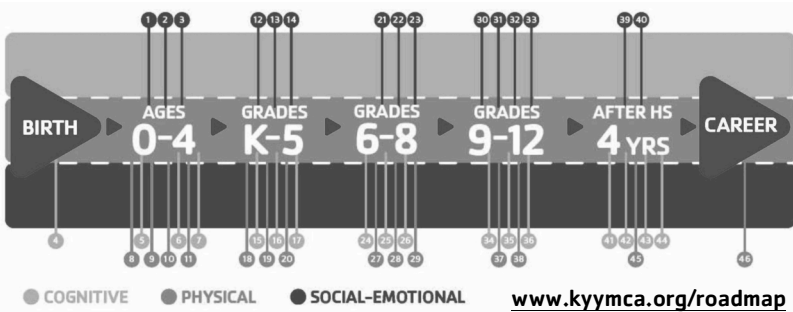

**KENTUCKY YMCA YOUTH ASSOCIATION**  
**KENTUCKY UNITED NATIONS ASSEMBLY (KUNA)**  
**STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT AND DRESS CODE**

The purpose of this Code of Conduct is to identify personal behavior that is consistent with the purpose and objectives of the Kentucky YMCA Youth Association. The items within the Code are designed to protect the welfare of the program for current participants and future generations. A participant's personal behavior reflects upon one's self, one's Student YMCA, and the Kentucky YMCA. Registration in any Kentucky YMCA conference program indicates personal acceptance of the Code of Conduct. Any student sent home for violation of this Code will be at the expense of parent or guardian.

**EXPECTATIONS OF PARTICIPANTS**

1. Each delegate shall conduct himself/herself in an orderly and responsible manner before, during, and after all functions of the Kentucky YMCA conference programs.
2. All participants share the responsibility for their actions equally when violations of the Code are witnessed. Those who choose to be present when a violation occurs and do not immediately act to remedy and report the violation shall, by their own choice, be considered participants in the violation. In relation to this Code, there are no "innocent bystanders."
3. No delegate shall participate in discrimination or harassment of any other participant. This includes protection on the basis of race, ethnicity, religion, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, or socioeconomic status.
4. No delegate shall leave a Kentucky YMCA function unless the approval of his/her advisor AND the director of the program is secured. The delegate must be picked up and returned by a parent or legal guardian who must take responsibility for the delegate in writing.
5. Each delegate is legally and financially liable for the removal, defacing, or willful damage to public or private property. Any act of vandalism, destruction of property, or misuse of a facility may be a crime and will be treated as a potential criminal violation.
6. Food (including gum and candy) and beverages other than water (including those sold by the hotel) are not permitted in any meeting sessions.
7. Cell phones, music players, or other wireless communications devices are not to be used during any meeting session.
8. The use of tobacco products, burning of incense, possession of alcoholic beverages, and the use of legal or illegal drugs not in accordance with a prescription is forbidden at any Kentucky YMCA function.
9. Youth delegates may not enter rooms other than those assigned by the Y-Staff or advisor.
10. Physical intimacy between participants of any gender is inappropriate at all times while at Kentucky YMCA Youth Association Programs and is prohibited.
11. All delegates shall be in and remain in their assigned rooms by scheduled curfew and doors shall remain closed until scheduled end of curfew.
12. Badges shall be worn ONLY by the individual whose name is on the badge. Badge switching or sharing is strictly prohibited. Participants will wear their assigned badges at all times when they are not in their sleeping rooms, and must be visible at all times. Badges are to be worn around the neck and are not to be defaced, decorated, or altered in any way. There may be a charge for replacement badges.
13. Unless there is a fire, participants will not pull the fire alarm. Pulling a fire alarm is a serious offense, and any participant who does so will be held financially and potentially criminally liable. Hotel alarms automatically summon the fire department and create a great inconvenience and fear for the hotel and other guests.
14. Use of personal vehicles by students during Kentucky YMCA conferences is strictly prohibited.
15. Weapons of any kind and items that could cause injury or damage to participants and/or property are strictly forbidden.

**VIOLATION OF EXPECTATIONS**

All violations of this code of conduct are to be brought to the attention of the Y-Staff. Participants found to be in violation of the above expectations will be subject to disciplinary actions at the discretion of advisors and the Y-Staff including but not limited to: calls to parents/guardians; incident report filed; participant sent home; school policies implemented. If state or federal law is broken, Y-Staff will notify parent/guardian and law enforcement and participant will be sent home. At all times the Y-Staff reserves the right to alter disciplinary actions at their discretion.

**ROOMING POLICY**

I understand that conference delegates are typically housed four (4) to each room and that in order to participate in this program; I must share a room and bed with at least one other student of the same sex from my delegation. I may be roomed with students of the same sex from another delegation, in which case I will not share a bed with a person from another delegation. I further understand that I may not room with anyone other than YMCA conference delegates -- not an advisor, parents, or other relatives -- without expressed notarized\* parental consent (\*notarization only required if student rooms with adult other than parent/legal guardian), and permission of Executive Director of the Kentucky YMCA. I also understand that I may not room alone.

**REFUND POLICY**

I understand that all fees are non-refundable. In the case of extenuating circumstances, a portion of the payment may be refunded by action of the Executive Director based upon written request from the student or parent.



**PARTICIPANT DRESS CODE**

KUNA is a professional development experience. While at KUNA, students are expected to abide by the following dress code. # UN UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS

## **Preamble**

Whereas recognition of the inherent dignity and of the equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human family is the foundation of freedom, justice and peace in the world,

Whereas disregard and contempt for human rights have resulted in barbarous acts which have outraged the conscience of mankind, and the advent of a world in which human beings shall enjoy freedom of speech and belief and freedom from fear and want has been proclaimed as the highest aspiration of the common people,

Whereas it is essential, if man is not to be compelled to have recourse, as a last resort, to rebellion against tyranny and oppression, that human rights should be protected by the rule of law,

Whereas it is essential to promote the development of friendly relations between nations,

Whereas the peoples of the United Nations have in the Charter reaffirmed their faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person and in the equal rights of men and women and have determined to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom,

Whereas Member States have pledged themselves to achieve, in cooperation with the United Nations, the promotion of universal respect for and observance of human rights and fundamental freedoms,

Whereas a common understanding of these rights and freedoms is of the greatest importance for the full realization of this pledge,

Now, therefore, The General Assembly,

Proclaims this Universal Declaration of Human Rights as a common standard of achievement for all peoples and all nations, to the end that every individual and every organ of society, keeping this Declaration constantly in mind, shall strive by teaching and education to promote respect for these rights and freedoms and by progressive measures, national and international, to secure their universal and effective recognition and observance, both among the peoples of Member States themselves and among the peoples of territories under their jurisdiction.

## **Article 1**

All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood.

## **Article 2**

Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration, without distinction of any kind, such as race, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status.

Furthermore, no distinction shall be made on the basis of the political, jurisdictional or international status of the country or territory to which a person belongs, whether it be independent, trust, non-self-governing or under any other limitation of sovereignty.

## **Article 3**

Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person.

## **Article 4**

No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms.

## **Article 5**

No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.

## **Article 6**

Everyone has the right to recognition everywhere as a person before the law.

## **Article 7**

All are equal before the law and are entitled without any discrimination to equal protection of the law. All are entitled to equal protection against any discrimination in violation of this Declaration and against any incitement to such discrimination.

## **Article 8**

Everyone has the right to an effective remedy by competent national tribunals for acts violating the fundamental rights granted by the constitution or law.

## **Article 9**

No one shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest, detention or exile.

## **Article 10**

Everyone is entitled in full equality to a fair and public hearing by an independent and impartial tribunal, in the determination of his rights and obligations and of any criminal charge against him.

## **Article 11**

1. Everyone charged with a penal offence has the right to be presumed innocent until proved guilty according to law in a public trial at which he has had all the guarantees necessary for his defence.
2. No one shall be held guilty of any penal offence on account of any act or omission which did not constitute a penal offence, under national or international law, at the time when it was committed. Nor shall a heavier penalty be imposed than the one that was applicable at the time the penal offence was committed.

## **Article 12**

No one shall be subjected to arbitrary interference with his privacy, family, home or correspondence, nor to attacks upon his honour and reputation. Everyone has the right to the protection of the law against such interference or attacks.

## **Article 13**

1. Everyone has the right to freedom of movement and residence within the borders of each State.
2. Everyone has the right to leave any country, including his own, and to return to his country.

## **Article 14**

1. Everyone has the right to seek and to enjoy in other countries asylum from persecution.
2. This right may not be invoked in the case of prosecutions genuinely arising from non-political crimes or from acts contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.

**Article 15**

1. Everyone has the right to a nationality.
2. No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his nationality nor denied the right to change his nationality.

**Article 16**

1. Men and women of full age, without any limitation due to race, nationality or religion, have the right to marry and to found a family. They are entitled to equal rights as to marriage, during marriage and at its dissolution.
2. Marriage shall be entered into only with the free and full consent of the intending spouses.
3. The family is the natural and fundamental group unit of society and is entitled to protection by society and the State.

**Article 17**

1. Everyone has the right to own property alone as well as in association with others.
2. No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his property.

**Article 18**

Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion; this right includes freedom to change his religion or belief, and freedom, either alone or in community with others and in public or private, to manifest his religion or belief in teaching, practice, worship and observance.

**Article 19**

Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right includes freedom to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers.

**Article 20**

1. Everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and association.
2. No one may be compelled to belong to an association.

**Article 21**

1. Everyone has the right to take part in the government of his country, directly or through freely chosen representatives.
2. Everyone has the right to equal access to public service in his country.
3. The will of the people shall be the basis of the authority of government; this will shall be expressed in periodic and genuine elections, which shall be by universal and equal suffrage and shall be held by secret vote or by equivalent free voting procedures.

**Article 22**

Everyone, as a member of society, has the right to social security and is entitled to realization, through national effort and international co-operation and in accordance with the organization and resources of each State, of the economic, social and cultural rights indispensable for his dignity and the free development of his personality.

**Article 23**

1. Everyone has the right to work, to free choice of employment, to just and favourable work conditions and to protection against unemployment.
2. Everyone, without any discrimination, has the right to equal pay for equal work.
3. Everyone who works has the right to just and favourable remuneration ensuring for himself and his family an existence worthy of human dignity, and supplemented, if necessary, by other means of social protection.
4. Everyone has the right to form and to join trade unions for the protection of his interests.

**Article 24**

Everyone has the right to rest and leisure, including reasonable limitation of working hours and periodic holidays with pay.

**Article 25**

1. Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control.
2. Motherhood and childhood are entitled special care and assistance. All children, born in or out of wedlock, shall enjoy the same social protection.

**Article 26**

1. Everyone has the right to education. Education shall be free, at least in the elementary and fundamental stages. Elementary education shall be compulsory. Technical and professional education shall be made generally available and higher education shall be equally accessible to all on the basis of merit.
2. Education shall be directed to the full development of the human personality and to the strengthening of respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms. It shall promote understanding, tolerance and friendship among all nations, racial or religious groups, and shall further the activities of the United Nations for the maintenance of peace.
3. Parents have a prior right to choose the kind of education that shall be given to their children.

**Article 27**

1. Everyone has the right freely to participate in cultural life of community, to enjoy the arts and share in scientific advancement and its benefits.
2. Everyone has the right to the protection of the moral and material interests resulting from any scientific, literary or artistic production of which he is the author.

**Article 28**

Everyone is entitled to a social and international order in which the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration can be fully realized.

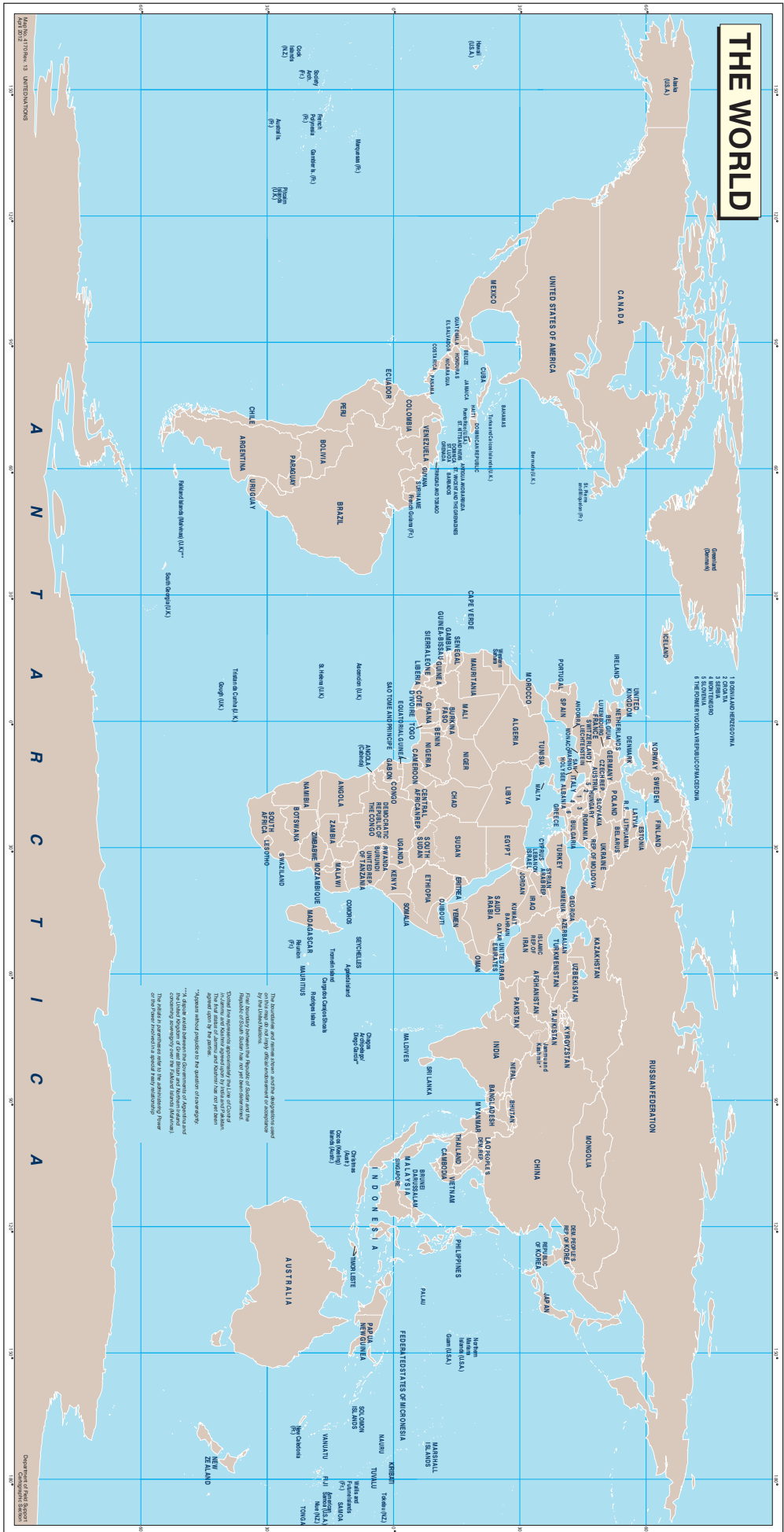
**Article 29**

1. Everyone has duties to the community in which alone the free and full development of his personality is possible.
2. In the exercise of his rights and freedoms, everyone shall be subject only to such limitations as are determined by law solely for the purpose of securing due recognition and respect for the rights and freedoms of others and of meeting the just requirements of morality, public order and the general welfare in a democratic society.
3. These rights and freedoms may in no case be exercised contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.

**Article 30**

Nothing in this Declaration may be interpreted as implying for any State, group or person any right to engage in any activity or to perform any act aimed at the destruction of any of the rights and freedoms set forth herein.

**Adopted by the UN General Assembly on 10 December 1948**

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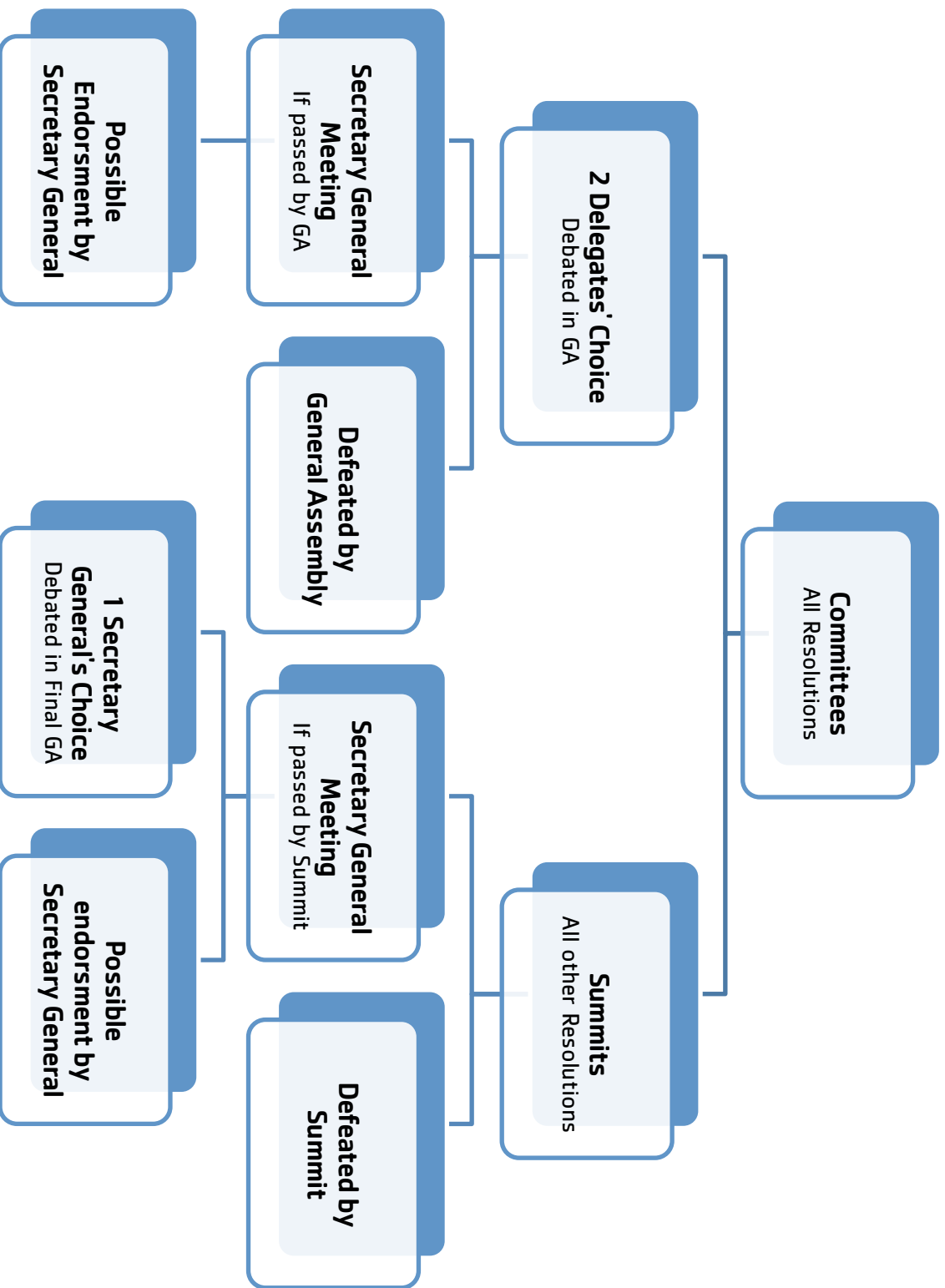

5 Realizing the current system of waste disposal is incomplete, that the W.O.D.A. in place, in addition to being

6 environmentally harmful, makes it so that stocks scheduled for destruction must be held for an inordinate

7 amount of time, typically in excess of a year, until final authorization can be achieved for their destruction,

9 Observing that these stocks are occupying badly needed warehouse space and thereby reducing the flow

10 capacity of the main medicine supply. Improper monitoring and written procedures give room for damaged,

11 used, or expired products to be filtered back into the market,

13 Observing that these issues are due to a poorly constructed write-off disposal authorization (W.O.D.A.) system,

14 we recommend a new, global, W.O.D.A. be implemented. The W.O.D.A. is a system that ensures that potentially

15 unsafe pharmaceutical products are removed from public and patient access and destroyed. The W.O.D.A. also

16 ensures that an accurate accounting of the process is undertaken to comply with the G.A.P., and that all

17 necessary records reflect the process in an open and transparent way. In addition the W.O.D.A. is a guideline for

18 seeing which pharmaceuticals need to be destroyed,

20 Recalling a quote from Waste Management of Pharmaceuticals in Afghanistan by WHO "The current system of

21 waste disposal is viewed as being substantially dysfunctional,"

19 once cultivated sugarcane and other food items. Barbados is experiencing severe soil erosion and this  
20 program will help combat this major issue;

22 2. Barbados already has 37,000 acres set aside for farming that is not being used. The Ministry of  
23 Agriculture of Barbados will sponsor this program to ensure that no environmental laws are broken. The  
24 initial startup cost is not set because of what crops need to be grown at what time. However, overtime  
25 this program will pay for itself. This program will be implemented 1 month after the passage of this  
26 resolution;

28 3. This resolution is crucial to Barbados's economy, due to the fact that tourism is an unstable source of  
29 income and is unable to support the country alone. By implementing Build Barbados, it will create jobs  
30 that are essential in tackling the unemployment rate with is soared to 15%. Worldwide this program will

5 Convinced that there are a number of people from Syria who are forcibly displaced owing to conflict,  
6 persecution, and violence,  
7  
8 Recalling that, in 1960, Brazil enacted legislation approving the 1951 Geneva Convention relating to the Status  
9 of Refugees,  
10  
11 Reaffirming that a Brazilian Resolution from 1997, determines that the Ministry of Justice, in order to  
12 safeguard the national interests may grant a permanent visa to an alien with refugee and asylum status,  
13  
14 Conscious that in 1981, Decree No. 86,715 determines that a permanent visa may be granted to an alien who  
15 intends to establish permanent residency in the country,  
16  
17 Bearing in mind to obtain a permanent visa, an alien must meet special requirements provided for the selection  
18 of immigrants established by the Brazilian Natl. Council of Immigration, and present required documentation,  
19  
20 Determined to achieve the support of the world community for a more uniform policy to strengthen the  
21 international protection of refugees and assist Governments in meeting their protection responsibilities,  
22  
23 1. Welcomes the important work undertaken by the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for  
24 Refugees and its Executive Committee, which is aimed at strengthening the international protection  
25 regime and at assisting Governments in meeting their protection responsibilities;  
26  
27 2. Encourages Member Countries that have not yet signed or ratified the Brazil Union Convention for the  
28 Protection and Assistance of Internally Displaced Persons in Brazil to consider doing so as early as  
29 possible in order to ensure its wider implementation;  
30  
31 3. Calls upon the international community, including the Office of the High Commissioner and other  
32 relevant United Nations organizations, within their respective mandates, to take concrete action to  
33 meet the protection and assistance needs of refugees, returnees and displaced persons and to  
34 contribute generously to projects and programs aimed at alleviating their plight, facilitating durable  
35 solutions for refugees and displaced persons and supporting vulnerable local host communities;  
36  
37 4. Request the international donor community to provide material and financial assistance for the  
38 implementation of programs intended for the rehabilitation of the environment and infrastructure  
39 affected by refugees in countries of asylum as well as internally displaced persons, where appropriate;

41 5. Urges the international community, in the spirit of international solidarity and burden-sharing, to

15 coverage would increase,

17 Emphasizing the uses of contraceptives and sex education on reducing family sizes, and giving women the  
18 opportunity to enter the workforce creating an economic advantage,

20 Affirming the role of medical clinics throughout rural areas in providing medical examinations, family planning,  
21 prescriptions, and treatments to decrease the overall healthcare gap,

23 1. Calls upon the United Nations to fund 5 clinics throughout rural Cambodia, costing approximately \$2  
24 million total, out of the \$4.4 billion fund for world healthcare;

17 Determined to prevent human rights violations committed against migrant workers in future construction  
18 endeavors that relate to multinational sporting events,

20 1. Calls upon the International Olympic Committee to hold host countries accountable for deaths and  
21 human rights violations associated with the construction of Olympic Facilities;
- 22  
23 2. Trusts the UN International Labor Organization to keep a record of the death toll for workers and  
24 human rights violations during the construction of Olympic facilities;
- 25  
26 3. Designates that the UN International Labor Organization set forth a list of international safety  
27 requirements related to the construction of international sporting facilities;
- 28  
29 4. Further recommends that the International Olympic Committee require any country in consideration as

Creation of Renewable Energy

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The General Assembly,


Recognizing that according to the World Energy Outlook Organization in 2016, nearly two billion people in developing countries do not have access to electricity,

Conscious that In a booming global economy, the importance of energy has exponentially increased; countries with inadequate energy lack basic services such as health care and education and without power, developing countries fail to contribute to the global society even with an abundance of natural resources,

Bearing in mind that former UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon launched an initiative in 2011 called "Sustainable Energy for All,"

Convinced that after conducting a cost-benefit analysis of solar power and finding that solar power is and untapped, incredibly profitable venture in the African continent due to the fact that the continent receives more than 11 hours of sunlight a day,


1. Calls upon the General Assembly to allocate funds to construct eight solar stations around the world;
2. Seeks to build these massive stations throughout Africa on the outskirts of major cities since 95% of the people without electricity are in Africa;
3. Urges that upon completion of our test project, we would look to expand our solar stations to other areas (Caribbean and South Asia) that are also in need of energy;
4. On a per-cell basis, the benefits of solar power are enormous. With a 1,552% return on investment, solar power is incredibly profitable. Each cell costs \$25,000; each cell produces \$388,067.50 over the expected twenty five year lifetime, putting the cost per watt at \$0.003. This source of energy is much cheaper and cleaner than fossil fuel powered electricity, which has an average cost of \$ 0.12.

Condemns that in Ecuador it is illegal to obtain an abortion for any reason other than if it is a threat to the health or life of a pregnant women,

Reaffirming that this ban is in violation of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (Article 8 Section A) as well as the Covenant,

Considering the grave mental repercussions of undergoing rape induced pregnancies and 2 years of incarceration for those who undergo illegal abortions,

Fully aware of the UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon’s advisory opinion in the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, which promotes female reproductive rights,

1. Supports that action be taken within Ecuadorian and other Latin American school systems to educate children on sexual education and prevention;

Eliminating Harmful Ship Disposal

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The General Assembly,

Fully aware of health, safety and environmental concerns associated with the disposal of ships, including the dangerous current state of recycling and the removal of hazardous materials from such ships,

Condemning hazardous conditions for workers and the effects of wasteful materials on surrounding populations, in addition to adverse effects on the environment,

Aiming to prevent, reduce, and eradicate accidents, injuries, deaths, and negative effects on humans and the environment when ships are recycled,

Endorsing the precedent set by the Hong Kong International Convention for the Safe and Environmentally Sound Recycling of Ships, which states that ships sent for recycling must carry an inventory of hazardous conditions (i.e. asbestos, PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls), heavy metals and oils such as residual fuels) and that shipyards must have a Ship Recycling Plan based on its particulars and inventory,

1. Requests that such a precedent is expanded upon, in that all ships in operation keep a current inventory of hazardous conditions, updated annually, excluding residentially owned ships and any ship under 500 tonnes, and that the aforementioned ship owners minimize the amounts of operationally produced waste leading up to disposal;
2. Recommends that ship disposal takes place at any pre-approved ship recycling yard and that in order to get onto such a list, a ship recycling plant must submit an application for approval to the International Maritime Organization (IMO), a sub-branch of the UN;
3. Calls For mandatory protective gear and 30 hours of training for workers at such plants, including, but not limited to: protective eyewear, respirators, hard-hats, chemical-resistant gloves and boots;
4. Additionally Requests that each state, recognizing the benefits of marine regulation to themselves, take measures to prevent circumvention of this resolution in order to enhance transparency of ship recycling. Thus, states should report information collected regarding illegal ship recycling and follow-up actions they have taken biannually;
5. Authorizes the IMO to enforce this resolution, with the following punishments: First offense: Fee equal to 110% of the current value of the ship to be disposed; Second offense: 125% of ship's value fee and/or jail time based on judge's discretion; Third offense: Loss of operating license;
6. Notes that the resolution will go into effect on January 1, 2025.

Requests that United Nations member states comply with the Roundtable on Sustainable Palm Oil’s (RSPO) guidelines some of which include compliance with applicable laws and regulations, commitment to long-term economic and financial viability, use of appropriate best practices by growers and millers, environmental responsibility and conservation of natural resources and biodiversity, responsible consideration of employees and of individuals and communities affected by growers and mills;
2. Calls Upon member states that produce more than 200,000 metric tons of palm oil annually to subsidize \$265 USD per square mile of land used for palm oil production in order to protect the environment and aide the economy;
3. Seeks the collaboration of UN member states and the United Nations Environmental Programme (UNEP) to form a committee to oversee countries’ subsidization of sustainably produced palm oil.

Increasing the Penalties of Illegal Drug Trafficking

5 Recognizing that the refugee crisis affects people from all countries. 60 million people have been forcibly  
6 displaced from their homes across the world, according to United Nations High Commission,

7  
8 Reaffirming the special status of refugees outlined in the 1951 Geneva Convention at which Luxembourg was  
9 instrumental, emphasizing that more developed countries accept higher quotas of refugees, such as Germany  
10 accepting 1 million in 2015, Canada 280,000-305,000 in 2016, Australia accepting 13,750 in 2016-2017,  
11 Luxembourg accepting 4,000 in 2016, Brazil accepting 8,800 in 2016, South Africa accepting 222,000 in  
12 2009, and United States accepting 85,000 in 2016,

13  
14 Conscious that many countries already have plans to increase acceptance of refugees to date, such as Germany,  
15 Canada planning to accept another 300,000 in 2017, Australia increasing acceptance to 18,750 in 2018-  
16 2019, and the United States in 2016 projected the acceptance of 110,000 in 2017 but presently plans to  
17 decrease refugee numbers. All developed nations need to continue to make strides to accommodate the  
18 projected number of future resettlement needs, which is 1.19 million in 2017,


19  
20 Determined to assist refugees around the world,

- 21  
22 1. Reminds developing nations to adhere to the Geneva Convention;
- 23  
24 2. Calls upon developed nations to increase the number of refugees they house or provide funding for  
25 other nations to house them, such as, the UN and/or the EU funding many less developed countries;
- 26  
27 3. Requests regulations including environment, sustainable living, housing, and quotas will be determined  
28 and managed by sponsored professionals.

5 Declares accordingly that Mongolia lacks an urban population or any major site of urban growth as confirmed by  
6 the fact that just over 2,000,000 people live in urban areas,

8 Emphasizing that Mongolia also lacks prosperous economic growth as well as having a GDP of only about 11.5  
9 billion USD,

11 Recalling that the UN and Mongolia have worked together before to promote socio-economic development,

13 Fully Aware that Mongolia serves as a border state between Russia and China, two world powers, who are at  
14 odds with each other,

33 military strength;

39 4. Draws the attention of the UN to recognize that if this resolution is not passed, Mongolia will annex the

5 Taking note of the alarming number of child marriages in many developing countries,  
6  
7 Convinced that it is vital to address child marriage in order to fulfill the United Nations goal of gender equality,  
8  
9 Recalling the United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights clearly states "Marriage shall be entered  
10 into only with the free and full consent of the intending spouses",  
11  
12 Fully aware that in countries where education of women has been improved, the occurrence of child marriages  
13 has declined,  
14  
15 1. Calls upon the United Nations General Assembly to allocate funds for the Commission on the Status of  
16 Women (CSW) in order to implement programs to protect child brides and prevent future child marriages  
17 in the developing world;  
18  
19 2. Requests that in developing countries the CSW works with governments to better enforce existing laws  
20 against child marriages and create laws against it if such laws do not already exist;

22 3. Urges the CSW to direct increased funding toward the creation and dissemination of social programs to  
23 teach women about reproductive health and career opportunities in an effort to dismantle the traditions

1                   Implementing easier access to health care infrastructure in rural areas of Nicaragua.  
2  
3    The General Assembly,  
4  
5    Seeing in Nicaragua there is a lack of health care infrastructure in the rural areas resulting in high mortality  
6    rates due to minimal access to care. This is a weighing concern with nearly half the population living outside of  
7    the urban areas,  
8  
9    Taking this into consideration, UNOPS (United Nations Office of Project Services) and the Nicaraguan Ministry  
10   of Health will partner and implement 2 centers for each of the 15 regions of Nicaragua resulting in 30 new  
11   centers throughout the country, allowing easier access to treatment. This program is modeled after a resolution  
12   that was implemented in Myanmar during the 2012 session,  
13  
14       1. The facilities will include examination rooms, delivery rooms, and administrative workspace;  
15  
16       2. The construction of the facilities will cost \$450 million. Each year \$6 million is provided from UNOPS to  
17       Nicaraguan health care. The remainder of the cost will be provided by the Nicaraguan Ministry of Health  
18       along with other international aid;  
19  
20       3. Training for new medical personnel as well as facility managers will be provided through UNOPS. UNOPS  
21       will effectively train hospital management on decision making and financial planning. Doctors and nurses  
22       will be trained on how to properly use new medical equipment.

1 Establishment of HIV/AIDS Prevention and Treatment Centers Throughout Sub-Saharan Africa  
2  
3 The General Assembly,  
4  
5 Deeply concerned that more than 24.7 million people are living with HIV/AIDS in Sub-Saharan Africa and that  
6 there are approximately 1.5 million new infections each year,  
7  
8 Deeply disturbed that there are over 1.1 million AIDS related deaths in Sub-Saharan Africa and only 39% of  
9 adults with HIV/AIDS in Sub-Saharan Africa are on antiviral treatment,  
10  
11 Noting with deep concern that Nigeria has the second largest HIV/AIDS epidemic in the world, with about 3.2  
12 million people living with HIV/AIDS; 227,000 new infections per year; and around 60% of new infections in  
13 Western and Central Africa taking place in Nigeria,  
14  
15 Recognizing that UNAIDS' Target 1 for 2020 is "90% of people (children, adolescents and adults) living with HIV  
16 know their status, 90% of people living with HIV who know their status are receiving treatment, and 90% of  
17 people on treatment have suppressed viral loads",  
18  
19 Observing that UNAIDS' Target 4 for 2020 is "90% of women and men, especially young people and those in  
20 high-prevalence settings, have access to HIV combination prevention and sexual/reproductive health services",  
21  
22 Conscious that UNAIDS' Target 6 for 2020 is "90% of key populations, including sex workers, men who have  
23 sex with men, people who inject drugs, transgender people and prisoners, as well as migrants, have access to  
24 HIV combination prevention services",  
25  
26 1. Calls upon the United Nations Program on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) to build and staff five clinics/resource  
27 centers in Nigeria - each clinic will be built on 300 square meters of land and each clinic will be 1-story;  
28  
29 2. Demands UNAIDS to staff each clinic with three Nigerian doctors paid on a fixed income, as well as  
30 staff each clinic with one Nigerian teacher to educate communities on HIV/AIDS, and both doctors and  
31 teachers are to be paid the average annual salary that their country provides  
32  
33 3. Requests UNAIDS supply each clinic with 10 hospital beds or examination tables and an additional  
34 budget of \$50,000 allocated for additional needed supplies;  
35  
36 4. Urges UNAIDS to provide at least 2,000 condoms annually to each clinic as a preventative method;  
37  
38 5. Encourages UNAIDS provide up to 7,500 HIV/AIDS positive people between all 5 clinics with  
39 antiretroviral therapy;  
40  
41 6. Demands UNAIDS maintain a \$7,500,000 annual budget to fund all five clinics with the money being  
42 allotted from the UNAIDS strategy 2016-2021;  
43  
44 7. Authorizes UNAIDS to have constructed, staffed, and supplied all five clinics by 1 January 2018.

5 Keeping in mind that, on average, over 5,000 women are killed every year in the country of Pakistan. Their

8 Pakistani women constantly fall victim to honor killings when family and friends feel that their actions are  
9 "dishonoring" them,

11 Being aware that, every day, the women of Pakistan are psychologically damaged, degraded and killed by  
12 becoming victims of bride burnings, acid throwings, breast ironings, mutation of the nose, forced marriages,  
13 forced pregnancy, rape, bride kidnapping, child marriage, and honor killings,


14  
15 Recognizing that these same women live in a place of constant fear and inevitable violence due to the real  
16 influence of groups such as the Taliban that do not believe girls should be permitted to get an education,

17  
18 Helping these women become free of any violence will empower them to help others bring Pakistan women into  
19 the 21st Century of being able to function as a productive citizen of Pakistan,

- 20  
21 1. A national "underground" railroad may be setup to provide protection from domestic violence offenders  
22 and to integrate women that are victims back into society or escape "underground" through the NGO;
- 23 a. A non-government organization (NGO) would coordinate all of the tasks including setting up a  
24 private shelter to house the women.
  - 25 b. Money will come through private international donations.
  - 26 c. Services would be partnered with South Asian countries who have the same problems
  - 27 d. Services and volunteers would come from the AWID (the Association of Women's Rights in  
28 Development) a women's rights group that helps with issues on a global scale with branches of  
29 offered services that provide aid (this service would come to no cost to the UN).

1 Curtailing of Nuclear Testing

3 The General Assembly,


4  
5 Further deploring the heinous action of nuclear testing for the reason that there has been over 2,053 nuclear  
6 test explosions which has led to a staggering number of deaths. Over 1.5 million people alone have deceased  
7 from the radiation of the bomb, let alone the actual number of deaths that these atrocious weapons have  
8 caused. The use of nuclear weapons is a violent and cruel method of power but can be stopped if we work

11 Emphasizing that the United Nations has adopted the first resolution the UN General Assembly in 1946, as well

24 1. Calls upon the United Nations, particularly the Security Council, to form a special task force in order to  
25 delve and investigate the manufacturing and testing of nuclear warheads;
- 26  
27 2. Further recommends the special task force be made up of a nonbiased elected representative from  
28 every country. The collaboration of countries to make up this force will provide a common goal for the  
29 separate nations;
- 30  
31 3. Declares accordingly that if any country is found guilty of the production and testing of nuclear  
32 weapons, though accurate evidence, than a certain sanction will be put against them for a failure to  
33 comply with the assembly of nations;
- 34  
35 4. Urges the sanctions be binding for all nations. A united front is the only way to reduce the amount of  
36 nuclear warheads in the world;
- 37  
38 5. Expresses the hope that the special task force will be put in place in no less than 2 years, which allows  
39 all countries to find the perfect candidate for their position. The forces shall be located in the  
40 International United Nations headquarters in New York City.

Regulating the International Management of Refugees

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The General Assembly,  
 Convinced that all refugee crises are matters of international concern,  
 Aware that there is no current policy to ensure the sustainable, reasonable, and safe relocation of refugees with concerns for the impacts refugees have on the local, national, and global economies and natural resources,  
 Determined that continuation of the current systems for management of refugees would violate the ideas set forth in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights,  
 Reaffirming that the standardization for the management of refugees is supported by concepts outlined in the UN Charter,  
 Recognizing that standardized management of refugee crises is not an overstep of UN authority, but rather an agreement between countries of the UN to see refugees as a global concern where all nations must be willing to assist or be assisted,  
 Understanding that refugees are unwanted by some nations due to fear of foreigners held by the people of those nations,  
 Taking into Consideration that the current immigration policies of some nations may prohibit the acceptance of refugees,

1. Demands that the UN develop a standard policy for the international management of refugees by nations;
2. Encourages nations to continue their current methods until the standardized process is fully developed and implemented;
3. Requests that the UN decide to distribute refugees throughout many nations, allowing nations to take in as many refugees as possible without great potential for damage to a nation's economy or sustainability of natural resources, as well as considering the population's ability to accept the amount of refugees into their livelihoods;
4. Further invites UN nations unwilling to accept mass amounts of refugees to instead assist refugee management through donation of money/resources to a fund developed for refugee integration, held/managed by the UN;
5. Urges that the distribution of refugees simply aligns with the ideals of utilitarianism, ensuring a result of the greatest good for the greatest number of people;
6. Endorses the development of integration policies and methods concerning the potentially reluctant acceptance of refugees into a nation's general populous, created and monitored as seen best fit by individual nations;
7. Trusts that the United Nations will understand the differences between nations regarding economies, natural resources, land area, natural resources, populations, and employment opportunities, and will take these factors into account when deciding the appropriate amount of refugees a nation can sustainably accept;
8. Further resolves that decisions regarding the appropriate amount of refugees to be accepted by a nation are made by a committee developed within the United Nations which shall take each nation's aforementioned factors into account as well as a nation's political stability and international relations;
9. Notes that policies laid out by this resolution and the decisions of the committee will have no bearing over a nation's right to handle their own management of voluntary immigrants and that all policies will be enforced only in times of serious refugee crises, which will be recognized by the committee and acted upon as deemed necessary;
10. Accepts that the United Nations will implement a standardized method for the management of refugees on January 1, 2019 but that the policies may not be enforced until deemed needed by the committee.

1                   Reaffirming the Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW)  
2  
3    The General Assembly,  
4  
5    Deeply concerned by the general treatment of women in Vietnam in terms of their conditions in the labor force,  
6    statistics of sexual and physical assault, and gender imbalance in population,  
7  
8    Having examined the statistics that showcase that in the labor force, women make up 49% of the general  
9    workforce, but only make up 20% of the country's national income. 63% of women also lacked protection of  
10   labor by contract (2014).In addition, abortion rates are some of the highest in Vietnam because of the male  
11   preference among families, which creates a gender imbalance in population. In 2010, studies proved that 58%  
12   of women had reported at least one form of assault or violence,  
13  
14   It is rather alarming that the ratification of CEDAW, or the Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination  
15   Against Women, has been unenforced and ineffective in Vietnam,  
16  
17   Determined to reinforce CEDAW, which was instituted in 1981, which would increase the quality of life for  
18   women in Vietnam and other countries that have also signed CEDAW into place,  
19  
20   Recognizing that the UN Declaration of Human Rights states in Article 7, "All are equal before the law and are  
21   entitled without any discrimination to equal protection of the law. All are entitled to equal protection against  
22   any discrimination in violation of this Declaration and against any incitement to such discrimination,"  
23  
24   Noting further that the UNDHR also states in Article 25, "Everyone has the right to a standard of living  
25   adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and  
26   medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness,  
27   disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control,"  
28  
29   Believing that, by agreeing to these articles and leaving CEDAW unenforced, the UN is not fulfilling the promises  
30   made to billions of women around the world,  
31  
32   Recalling Resolution 2122, adopted by the Security Council in 2013, United Nations states were urged to  
33   increase gender equality among women and girls in order to ensure a more peaceful world for all,  
34  
35        1. Reminds the UN of the deplorable condition and treatment of women in Vietnam and across the world;  
36  
37        2. Calls upon all UN members to remember these women and the promises made in CEDAW to protect their  
38        freedoms;  
39  
40        3. Requests that said UN members review and make efforts to create better conditions in their own  
41        countries;  
42  
43        4. Emphasizes that the success of women contributes to the success of all people, no matter their gender,  
44        race, age, or religions affiliations.
