1 Improving Conditions for International Peace Through the Cataloging of Weapons of Mass Destruction
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Alarmed by the lack of readily available information about the amount of nuclear, biological, and chemical
6 weapons in existence,
7
8 Convinced that the aforementioned absence of statistical information about stockpiled weapons endangers both
9 national and international peace,
10
11 Emphasizing that the use of such weapons would violate both the Charter of the United Nations and the
12 Universal Declaration of Human Rights,
13
14 Recalling that the United Nations Monitoring, Verification and Inspection Commission was terminated on June
15 29, 2007,
16
17 1. Calls upon the United Nations to establish a task force with the specific goal to carry out an
18 international survey of all nuclear, chemical, and biological weapons, along with recording any facilities
19 that could be used for the manufacture of such weapons;
20
21 2. Authorizes that each member state will yield funds to the inspectors of their respective nation,
22 including housing and transportation;
23
24 3. Requests that the collected information be released to the public on the grounds of transparency and
25 protecting personal security;
26
27 4. Further requests that failure to comply should be met with monetary fines or other due restrictions as
28 proposed by the Security Council;
29
30 5. Recommends that the proposed task force be assembled immediately after the passage of this
31 resolution in order to begin work as soon as possible.

Convention on strengthening the Trafficking Victims Protection Act.

The General Assembly,

Confirming evidence that the Government of The Bahamas has shown improvement for its efforts to combat Trafficking in Persons for the third consecutive year, while realizing much work needs to be accomplished, especially among nations in Latin America, Africa, and Asia;

Recalling that, in 2000, the United Nations encouraged all countries to support the Trafficking Victims Protection Act;


Reaffirming, as of 2014, that approximately 20 to 30 million people were trafficked for the purpose of sexual slavery, sexual exploitation and forced labour;

Conscious that 600,000 to 800,000 people are trafficked across international borders every year, of which 80% are female and half are children;

Bearing in mind, that as of 2015, human trafficking was the third largest international crime industry (behind illegal drugs and arms trafficking), reportedly generating a profit of \$32 billion every year (of that number, \$15.5 billion is made in industrialized countries);

and, Determined to achieve the support of the world community for a stronger policy to decrease the number of human trafficking victims;

1. Refine formal procedures as defined by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) to guide police, immigration officials, child welfare officers, health officials and labor inspectors on how to identify victims of forced labor and forced prostitution among vulnerable groups, including migrant workers and people in prostitution, and refer them to available services;
2. Greatly improve efforts to investigate, prosecute, convict, and punish trafficking offenders, including any government employees complicit in human trafficking;
3. When conducting trafficking investigations, ensure suspected victims are taken to a safe location, as victims of human trafficking often feel threatened and are reluctant to identify themselves as victims during a raid but are likely to reveal at least a portion of their true situations when they are interviewed in a non-confrontational, supportive setting;
4. Identify potential victims of forced labor and forced prostitution;
5. And Encourage contributions to the United Nations Voluntary Trust fund for Victims of Human Trafficking and the Voluntary Trust fund on Contemporary Forms of Slavery that will be designated to assist victims.

Child Labor in Bangladesh

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The General Assembly,


Deeply concerned that 13% of the population under the age of 18 are involved in child labor,

Alarmed by the lack of resolutions created in response to this issue,

Recognizing the National Child Labor Elimination Policy of 2010, which aimed to have eliminated all forms of child labor by 2015, and its failures in regard to total eradication of working children,

Viewing with appreciation the Labour Act of 2006, which prevents employment of children under 14 years of age,

1. Requests for the government of Bangladesh to establish alternative schools that provide training of a specific field of work before allowing people under the age of 18 to work;
2. Reaffirms that children will still be provided a basic education along with a mastering of skills required for common jobs.

1 Convention to Reform 1967 Outer Space Treaty

2
3 The General Assembly,

4
5 Recalling the regulations put into place in 1967 by the General Assembly of the United Nations, on December
6 19, 1966 on the moon and other celestial bodies by the RES 2222 (XXI) "Treaty on Principles Governing the
7 Activities of States in the Exploration and Use of Outer Space, including the Moon and Other Celestial Bodies,"
8 itself recalling the resolution XVIII of 1962,

9
10 Observing the increasing interest of businesses, countries, and other agents in the moon because of its
11 potential economic and scientific benefits, and the imminent return of humans on the lunar surface,

12
13 Recognizing the threat of an agent not specified or regulated by current laws claiming the moon or other
14 celestial bodies for their own purposes,

- 15
16 1. Authorizes a means for giving nations legal and judicial jurisdiction over certain areas of the moon so
17 that outer space legislation may be upheld,

18
19 Utilizes the GDP density of the countries in order to find the portion of the moon they will control
20 ((GDP/Population) * (Population/Area)= GDP Density) (GDP Density of country/ GDP Density of all
21 countries added together= fraction of the moon controlled by the countries.))


22 Gives nations their choice of where to place their designated jurisdiction of the moon when a nation has
23 reached the moon. Unclaimed jurisdiction will follow all laws approved by the UN General Assembly until
24 they are claimed.

- 25
26 2. Establishes a system for creating universal laws instated under ratification from a majority of 2/3 of all
27 countries recognized by the United Nations.


- 28
29 3. Establishes a system for deprivation of jurisdiction to those nations that have been seen as unfit to
30 properly enforce their laws on the moon (determined by a 3/4 vote of General Assembly).

- 31
32 4. Recommends deprivation of jurisdiction to those nations that are seen as adversaries to peace and
33 security of the world in order to avoid the possibility of conspiracy between two entities.


- 34
35 5. Allows a more advanced nation to make a trade agreement with a smaller nation that will give the
36 smaller nation a percentage (specified by the smaller nation) of the profits provided the UN General
37 Assembly is compliant.

1 Establishment of an international code to provide the foundation for Child Labor Laws worldwide
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Recalling that there are currently about 168 million child laborers worldwide, and there are 10.5 million in Latin
6 America and the Caribbean,
7
8 Convinced that Bolivia’s Child and Adolescent Code, which was created in 2014, deliberately counteracts the
9 UN’s Declaration of Human Rights Articles 7 & 12 (Sec.1), as well as Resolutions 50/153, 51/492, and 51/77,
10
11 Alarmed that the current Code advocates for a minimum age of 10 for child labor, an installment of Offices of
12 Child Advocates which have ceased to operate effectively, and a gap-filled comprehensive child labor policy,
13
14 1. Calls upon the UN Committee on Economic, Social, and Cultural Rights to initiate an international
15 convention discussing child labor issues;
16
17 2. Further requests the UN Committee on Economic, Social, and Cultural Rights to create a resolution
18 based on the results of their discussion;
19
20 3. Further invites the UN to require all member countries to sign said resolution- beginning with Latin
21 America and the Caribbean and then initiating the next regional signing following a 3 year period to
22 allow the effects of the resolution to be evident for the UN Committee to continue the signing process,
23 which will enact accountability requirements for all countries to uphold set child labor laws (as outlined
24 in Section 3 of this resolution)
25
26 4. Notes that the designed resolution should include the following categories: minimum age to work for
27 both family business/self business and also private sector labor, a mandatory establishment of Offices
28 of Child Labor Advocacy, a promise of 1 Child Labor Inspector for every 250 child laborers in the
29 country, and a Child Labor Report to be submitted to the UN Committee on Economic, Social, and
30 Cultural Rights a year following the country’s census.
31
32 5. Emphasizing the importance of this resolution on the world, failure to sign the resolution will result in
33 the following:
34 a. First refusal/forgetfulness: Warning
35 b. Second: Fine of \$5,000 on the leading corporations (to include no more than the top 5) in the
36 country
37 c. Third: Certain sanctions on leading corporations founded in the country by member nations

3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Taking into consideration that Brazil is 39th in the world for education and the majority of families (four or
6 more people) bring in about \$4,5000 USD a year
7
8 Understanding that due to low education rates, a large percentage of young Brazilian adults find themselves
9 unequipped to lead self sustaining lifestyles. Because of such a widespread low education rate, many Brazilians
10 are unqualified to work any high paying jobs, hold official leadership positions, and are unknowledgeable about
11 the disadvantages that are placed unto them.
12
13 Determined to reform the structure of education in Brazil in order to increase the overall upward mobility of the
14 nation to bring them out of a mainly agricultural state to a more first world, industrial one
15
16 1. Authorizes the modification of Brazil’s public school funding so that schools with better
17 performance and attendance get more funding
18
19 2. Seeks to designate 5% of Brazil’s Gross Domestic Product toward bettering education
20
21 3. Resolves to give those families on welfare bonuses based on their child(ren)’s performance in school

A Proposal to Decrease Crimes Against Humanity

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The General Assembly,


Deeply disturbed by the acts of crimes against humanity taking place in the world,

Defined by the United Nations as enslavement, extermination, torture, imprisonment or other severe deprivation of physical liberty, persecution against any identifiable group or collectivity based on race, nationality, ethnicity, culture, religion, or gender, sexual slavery or enforced pregnancy or prostitution,


Further recalling from Article 4 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, adopted by the United Nations, that no one shall be held in slavery or servitude, and slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms,

Referring that in Article 5, the UDHR states that no one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman, or degrading treatment or punishment.


1. Calls upon the members of the United Nations Security Council to form a Special Forces team that charges, investigates, and punishes such crimes listed above;
2. Requests that each team should have 2-5 ambassadors from their country;
3. Authorizes each country to provide the funding for the salary of those on the Special Forces teams.

3 The General Assembly,

5 Concerned by the consistently increasing yearly global temperatures and its effects as a threat to island
6 countries,
7
8 Recognizing the ineffectiveness of the 2015 Paris Agreement which called for an international collaboration to
9 decrease global temperature to 1.5°C,
10
11 Bearing in mind that the UN Secretary General stated on October 9, 2015, "Putting a price on carbon has been
12 recognized as one of the most effective tools to incentivize low-carbon growth and lower greenhouse gas
13 emissions.",
14
15 Cognizant of the fact that steps taken towards combating climate change by countries with a heavy CO2
16 emission will have significant effects.
17
18 1. Calls upon members of the 20 leading carbon emitting nations to decrease carbon emissions by 8%
19 annually over the course of 5 years to reach a goal of a 24% decrease in carbon emissions in the next
20 15 years;
21
22 2. Big 5 to actively support this resolution and place trade sanctions against non-compliant countries
23 according to an annual carbon emission analysis.
24
25 3. Requests that the participating nations also allow for island nations to inhabit their country should a
26 refugee crisis appear on archipelagos.
27
28 4. Further requests that countries must keep their CO2 emissions to less than five metric tons per capita.

3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Remembering that Africa holds the majority of the least developed countries,
6
7 The Central African Republic proposes the UN creates a team of two United Nations agriculture professionals to
8 go to the countries of Niger, The Gambia, the Central African Republic, Burundi, and Malawi. This team would
9 communicate the most effective agricultural practices and techniques to village elders and community officials.
10 The elders and officials would then teach and implement the new, effective practices within their villages. A
11 principal cause of hunger is simply not knowing effective farming techniques, in turn engendering low
12 agricultural productivity. This team would teach many Africans the most beneficial farming practices and lower
13 hunger in Africa day by day.
14
15 1. This proposal would cost \$250,000 for a one year plans. The two-person team splits a \$150,000
16 salary and \$180,000 is left over for food, transportation, living expenses, etc. This will very easily fit in
17 the Food & Agriculture organization’s regular budget which is 1,005.6 million USD for 2018-2019,
18 along with an expected 1.6 billion USD in voluntary contributions.

1 An Act to Redefine Sanctions on Democratic People’s Republic of Korea


2
3 The General Assembly,

4
5 Having considered that in 2018 over 70% of the Democratic People’s Republic of Korea (DPRK) population is
6 food insecure and 1 in 4 children experience growth stunting. While the public are suffering from the
7 suffocating grip of sanctions, the Kim regime has spent over 645 million USD, in 2012 alone, on their lives of
8 luxury. The current sanctions in 71/2371 pitted against the DPRK have been ineffective because those in power
9 have found ways around the roadblocks aimed at crippling the regime and its nuclear program. Sadly these
10 sanctions, especially those that are geared toward shutting down the economy and starving the country of
11 economic resources, have extreme adverse effects on the citizens of the DPRK. Humanitarian aid efforts have
12 been abandoned because of complications with the sanctions being imposed on the country even though the
13 most vulnerable in DPRK desperately need assistance.

14
15 Noting further, the Human Rights Chief of the UN stated that the new sanctions are complicating, and many
16 times stopping, aid from reaching the 18 million DPRK citizens that rely on it. The UN Human Rights
17 Commissioner, Zeid Ra’ad Al Hussein, expressed that aid agencies provide a “lifeline” for those suffering to
18 survive in the DPRK. While many nations argue that increasing sanctions on the Kim regime will be effective in
19 addressing human rights abuses, tightening sanctions only harms the general public and strains diplomatic
20 efforts.

21
22 Deeply conscious of the DPRK’s violation of international nuclear policies, China’s interests lie in stabilizing
23 DPRK and Asia in order to better the lives of China’s citizens and lessen a major nuclear threat. China’s goal is
24 to achieve diplomatic talks, hoping to reach a compromise that is beneficial to both parties and stabilizes the
25 region. As the DPRK’s major trading partner and ally, China is in a unique position to influence the country.

- 26
27 1. We propose shifting from sanctions that work to completely isolate the country to ones that more
28 effectively target the Kim regime and their nuclear ambitions. Sanctions must avoid affecting the
29 general public and humanitarian efforts.
30
31 2. China calls upon the UN to lessen the sanctions on the exports from DPRK and most importantly lift the
32 sanctions on international bank transfers imposed in 71/2371.
33
34 3. Furthermore, China has resolved that in exchange for lifting these sanctions, China will increase its
35 efforts to carry out other components of the ban, especially focusing on the smuggling of luxury goods.

1 Reducing Human Trafficking in Latin American Countries and Providing Aid for Survivors

Declaring that Human Trafficking is a crime against humanity as affirmed in resolutions 64/293, 55/25, and 11/3,

Reaffirming that Human Trafficking is a violation of the Declaration of Human Rights,

Realizing the steps that Denmark and Australia have taken to reduce the Human Trafficking problems, domestically, can help change the issue globally,


Taking Note of the resolution 2388, unanimously adopted by the Security Council in 2016 reiterating the condemnation of Human Trafficking,

1. Further Invites the UN Conference to implement more steps to reduce Human Trafficking in Latin American countries among all people and especially among women and children, the following steps will be;
2. Requests increased training to recognize the signs of victims of Human Trafficking in national air traffic officers and local police to deal with Human Trafficking,
3. Calls Upon the UNODC (United Nation Office of Drugs and Crime) to provide funding and ambassadors to Latin American countries, taken from the allocated minimum budget of \$850 million, for the purpose of implementing national anti-trafficking centers, and more aid for survivors of Human Trafficking.

5 Convinced that the absence of democracy prevents representation of a nation,
6
7 Alarmed that political corruption results in mass poverty and malnutrition,
8
9 Reaffirming that the will of the people shall be the basis of the authority of government in the Universal Declaration of
10 Human Rights,
11
12 Fully aware genuine elections which shall be by universal and equal suffrage and shall be held by secret vote or by
13 equivalent free voting procedures are vital to democracy in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights,
14
15 Conscious that only 10% of arable land is currently being farmed due to violent conditions in Congo,
16
17 Confident that the 1100 minerals and precious metals in Congo will provide economic stability to the nation in the presence
18 of a stable political leader,
19
20 Fully aware of the effects of a strong democracy including decreases in violence and poverty,
21
22 Conscious that the United Nations Democracy Fund has aided in funding elections in over 100 countries,
23
24 1. Calls on the UN to determine the existence of threats to international peace without the presence of democratic
25 elections;
26
27 2. Endorses a committee of 127 peacekeeping troops, each from different nations, to monitor supreme national elections
28 as a precaution that a nation will not hold a corrupt election;
29
30 3. Requires all UN nations to hold elections in a constant interval; this will be determined by the committee; determined
31 by the following criteria: existing interval, size of nation, current political stability of the nation;
32
33 4. Strongly condemns any nation which prevents free elections through corruption;
34
35 5. Emphasizes the importance of elections being open to all citizens regardless of socioeconomic class, race, religion,
36 sex;
37
38 6. Encourages members of the UN to place sanctions on nations not abiding by the free elections;
39
40 7. Authorizes the UN to not recognize the leader if elections have not been held one year after warning.

The Formation of a Natural Disaster Relief Program

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The General Assembly,


Alarmed by the, amount of natural disasters worldwide, in 2017 alone there were more than 7,000 natural disasters,

Taking into consideration, that many developed countries already have natural disaster relief programs in place, this resolution would primarily affect underdeveloped countries who are susceptible to natural disasters,


Noting with deep concern, 1.35 million people died from natural disasters over the past two decades, 90 percent of those deaths occurred in low and middle-income countries,

Recognizing, that most underdeveloped countries have a lack of resources and funding these nations would need assistance in order to rebuild themselves after a natural disaster,

1. Calls upon, the UN Office for Disaster Reduction (UNISDR) to create a sub specialized agency;

Referring to United Nations General Assembly (UNGA) resolution 377 A, the "Uniting for Peace" resolution, which states in any case where the Security Council, fails to act as required to maintain international peace and security, the General Assembly shall consider the matter immediately and may issue any recommendations it deems necessary in order to restore international peace and security,


Taking into account, the example of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea engaging in peace relations includes sending Kim Jong-Un's sister to observe and participate in global affairs at the 2018 Winter Olympics in South Korea,

Bearing in mind that lifting trade embargoes on North Korea will promote peace in the midst of existing tensions between North Korea and other countries,

1. Calls upon the General Assembly to recommend eliminating significant trade embargoes currently in place with North Korea as a way to stimulate the global economy and offer resources to the rest of the world which are abundant in North Korea to the United Nations Security Council;
2. Acknowledging that Sanctions include inspection of all passing cargo to and from North Korea, prohibition of all weapons trade with the country, and additional restrictions on North Korean imports of luxury goods;

21 regards to the financialization of food products contributing to a sharp rise in price. President of the
22 Dominican Republic, Leonel Fernandez, cites opportunistic behaviour by investors over-inflating food prices,
23 which directly impacts the livelihoods of the global poor.

25 Recognizing that Ethiopia and the Dominican Republic are fighting similar battles, corresponding steps should
26 be taken to contribute towards the goal of ending the inflation of the price of food sales in rural areas.

5 Guided by the production of successful indoor farms in Japan, we reflect on doing the same to boost the economy in Fiji,
6
7 Observing that the production of indoor farms could benefit in any climate condition and could greatly affect the exports of Fiji,
8
9 Recalling that the agricultural development of countries is backed by resolution 72/238 which took place on december 20th,
10 2017.
11
12 Bearing in mind that the company known as ZipFarm will be partnering with Fiji in order to construct the indoor farms and will be
13 supplying materials, and will be paid to make these indoor farms.
14
15 Keeping in mind that these indoor farms can produce leafy greens, herbs, and even cash crops in any environment, even during
16 harsh monsoon seasons.
17
18 Guided by the fact that indoor farms on average can produce around 30,000 heads of lettuce per year, per farm.
19
20 Seeking a loan of \$10 million (U.S) to help construct the indoor farms, and are aware that the loan will be paid back by the end of
21 2024 or any other date that the Fijan government can repay the loan
22
23 Fully aware that the price surrounding the starter package provided by ZipFarms is large, at about \$110,000, however currency
24 from the loan will help construct and purchase the farms.
25
26 Emphasizing the production of food from indoor farms could be used as sustenance for the struggling citizens, and for exports to
27 help correct the international trade debt held by Fiji.
28
29 1. Having examined the current state Fiji's economy, trade, and agriculture, we believe that this is the best solution to help
30 benefit, and fix Fiji's current infrastructure.
31
32 2. Further recommends that the loan should be taken in consideration of economic state of Fiji and should counteract the
33 number of farms.

35 3. Emphasizes that the UN Conference should report all conclusions of the loan to the General Assembly or all changes to

5 Although Guatemalans can obtain free sexual health consultations, condoms, and birth control injections that

16 having, puts financial strains on families. Having fewer children allows the finances of one’s family to be focused
17 on things such as food, education, and other basic necessities, eventually helping to decrease both poverty and
18 overpopulation.

20 1. Long term contraceptives such as IUDs, diaphragms and pills will be provided by the government at no
21 charge to the recipients.

23 2. This health care initiative will receive an annual funding of \$800,000,000 (U.S. dollars). This money will

25 Emergency Fund (UNICEF), and UN Women. Private donations will be solicited to augment additional co-

1 A proposal to implement educational programs regarding Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)

3 The General Assembly,

5 Jamaica, among many other countries, has developed the trend of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) for non-

6 medical reasons. FGM is an operation, normally performed without anesthetics, in which parts of the female

7 genitalia are fully removed or stitched/stapled shut leaving only small openings to urinate and menstruate. This

8 procedure is often performed on 1 to 14 year old girls and has proven to be extremely harmful to their bodies

9 causing long term physical and psychological pain throughout their lives and has caused many deaths during

10 and after the procedure. Over 200 million women currently suffer from a past FGM procedure and the numbers

11 are still growing. FGM has been named a violation of human rights by the World Health organization, and has

12 been proven to have no real health benefits or religious support.

13

14 1. An educational program raising awareness for the dangers and misconceptions of FGM will be

15 implemented in areas of high concentration for the practice. The program will discuss things such as

16 short and long term effects of FGM, the dangers of non-medical and/or at home procedures, and it's

17 lack of health benefits among other important things the citizens may need to know.

18

19 2. The program will travel through the areas with high concentration of FGM in Jamaica and will be

20 recommended to other countries with high concentration such as Somalia and Ethiopia. The program will

21 not be mandatory but heavily endorsed and available for the population. Countries with concentrations

22 exceeding the established allowance of FGM will receive compensation in exchange for their attendance,

23 and it is recommended they send at least two representatives (one of whom is female) to attend the

24 program. There will be a contract available to sign in order to pledge their avoidance of the practice all

25 together.

26


27 3. The estimated cost varies from around \$4,500 to \$5,000 per year and will be paid in part by both the

28 World Health Organization (WHO) and the UNFPA, who have been slowly working towards the

29 eradication of FGM.

30

31 4. This proposal will go into effect January 1, 2019.

18 Angered that the United States blames militants based in Pakistan for Taliban attacks in Kabul when such
19 militants were suspected to have hidden in refugee settlements, and

21 Stressing that political stability of Pakistan and the region requires further support of countries that open
22 borders to the refugees and support them in their time of extreme need,

24 1. Urges the United States, NATO, and China to use military power to end the political instability in
25 Afghanistan so that Afghani refugees currently residing in Pakistan may return to their home nation.

27 2. Urges the United States and NATO to give 1/100% of the military budget assigned to the military

12 Rights, Article 25, section 1, that states every person has a right to medical care and necessary social services,

Turmeric As a Medication Option

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The General Assembly,

Having considered 20% of the adult population in Rwanda suffers from PTSD, without the means to purchase prescription medications, tumeric is a cheap, obtainable, and natural alternative,

Guided by the Time Magazine, Turmeric has been proven to reduce activation of fear memories, improve damage caused by chronic stress, effective in reducing depression and anxiety and can help sleep disorders due to the chemical compound, curcumin,


Further recalling the current Selective serotonin reuptake inhibitor (SSRI) used to treat PTSD sums annually to over 6,000 dollars per individual,

Taking note the average human requires 2 grams of turmeric daily for its benefits to take effect,

1. Calls upon the World Health Organization to urge the use of turmeric as an inexpensive and natural remedy to help reduce the symptoms of all those suffering from PTSD following the Rwandan Genocide;
2. Encourages this resolution to promote the purchase of turmeric from Rwanda's neighboring country, Kenya, and also India, China, Bangladesh, Pakistan, Sri Lanka and Taiwan to benefit the world economy,
3. Further requests Rwanda's Ministry of Health to distribute and advertise the turmeric as an accessible over the counter medication, which will only cost 0.09\$ U.S. dollars per person for a year's supply;
4. Urges this resolution to promote the economy of African countries and help reduce the symptoms of a detrimental mental illness.

Alarmed that only 7% of teachers are trained in Sudan, with the overwhelming majority not even having completed primary education;


Confident that by training prospective and unqualified teachers, the quality of education will improve, and less military conflicts will occur in the future as the general population will be better educated;

Determined that by focusing on educating prospective teachers, the demand for educators will be met, allowing children to have access to a better education, consequently decreasing the unemployment rate of Sudan, along with extreme poverty, child labor, henceforth overall improving the economy,

Having examined that there are currently no laws about the teachers qualifications it is clear to see that anyone could become a teacher,

Recognizing that the Federal Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research is responsible for the pre-service training of general education teachers both basic and secondary school teachers are recruited by individual states,

1. Seeking for Federal Ministry of Higher Education to appoint it a priority to hire individual teachers for states;
2. Encourages Federal Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research to train teachers recruited by the individual states;
3. Urges the Federal Ministry of Higher Education to perform regular and mandatory checks teachers and make sure the instructors are still qualified.

Convention to Protect the Rights of the Incarcerated

3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Taking note of the overcrowding in prisons today, most notably Geneva’s Champ-Dollon prison. A prison, according the
6 Swiss Government, built to house 270 prisoners, in 2014, hit an all time high for cell overcrowding at 240%, “Overcrowding
7 is not an inevitability. Even if it is widespread and long-lasting, it should never become commonplace.”(United Nations
8 Office on Drugs and Crime)
9
10 Alarmed by the towering growth of mass incarceration around the world, like in the United States where it is responsible for
11 nearly 22 percent of the world’s prison population, (Amnesty International)
12
13 Recalling that letting prisoners die of disease, which is caused by severe overcrowding, malnutrition, unhygienic conditions,
14 and lack of medical care, would be violating Article 5 of the UN Universal Declaration of Human Rights, “No one shall be
15 subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment,”.(Human Rights Watch, UNDHR)
16
17 Deeply concerned that 26% of the inmates were diagnosed with a mental health condition at some point during their
18 lifetime, and a very small proportion (18%) were taking medication for their conditions, (US National Library of Medicine)
19
20 Noting further the dangerously high numbers of prisoners in already full prisons around the world. Most notably the
21 examples of Brazil which has over 150% occupancy levels and Kenya which has a 284% occupancy level, with 45.6% un-
22 sentenced prisoners, (BBC)
23
24 Conscious of the attempts by countries such as Norway to rehabilitate convicts that they believe may be reassimilated back
25 into society, taking note that Norway sends drug-addicts to treatment facilities instead of prisons,
26
27 1. Urges the UN, by majority vote, to amend the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights to protect the rights of
28 the imprisoned by adding Article 5A: “No one incarcerated shall be subjected to torture or to cruel and inhuman or
29 degrading treatment.”
30
31 2. Requests that the Council of Human Rights to enforce the idea of treating prisoners more humanely;
32
33 3. Calls upon the UN to help fund countries to repurpose prisons to make them more humane for prisoners, and
34 rehabilitate prisoners into better individuals;
35
36 4. Recommends the UN to advocate the creation of treatment centres for prisoners with mental health issues;
37
38 5. Switzerland will use its seat on the Human Rights Council to recommend that countries found in violation of the
39 newly adopted Article 5A could face international consequences ranging from the cessation of existing United
40 Nations funding to potential sanctions.

Convention to Form an Organization to Combat Human Trafficking

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The General Assembly,

Profoundly aware of the ongoing global issue of human trafficking, rooted deeply in our own Uganda,

Convinced that without intervention global victims of human trafficking will continue to suffer and the issue will only worsen,

Expanding upon the principles proposed in Resolution 11/3 of June 17th, 2009, which states that it is essential to place the protection of human rights at the centre of measures taken to prevent and end trafficking in persons, and to protect, assist and provide access to adequate redress to victims including the possibility of obtaining compensation from the perpetrators,

Reaffirming the essential idea that all nations and their citizens deserve protection of their human rights and should aid one another in said protection so that we may coexist in a safe environment with one another, as found in the Charter of the United Nations,

Mindful of the efforts put forth by other nations to end human trafficking,


Conscious of the global threat human trafficking poses,

Understanding that Uganda cannot resolve this issue alone,


Viewing in appreciation the vigorous attempts of the United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC) founded in 2006 to strengthen the promotion and protection of human rights around the world,

Reiterating the distressing situation facing victims of human trafficking and overall positive global impact eradicating such an issue would produce, Uganda:

1. Calls upon the UN to sponsor an international organization composed of member nations aimed at fighting human trafficking
2. Recommends that the organization should be divided into six regional zones, the six regional zones each represent a continent
3. Establishes three main departments within each regional zone. Urges that there should be one department for intelligence, one department that is composed of task forces aimed at rescuing victims, one department should be aimed at raising money
4. Requests that the organization be headed by a council lead by 5 members in a 5 year position from Uganda and other voluntary nations
5. Further requests that nations that support or turn a blind eye towards the threat of human trafficking be omitted from the council member election process
6. Notes that each nation on the council gets to choose two representatives to sit on the council
7. Asks that the UN General Assembly draft the charter for this organization and be the financial source for the first five years
8. Insists that once the org. is in full swing it will be able to operate with minimal UN funding; the org. should be able to raise its own money from fundraisers and donations
9. Expresses hope that this organization will live up to its goals of: slowing down the rate of human trafficking world wide, bringing loved ones back to there family, providing do justice to communities worldwide, and most importantly, taking a step forward in the fight for human rights

10 Taking into consideration the limited number of regulations needed to remain a member of the UN Security

13 Having considered these implications, the representatives from Ukraine urge the UN conference to implement a
14 set of regulations that the members must abide by in order to retain the member status.

16 1. Noting that said regulations would include: Requirement to inform the UN if planning on annexing a

1 An Act to Expand the Needle-Syringe Program in the United Kingdom

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The General Assembly,

Alarmed by reportings of a 57% increase of new HIV infections between 2010-2015, half of new HIV cases in the region being related to drug usage,

Deeply concerned that over half of people who have injected drugs have Hepatitis C, which kills just as many people as HIV/AIDs globally,


Conscious of the UN General Assembly Special Session on Drugs and their 2009 Political Declaration and Action Plan which has made little to no progress on reducing or eliminating the demand and supply of drugs,

Having examined the Universal Declaration of Human Rights Article 25, clearly seeing that everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and his family,


Viewing with appreciation the current NSP programs run by local drug clinics,

Determined to reduce the risk of developing life-threatening diseases through the usage of dirty needles in the United Kingdom,


1. Calls upon the United Nations to expand the NSP by providing government fundings through the already established and currently expanding NHS.
2. Requests that the UN create Mobile Drug Service to provide clean injecting equipment including needles and to safely dispose of used needles.
3. Urges the UN to expand the NSP in order to educate people with advice on safer injecting practices, advice on minimizing harm done by drugs, advice on how to avoid an overdose, access to blood-borne virus testing, help to stop injecting drugs including information and access to rehabilitation centers.

3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Alarmed by the cost of upkeep of the ISS, which is more than 3 billion dollars a year, and that as of 2014 the
6 ISS has cost the contributing nations \$160 billion USD, and that the US paid \$100 billion of the cost,
7
8 Taking note that Space X has successfully launched a resupply mission to the current ISS and that they have
9 significantly improved the capabilities of their rockets putting their cost at \$67 million USD per launch opposed
10 to a NASA space shuttle/Russian Soyuz spacecraft launch at \$450 million,
11
12 Noting further that the ISS's official mission is to conduct research, maintain a continuous presence in space,
13 and foster international cooperation,
14
15 Deeply concerned that the current space station has issues with dust, mold, and clogged air filters,
16
17 Confident that research that can only be done on the ISS is crucial to future steps in space exploration and a
18 better understanding of Earth and the human race, and that grounding the ISS without a replacement is a step
19 backwards,
20
21 Having considered that space exploration is the next step for the human race,
22
23 1. Requests that the UN start a fund, in which countries can contribute, to research and develop a new
24 ISS;
25
26 2. Further requests that countries contribute funds which will result in space and time on the new ISS
27 proportional to currency donated to the fund;
28
29 3. Notes that the new ISS will be researched to create artificial gravity which can be controlled to create
30 different levels of gravity for different tests.

5 Troubled by the lack of clean drinking water available in underdeveloped countries such as Tanzania,
6
7 Deeply concerned by the fact that 70% of Tanzanian households do not have access to clean drinking water,
8
9 Supported by Pope Francis and the world’s Catholic population with a goal to dramatically increase access to
10 clean water sources limiting disease within remote communities,
11
12 Conscious of the fact that Catholic missions and charities is uniquely positioned to distribute water filtration
13 systems and educate the population as to their use because there are thirty-four dioceses already established
14 within the country, servicing twenty five percent of the countries’s population,
15
16 1. Calls upon the UN to donate \$500,000 USD to be used to purchase 100,000 personal Lifestraw water
17 filtration systems, which will be distributed to remote populations within the state of Tanzania by
18 Catholic missions.
19
20 2. Calls upon UN general assembly to authorize loans from the IMF of \$500,000 USD or equivalent
21 amounts of currency.

23 3. Also authorizes a further amount from Vatican City’s budget for the distribution of said water filtration
24 systems.

1 An act to offer training to transportation workers and border guards to know the signs of human trafficking

3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Alarmed by the fact that there is slavery in the twenty-first century and that it is a threat to millions of people,
6
7 Reaffirming that forced labor and the sexual exploitation of people would be a violation of the Charter of the
8 United Nations. Most global citizens view natural rights as the rights; to life and liberty and freedom of thought
9 and expression. When being sold or forced into human trafficking, you are stripped of those rights because you
10 do not make choices for yourself, since you are owned by another. Conscious that there has been some progress
11 taken by the Vietnamese government towards preventing human trafficking from occurring. The Vietnamese
12 government has implemented An Anti-Human Trafficking Law, which improves coordination among a variety of
13 mass organizations, also it stresses the importance of prevention.
14
15 1. We the country of Vietnam propose that the United Nations develop a training program for boarder and
16 custom control agents, transportation officials, and travel industry employees. This training program
17 would not be mandatory, but be available for free to all member nations and in all local languages. This
18 program would be a digital program, but also available in print for those who do not have access to
19 technology. Countries, businesses, and agencies that complete this training will be able to display their
20 participation and completion of this program. The goal of this program is to inform individuals on the
21 signs of human trafficking and the legal resources available to individuals who suspect a human
22 trafficking case.
23
24 2. The goal of this program is to train people on the signs of human trafficking and how to recognize
25 potential victims and perpetrators. Individuals in the customs, transportation, and travel industries
26 often witness these events. By training individuals on the signs of human trafficking we can help combat
27 the problem globally
