Protecting Women in the Workplace

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The General Assembly,

The Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women held in 1989 addressed the issue of sexual harassment and acknowledged it as a form of violence against women. It called all parties to take legal action and manners necessary to effectively provide protection for women.

3.1.3.1 The Constitution of the Kingdom of Cambodia While the constitution does not explicitly address sexual harassment, several articles are relevant to the protection of women against sexual harassment. These articles are as follows:


Article 31: The Kingdom of Cambodia shall recognize and respect human rights as stipulated in the United Nations Charter, the Universal Declaration of Human rights, the covenants and conventions related to human rights, women’s and children’s rights.

Article 38: The law forbids any physical abuse against any individual. The law protects the life, the honor and the dignity of the citizens.

Article 45: All forms of discrimination against women shall be abolished. • The exploitation of women’s labor shall be prohibited.

Article 46: Human trafficking, exploitation of prostitution and obscenities which affect the dignity of women shall be prohibited.

Platform for Action, which outlines strategic objectives and actions to be taken by a range of actors. The Platform includes provisions on sexual harassment in the workplace. It defines the problem as a form of both violence against women and a barrier to their equality, stating “the experience of sexual harassment is an affront to a worker’s dignity and prevents women from making a contribution commensurate with their abilities.” The Platform further calls on governments, trade unions, employers, community and youth organisations, and NGOs to eliminate sexual harassment. Our resolution calls on the United Nations to uphold their Platform for Action by providing funds for local Non governmental organizations, such as the CARE organization in Cambodia, to allow education to be given to women on the laws and actions allowed to them if sexually harassed in them workplace. Sexual harassment laws vary from country to country therefore each organization will be creating their own curriculum. With this small amount of funding, women in these countries will be more likely to be confident in standing up for themselves and knowing what actions to take if they were to receive this type of treatment in the workplace.

5 According to the Center for Biological Diversity there are an estimated 15-51 trillion pieces of plastics in the
6 ocean making up 40% of the surface of the ocean. Estimates say that by 2050 there will be more plastic in the
7 ocean than fish. According to Sea Turtle Conservatory five species of sea turtles are endangered due to several
8 factors including ocean pollution. A UN study has shown that plastic has caused 8 billion (U.S. dollars) in
9 damage to marine ecosystems. Up to 80 per cent of all litter in our oceans is made of plastic The UN has
10 already begun a clean up project called #CleanSeas. Which urges governments to pass plastic reduction policies;
11 targeting industry to minimize plastic packaging and redesign products; and calling on consumers to change
12 their throwaway habits – before irreversible damage is done to our seas. Ten countries have already joined the
13 campaign with far-reaching pledges to turn the plastic tide. Indonesia has committed to slash its marine litter
14 by a massive 70 per cent by 2025; Uruguay will tax single-use plastic bags later this year and Costa Rica will
15 take measures to dramatically reduce single-use plastic through better waste management and education.

16
17 In following the UN #CleanSeas Campaign the country of Costa Rica is urging the UN to call for countries to tax
18 single use plastic products at a rate deemed appropriate for each country to asset in minimizing plastic waste
19 in consideration of the marine life, which according to the UN makes up 80% of all waste in the ocean.

20
21 Money raised by taxes will be put into the conservation and preservation of marine life at the local or global
22 level.


23
24 This resolution will be enforced by each countries government and reported to the UN’s Green Climate Fund.

26 This resolution, if passed, will be enacted on January 1st, 2022.

A Resolution to Establish United Nations Consulates in Djibouti and the Surrounding Region

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The General Assembly,

Observing that dependence on foreign powers poisons not only the economy and national security of a state but as well as the human rights, within the state of Djibouti,

Recalling that the establishment of consular relations and basic human rights are determined in both the Geneva Conventions and the Vienna Conventions,


Fulfilling that the establishment of a United Nations consulate will better Djibouti's accordance to the Declaration of Human Rights,

Confident that through installation of consulates will ensure that the efforts of the United Nations in collaboration with the state of Djibouti will further strengthen the country's internal economy and national security as well as the foreign relations of the surrounding countries; and that the efforts of the consulate along with the government of Djibouti will better the state of human affairs in both Djibouti and the surrounding nations, in relation to human trafficking and slave and child labor.

Noting with deep concern from Djibouti's 2017 Human Rights Report namely showing allusion to unconstitutional torture and suppression of free speech/media, among many others, and realizing that the previous efforts of the government in cooperation with the United Nations to handle their issues regarding the abuse to refugees have failed. Realizing that the state of Djibouti has previously requested assistance in relation to the stabilization of the state's economy and national security; and that through the installation of United Nation consulates would primarily focus on these areas in order strengthen the state as a whole. As well as, the the critical economic situation of Djibouti as addressed by the government as hazardous to their structural development.

Determined to establish an international organization that contains the authority to allow the development of United Nations Consulates,

1. Requeststhat the United Nations implement a committee of to establish an organization of United Nations Consulates to provide advice on: domestic economy, national security, human rights, and as an intermediary force in foreign relations;
2. Convinced that the advisement of these consulates would better Djibouti through advising them away from foreign dependency and onto a better, safer, and overall, more independent country.
3. Emphasizes that this advisement would be from United Nations appointed officials operating as a current foreign embassy would but independent of biased motives, and driven instead by true betterment of the country itself and by true betterment of the world.
4. Solemnly Affirming that in an extreme situation the consulate could gain authorization from the Security Council to stabilize an existing government through force and create a new one in accordance with all United Nations codes and resolutions.
5. Affirms that the benefits of these consulates outweigh the costs of establishing them. The consulates would not require a new building in order to be established, instead, a former foreign embassy building could be repurposed for a United Nations embassy. However, if a consulate building is needed it will be based on the new US embassy in Israel that costs \$21 million USD or 3,732,120,000.00 Djiboutian Francs. The final cost would be the salaries of employees within the consulates and these would differ within each nation. An Act to Establish Child Safety Seat Laws

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The General Assembly,


Conscious that the Dominican Republic currently has no child safety seat laws and is one of the leading countries in traffic-related fatalities,

1. Children under the weight of 27 kilograms and/or under the age of eight must be properly restrained in a child safety seat or booster seat that meets standards appropriate for the child’s weight and height.
2. If a driver is observed violating this law, the first and second offense is a fine of 500 Dominican Pesos (DOP). After three or more offenses, the driver could be subject to suspension of license for up to 60 days.
3. This resolution will go into effect January 1, 2021.

Convention to Create a Green Building Initiative

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned with the negative impact the maintenance and creation of infrastructure can have on our global sustainability and economic security.


Alarmed by the fact that 80 percent of countries use more biocapacity than is available within their borders, we decided to further explore the issue.

Disturbed to discover that each year, humanity uses resources equivalent to nearly one-and-a-half- Earths to meet its needs.

Conscious of Germany’s involvement with the United Nations’ 2016 Voluntary National Review of the High-Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development, which consisted of efforts to promote sustainable development in the private sector, private investment and the ability of the partner countries to contribute financially to their own development.


Reaffirming the Sustainable Development Goals of the United Nations by encouraging countries to take similar initiatives.

1. Calls upon the governments to promote an increase of green building as defined by the Environmental protection agency as the “ creation of structures and use of processes that are environmentally responsible and resource-efficient throughout a building’s life-cycle from sitting to design, construction, operation, maintenance, renovation and deconstruction” (2016).
2. Establishes a minimum of four green initiative compliances to receive recognition as a green building.
 - a. Gives owners the option of utilizing eight different green initiatives outlined by the World Green Building Council (2016) :
 - a. Efficient use of energy, water and other resources
 - b. Use of renewable energy, such as solar energy
 - c. Pollution and waste reduction measures, and the enabling of re-use and recycling
 - d. Good indoor environmental air quality
 - e. Use of materials that are non-toxic, ethical and sustainable
 - f. Consideration of the environment in design, construction and operation
 - g. Consideration of the quality of life of occupants in design, construction and operation
 - h. A design that enables adaptation to a changing environment
3. Further requests that governments provide incentives to its citizens, businesses, and industries to participate in green building.
 - a. Gives nations their choice of incentives such as tax breaks, marketable permits, liability rules, or subsidies.

An Act to Request Hungary Open It's Borders For Asylum Seekers

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The General Assembly,


Fully conscious that under Hungary’s current regime, asylum seekers are only allowed to apply for Asylum in specific transit zones. These transit zones are often questioned for their legality and safety, and have been ruled as a violation of Article 5(4), Article 3, and Article 13, under the European Court of Human Rights.

Aware that Hungary’s asylum policies diminish the reputation of Hungary itself, the European Union, and the global community, but cognizant of the fact that Hungary’s current administration is unwilling to change its blatantly discriminatory policy.

Disappointed that Hungary’s parliament has passed statutes making asylum borderline impossible but also, punishing its citizens for helping migrants or refugees. As of February 2018, one asylum seeker per day was permitted to pass through each of the two checkpoints. These violations disregard standards by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, and leave migrants unsafe from persecution, violence, or other serious safety concerns.

As Hungary, we ask the United Nations to intervene in current asylum procedures for our nation and serve as precedent for our global community. We ask these be enacted by:

1. Asking United Nations Peacekeeping officers to monitor the disputed border between Serbia and Hungary
2. Requiring Hungary’s asylum seeking standards to comply to the Global Compact of Refugees, and allow asylum for anyone persecuted, political dissidents, those discriminated against on the basis of gender, race, religion, or social group, possible victims of gang violence, or any victims of domestic abuse.
3. If Hungary does not comply, the nation will be charged with not complying Article 14(1) of UDHR, and ask that nations of the European Union apply economic sanctions to be enforced until standards are increased and human rights are not being infringed on. While asking for change of our own nation seems strange, Hungary is aware that change is necessary from outside forces with the current corruption from within our government.

Addressing the State of Infrastructure in East Africa

1. Calls upon the governments of East Africa, the United Nations Development Programme, the International Monetary Fund, the World Bank, the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development, and the United Nations Office for Project Services to contrive and enact a procedure to expand infrastructure within the East African states who commit to this programme;
2. Further recommends that the International Civil Aviation Organization, the International Maritime Organization, and the International Telecommunications Union aid in the development of suitable rules and regulations to foster responsible international commerce and communication;
3. Requests that the aforementioned groups, per Clause 1, have developed their stratagem by no later than 2024;

An Act to Open Renewable Energy Plants in Morocco

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The General Assembly,

Morocco imports over 4.4 billion dollars worth of oil every year. With oil prices not getting cheaper, it is important to look into how Morocco may save money in that department. Morocco also deals with a 9.33% unemployment rate. Both of these issues could be resolved with the opening of renewable energy plants. Solar and wind energy opened almost 100,000 jobs last year in the US, and are cost efficient to run. Solar Energy and Wind Turbine farms cost around 1-2 million to open/build, however, the cost to run them is only around 1% of the installation cost. For example, a 2 million dollar installment would likely cost 20,000 dollars annually to maintain it. This resolution would not reject the use of oil, it would wean off of it to save money, create jobs, and at the same time reduce pollution and work towards a healthier environment.

1. We propose that Morocco installs and maintains 200 renewable energy plants by 2021. The installation would cost 200-300 million dollars, and 200-300 thousand dollars to maintain annually. While this may sound like a lot of money, it would only be 51% of how much it would cost to import the amount of oil that would be used for the same purpose.
2. This resolution would effectively save over 185 million dollars on oil imports, while also creating over 11,000 jobs for Moroccan citizens. The bill would cut oil import costs by 437 million dollars.

The Relief of Sanctions on the Russian Federation

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The General Assembly,

Recognizing that the Russian Federation is being unfairly punished for assisting its allies and pursuing its interests. Sanctions include but are not limited to the "Kremlin Dossier", Sanctions against Dmitry Ovsyannikov set in November 2017, Sanctions imposed by the EU, all sanctions imposed on Crimea and anyone involved with the Russian Federation since the Crimean conflict began, and sanctions against six companies who were involved in the construction of the Kerch Strait Bridge which opened in May 2018.

Deeply Concerned that as today, 14% of Russians are impoverished, almost 21 million people are suffering at hands of the Western sanctions.


Alarmed by the fact that these sanctions have cost the Russian people more than 40 trillion rubles, and over the last six years the US has imposed more than 60 rounds of sanctions on Russian individuals, companies, and government agencies spanning nine issue areas.

Recalling the United Nations Charter explicitly specifies the procedures to be followed in the event of a perceived threat to international peace and security, and implicitly forbids Member States from taking unilateral or concerted action outside the ambit of the UN Charter to respond to perceived threats to international peace and security.


Reaffirming that Article 24 of the UN Charter confers authority upon the Security Council to maintain international peace and security. Article 34 confers authority upon the Security Council to investigate disputes that may destabilize the peaceful relations upon Member States.

Conscious that the Security Council has not found that the Russian Federation has threatened the peace or stability of Ukraine, or has committed an act of aggression.


1. Calls upon the relief of sanctions upon our Federation to secure a better future for our citizens and citizens of the world.
2. Requests that sanctions including a ban on arms sales, arms-sales financing, U.S. government credit or other financial assistance, exports of national-security-sensitive goods, and most foreign assistance to Russia to impose the Chemical and Biological Weapons Control and Elimination Act be removed.
3. Responds with the elimination of the use of chemical and biological weapons.
4. Resolves that the aforementioned sanctions be relieved and in return a ceasefire will be called in Ukraine but Crimea will remain as a part of our territory as it was annexed in 2014.
5. Seeks the relief of these sanctions so that we can restore Russia to its former glory by bringing millions out of poverty.

2. Requests the United Nations to recommend solutions that can easily be implemented to aid in the solving of the water crisis.
3. Recommends the country of South Africa to increase environmental efforts to cease any contamination of water sources.

1 Resolution to Implement Efficient Waste Management Systems in Developing Countries

3 The General Assembly,

4

5 Deeply disturbed by the practice of open waste dumping and consequent socio-economic implications coming

6 from developing countries—accounting for about 2.01 billion tonnes of solid waste as of 2016,

7

8 Acknowledging that annual waste generation is expected to increase by 70% from 2016 levels to 3.40 billion

9 tonnes in 2050 and that these practices create serious health, safety, and environmental consequences,

10

11 While recognizing the efforts put forth by several countries to better manage waste, these efforts have been

12 largely ineffective due to weak administration and insufficient space designated for disposal,

13

14 Conscious that effective waste management is expensive, often comprising 20–50% of municipal budgets,

15

16 Noting with deep concern, however, the need for more effective practices toward the prevention of mismanaged

17 waste in developing countries, specifically those in the Caribbean, where over 90% of waste is often disposed of

18 in unregulated dumps or openly burned,

19

20 1. Calls upon the General Assembly to encourage the addition of funds towards the United Nations World

21 Health Organization (WHO) and the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP);

22

23 2. Requires a task force to be created within the WHO and UNEP to organize a plan to implement in

24 developing countries;

26 3. Recommends countries establish a recycling system and keep waste disposal at a distance of 5 miles

27 from running water;

29 4. Encourages the General Assembly and subsequent countries to provide aid and promote the systems


30 proposed to reduce the amount of ill-managed waste in developing countries.

5 Deeply concerned by the lack of regulation in the fields of cybercrime and cyber security within the United
6 Nations,

8 Recalling that UN resolution 72/440 DR III is pursuing a solution to the threat of cyber terrorism,

10 Alarmed by the blatant human rights violations committed in opposition with the nineteenth article of the
11 Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which states that everyone has the right to freedom and expression
12 without interference through any source of media,

14 Recalling that under twenty-second article of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, "Everyone, as a
15 member of society, has the right to social security" which establishes a duty to all international coalitions to
16 protect this right in every aspect of each citizen's life, including cyber securities,

18 Conscious that the US Department of Justice has taken steps to report computer hacking, fraud, and other
19 internet related crimes,

21 Bearing in mind that as a result of the inherent danger and unpredictability of cyber warfare, it is necessary to
22 adequately fund international coalitions that can address such issues,

24 1. Condemns the use of technological censorship and cybercrime by foreign powers, which are in direct
25 conflict with the nineteenth article of the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights;

27 2. Notes that the United Nations Group on Cybercrime and Cyber Security is currently tasked to be the
28 main international task-force in addressing all aspects of cybercrime and cyber security despite not

Preventing and reducing air pollution to improve air quality in Southeast Asia

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The General Assembly,

Recognizing that air pollution is the single greatest environmental risk to health, and one of the main avoidable causes of death and disease globally,

Concerned that air pollution is a global problem with far-reaching impacts due to its transport over long distances,

Aware that promoting air quality is a priority to protect public health and provide co-benefits for the climate, ecosystem services, biodiversity and food security,

Recognizing that in developing countries air pollution disproportionately affects women, children and the elderly especially in low-income populations as they are exposed to high levels of ambient air pollution,

Recalling the United Nations Environment Assembly (UNEA) resolutions 1/7 and 2/3 which ask member states to strengthen their role with UNEA in promoting air quality and urging them to take action to address air pollution,


Guided by past resolutions 43/196, 44/228, and 66/288 dealing with the continuing deterioration of the environment and the need for global cooperation to decrease the loss,

Acknowledging the work of some initiatives such as the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe's Bataumi Action on Cleaner Air (BACA) and the Association of Southeast Asian Nations Agreement on Transboundary Haze Pollution that can inspire countries to take action to improve air quality and protect human health,

Keeping in mind that Article 25 of the UN's Declaration of Human Rights states everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for health and well-being of himself and his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services,

Mindful that poor air quality is a challenge to all countries, in particular in cities and urban areas in developing countries, with levels of air pollution higher than the World Health Organization (WHO) air quality guidelines,

1. Calls upon member states to be more well-informed on the state of air quality and sources of pollution in affected areas and to support improved air quality management;
2. Encourages member state governments to take action across sectors to improve air quality to protect human health and the environment, reduce negative impacts, including on the economy, and promote sustainable development;
3. Recommends policies and measures to prevent and reduce air pollution from their significant sources;
4. Urges member states to consider joining or cooperating with, as appropriate, relevant global initiatives such as the Climate and Clean Air Coalition and the Global Methane Initiative;
5. Further recommends member states to formulate action plans and establish and implement nationally determined ambient air quality standards, taking into account the World Health Organization Air Quality Guidelines and other relevant information and to establish emissions standards for their significant sources of air pollution;
6. Requests the UN Environment Programme to report to the General Assembly on the results of these actions.
