1 An act to require recycling bins in every school in the Commonwealth of KY

3 **Be it enacted by the Youth Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky**

Section 1: This bill is to require schools across the state to provide recycling bins to enable students and school staff to recycle various materials.

Section 2: The school would pay for these recycling bins, based on the population of the school. For example, a smaller school with only two-hundred students would have less bins around campus compared to schools with two-thousand students.

Section 3: Schools would be expected to recycle aluminum, paper, plastic (bottles) and cardboard. If the costs to have the materials picked up are prohibitive, individual schools could request to choose what they could afford to recycle.

Section 4: The bins will have to be emptied out every week by waste haulers, and they will take them to a recycling mill or a MRF. Schools would be saving money because it is 36% cheaper than regular trash disposal.

Section 5: This bill would take effect at the beginning of the 2017-2018 school year.
