24   insurance would be the responsibility of the patient. Furthermore, patients who wish a report a failure  
25   to comply with this legislation will be asked to report such noncompliance to the Kentucky Department  
26   of Insurance - <http://www.insurance.ky.gov>.  
27

28   Section 5: This bill will be effective as of January 1st, 2017.

7 not leak into neighboring bodies of water that are used as drinking water by both humans and animals.  
8

9 Section 2: Currently, coal mine inspections focus on the health and safety of the coal miners and are  
10 administered by the federal government. This bill will require the reenactment of Kentucky state coal  
11 mine inspections, with the additional focus on coal mine sanitation.  
12


13 Section 3: Inspectors will look for areas of vulnerability in the mine structure that would allow leaks of  
14 harmful mine pollutants. They will also focus on mining procedures that concentrate on limiting  
15 pollution release from the mine.  
16

17 Section 4: Costs to enact this bill will vary according to each mine depending on their pollution control  
18 needs. Costs will be the responsibility of the coal mine.  
19


20 Section 5: Coal mines will have 6 months to make any necessary changes and will be reevaluated by an  
21 inspector. Failure to comply with the inspector's recommendations will result in a \$1,000 fine. This fine  
22 will be administered every 3 months until the coal mine falls within regulation.

11   hopefully lower abortion rates.

13   Section 3: This law will effect women who want an abortion. Abortion clinics will be responsible for  
14   enforcing this law.

15  
16   Section 4: Abortion clinics will not be able to perform an abortion unless a women has an ultrasound  
17   prior to the procedure. If the clinic does not enforce the law it will be fined.


18  
19   Section 5: This bill will be paid for through the woman's insurance carrier (private or public).

20  
21   Section 6: This bill will go into effect the month after it is passed.

13 as a felony.

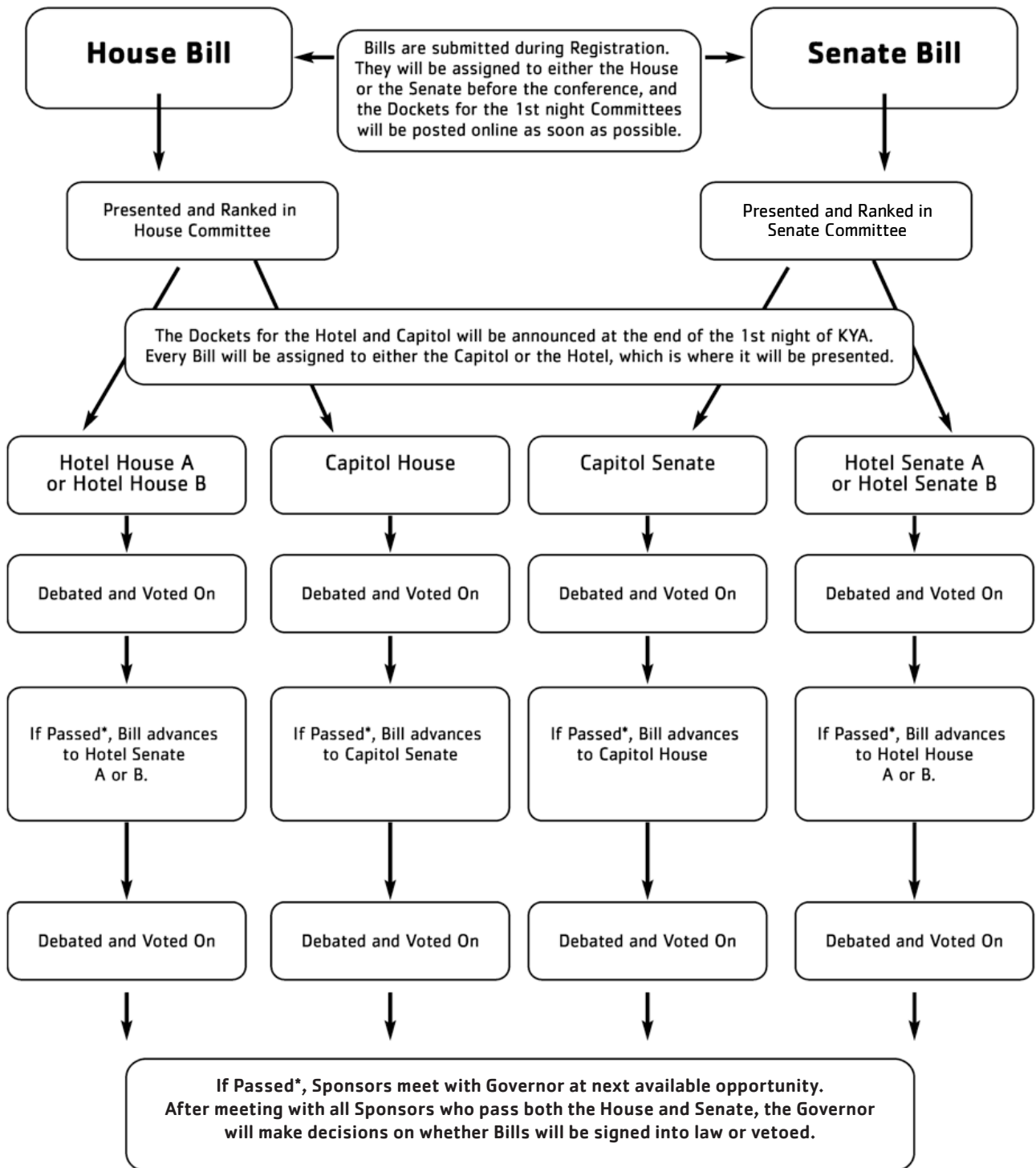

5 Section 1: Kentucky currently does not have a law requiring K-3rd grade students to be escorted from  
6 the school bus by a responsible adult.

7

8 Section 2: This law will ensure that no student, grades K-3rd, shall get off of the school bus  
9 unescorted by a responsible adult. The parent or guardian may sign a release form allowing an older  
10 sibling to escort the younger child from the school bus in the place of an adult.

11

12 Section 3: Excluded from this bill: Students 4th grade and older

13


14 Section 4: When enacted, the State of Kentucky will not incur any additional expenses.

15

16 Section 5: Penalties: If an adult is not at the bus stop to get the child off of the school bus, the student  
17 is required to remain on the bus. The driver will take the student to a designated location (such as the  
18 school, or the board of education) where the student will wait on his or her parent or guardian to come  
19 pick them up. The parent or guardian is responsible for the costs of transporting the student from the  
20 designated location.

21

22 Section 6: Upon passage, this bill will go into effect on July 1, 2017.

2  
3                                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5   Section 1: 15 year olds will be given the opportunity to obtain a Parent/ Guardian Driving permit. They  
6   are only allowed to drive if a parent or guardian is with them. At the age of 16 they will receive their  
7   intermediate license and at 17 their full license the same as it is now. The changing of the age of  
8   receiving a learner’s permit from 16 years of age to 15 years of age will allow teenagers to have an  
9   extra year of guided practice before they start driving with other people besides their parents or  
10   guardians in the vehicle.


11  
12   Section 2: The leading cause of deaths for American teenagers is car crashes. The crash fatality rate is  
13   highest for 16-17 year olds within the first 6 months of getting their license, and it remains high  
14   through the age of 24. This age group makes up 7% of licensed drivers, but suffers 14% of fatalities  
15   and 20% of all reported accidents. Of teen drivers fatally injured in automobiles, more than 1/3 were  
16   speed related accidents. Teen drivers are more likely than older drivers to be the cause of their  
17   accidents. That is based on facts pointing to high rates of teen accidents involving one vehicle. Many  
18   reasons contributed to teen drivers’ high accident and fatality rates in automobiles but lack of  
19   experience is a main cause.

20  
21   Section 3: If the 15 year old is given a ticket during his/her year of learner’s permit experience, they  
22   will lose their permit. They will have to restart the process of regaining an intermediate driver’s  
23   license when they turn 16. Police officers and The Kentucky Department of Transportation will enforce  
24   this law once it goes into effect.

25  
26   Section 4: The cost for a license in Kentucky is \$20. To inform the public of the new law, media  
27   coverage and social media will be used to pass it along throughout Kentucky.

28  
29   Section 5: This bill will go into effect on April 1, 2017

9   other half of the regular pay will go to the required substitute designated to the position.

11   Section 3: Majority of the teachers have lesson plans and a curriculum planned out even before the  
12   maternity leave. Less planning is required by the substitute teacher because most activities are already  
13   in place. In addition, a newborn child the first year could cost up to \$12,000, not including the  
14   hospital bills for delivery and if complications occur.

16   Section 4: Men who are also on maternity leave will be allowed to take up to two weeks at half pay as  
17   well.

18


19   Section 5: This bill will be at no cost to schools because the amount shared between the teacher and  
20   the substitute is the total amount teachers would normally receive during that amount of time.

21

22   Section 6: This bill will be enforced by the Kentucky Department of Education.

23

24   Section 7: This bill will go into effect July 1, 2017.

2 training to all certified staff.  
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5

6 Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to have all certified staff trained in CPR, AED, and first aid.  
7

8 Section 2: Over half of the students enrolled in schools will require CPR, AED, and/or first aid at least  
9 one time during the school year. If the staff is not certified, there could be life-threatening results.  
10

11 Section 3: All certified staff (teachers and administrators) must have a minimum of six credited and  
12 required hours of CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation), AED (automated external defibrillator), and first  
13 aid training. Training will be provided by the certified district nurse and/or school health coordinator  
14 through professional development or district wide training days scheduled by the principal at each  
15 school.  
16


17 Section 4: CPR, AED, & First Aid training costs \$40 per person every other year and will be funded by  
18 the Kentucky Department of Education during the professional development or district wide training  
19 days.  
20

21 Section 5: Non-compliance by certified staff within a school district will result with the following  
22 offenses:

- 24 • 1st offense: Certified staff will receive a warning from the superintendent for non-compliance  
25 and receive a notice to have training completed or scheduled within 3 months at employees

8 Section 2: Genetically-modified foods are any food that have had chemicals added to their original  
9 makeup. Many harmful effects have been found in studies about genetically-modified foods. The FDA  
10 (Food and Drug Administration) will enforce this bill.

12 Section 3: This bill will not require any funding, as the manufacturers could place the label in their  
13 current design.

15 Section 4: The first violation would result in a fine of \$3,000 within three months of the initial  
16 notification. The second violation would result in a larger fine of \$6,000 within three months of the  
17 first fine. The third violation would result in a \$10,000 fine within three months of the second fine.  
18 Three months after the final fine, the company will shut down until the labels are placed on the

- 12 Section 3: The test will be divided into core subjects by grade level with each core subject test lasting  
13 one hour with fifteen minute breaks between subjects.

- 15 Section 4: Each test will consist of grade appropriate questions and responses.

- 17 Section 5: Grading will be completed at the state level mirroring the K-Prep grading process. If the  
18 student receives a Novice score, it will be understood that student did not master the content. The  
19 parents must report to the local board of education officials and law enforcement officials to discuss  
20 consequences.

- 22 • 1st Offense: The parents of home schooled student will be fined \$1000 if the student does not

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5 Section 1: This bill will allow Kentucky State Police to perform their daily duties in a safer environment  
6 with less fatalities.  
7  
8 Section 2: This bill will require all newly purchased Kentucky State Police vehicles used for the sole  
9 purpose of law enforcement to be equipped with ballistic resistant materials. The ballistic resistant  
10 materials must meet a minimum rating of UL 752 Level 1.  
11  
12 Section 3: This bill is optional for the following agencies: Fish and Wildlife, Conservation, State Parks,  
13 Department of Corrections, Juvenile Justice, City Police and County Sheriff Departments. At the same  
14 time these agencies are encouraged to participate as funding permits.  
15  
16 Section 4: The Department of Transportation will inspect, enforce, and assure compliance. Any newly  
17 purchased vehicles not meeting the aforementioned requirement will be decommissioned until fitted  
18 with the ballistic resistant materials.  
19  
20 Section 5: Funding will come from the existing Kentucky State Police budget. State funding will only be  
21 approved for newly purchased vehicles that meet the ballistic resistant materials requirement. The  
22 approval includes funding from outside sourcing as well. Outside sourcing fund will be sought in an  
23 effort to increase existing Kentucky State Police budget.  
24  
25 Section 6: This act will be made effective July 1, 2017.

3                           **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4


5   Section 1: There are 116,945 Kentuckians who receive financial help from the government. We plan to  
6   drug test 58,000 or half of these people once a year. This would cost the government \$500,000  
7   yearly. Five percent (5%) of Kentuckians (2.6 million people) are unemployed, and 2.65% of Kentuckians  
8   receive assistance from the government.  
9

10   Section 2: One drug test costs from \$10 to \$50. The drug test uses saliva or urine to test for any  
11   illegal drugs. People currently are receiving about \$15,000 from the government for unemployment. If  
12   they were to fail the drug test, they would be removed from the unemployment program.  
13


14   Section 3: Although, this would cost \$500,000 yearly, only 10% of recipients would need to fail the  
15   drug test for the state to recoup the cost of the program. The state would make the money back  
16   because as the drug tests are taken, the number of unemployed people being assisted by the  
17   government will decrease.  
18

19   Section 4: The drug tests will take place at the Kentucky Unemployment Offices and they would be  
20   administered by the Kentucky State Unemployment Officers. People being drug tested will be  
21   administered the test when they come to collect their money. If people receive checks in the mail, they  
22   will be required to go to an unemployment office once a year to pass the drug test before the checks  
23   continue.  
24

25   Section 5: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2019.

1           An act to make recess mandatory for 20 minutes in all public middle schools each school day  
2  
3                           **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5   Section 1: Recess should be required in all Kentucky public middle schools. Recess time should be at  
6   least 20 minutes each school day for a total of 100 minutes each week. Adult supervision will be  
7   required to keep the students safe and to make sure they stay active. Inclement weather plans will be  
8   developed at the school’s discretion. If schools don’t comply they will be charged a fine of \$500 every  
9   semester they don’t follow the bill. Schools will shave off 2-3 minutes of every class to be able to fit in  
10   the extra physical activity.  
11  
12   Section 2: Studies have shown students are more productive and attentive after participating in  
13   physical activities. Other surveys have said students’ behavior has improved on days that they have  
14   physical activity. Students also develop problem solving skills, critical thinking skills, as well as social  
15   skills.  
16  
17   Section 3: There is little funding required for this bill. The only money necessary will be for extra  
18   playground equipment. There will need to be one teacher necessary for every 50 students, a ratio of  
19   1:50.  
20  
21   Section 4: This will go into effect at the start of the 2018-19 school year.

2

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4

5 Section 1: This bill entitles all public schools to be required to hire a private tutor for the refugees who  
6 have been approved for asylum in the United States. The refugees will need to surpass the language  
7 barrier of our country for future jobs or business opportunities. These tutors must be required to  
8 speak the native language of the refugee until that person has a basic understanding of the English  
9 language. This bill only affects high schools around the state of Kentucky.

10

11 Section 2: Adults and children in war stricken countries are provided safe places by host countries  
12 where camps are established. While in the camps they may or may not have received an education.  
13 Upon arrival to the United States they will have access to an education, so the United States needs to  
14 be prepared to provide educational programs for refugees. The United States Department of Education  
15 is what the teachers can use as a resource to help the refugees.


16

17 Section 3: The money for this bill would be paid to the high schools by the government. The reason for  
18 government funding is because refugees are not able to afford private tutoring. The money will go  
19 directly to the school then to the tutor for the cost of the session. The tutor will be required in a  
20 school where a new refugee has enrolled. A tutor may cost an estimated \$10 to \$15 per hour for each  
21 tutor, but since private tutors may cost more the price could vary per tutor. The time of the tutoring  
22 sessions must be worked out by the student and tutor.


23

24 Section 4: This bill goes into effect in January 27, 2018

4                                                          **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

6           Section 1: This bill will require Kentucky public schools to provide vocational classes to their students  
7           who wish to be career-ready when they graduate high school. Vocational classes should be introduced  
8           into schools so that students aspiring to have careers such as carpentry, mechanics, and food  
9           management can be ready to enter the workforce. This bill will benefit every high school student who  
10          wishes to be ready for employment by the time they graduate.  
11  
12          Section 2: In Kentucky public high schools, the classes that would be required to be offered are  
13                  • Mechanics  
14                  • Restaurant management  
15                  • Introduction to law and justice  
16                  • Introduction to teaching  
17                  • Introduction to nursing  
18  
19          Section 3: The average money spent on college tuition alone is \$23,890. This doesn't even include room  
20          and board, books, meals, and transportation while attending the university. Citizens who are ranked  
21          under the poverty level will have an introduction to the duties and responsibilities of the desired  
22          career. These vocational classes will also be beneficial to all students who would appreciate being part  
23          of the work force without attending college.  
24  
25          Section 4: Public school teachers are paid through the government, and the government gets the  
26          funding for this through the taxes we pay. The current tax rate is 0.5%. We would increase the tax rate  
27          0.05% making the school tax 0.55%. This tax will affect all residents who pay school taxes in Kentucky.  
28  
29          Section 5: This bill will go into effect in the 2017-2018 school year.

1 An act to allow all preschool age children to attend preschool for free, if parents want their child to  
2 attend.  
3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5


6 Section 1: Currently, in Kentucky, we have a public preschool program for students that qualify for the  
7 program. Students qualify and can attend for free based on parent income, social skills, and other  
8 educational needs. Many parents would like for their child to attend preschool, however, they can only  
9 attend by paying tuition. This bill does not require students to attend preschool, rather it provides each  
10 child an opportunity to attend preschool for free.  
11

12 Section 2: This bill will help preschool age children develop social and self regulatory skills, as well as  
13 lay a foundation for future brain development. This bill will help students succeed in Kindergarten and  
14 beyond. At preschool, they become exposed to numbers, letters, and shapes. More importantly, they  
15 learn how to socialize by getting along with other children, sharing, and contributing as a team. Some  
16 children aren't given the opportunity because they don't qualify during the preschool assessment or  
17 their parents earn too much money.  
18

19 Section 3: Each year, children attend a preschool screening. During that time, teachers and  
20 administrators decide who qualifies to attend the free preschool program. Other parents are given the  
21 option to enroll their children, but for a price--they must pay tuition for their child to attend. This bill  
22 would allow all students to attend preschool for free, regardless of parent income.  
23

24 Section 4: The cost to implement this bill will fall on the school system. The state would pay for  
25 teachers, transportation, and food. The cost could be reduced by having morning preschool and  
26 afternoon preschool; therefore, using the same teachers for both sessions. This will benefit school  
27 systems in the long run, by preparing students and creating life-long learners.  
28

29 Session 5: Upon passage, this bill will go into effect during the next school year.

1           An act to require all students in elementary public schools to have recess everyday at school.  
2

3                           **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4

5 Section 1: Currently, in Kentucky, there is no law requiring students to have recess during the school  
6 day. In Kentucky, about 40% of children are obese and do not get enough physical activity. This bill will  
7 help decrease the number of obese children by helping them become more active during the school day,  
8 while also allowing students to work on their socialization skills. Furthermore, physical activity  
9 supports the cognitive development as well as social and emotional learning that takes place while  
10 having unstructured free time to play. Requiring students to participate in activities during recess will  
11 help decrease behavioral issues that occur during the school day.  
12


13 Section 2: In order for the children of Kentucky to become healthier, we need to get them moving.  
14 Kentucky students are becoming less active and less social while at school because they do not get  
15 enough time for physical activity or socialization during the school day. If students are required to be  
16 more active during school then their overall health will begin to improve. Students will also begin to  
17 socialize with others more if they were given the opportunity.  
18

19 Section 3: Due to increased academic requirements, students do not have time to release some of the  
20 built up energy they have during the regular school day, so classroom behavior becomes an issue. The  
21 number of behavioral issues are on the incline during the school day. If students were allowed to  
22 release some of the energy, these issues would decline.  
23

24 Section 4: Schools will be required to incorporate 15-20 minutes of "free recess" during the school day.  
25 Principles and school councils will ensure that the recess is added to the curriculum in addition to PE.  
26 Principals will create a schedule that includes daily recess for every student.  
27

28 Section 5: This bill will not require additional money, but it will include finding time to implement the  
29 "free recess."  
30

31 Section 6: Upon passage, the bill will go into effect during the next school year, to provide time for  
32 principals and teachers to implement the new schedule.

13 bus. Ford Motor Company, leader of school bus production has made it standard equipment that all

15 this outside cameras installed. This This bill would require all buses 2015- and later to install outside  
16 camera equipment on Kentucky Public School buses.

18 Section 4: This bill will be funded by Kentucky State School tax, already in place and will expire once all  
19 Kentucky buses are replaced by each district.

8 driving test every 4 years. Failure to do so will result in an accumulation of points to their license.  
9

10 Section 2: This bill is intended to reduce the number of automobile accidents due to poor driving skills  
11 and keep current drivers up to date on recent and/or changed traffic laws.  
12

13 Section 3: The penalty to drivers will be an addition of 4 points added to their state issued drivers  
14 license. Those who fail to pass the written portion after 2 attempts will be required to take the driving

17 Section 4: This bill will not pose additional cost to the Ky Department of Transportation. The written

8 Section 2: This bill, enforced by local law enforcement, will issue a DUI along with other punishments  
9 to any individual under 21 with a Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) of 0.02% or higher.

10

11 Section 3: Individuals not following the law will be subject to the following punishments:

12

- 1st offense - \$250 fine, 15 days imprisonment in local jail, and 90 days license suspension

13

- 2nd offense - \$350 fine, 30 days imprisonment in local jail, and 1 year license suspension

14

- 3rd and subsequent offenses - \$500 fine, 90 or more days imprisonment in local jail, and 2 or more year license suspension

15

16 Section 4: This bill will go into effect upon passage.

An act to make Kentucky waterways safer.

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: This bill will affect all boaters in the state of Kentucky. It will increase the number of boating officers and make Boating Under the Influence (BUI) punishments stricter.

Section 2: This bill will be carried out by Kentucky State Police with the assistance of Fish and Wildlife Officers. Funding will come from increasing taxes by .5%.


Section 3: Anyone in violation of this law will be subject to a series of fines and jail time based on the offense.

- 1st offense - \$200 - \$300 fine, 2-14 days of jail time, 1-3 months boating license revocation
- 2nd offense - \$450 - \$1000 fine, 1-3 months of jail time, 6-12 months of license revocation
- 3rd offense - \$2000 - \$5000 fine, 6-30 months of jail time, 3-10 years of license revocation
- Any further offenses will be decided by the courts.

Section 4: This bill will go into effect on January 1, 2017.

Section 5: Any and all parts of laws in conflict with this bill will be repealed upon passage.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
5

6 Section 1: This bill will establish a real life stimulation course throughout all public high schools in the  
7 state of Kentucky. This class will help with "real world" situations, financially, that you as a student will  
8 have to deal with, in our oncoming future, after high school.  
9

10 Section 2: In order to form the curriculum for this course, a committee will be formed consisting of  
11 educators from across the state. Selections for this committee will be chosen by the Department of  
12 Education. In order to be selected, educators will have to have a bachelor, masters, or PHD in a  
13 financial or educational field. The committee will be convened during the summer of 2018. They will  
14 have to finish the curriculum by the end of the summer. Any other decisions are delegated to the  
15 Department of Education and the committee itself.  
16


17 Section 3: Certain requirements for the curriculum development will have to be met however. These  
18 subjects will have to be included in the curriculum:

- 19 • Filing Tax Returns
- 20 • Investing & Entrepreneurship
- 21 • Retirement, Financial Planning
- 22 • Real-Life Simulation based on skills above-Mentorship  
23

24 Section 4: The funding for this bill will come from the Kentucky Department of Education. Any  
25 additional funding will be removed from the old Financial Literacy program. \$65,000-75,000 just to  
26 get the teacher and run the class, and depending on your school your teacher will be given an amount  
27 of money for their classroom like most schools typically do.  
28

29 Section 5: The penalty for any student not taking and passing this course is to take it during the  
30 summer. Any school that does not implement this program will lose funding from the State of Kentucky.  
31 We do this because if the students haven't taken this course they will not know how to do this in "the  
32 real world".

34 Section 6: This bill will go into effect at the beginning of the 2018/2019 School year/next year.

1 An act to Legalize Casino Gaming

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: According to Chapter 528 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes gambling is illegal. While casino  
6 gambling is illegal, charitable gambling is legal in Kentucky. "Gambling" means staking or risking  
7 something of value upon the outcome of a contest, game, gaming scheme, or gaming device which is  
8 based upon an element of chance, in accord with an agreement or understanding that someone will  
9 receive something of value in the event of a certain outcome. A contest or game in which eligibility to  
10 participate is determined by chance and the ultimate winner is determined by skill shall not be  
11 considered to be gambling.


12  
13 Section 2: According to USA Today in 2014, Indiana's government profited \$2.61 billion, Missouri  
14 \$1.77 billion, Illinois \$1.64 billion, West Virginia \$948 million dollars. Casinos create hotels and  
15 restaurants which create more jobs. Casinos create many jobs for unskilled employees. The large  
16 number of created jobs will strengthen Kentucky's economy. Casinos will attract more tourism, which  
17 also creates more business for Kentucky.

18  
19 Section 3: According to the information on the profits from casino gaming in our surrounding states,  
20 casino gaming in Kentucky can raise substantial money for education and addiction programs. Twenty-  
21 five percent of the profits will be given to the Department of Education to use as they see fit. In  
22 addition five percent of the profits will fund programs that treat addictions. The Legislature will decide  
23 how the money is allocated to addiction services.

24  
25 Section 4: Enforcement will come from the Department of Charitable Gaming. Violations of the casino  
26 gaming regulations will have three offenses:

- 27 • First Offense: Warning
- 28 • Second Offense: Fine of \$100,000
- 29 • Third Offense: License revoked

30  
31 Section 5: Upon passage, this bill to allow casino gaming will take effect immediately. Casinos will begin  
32 paying once they generate revenue.

2

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4


5 Section 1: This bill will limit the number of kids on a school bus, as well as creating extra space for  
6 large equipment; such as recreational items. According to the Kentucky Department of Education  
7 (education.ky.gov) we have 9,855 registered buses in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. For the safety  
8 of the students, a new ratio of student to a seat is needed - three students per seat on elementary  
9 school bus runs, and two per seat on middle school and high school bus runs. Besides a set limit of  
10 students on a school bus we need extra space as well. At least two seats on a bus (on located in the  
11 front, and one in the back) should be used solely on storing extra circular items such as large, bulky  
12 football gear, and larger instruments that cannot fit with two students.  
13

14 Section 2: This bill will provide safety for kids that ride on the school bus. With the ratio we are  
15 proposing, students will be safely seated and will not be as injured in the event of an accident. Buffer  
16 spaces on the bus will provide safety as well as convenience. Buffer spaces will allow large equipment  
17 to not block the Emergency exit, which is dangerous in an accident.  
18

19 Section 3: According to the JCPS Burks Compound, an average 22 seat bus is \$120,000. For this  
20 reason, we have purposed the ration so bus compounds do not have to spend so much of their budget  
21 on new buses when, easily, we could move kids around so we do not have to buy as many buses.  
22

23 Section 4: Setting a bill to be passed is different than making sure it truly becomes effective. For this  
24 reason, monthly camera check-ups would be needed to confirm that everyone on the bus is abiding by  
25 the law.  
26

27 Section 5: This bill will become effective at the beginning of the 2017 school year.

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5                   Section 1: The fine for illegally parking in a designated handicap space will increase from \$150 to  
6                   \$250.

7  
8                   Section 2: Additionally, fines will increase with each violation. First Offense- \$250 fine, Second  
9                   Offense- \$500 fine, Third and subsequent offenses- \$1,000 fine.

10  
11                  Section 3: Police departments state-wide will complete bi-monthly sweeps of parking lots. These  
12                  sweeps may be conducted by officers, cadets, or trained volunteers. If volunteers are utilized, they  
13                  must undergo a background check and be trained in issuing citations. Volunteers will not be  
14                  compensated.

15  
16                  Section 4: Trained volunteers that issue citations will be required to submit photographic evidence of  
17                  the presence of a disabled parking sign AND the absence of a placard or plate on the violating vehicle  
18                  along with the written citation. Volunteer-issued citations will have to be approved by the local  
19                  department, and will be mailed to the owner of the vehicle in violation.

20  
21                  Section 5: Revenue created from fines will go to certified job training for people with disabilities, as  
22                  well as training and background checks for volunteers. Any additional remaining funds at the end of the  
23                  fiscal year will go directly to the MORE THAN A CHAIR campaign.


24  
25                  Section 6: All issued placards will have a holographic image of the wheelchair symbol as well as the  
26                  driver's license number of the disabled applicant or guardian of the applicant to prove authenticity.

27  
28                  Section 7: There will be a mandatory 6-month reissuing window for ALL persons currently using a  
29                  temporary placard. This will be from July, 2017- November, 2017.

30  
31                  Section 8: Temporary placards will cost \$15 (an increase from \$0). The cost for renewal is \$10, and the  
32                  renewal period shall remain 6 months. This will amend KRS 189.456 which originally issued no fee.

33  
34                  Section 9: Placard and renewal fees will first cover the printing cost, and any additional revenue will  
35                  fund a state-wide MORE THAN A SIGN campaign.

36  
37                  Section 10: This bill will go into effect July 1, 2017.

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5  
6 Section 1: All students in the state of Kentucky will have to pass a U.S. HISTORY and BASIC CIVICS test  
7 prior to graduation.  
8

9 Section 2: The test shall consist of the 100 multiple choice questions used by the U.S. Citizenship and  
10 Immigration Services (USCIS) to grant United States Citizenship. It will be administered and scored by a  
11 school official such as a principal, assistant principal, History instructor, librarian, or guidance  
12 counselor.  
13

14 Section 3: Students must answer test questions with seventy-five percent accuracy to be considered  
15 passing.  
16

17 Section 4: Schools must offer the test twice a year, once each semester for students that are currently  
18 enrolled or have previously been enrolled in a History course. Make-up tests and/or re-takes dates will  
19 be scheduled as needed.  
20


21 Section 5: Students who fail will have the option to retake the test until they receive a passing score.  
22

23 Section 6: Students who have mental or physical disabilities will have the option to take the test with  
24 accommodations according to their Individualized Education Plan (IEP) or 504 Plan.  
25 Modifications/accommodations will be specific to each student's IEP or 504 Plan.  
26

27 Section 7: Schools may charge a fee of no more than \$1 per student to cover the cost of testing  
28 materials. This fee may only be charged once in the four years of high school enrollment.  
29

30 Section 8: Schools may NOT prevent a student from walking in graduation ceremonies; however, the  
31 diploma must be withheld until the student has passed the test with 75% accuracy.  
32

33 Section 9: Once passed, this bill will affect all graduating classes of students beginning with the Class  
34 of 2018.

6 Section 1: Districts will be required to offer First Aid, CPR and AED training for all certified and  
7 classified employees.  
8

9 Section 2: These certifications will be renewed every two years in order to maintain compliance with  
10 the American Red Cross standards.  
11

12 Section 3: School districts must schedule trainings with their local Red Cross Chapter (Louisville Area  
13 Chapter, South Central Kentucky Chapter, Western Kentucky Chapter, Bluegrass Area Chapter, Eastern  
14 Kentucky Chapter) OR arrange for teachers and staff members to take the training at a class offered  
15 locally or on-line.  
16


17 Section 4: Training sessions cost \$50 per person when a group schedules a course to be administered  
18 at the school facility by an American Red Cross representative, \$90 to take the class at a scheduled  
19 Red Cross Chapter site, or \$25 to have certified staff take the course on-line.

21 Section 5: Funding for this initiative will be generated from a .25% wholesale tax increase on beer and

11 background check and mandatory waiting period. Purchasers must be at least 18 years of age.

14 Background Check System (NICS).

16                                    Section 5: Additionally, there will be a required five business day waiting period for all firearm sales,

18                                    Section 6: All sale vouchers and information regarding NICS background checks must be filed by the  
19 licensed dealer and must be available for auditing purposes. Records must be maintained for a minimum  
20 of 5 years.

22                                    Section 7: This bill will be enforced by the Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms Bureau (ATF).

24                                    Section 8: Any gun sold at a flea market or trade day will be considered a felony offense for both the

3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4

5 Section 1: The state of Kentucky currently receives funds to provide services to the homeless from the  
6 Housing and Urban Development Department. It will be required that funds from this money be  
7 earmarked to provide portable shower units for the homeless.  
8

9 Section 2: As part of the state’s Continuum of Care plan (CoC), the state estimates the number of  
10 homeless individuals in each Kentucky county. As part of the CoC plan, each county will receive one  
11 portable shower unit the first year. Each subsequent year each county will receive additional shower  
12 units as additional funds are received through HUD. This will continue until it is determined by the  
13 Continuum of Care plan that the number of portable shower units in each county is meeting the needs  
14 of the homeless in each county. A person within the State Department of Housing and Urban  
15 Development who monitors the CoC plans will be named to oversee the provision and use of these  
16 shower units. .  
17

18 Section 3: Each county will be responsible for using the portable shower system to best meet the needs  
19 of the homeless population within their county. They will be required to establish and publish a  
20 schedule for where the portable shower(s) will be located and its operating hours. The portable showers  
21 may travel or remain in a set location. This will vary from county to county depending on its homeless  
22 population and location.  
23

24 Section 4: These funds from HUD will also be used to hire people to work to operate and clean the  
25 portable showers.  
26

27 Section 5: Each county will provide annual reports to HUD detailing how the shower(s) was used, how  
28 many people are using their portable shower systems, and an analysis of its effect on their homeless  
29 community.  
30

31 Section 6: Each county will have a year from the passage of this law to obtain their portable shower  
32 and put them into use.

An act to minimize the use of plastic bags in grocery stores.

**Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: The purpose of this bill is to reduce plastic bag pollution. By having grocery stores charge customers for using plastic, hopefully, customers will begin to use reusable canvas bags, backpacks, or totes.

Section 2: One trillion plastic bags are used worldwide every year, which is 2,000,000 plastic bags a day. Plastic bags take up to 1,000 years to break down in the landfills.


Section 3: Stores would charge customers \$.10 per plastic bag used at checkout for the first year. The charge would increase to \$.20 per bag the second year. The charge would increase to \$.25 per bag for year three.

Section 4: The Public Works Department for each county will be responsible for enforcing this bill.


Section 5: Any store not complying with this bill will be given a written warning and 60 days to comply. Any store not in compliance after the 60 days will be fined \$100 per week.

Section 6: This bill will go into effect June 1, 2017.

6 Section 1: According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, the state of Kentucky led the nation  
7 in ATV deaths for 2007-2011. Our will assist in reducing the occurrences of ATV fatalities in the state  
8 of Kentucky.

10 Section 2: We propose a bill that will require children at the age of 8 and up to take an ATV safety  
11 course. After the age of 8 minors will be required to enroll in a follow-up course every 2 years, until  
12 the age of 16, at which time they will be provided an ATV license. The ATV license must be renewed  
13 after 5 years. In order to drive or purchase an ATV you must have a license.  
14

15 Section 3: The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife will administer the course. This department is  
16 currently in charge of the issuing Kentucky Boater Education Certificates. The ATV course will be  
17 administered via online. Individuals must pass the course to be granted a Safety Certificate.

19 Section 4: If you are found riding an ATV without a license, or a Safety Certificate, you will be fined

1                   An act to ensure all Kentucky newborns are sent home to a safe environment  
2  
3                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5 Section 1: In 2013, 90% of infants who died by Sudden Unexplained Infant Death (SUID) had at least  
6 one hazardous risk factor related to their sleep space. These factors include: the baby not being put  
7 to sleep on their back; infants sleeping on a surface not intended for sleep such as an adult bed, couch,  
8 car seat or swing; sharing a bed with an adult, or pillows, blankets, or other soft bedding. 50% of  
9 infants deaths involved bed sharing. In the state of Kentucky, an infant is 70 times more likely to die a  
10 sleep-related death than in a motor vehicle accident.  
11  
12 Section 2: In Kentucky, every 5 days an infant dies in an unsafe sleep environment. Parents and  
13 caregivers need education regarding this issue and statistics show what we are providing them with  
14 now is not working. According to Kentucky Vital Statistics, SUIDs are the second leading cause of  
15 infant deaths in Kentucky children.  
16  
17 Section 3: We propose that every Kentucky infant have a home visit prior to leaving the hospital by a  
18 social worker, healthcare worker, or certified home visitor to assess for safe sleep environment and  
19 provide education to the caregivers on safe sleep. If a safe sleep environment can't be established the  
20 worker will work with the caregivers to help provide a crib through a program called Cribs for Kids.  
21 Follow up visits will be conducted weekly until the risk factors are determined to be reduced and the  
22 infant is considered to be living in a safe sleep environment. These visits can be done through the  
23 Kentucky HANDS program, local DCBS office, certified community health care workers.  
24  
25 Section 4: Each year the department of health and human services are allocated money to a maternal  
26 child health program one of the program focuses is on safe sleep environment. The money allocated to  
27 this program can be used to pay for staff salary to provide our proposed bill.  
28  
29 Section 5: We will begin our program July 1<sup>st</sup>, which is the start of budget year 2017-2018.

10 Section 2: An institution is a school or facility including, but not limited to, hospitals and facilities for  
11 the mentally disabled.

16       • Second offense - fired from the current institution

9   Section 2: This bill will be enforced by the public health inspector.  
10

11   Section 3: The cost of this bill will vary depending on each building and their personal needs. Each  
12   company will be responsible for the cost of updating their building to meet the handicapped accessible  
13   requirements.  
14


15   Section 4: The penalty for failure to comply with handicap accessibility requirements will gradually  
16   increase every three months until requirements are met. Penalties will begin with \$500 and will  
17   increase \$500 every 3 months until the fines max at \$2,000. Fines will remain at \$2,000 every three  
18   months until the company's building follows requirements.  
19

20   Section 5: This bill will go into effect on March 1, 2018 in order to give businesses enough time to  
21   raise and save the funds to make any necessary updates to their public building.

1 An act to modify the procedures for Driver's License Renewal in Kentucky for Drivers ages 60 and over  
2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5 Section 1: This bill will adjust the Kentucky Driver's License renewal process for all Kentucky residents  
6 at age 60, requiring an eye exam from a certified optometrist or ophthalmologist with each renewal.  
7 Currently, there is no further check in Kentucky on people's eyesight other than the initial DMV Vision  
8 Test. At age 76, in addition to the eye exam, drivers will be required to complete the Driving Skills test  
9 administered by Kentucky State Police driving examiner just as younger drivers are. This will occur each  
10 renewal period.  
11  
12 Section 2: All drivers 60 and over will be required to show proof of an eye exam by a certified  
13 professional within six months of license renewal.  
14  
15 Section 3: Failure to show proper eye examination paperwork will result in a fine of \$100 and the  
16 forfeiture of their Driver's License until such time that the eye examination is proven to the DMV. If a  
17 wreck occurs and the driver is shown to be non-compliant, it will result in a fine of \$200 and  
18 suspension of their Driver's License for one year. For driver's 76 years and older, failure to successfully  
19 complete the Driving Skills test will simply lead to forfeiture of their Driver's License.  
20  
21 Section 4: This law will not cost the state anything because the individual drivers will have to pay for  
22 their own eye exams. The Driving Skills exams will be scheduled in accordance with existing procedures  
23 at each county's DMV office.

3                                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4


5   Section 1: This bill will prohibit the possession of a firearm in the Commonwealth of Kentucky without  
6   proof of completion of safety training, administered by a licensed representative of the State.  
7

8   Section 2: The purpose of this law is to ensure that every gun-owning citizen in Kentucky is educated  
9   on its proper use and storage, thereby reducing deaths by accidents and incompetence. Currently, 14  
10   out of 100,000 people are killed in Kentucky by accidental or unintentionally discharging of firearms -  
11   above the national average of 10 deaths per 100,000 people.  
12


13   Section 3: If the training is provided by members of existing police forces, at an extra salary of \$5,000  
14   per officer for 120 counties, the cost of this bill in the first year will be \$1.2 million. There will be  
15   additional costs of informing current gun owners of the new requirements, either by mail or when they  
16   renew their current licenses. However, there are 2 million current registered gun owners in the  
17   Commonwealth at this time. Assuming all are compliant with the new regulations, the revenue, at \$20  
18   per license, would be \$40 million, for net revenue of \$38.8 million for the state.  
19

20   Section 4: Revenue will decline over time, as only new gun owners are added to the database. However,  
21   a penalty of \$500 imposed on someone who is found operating a gun without the required permit  
22   would help to offset this decline.  
23

24   Section 5: The penalties of this bill will go into effect one year after passage, allowing citizens time to  
25   comply. In the meantime, citizens will receive a warning citation at no charge. After a third offense, a  
26   mandatory incarceration upon conviction will be imposed.

5 Section 1: This bill will decrease road accidents due to weather by requiring digital satellite road signs  
6 to be installed instead of standard road signs on major highways in the commonwealth of Kentucky.  
7 The Department of Transportation (DOT) will assign the digital satellite road signs to major highways  
8 that have shown a history to be dangerous during inclement weather. DOT Research data on accidents  
9 will be used to pick the places where these sign will be distributed.  
10  
11 Section 2: New weather based digital satellite controlled road signs will be placed where common road  
12 signs were previously constructed on these major highways.  
13  
14 Section 3: This bill will be funded by the Kentucky Department of Transportation.  
15  
16 Section 4: This act will go into effect 6 months after this bill is passed.  
17  
18 Section 5: The Kentucky Department of Transportation will insure that all road signs are installed  
19 properly by the the due date. Anyone caught exceeding the projected speed limit will face the same  
20 consequences as though they were caught speeding on a standard road sign.

9 Section 2: The Kentucky Department of Health (KDH) will enforce this bill by reviewing insurance  
10 policies and payments made for Insulin costs. Insurance companies will be required to submit policies  
11 in writing and show proof of payments for Insulin costs. Random audits will be done by KDH on the  
12 insurance companies to make sure they are following this bill.

14 Section 3: KDH will investigate insurance companies and when they are found guilty of not following  
15 the rules of this bill the following penalties will occur:

7   Section 2: This bill will go into effect immediately, however ample time (6 weeks) will be given to the  
8   jailer to find employment.

10   Section 3: As of now there are 41 no-jail county's that still has an elected jailer, which is only a law in  
11   Kentucky.

12  
13   Section 4: Currently, no-jail jailers cost Kentucky taxpayers \$2 million dollars each year.

14  
15   Section 5: Jailers who don't have a jail to operate are paid salaries set by their fiscal courts within a  
16   state-approved range, between \$20,000 and \$70,398, their responsibilities vary from allegedly  
17   substantial to virtually nonexistent. This bill would also be enforced by the county's, or neighboring  
18   county's, court.

20   Section 6: The cost of this bill will be nothing, and the extra money that used to go to the no-jail  
21   jailers, could be used to improve drug and alcohol rehab programs for prisoners, which would create  
22   more working individuals and taxpayers.

3                                   **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: Because of an increase of deaths and drug addictions, we are asking for mandatory drug  
6 testing throughout every school in Kentucky. Kentucky is the third producer of marijuana in the United  
7 States. We believe by having mandatory drug testing, it will decrease the drug use in Kentucky and the  
8 production of drugs.


9  
10 Section 2: Currently, it cost \$10-\$50 per drug test. There are approximately 450 middle and high  
11 schools in Kentucky. If 10% of schools are randomly drug tested with 10 students, it will cost  
12 approximately \$5000 per year. We will be partners with Drug Free America and with the health  
13 insurance industry for the cost of the drug testing.

14  
15 Section 3: Just like random drug testing for athletes, we will use those medical professionals to  
16 randomly drug test the non-athletes as well as faculty and staff. The Dean of Students or Assistant  
17 Principal can randomly select students and faculty when their school is selected. No one knows about  
18 the drug test except people giving the drug test and the school administration.


19  
20 Section 4: The Department of Public Health will monitor this law.

21  
22 Section 5: A teacher caught with drugs in their system would be terminated from their position.  
23 Students with a positive drug test would receive counseling, along with their parent or guardian. The  
24 student would also receive punishment according to their school district's drug policy.

26 Section 6: This law would go into effect the year after the bill is passed.

5    Section 1: The federal Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA), provides up to 12 weeks of unpaid  
6    parental leave. Under this act, eligible employees are guaranteed their job when the leave ends.  
7

8    Section 2: By law, employees who are hurt on the job and have to go on a medical leave must receive  
9    60% of their usual salary while away from work. Employees who are eligible for FMLA leave shall be  
10    entitled to 60% of their usual salary during the FMLA leave to correspond with existing laws.  
11

12    Section 3: This applies to employees at the time of birth or adoption of a child.  
13


14    Section 4: If both parents work for the same employer, then only one may take leave at a time.  
15

16    Section 5: The law only applies to businesses with fifty or more employees.  
17

18    Section 6: All money will be provided by employers. No money will come from the Kentucky government  
19    or taxpayers.  
20

21    Section 7: To ensure compliance with this law, the Kentucky Labor Cabinet shall be empowered to  
22    investigate violations, issue penalties, and/or take the company to court.  
23

24    Section 8: This bill will take effect on the 1st of July, 2017.

1 An act to abolish underage marriage in Kentucky.

2  
3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

4  
5 Section 1: Currently in Kentucky under law KRS 402.020(1)(d) marriage between two individuals under  
6 eighteen years of age is legal if parental consent is given. If enacted this bill will prohibit the marriage  
7 of two minors, or a minor marrying an adult under any circumstances.  
8


9 Section 2: Currently in Kentucky a sexual relationship between a minor and an adult is classified as  
10 statutory rape and could lead to life imprisonment. Yet Kentucky's current marriage laws allow minors  
11 to get married to adults even though it is illegal to be in a relationship.  
12

13 Section 3: In Kentucky, marriage is defined as a socially or ritually recognized union or legal contract  
14 between spouses that establishes rights and obligations between them.  
15

16 Section 4: An infant or person who is under the age of legal competence (age 18) is considered a minor  
17 in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.  
18

19 Section 5: No additional funding will be required for this bill.  
20

21 Section 6: This bill will go into effect 30 days after passage.

1 An act to require Kentucky public schools to provide a comprehensive sex education program by  
 2 sophomore year.  
 3

4 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

5  
 6 Section 1: Every high school shall provide at least one comprehensive sex education course to be  
 7 provided for their students, to be taught in freshman or sophomore year for the classroom.  
 8

9 Section 2: This course is required to provide information on contraceptives, sexually transmitted  
 10 diseases, age of consent, and safe sex.  
 11


12 Section 3: Though required in high schools, this program and course will be highly recommended to be  
 13 taught to 7th and 8th graders in middle school.  
 14

15 Section 4: To approve these programs, we will provide permission slips for parents to sign. If they do  
 16 not sign the slip that permits their children to take part in the program, then they shall accept the  
 17 responsibility of educating their children themselves. These students will be given alternative work  
 18 instead.  
 19

20 Section 5: The money to fund these programs will be redirected from funding the Abstinence Only  
 21 programs to these programs. Any additional funding will be provided by school fundraisers, or by the  
 22 school board if necessary.  
 23

24 Section 6: If a school refuses to create and teach the program, after the first semester of non  
 25 compliance, they will receive a warning. After the second semester of non compliance, representatives  
 26 from the school board will check the school to make sure they have received adequate funding, and the  
 27 school will be assisted in teaching the program. If, by the third semester of this bill being in effect, the  
 28 school still refuses to make or put in effect this program, then representatives from the school board  
 29 will be sent to check up on the school, and teachers or school employees may be removed from their  
 30 posts where appropriate.  
 31

32 Section 9: This bill will be put into effect after the end of the 2016/2017 school semester, giving  
 33 schools enough time to create and present the program by the beginning of the 2018/2019 school  
 34 year, when the bill will be properly enforced.

1                    An act to require mental health examinations for students under the age of 18.  
2  
3                    **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**  
4  
5 Section 1: This bill will require that every two years, starting in 4th grade, before returning to school,  
6 students in Kentucky must meet with a licensed physician to check the state of their mental health.  
7  
8 Section 2: As of now, out of the 200,000 teens and children with a mental illness, only 45,000 are  
9 diagnosed. This is due to the warning signs of mental illness going unnoticed by peers,  
10 parents/guardians, and teachers. If enacted, this bill will mandate that students must receive a mental  
11 health examination.  
12  
13 Section 3: The examination will cost a similar amount to a sports physical, which typically costs no  
14 more than 35 dollars and is provided free at certain county events. If more tests become necessary due  
15 to dangerous results, most insurances cover the costs of these tests.  
16  
17 Section 4: The test will include a checklist with questions pertaining to one's mental health, based on a  
18 test made by the Mental Health Association of America. This will include questions relating to one's  
19 own opinion, the opinion of the parent/guardian, and the opinion of the doctor after the examinations  
20 completion.  
21  
22 Section 5: Professionals allowed to perform the test will be, will be doctors at a clinic, school nurses,  
23 licensed physicians, therapists, psychologists, and neurologists.  
24  
25 Section 6: If legal guardians fail to comply getting the necessary tests, the following penalties will  
26 apply:  
27                    • One month after deadline: a letter explaining the rules will be sent to the house of the student  
28                    • Two months after deadline: a meeting will be arranged with parent/guardian by the school  
29                    • Three months after deadline: a court mandate will be sent to the house of the family of the  
30 student, requiring the parent or guardian to appear before a judge.  
31  
32 Section 7: This bill will go into effect during the 2018-2019 school year.

## A Self-Guided Tour of the KENTUCKY STATE CAPITOL



### SECOND FLOOR – JUDICIAL BRANCH

- 13** From the top of the steps on the second floor, observe the view of the nave, or **Main corridor**.
- This spectacular space is over 300 feet long. It is lined with 36 huge, one piece columns made of Vermont granite. Note the colorful art skylights and grand staircase.
- Also from here you can see the murals in the lunettes on either end of the nave. Painted by Gilbert White, the murals depict moments in the early history of Kentucky.
- 14** The one over the East wing is a representation of Daniel Boone's first view of the Bluegrass region, or "beautiful level of Kentucky," in 1769.
- 15** The mural to the West shows Boone and Richard Henderson concluding the Treaty of Watauga in 1775 which allowed the Transylvania Company to purchase much of the land that is Kentucky from the Cherokee Indians.
- On the second floor of the Capitol you will notice many paintings. These are **portraits of Justices of the Kentucky Supreme Court** and Justices of the former Court of Appeals.
- 16** **Supreme Court.** Feel free to enter the room when court is not in progress.
- With its Hoduran mohogany paneling and Dutch metal leafed ceiling lacquered to resemble bronze, it is one of the most impressive and dignified spaces in the Capitol.
- 17** **State Reception Room.** (Please help us in preserving this room by remaining on the carpet runner.)
- Perhaps the most elegant room in the Capitol, the state reception room was intended as a place for special events and as the reception area for the governor's office, originally next door. Inspired by grand salons in European palaces, the room was restored in 1995 to its original grandeur. The placement of the mirrors on either end of the room creates the illusion of an infinite view, like that in the Hall of Mirrors of the Palace of Versailles in France.
- 18** Stepping outside of the State Reception Room, a small **chapel, press offices,** and the **office of the Chief Justice** (not open for tours) are on the West end of this floor.



### THIRD FLOOR – LEGISLATIVE FLOOR

- 19** **Senate chamber** (on the West end of the building). You may enter the Senate if the chamber is not in use.
- Raised galleries allow the public to view the Senate's deliberations during legislative sessions. There are desks for thirty-eight senators, who also have individual offices in the Capitol Annex.
- Please proceed to the other end of the third floor - the East end.
- 20** **House of Representatives.** You may enter the House chamber if it is not in use.
- The House of Representatives, like the Senate, also includes spectator galleries and desks for members. However, with 100 members, the size of the House requires some additional features. Votes are recorded electronically and displayed on panels on either side of the Speaker's desk. Each member of the General Assembly has a desktop computer.

**The Legislative Branch of Kentucky State Government:**

Like most states, Kentucky has a bicameral legislature - that is one with two components. The "lower" and larger body is the House of Representatives; the "upper," smaller body is the Senate. The Speaker of the House presides over that chamber, and the President of the Senate chairs deliberations there. Other legislative officials include the House and Senate majority and minority leaders. Together, the House and Senate are known as the Kentucky General Assembly. The General Assembly meets in regular session for sixty working days in even years, and for thirty working days in odd years. The governor of Kentucky can call Special Sessions to address specific issues. Legislative chambers and offices occupy the third floor of the Capitol.

At times the Capitol may be under repairs to ensure that it remains a proud symbol of Kentucky. Portions of the building may be closed to tours. Please accept our apology for any inconvenience.

### Why is Kentucky called a "Commonwealth"?

In this country, "commonwealth" is another word for "state". The term implies a commitment to the "commonweal," or common good of the people. Several states (Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, and Virginia, in addition to Kentucky) call themselves commonwealths. Since Kentucky was formed from Virginia, our state's founders decided to use the term too.

### Capitol vs. Capital.

A capitol is a building used as a headquarters of a government. A capitol houses legislative chambers and may also have courtrooms and government offices. A capital is a city that is the seat of government of a state or nation. This building is a capitol. Frankfort is a capital.
