How are you feeling?



Need a moment of calm? Scan this QR code for a resource to a breathing exercise that can help reduce stress and anxiety. You can also try a quick breathing exercise to relax, follow the instructions below.



How to breathe for relaxation: basic exercise

1. Sit comfortably with your back straight and your feet flat on the floor.
2. Close your eyes.
3. Slowly breathe in through your nose. As you breathe in, notice your chest filling up with air. Notice your shoulders rising and your tummy expanding.
4. When you feel that your lungs are full, hold the breath. Focus on the feeling of fullness in your chest and tummy.
5. Now slowly breathe out through your mouth. As you breathe out, notice your chest emptying and your shoulders dropping. Notice your tummy relaxing.
6. Repeat this exercise another 2 times (3 times in total).

Return to your normal breathing pattern.

Looking for more support? Ask your teacher or a Y staff member for a fidget to help you focus or additional resources to improve your mental health in the moment.

We also have a quiet room available for anyone needing a quiet moment away from programming. Review your agenda to see where the Quiet Room is located.

Student & Adult Code of Conduct

The purpose of this code is to identify personal behavior that is consistent with the mission of the Kentucky YMCA. Students sent home for violations would be at the expense of a parent/guardian. Violations are to be brought to the attention of Y-Staff. Delegates in violation are subject to disciplinary actions at the discretion of supervising adult and Y Staff including but not limited to calls to guardian(s); incident/behavioral report filed; sent home; school policies implemented.

If state/federal law is broken, Y-Staff will notify law enforcement and guardian(s) and delegates will be sent home. Y-Staff reserves the right to alter disciplinary actions as needed. Y-Staff may determine if a participant of the KY YMCA is no longer allowed to attend future KY YMCA programming and/or is ineligible to serve in leadership positions within the KY YMCA, at the discretion of Y-Staff.

EXPECTATIONS OF DELEGATES

1. Delegates shall demonstrate respectful/responsible conduct before, during, and after all KY YMCA functions. This includes but is not limited to social media, physical and verbal interactions, electronic communication. Above all else, other people's needs/requests must be respected.
2. All delegates share the responsibility for their actions when violations committed by students or adults are witnessed. Those present who do not act to remedy and report the violation shall be considered participants. There are no "innocent bystanders."
3. Bullying of any kind will not be tolerated. This includes but is not limited to physical, verbal, mental, cyberbullying.
4. Delegates are legally and financially liable for removing, defacing, or willfully damaging public or private property. Vandalism, destruction of property, or misuse of facilities may be a crime and will be treated as such.
5. No delegate shall leave a Kentucky YMCA function without the approval of advisor, guardian, and program director. Students must be signed out of the program by an adult listed on their Authorized Pick-Up Form.
6. Food, candy, and beverages other than water are not permitted in any meeting spaces, unless medically needed. Delegates will abide by any rules put into place by Y-Staff at other locations.
7. Cell phones, music players/speakers, or other wireless communications should not be used during meetings or formal programming time. Delegates will abide by any rules put into place by Y-Staff at other locations.
8. The use of tobacco products, e-cigarettes, vaping products, illegal drugs, alcoholic beverages, legal drugs without prescription, open flame, and the burning of candles, incense or wax melts is forbidden.
9. Delegates may not enter sleeping rooms other than those assigned to them without permission from Y-Staff.

10. All delegates shall be in assigned rooms by curfew and remain there until curfew ends.
11. Physical intimacy between participants is inappropriate at all times during Kentucky YMCA programs. Physical intimacy includes, but is not limited to romantic interactions, unwanted or inappropriate physical contact, unwanted comments/conversation, etc.
12. All forms of communication, including videos, images, GIFs, text messages, and other digital media, must remain appropriate and respectful. Inappropriate, offensive, or suggestive content is strictly prohibited.
13. Delegates will wear their OWN Name Tags visibly around the neck at all times when not in their assigned sleeping rooms.
14. Unless there is a fire, delegates will not pull the fire alarm. Pulling a fire alarm is a serious offense, and offenders will be held financially and potentially criminally liable. Alarms summon the Fire Dept. and require evacuations.
15. Use of personal vehicles by delegates during any Kentucky YMCA program is strictly prohibited.
16. Weapons of any kind and items that could cause injury/damage to participants/property are forbidden.
17. Delegates are not allowed to use any food ordering or delivery service (DoorDash, GrubHub, UberEats, etc.) while at the conference.

DRESS CODE: KYA & KUNA

The Dress Code is designed to support our emphasis on professional development at KYA and KUNA. Anyone not in compliance with the Dress Code may be asked to change, and Delegation Adults will be notified. Y-Staff reserves the right to remove Delegation of Excellence after 3+ dress code violations. Delegation Adults will enforce Dress Code.

Not Allowed At Any Time: Visible underwear, inappropriate/derogatory text or imagery, and attire deemed inappropriate/unsafe by Y-Staff.

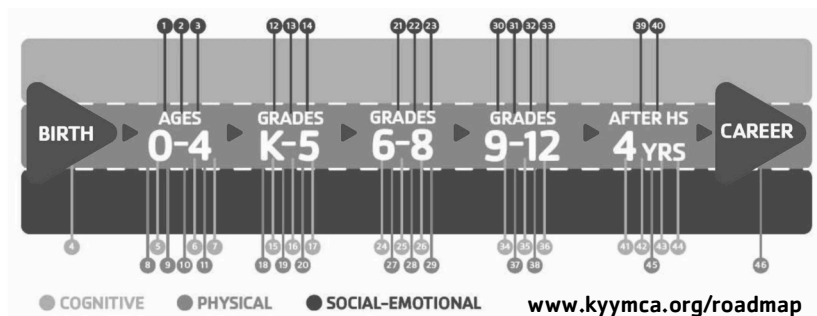

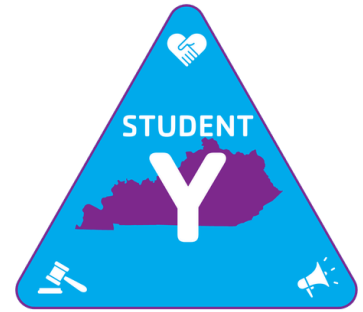

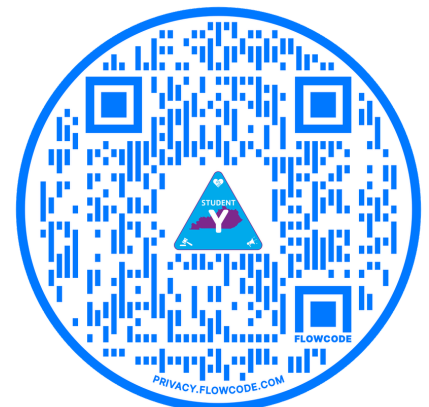

COMMONWEALTH TEEN ADVOCATES

Leadership and Advocacy Program

Commonwealth Teen Advocates (CTA) is six-week leadership and advocacy program for high school students across Kentucky, designed to help young people identify issues they care about in their communities and take meaningful action. Hosted by the Kentucky YMCA Youth Association, this program blends civic education, hands-on project work, and real-world connections to help students become advocates where they live.

Each week, students meet in small groups with an adult facilitator for a two-hour session that includes an interactive workshop and time to develop a group advocacy project. Topics include local government, research, public speaking, and professional development. Guest speakers from each community will join sessions to bring the topics to life and share their own experience with civic engagement.

At the end of the program, students will present their advocacy projects to their group and then showcase them via tri-folds at their respective Kentucky Youth Assembly (KYA) conference later in the year.

Program Curriculum

Over the course of six weekly sessions, students will engage in workshops, hear from local guest speakers, and collaborate in small groups to create an advocacy project they will present to their peers, and later showcase at their respective Kentucky Youth Assembly (KYA) conference. Each session is two hours long and includes two parts:

- Workshop: A hands-on learning experience focused on an advocacy-related topic.
- Project Time: Guided small-group work to apply skills and develop an advocacy initiative.

Weekly Topics

- Week 2 – Understanding Local Government: Explore how local government works, how decisions are made in your community, and how to make your voice heard. Local officials may join to share their experiences.
- Week 3 – Research & Issue Mapping: Learn how to research community issues, understand root causes, and develop a clear and informed advocacy goal.
- Week 4 – Networking & Professional Development: Practice communication, public speaking, and outreach skills to help bring your advocacy ideas to life and work with others effectively.
- Week 5 – Project Work Day: Use this full session to finalize your advocacy project, organize your tri-fold display, and prepare your group presentation.
- Week 6 – Final Presentations: Share your group's project with your peers, celebrate your work, and get ready to have your work showcased later in the year at your Kentucky Youth Assembly (KYA) conference.

Y-Corps 2026

Service Learning Program

Y-Corps is a service-learning program for students who are looking to make a difference in their local communities, in their Commonwealth, and across the country. Over the course of months, students are placed on teams that work together to achieve different goals in service, philanthropy, and advocacy. The program culminates in a multi-day travel experience in July, performing service across a region specific to their team.

Each team has a staff lead, as well as student Captains that manage the team throughout the program. The teams are based on the region they'll be serving at the culmination of the trip.

Individual and Team Goals

The program officially begins in April, when students receive their team assignments, team goals, and individual goals. They'll be connected with their team and its Captains, where they can find direction, advice, and collaboration. Throughout the program, participants perform direct and indirect service in their communities, practice philanthropy by fundraising for the YMCA Scholarship Fund, and advocate on behalf of their teams and the YMCA Movement.

Y-Corps Institute

In April, all teams will gather for the Y-Corps Institute (YCI), a one-day training and team-building event. At YCI, students gather to meet their team in person for the first time and go through a series of workshops and culture-setting activities. Together, each team can brainstorm strategies for meeting their goals leading up to the travel and prepare for the travel at the end of the program in a fun and productive setting.

The program culminates in July in a team travel experience, where each team ventures across a specific region, serving the communities within and learning about the culture of the places they visit. Service



Prior to the culminating travel, all Y-Corps students complete service hours and projects over the course of the program. Each student is required to complete 50 hours of direct or indirect service in June. Philanthropy



In addition to their local communities, Y-Corps students serve their YMCA community by fundraising for the Y Scholarship Fund, providing opportunities for over students across Kentucky. Each team has a fundraising goal, while individual members raise different amounts based on their experience in the program. Through philanthropy, Y-Corps students connect hundreds of businesses, organizations, and donors to the Y movement.

Advocacy



As a cause-driven organization, the Y has been advocating for others since its founding. Y-Corps students spread awareness and inspiration about the Y and Y-Corps movements by advocating on behalf of their team and the program. Students learn the history of the movement and practice storytelling in long and short forms across multiple platforms to help inspire people, both young and old, to serve their communities.

SECRETARIAT OVERVIEW

AMBASSADOR LEVEL

NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION (NGO)

Students attending the conference as NGOs sign up to advocate for and against resolutions that are in the best interest of their organization. During ranking committees they'll provide expert testimony to Ambassadors. As they are not technically members of the United Nations, NGOs spend voting committees meeting with USG in an effort to advance their cause with the Secretariat.

SUPPORTING OFFICER LEVEL

REGISTRAR (REG)

The Registrar serves as the administrative assistant to the DSG. They are in charge of managing the Secretariat's schedule and office relations.

UNDER SECRETARY GENERAL-POLICY (USG)

As a part of their role as Policy Advisors to the Sec Gen, USGs meet with NGOs to determine which issues/resolutions should be given emphasis and eventual endorsement.

UNDER SECRETARY GENERAL-LEGAL (USGLA)

Work with Office of Legal Affairs to determine which resolutions are within the purview of the United Nations.

PRESIDING OFFICER LEVEL

SECRETARY GENERAL (SEC GEN)

Reviews all resolutions and determines which ones are of highest international priority in consultation with the offices of the Secretariat.

DEPUTY SECRETARY GENERAL (DSG)

As chief Policy Advisor, they oversee the entire Secretariat. They are tasked with reviewing every resolution, determining which Offices are represented at conference, and most importantly advancing the views of the Sec Gen.

DIRECTOR GENERAL OF UNESCO (DGUNESCO)

Oversees all cultural aspects of the conference and compiles the Global Impact Report based off the U.N. Goals of Sustainable Development.

ICJ OVERVIEW

The purposes of the ICJ are to mediate disputes between states (member countries), and to provide advice to the General Assembly on issues relating to international law. The ICJ both at the UN and at KUNA deal with two kinds of cases:

ADVISORY

The General Assembly, and other bodies of the United Nations, may request Advisory Opinions from the Court in order to clarify a point of International Law or procedure. Such cases are not directed at specific states, although the decision of the court theoretically applies to all states within the United Nations.

This Year's Case: Legal Consequences of the Construction of a Wall in the Occupied Palestinian Territory (2004)

The case before the International Court of Justice concerns the legality of a barrier being constructed by Israel in the Occupied Palestinian Territory.

The Court is being asked to determine whether the construction of the wall violates international law and what legal obligations arise for Israel and other states as a result.

CONTENTIOUS

Cases in which two or more states (member countries) are in disagreement about a point of International Law or treaty requirements.

This Year's Case: Case Concerning Application of the Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide: Croatia v. Serbia (2015)

The case before the International Court of Justice involves Croatia accusing Serbia of committing genocide during the 1991–1995 conflict following the breakup of Yugoslavia, with Serbia submitting a counterclaim against Croatia.

The Court is being asked to determine whether actions by either side meet the legal definition of genocide under the Genocide Convention.

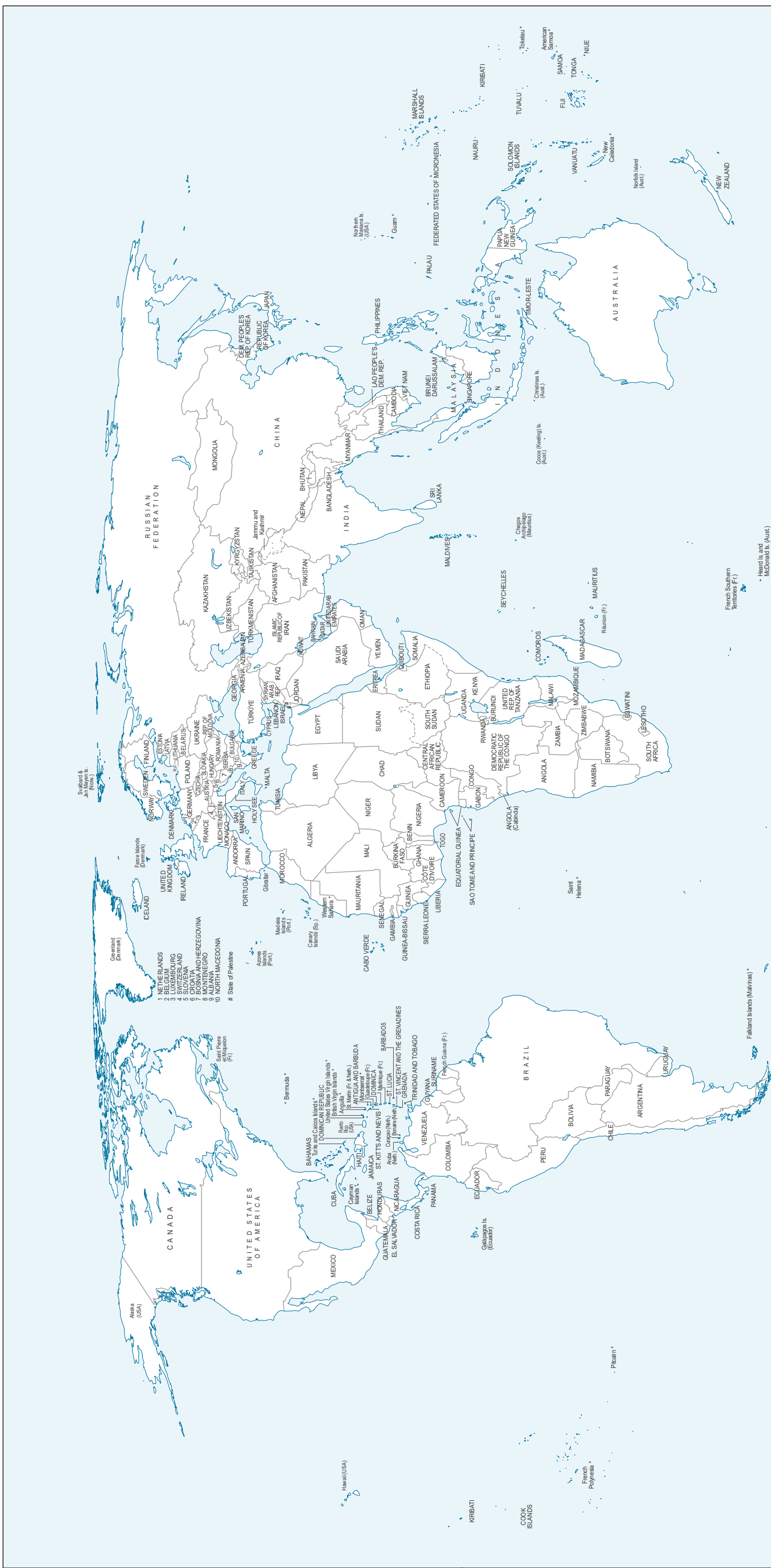
When not participating in oral argument rounds, ICJ Advocates work in the UN Office of Legal Affairs to determine which resolutions are within the purview of the United Nations.

UN UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS

Preamble

Whereas recognition of the inherent dignity and of the equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human family is the foundation of freedom, justice and peace in the world,

Whereas disregard and contempt for human rights have resulted in barbarous acts which have outraged the conscience of mankind, and the advent of a world in which human beings shall enjoy freedom of speech and belief and freedom from fear and want has been proclaimed as the highest aspiration of the common people,

Whereas it is essential, if man is not to be compelled to have recourse, as a last resort, to rebellion against tyranny and oppression, that human rights should be protected by the rule of law,

Whereas it is essential to promote the development of friendly relations between nations,

Whereas the peoples of the United Nations have in the Charter reaffirmed their faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person and in the equal rights of men and women and have determined to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom,

Whereas Member States have pledged themselves to achieve, in cooperation with the United Nations, the promotion of universal respect for and observance of human rights and fundamental freedoms,

Whereas a common understanding of these rights and freedoms is of the greatest importance for the full realization of this pledge,

Now, therefore, The General Assembly,

Proclaims this Universal Declaration of Human Rights as a common standard of achievement for all peoples and all nations, to the end that every individual and every organ of society, keeping this Declaration constantly in mind, shall strive by teaching and education to promote respect for these rights and freedoms and by progressive measures, national and international, to secure their universal and effective recognition and observance, both among the peoples of Member States themselves and among the peoples of territories under their jurisdiction.

Article 1

All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood.

Article 2

Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration, without distinction of any kind, such as race, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status.

Furthermore, no distinction shall be made on the basis of the political, jurisdictional or international status of the country or territory to which a person belongs, whether it be independent, trust, non-self-governing or under any other limitation of sovereignty.

Article 3

Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person.

Article 4

No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms.

Article 5

No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.

Article 6

Everyone has the right to recognition everywhere as a person before the law.

Article 7

All are equal before the law and are entitled without any discrimination to equal protection of the law. All are entitled to equal protection against any discrimination in violation of this Declaration and against any incitement to such discrimination.

Article 8

Everyone has the right to an effective remedy by competent national tribunals for acts violating the fundamental rights granted by the constitution or law.

Article 9

No one shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest, detention or exile.

Article 10

Everyone is entitled in full equality to a fair and public hearing by an independent and impartial tribunal, in the determination of his rights and obligations and of any criminal charge against him.

Article 11

1. Everyone charged with a penal offence has the right to be presumed innocent until proved guilty according to law in a public trial at which he has had all the guarantees necessary for his defence.
2. No one shall be held guilty of any penal offence on account of any act or omission which did not constitute a penal offence, under national or international law, at the time when it was committed. Nor shall a heavier penalty be imposed than the one that was applicable at the time the penal offence was committed.

Article 12

No one shall be subjected to arbitrary interference with his privacy, family, home or correspondence, nor to attacks upon his honour and reputation. Everyone has the right to the protection of the law against such interference or attacks.

Article 13

1. Everyone has the right to freedom of movement and residence within the borders of each State.
2. Everyone has the right to leave any country, including his own, and to return to his country.

Article 14

1. Everyone has the right to seek and to enjoy in other countries asylum from persecution.
2. This right may not be invoked in the case of prosecutions genuinely arising from non-political crimes or from acts contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.

Article 15

1. Everyone has the right to a nationality.
2. No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his nationality nor denied the right to change his nationality.

Article 16

1. Men and women of full age, without any limitation due to race, nationality or religion, have the right to marry and to found a family. They are entitled to equal rights as to marriage, during marriage and at its dissolution.
2. Marriage shall be entered into only with the free and full consent of the intending spouses.
3. The family is the natural and fundamental group unit of society and is entitled to protection by society and the State.

Article 17

1. Everyone has the right to own property alone as well as in association with others.
2. No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his property.

Article 18

Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion; this right includes freedom to change his religion or belief, and freedom, either alone or in community with others and in public or private, to manifest his religion or belief in teaching, practice, worship and observance.

Article 19

Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right includes freedom to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers.

Article 20

1. Everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and association.
2. No one may be compelled to belong to an association.

Article 21

1. Everyone has the right to take part in the government of his country, directly or through freely chosen representatives.
2. Everyone has the right to equal access to public service in his country.
3. The will of the people shall be the basis of the authority of government; this will shall be expressed in periodic and genuine elections, which shall be by universal and equal suffrage and shall be held by secret vote or by equivalent free voting procedures.

Article 22

Everyone, as a member of society, has the right to social security and is entitled to realization, through national effort and international co-operation and in accordance with the organization and resources of each State, of the economic, social and cultural rights indispensable for his dignity and the free development of his personality.

Article 23

1. Everyone has the right to work, to free choice of employment, to just and favourable work conditions and to protection against unemployment.
2. Everyone, without any discrimination, has the right to equal pay for equal work.
3. Everyone who works has the right to just and favourable remuneration ensuring for himself and his family an existence worthy of human dignity, and supplemented, if necessary, by other means of social protection.
4. Everyone has the right to form and to join trade unions for the protection of his interests.

Article 24

Everyone has the right to rest and leisure, including reasonable limitation of working hours and periodic holidays with pay.

Article 25

1. Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control.
2. Motherhood and childhood are entitled special care and assistance. All children, born in or out of wedlock, shall enjoy the same social protection.

Article 26

1. Everyone has the right to education. Education shall be free, at least in the elementary and fundamental stages. Elementary education shall be compulsory. Technical and professional education shall be made generally available and higher education shall be equally accessible to all on the basis of merit.
2. Education shall be directed to the full development of the human personality and to the strengthening of respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms. It shall promote understanding, tolerance and friendship among all nations, racial or religious groups, and shall further the activities of the United Nations for the maintenance of peace.
3. Parents have a prior right to choose the kind of education that shall be given to their children.

Article 27

1. Everyone has the right freely to participate in cultural life of community, to enjoy the arts and share in scientific advancement and its benefits.
2. Everyone has the right to the protection of the moral and material interests resulting from any scientific, literary or artistic production of which he is the author.

Article 28

Everyone is entitled to a social and international order in which the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration can be fully realized.

Article 29

1. Everyone has duties to the community in which alone the free and full development of his personality is possible.
2. In the exercise of his rights and freedoms, everyone shall be subject only to such limitations as are determined by law solely for the purpose of securing due recognition and respect for the rights and freedoms of others and of meeting the just requirements of morality, public order and the general welfare in a democratic society.
3. These rights and freedoms may in no case be exercised contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.

Article 30

Nothing in this Declaration may be interpreted as implying for any State, group or person any right to engage in any activity or to perform any act aimed at the destruction of any of the rights and freedoms set forth herein.

Adopted by the UN General Assembly on 10 December 1948

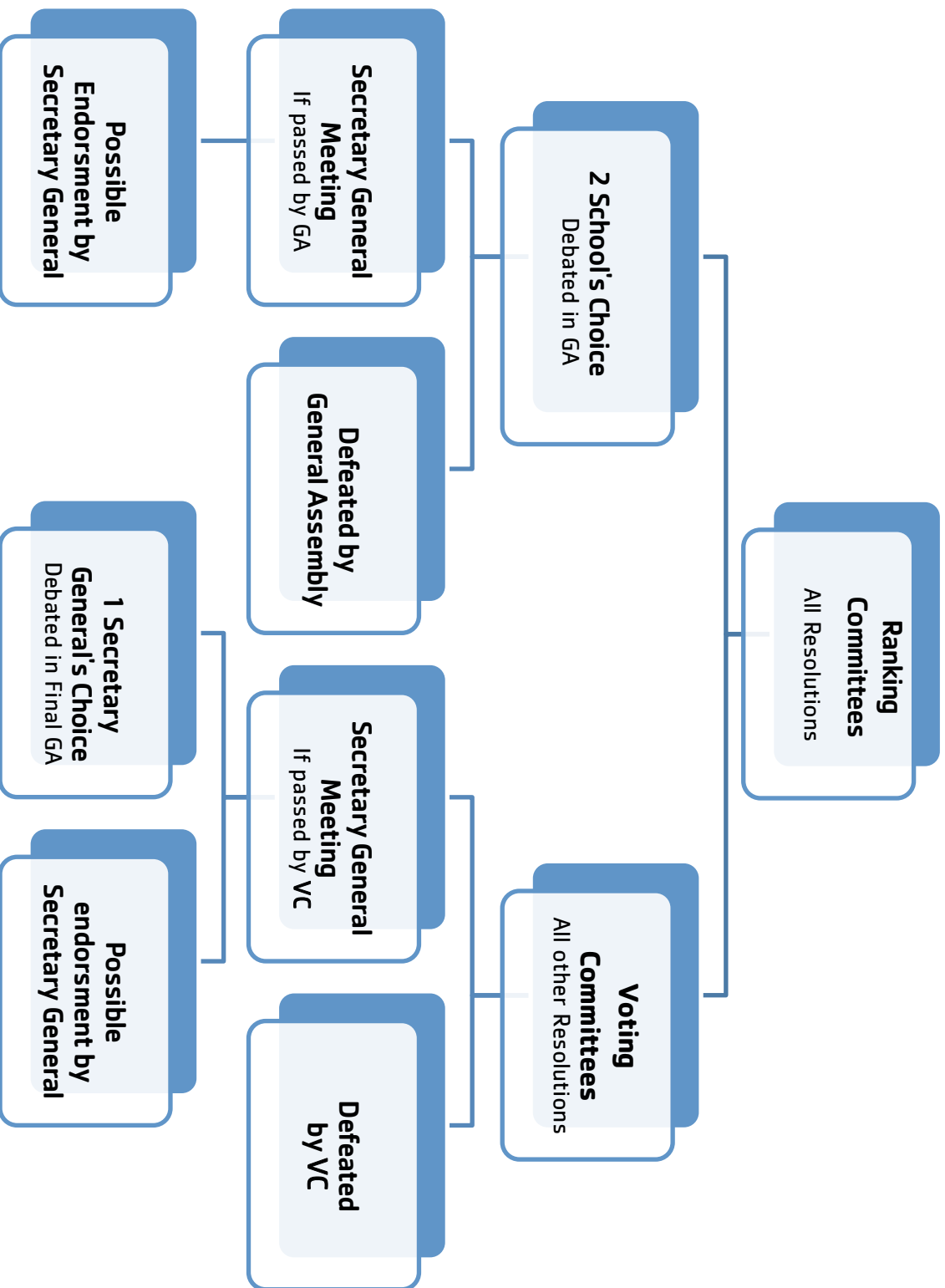

A Proposal for the Improvement of Environmental Protection Efforts

The General Assembly,

3

4 Referring to the Paris Agreement, which recognizes that climate change poses a severe threat to ocean

5 ecosystems, protected international wonders, and globally significant landmarks, and to the United Nations

6 Sustainable Development Goals 13 (Climate Action) and 14 (Life Below Water); The Paris Agreement is a legally

7 binding international treaty on climate change. It was adopted by 195 Parties at the UN Climate Change

8 Conference (COP21) in Paris, France, on 12 December 2015. It entered into force on 4 November 2016. Currently,

9 as of 27 January 2026, there are 194 Parties to the Paris Agreement.

10

11 Reaffirming the goals of the Paris Agreement to reduce global greenhouse gas emissions and limit the rise in global

12 temperatures;

13

14 Noting with deep concern that, despite the commitments made under the Paris Agreement, current national

15 efforts remain insufficient to meet agreed-upon climate targets; With the Paris Agreement, countries established

16 an enhanced transparency framework (ETF) where they are to report the progress made towards these goals.

18 Calls for the establishment of a specialized committee to facilitate oversight, design incentive-based rewards, and

19 develop accountability measures to encourage stronger compliance with international climate commitments. This

20 committee will outline the expectations and methods used upon official establishment. If the committee is not

21 effective and does not see results within 5 years it will be dismantled.

Convention on Climate Change Action to Reduce Disasters in the Alpine Regions of Austria and Greater Europe

General Assembly,

Deeply concerned over the accelerated melting of glaciers in the Alpine region as a result of rising global temperatures, which has led to increased risks of flooding, landslides, and long-term freshwater shortages affecting both the Alps and surrounding regions,

Considering that there are repeated flooding events in Austria during the summers from 2018 to 2025, as well as in the fall of 2024, have demonstrated the growing vulnerability of Alpine regions to climate-related natural disasters, causing damage to infrastructure, power supply disruptions, and the evacuation of affected populations,

Recognizing that Alpine mountain ecosystems play a vital role in Europe’s water supply, biodiversity preservation, and climate regulation, and that their degradation poses serious environmental and socioeconomic risks,

But also, acknowledging the importance of tourism for Alpine communities and noting that climate change has negatively impacted this sector through reduced snow reliability and increased natural disasters,

Recognizing Austria’s long-standing experience in renewable energy development, particularly hydropower, as well as its strong environmental protection policies and neutral diplomatic role, which position it to contribute constructively to international climate protection efforts,

Alarmed that without timely and coordinated international action, Alpine ecosystems, freshwater resources, and regional economies will remain at significant risk,

1. Calls upon Alpine states to strengthen cooperation with neighboring countries and international partners to protect Alpine climates and mountain ecosystems through coordinated, long-term strategies, building on successful regional cooperation models such as the European Union’s response to the floods of autumn 2024;


2. Encourages the promotion of environmentally sustainable tourism in Alpine regions through low-emission transportation and reasonable limitations on mass tourism in ecologically sensitive areas;

3. Supports increased investment in renewable energy sources suitable for mountainous regions, including hydropower, solar energy, and wind energy, in order to reduce greenhouse gas emissions while maintaining energy security;

4. Urges countries with advanced renewable energy systems to share knowledge, technology, and expertise with other nations working toward sustainable energy transitions;

5. Recommends the implementation of educational and public awareness programs on climate protection;

6. Suggests the use of voluntary funding mechanisms, including United Nations environmental programs, international climate funds, and public-private partnerships, to support climate protection initiatives in Alpine regions.

Guided by Brazil's ongoing efforts to promote economic development with the protection of its natural resources,

Considering statements made by the United Nations Environment Programme to emphasize the importance of the protection

of rainforests as an essential component to combat climate change,

1. Encourages member states to partner with Brazil in the pursuit of sustainable land use practices in the Amazon

region via financial and technical assistance.

2. Calls upon the United Nations to strengthen the ability to track and monitor deforestation within the Amazon

Basin.

3. Urge the development of incentives for Indigenous communities to have input in the conservation efforts.

4. Requests increase in collaboration in the effort to combat illegal logging and environmental crimes by increased

information sharing as well as joint enforcement efforts.

5. Recommends the continuation of this dialogue among member states to promote a true commitment to

rainforest preservation and sustainable development.

6. Proposes the allocation of \$125 million(USD), with \$100 million(USD) dedicated to the preservation and restoration

of the Amazon rainforest with an additional \$25 million (USD) for the security of the rainforest, Not only will this help

the ecosystem itself but it will also provide more oxygen and limit carbon trapped in our atmosphere.

Call for a Solution to the Water Crisis in Chile

The General Assembly,


Recognizing that Chile has experienced a prolonged “mega-sequia” for over a decade, during which national water availability has declined significantly, affecting millions of people-particularly in central and northern regions-due to climate change, geographic imbalance, and limited access to safe and reliable water infrastructure.

Recalling the United Nation’s past involvement in supporting countries such as Haiti through funding, technical expertise, and water purification initiatives to improve access to clean water as a fundamental human right.

Encourages the United Nations, in cooperation with the Government of Chile, UNICEF, and UNDP, to provide targeted financial and technical assistance to expand sustainable water filtration and treatment including the construction of modern filtration systems, the upgrading of existing facilities, and the training of local workers to ensure long-term maintenance and equitable access to safe drinking water.

Further requests the United Nations to support programs that promote water conservation, protect rivers and wetlands, and educate communities on sustainable water use to strengthen Chile’s resilience to prolonged droughts intensified by climate change.

Calls upon the United Nations to assist Chile in reforming water quality and ensure equitable access to water as a human right for all, but particularly the rural, Indigenous, and low-income communities in need.

Addressing Violence and Drug Trafficking Through Economic Support

The General Assembly,

Deeply conscious that Colombia produces approximately 70% of the world's cocaine, in addition to multiple other illicit drugs,

Noting with deep concern Colombia’s alarmingly high homicide rate staying at 25.4 per 100,000 inhabitants and the similarly high rates in neighboring countries,

Aware that Article 3 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR) grants every person the right to life, liberty and security of person,


Guided by United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) resolution 1/9, which established the United Nations Committee on Narcotic Drugs, an organization attempting to combat the growth and spread of illicit drugs,

Urges United Nations member states with high volumes of drug trafficking to focus on ensuring farmers have the economic support allowing them to no longer rely on crops primarily used for the production of illegal drugs;

Calls upon the United Nations Committee on Narcotic Drugs to begin focusing on support to countries with high rates of illicit drug consumption;

Authorizes the United Nations General Assembly to appropriate fifteen (15) million United States Dollars every year for the next ten (10) years from the UN General Budget to the United Nations Committee on Narcotic Drugs, in addition to any money already appropriated, with the explicit purpose of being used to support farmers with the purchase and development of sustainable, legal crops;

Further designates ten (10) million United States Dollars every year for the next ten (10) years for the use of monitoring member states’ progress replacing illicit crops with legal crops and financially supporting farmers.

Further Recalling that the United Nations World Charter for Nature also states, “Man can alter nature and exhaust natural

resources by his actions or his consequences and, therefore, must fully recognize the urgency of maintaining the stability and

quality of nature and of conserving natural resources”.

Conscious that steps taken by the United States of America towards reducing the hazard and impacts of animal electrocution,

26

such as the creation of the Avian Power Line Interaction Committee, can contribute towards the goal of safer environments

and ecosystems for animals which use powerlines as means of transportation.

Calls Upon the United Nations General Assembly and member states to take the following actions:

Calls upon the UN to recognize a new organization that would aid in the infrastructure for the protection and well-

being of animals that are vulnerable to the harm that may come from unregulated power lines.

Supporting the decrease of Malaria and Tuberculosis

The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned with the consistent rise of infection rates due to Malaria and Tuberculosis,

Disturbed that in 2024, 377 per 100,000 people globally contracted Tuberculosis, and 12.3 percent of nondeadly and 11.3 percent of deadly global Malaria cases arose from the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Along with an astonishing 55 percent of the Malaria cases in Africa arising from the DRC,

Recalling that it is still the leading cause of death in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and that 2.7 million cases have been reported just in 2024 alone,


Regarding fellow countries currently combatting high rates of tuberculosis; Korea, Philippines, India, and Mongolia, with rates nearly 500 per 100,000 in the year 2023. Also, other countries that are battling Malaria are; India, Haiti, Peru, and Thailand.

Determined to lower the growing rates of these deadly diseases,

Calls upon the UN General Assembly and members of state to grant the Democratic Republic of the Congo funding of 15 million dollars toward sending clinics and conducting researchers to the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

Offers all research collected to aid fellow countries facing these diseases

Taking note that the clinics will be sent to Kinshasa, Nord(north) Kivu and Ituri because they are most affected by the diseases.

Expanding Hospital Facilities and Modernizing Medical Equipment

The General Assembly,

Recognizing that many hospitals within countries in the UN face overcrowding, limited space, and outdated medical equipment - particularly countries like Mali, Madagascar, Nigeria, the Dominican Republic, and Nepal,

Observing that many public sector medical facilities and hospitals lack essential medical supplies and struggle to maintain equipment, specifically diagnostic equipment,


Alarmed by the statistic that many hospitals in underprivileged countries within the UN have less than one bed per 1,000 inhabitants, with a significant amount of people visiting hospitals every day, proving that the expansion of hospitals and addition of beds is necessary,

Conscious that the World Health Organization has made strides to achieve the goal of modern medical equipment and expansion of hospital facilities to needy countries in the UN by improving access to medicine and vaccines, and promoting healthy and safe infrastructure in hospitals,

Recalling that the United Nations wishes to “build a healthier world for all,” as declared in resolutions 78/4,

Recalling the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 3, which aims to ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all,

1. Calls upon The United Nations Office for Project Services (UNOPS) to provide funding for the following to overcrowded medical facilities and hospitals in the high population density cities of needy countries within the UN to combat the serious illnesses and injuries that fill hospitals:
 - a. infrastructure to expand hospital space and adding additional medical wings if required, to accommodate the average number of people who visit hospitals daily by creating space for more inhabitants (minimum 100 more beds per public hospital, but more depending on size)
 - b. modern medical equipment (ultrasound machines, x-rays, patient monitoring systems, and advanced surgical tools)
 - c. essential medical supplies (gauze, bandages, prescription medicines, feminine hygiene products, water purification tablets, wipes, and alcohol based sanitizer)
 - d. basic medical technology (surgical equipment, anaesthetic tools, and portable diagnostic tools)
2. Requests the UNOPS to fund 250 million dollars to each hospital that is severely lacking resources in impoverished countries.

Strengthening Humanitarian Assistance and Food Security in the Oromia Region of Ethiopia

Guided by the principles of the Charter of the United Nations and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights,

Reaffirming Article 25 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, "everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control,"

Deeply concerned by the escalating humanitarian crisis in the Oromia region of Ethiopia, where displacement and conflict have pushed populations into Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) Phase 4 (Emergency), one step below total famine,

Recognizing that the funding landscape for 2026 has secured \$300 million in donor contributions, yet acknowledging the remaining gap required to stabilize the region,

Emphasizing the role of voluntary government contributions, which historically account for 87% of humanitarian aid in the region.

Urges a response led by the Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) to prioritize the Oromia region as the primary zone of intervention, establishing a "hub-and-spoke" model to extend aid to surrounding areas;


Calls upon the World Food Program (WFP) and the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) to increase therapeutic feeding programs and emergency food distribution to mitigate the transition from IPC Phase 4 to Phase 5 (Famine);

Requests the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) to enhance the protection framework for Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) within Oromia, ensuring that housing and "security in the event of lack of livelihood" are maintained per international standards;

Authorizes the mobilization of a dedicated portion of the United Nations Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) to bridge the gap between the initial \$300 million in pledges and operational requirements for life-saving medical care provided by the World Health Organization (WHO);

Encourages Member States to sustain and increase their voluntary contributions to reach the necessary thresholds for 2026, noting that the stability of the region relies heavily on the fulfillment of these humanitarian obligations;

Invites the Ethiopian authorities to ensure unhindered humanitarian access for UN agencies to the Oromia region to facilitate the delivery of food, clothing, and medical services.

Recalling the Charter of the United Nations and its commitment to peace and cooperation,

Reaffirming the 1954 Hague Convention for the Protection of Cultural Property in the Event of Armed Conflict and its Additional Protocols,

Recognizing that cultural heritage—including monuments, museums, and historic sites—represents the shared history of humanity,

Alarmed by the destruction and looting of cultural heritage during armed conflicts,

Acknowledging the role of UNESCO in protecting global cultural heritage,

1. Condemns the intentional destruction and theft of cultural heritage in armed conflict;

2. Calls upon Member States to respect international laws protecting cultural sites and artifacts;


3. Encourages military forces to avoid damaging cultural heritage during operations (because history should survive longer than the conflict);

4. Urges cooperation with UNESCO and international organizations to prevent the illegal trade of stolen cultural artifacts;

5. Supports international assistance to help restore damaged cultural sites after conflicts;

6. Affirms that protecting cultural heritage helps promote peace, understanding, and post-conflict recovery;

7. Decides to remain seized of the matter.

Strategic Aid for Global Literacy Rate Improvement

The General Assembly,

Guided by the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which establishes education as a fundamental human right, Acknowledging that low literacy rates are a significant barrier to economic development and social stability in developing nations,


Confident that international cooperation through a centralized, unbiased funding mechanism is the most effective way to eliminate educational disparities,

Calls for the establishment of the Global Literacy Initiative (GLI), led by Germany and supported by a coalition of willing member states, to provide technical and educational expertise to nations with critical literacy needs;

Recommends the creation of a Collaborative Fund for Education (CFE), which shall be: a. Administered and controlled directly by the United Nations to ensure total transparency and neutrality, b. Funded by annual contributions from participating nations relative to their Gross Domestic Product (GDP), c. Aid is distributed based on which nations have lowest percentage of literate citizens;

Designates a target literacy rate of 85% for all recipient nations, establishing that: a. Funding must be utilized exclusively for the expansion of public schooling, training teachers, and adult literacy programs, b. To prevent the misuse of the CFE and ensure resources are directed to the countries that need it most, any nation that exceeds the 85% literacy threshold will have their current membership or application for funding successfully concluded;

Encourages recipient nations to provide annual progress reports to the UN oversight committee to ensure that CFE funds are directly impacting the education sector of governments.

Increasing the Use of Clean Energy Globally

The General Assembly,

Recalling the purposes and principles of the Charter of the United Nations,

Recognizing the importance of transitioning to clean and sustainable energy systems to address climate change and support long-term economic growth,

Acknowledging the need for equitable access to affordable, reliable, and modern energy for all nations,

Affirming that international cooperation plays a key role in advancing sustainable development and reducing global emissions,

Keeping in mind that clean energy refers to energy derived from renewable and low-emission sources, including but not limited to solar, wind, hydroelectric, geothermal, and other technologies that significantly reduce greenhouse gas emissions compared to fossil fuels,

Taking note that several Member States have demonstrated strong progress in utilizing clean energy, such as Norway and Iceland relying heavily on hydroelectric and geothermal power, Costa Rica producing most of its electricity from renewable sources, Denmark expanding the use of wind energy for national electricity generation, and Sweden combining hydropower and bioenergy to reduce dependence on fossil fuels,

Encourages Member States to work toward increasing the global share of clean energy use to approximately 50 percent of total energy consumption;

Calls upon Member States to pursue steady annual improvements of approximately 2 percent in clean energy usage, where feasible, to collectively reach the goal of 50 percent global clean energy use within a five-year timeframe;


Calls upon Member States to develop and implement national strategies that promote renewable and low-emission energy sources based on their economic and technological capabilities;

Urges developed countries to provide financial, technical, and capacity-building assistance to developing nations to support clean energy transitions;

Recommends increased investment in energy efficiency, innovation, and clean energy infrastructure to promote sustainable energy systems;

Requests the Secretary-General to support voluntary reporting and international collaboration to track progress toward clean energy goals;

Encourages the establishment of long-term targets aimed at achieving a predominantly clean global energy system while maintaining energy security and economic stability.

Temporary Relief for Housing Crises

The General Assembly,


Referring to the ongoing housing crisis globally, marked by a severe shortage of available homes relative to population growth and housing demand,

Noting with deep concern the high costs of housing development in both Ireland and across the world,

Acknowledging the uneven regional distribution of housing, particularly the concentration of housing shortages in major urban centers such as Dublin, while rural and developing regions remain underutilized,

Questioning whether existing housing efforts sufficiently address both regional distribution challenges and the needs of vulnerable populations, including young adults, low-income families, and migrant communities,

Suggests The United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-Habitat) call for a temporary rent/mortgage payment freeze during periods of time when housing is in high demand. Determined by if or when the median rent for a standard unit exceeds 40% of the median local household income. And/or When the city’s rental vacancy rate drops below 3% for two consecutive quarters (total of 6 months). This would last until the demand for housing decreased or after a period of 1 year. There would be no annual increases, inflation adjustments, or raising rent to current market rates when the tenant moves in. During a freeze, a tenant may only benefit from the price cap if they remain up-to-date on a "Good Faith" registry. Conversely, if a landlord can prove a "Capital Improvement Necessity" (e.g., the roof is falling in), the freeze is partially lifted to allow for a strictly regulated, cost-only pass-through. This would be monitored by each countries respective housing departments with the support of the UN

Establishing a Definition and Classification for Femicide

The General Assembly,

Deeply disturbed by the global escalation of gender-based violence and the fact that an average of one woman is killed every ten minutes by someone in her own family,

Noting with deep concern that encouraging international cooperation in regards to fields of study in economic, social, cultural, education, and health without prejudice to any group would be a violation of Article 13 Section 1B of the Charter of the United Nations,

Viewing with appreciation the leadership of member states, such as the Republic of Italy, that have enacted specific domestic legislation in 2025 to define and punish femicide as a distinct criminal act,


Guided by the Istanbul Convention, actions have been put into place to legally prevent gender based violence, as stated in articles 30/40, 24/7, and 44.

Recalling the UN General Assembly Resolution 78/187 regarding the intensification of efforts to prevent and eliminate all forms of violence against women and girls,

Further Recalling Goal 5: Gender Equality targets 5.1 and 5.2 of the UN Sustainable Development Goals Initiative to eliminate all harmful actions against women and girls,

Urges all member states to establish a distinct legal classification for femicide within their nation, ensuring it is recorded and prosecuted as a gender motivated crime separate from general homicide;

Further recommends that the General Assembly ask member states to recognize the urgency within our cause to prevent femicide.

The Restriction of Bottom Trawling Near Coral Reefs

The General Assembly,

Recognizing that bottom trawling, which drags heavy nets across the seafloor, destroys complex habitats such as coral reefs and sponge gardens essential for fish reproduction and biodiversity,

Alarmed by evidence showing that bottom trawling can remove up to 95% of coral cover on seamounts, leading to long-term ecosystem collapse,

Acknowledging that trawling is highly indiscriminate, often resulting in significant bycatch, which accelerates population decline,


Deeply concerned that damage to seafloor habitats can last decades or even centuries with slow or no natural recovery,

Noting with satisfaction that the European Union’s Marine Action Plan outlines a need to phase out bottom trawling in Marine Protected Areas,

1. Urges the expansion of Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) and the prohibition of trawling around coral reefs, especially in the Bering Sea, areas of the Pacific Ocean near the Philippines, and areas of the Indian Ocean near Australia

2. Calls upon Member States to enforce prohibitions on bottom trawling within MPAs and sensitive benthic habitats

3. Requests partnerships with NGOs and research institutions to fund habitat restoration projects in areas previously damaged by trawling

Strengthening Waste Control for Cleaner Waterways

Viewing with appreciation the numerous non-governmental organizations that are working towards waste control, including Clean Water Network, Planet Water Foundation, and Water.org,

Recalling UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres' statements on waste control within water, he emphasizes that correctly managing wastewater would help against ill-health,


Calls upon the Government of Mexico to dedicate a portion of its budget to investing in waste management by building facilities for recycling and composting, and systems to treat hazardous waste;

Urges the Government of Mexico to strengthen its policies on waste control by having clear and strict repercussions for when the laws and regulations are not abided by;

Affirms that the Government of Mexico expands monitoring systems to prevent illegal dumping;

Encourages the UN to develop public education programs on how and why improving waste management is important;

Requests the help of non-governmental organizations to work with the UN as well as the Government of Mexico to implement these systems.

Mexican Intervention for Corruption and Education (MICE)

The General Assembly,

Affirming the stability in children's education and the people's law system,

Recognizing that corruption is widespread and taking preventative measures, as said in United Nations Convention Against Corruption (UNCAC),

Conscious that not respecting the law or human rights is in direct violation of the Charter of the United Nations,

Confident that Mexico has made efforts to address corruption and to strengthen its education system,


Bearing in mind the advisory opinion of the UNCAC of October 31,2003, being the only legally binding international anti-corruption instrument,

Declaring that the National Governments should take prime responsibility,

Further recalling that a committee can be made up to evaluate said bill,

Having considered consequences of sanctions by the UN for example Asset Freeze, targeting individuals or entities involved in corruption freezing their assets,

- Request that they implement stronger judicial systems to ensure independent and transparent courts,
- Further requests that this takes place immediately and it reoccurs on a short-term and long-term basis, mplementing education systems to teach children what corruption is. This could be taught in training centers for law systems, educating them on how to approach conflicts of corruption and how to handle the situations,
- Endorses that the Governments should enforce anti-corruption laws while the UN should provide guidance, funds, and monitoring of their choice preferably through the UNCAC to support the judicial systems and anti-corruption achievement,
- Designates The UNCAC is a legally binding international treaty with a near total compliance that serves as the cornerstone of the global anti-corruption movement.This moves beyond locals making an effort to treat corruption as a transnation problem requiring collective action,
- Seeking that the UN help provide a budget of this resolution, 200 million dollars, these funds will go into implementing a program in the schools that teach students (6-8th grade), judges, police, and lawyers (twice-annually) on why corruption is wrong, anti corruption laws and how to prevent it. Allocating 100 million to the school system for education, 250,000 dollars each for judges and lawyers to implement said changes, and 500,000 dollars for police enforcement to accommodate these policies. Some of said monies are to provide body cameras for all law enforcement officers.

Call for Military Assistance in Myanmar’s Civil War

Deeply Concerned for the People of Myanmar due to the hunger crisis and the ongoing Civil War against the Myanmar military called the Junta, and acknowledging the hardships and danger of the citizens who are caught in the midst of this war.

Improving the Safety and Reliability of Spain’s High-Speed Rail Network

The General Assembly,

Acknowledging that Spain operates the largest high-speed rail network in Europe and carries 40 million passengers annually, a 77% increase since 2019,

Recognizing that technical issues on Spain’s high-speed rail network have increased in recent years, with average delay times increasing by 21% in the last five years,

Emphasizing that reports of rail deterioration and track failures on high-speed lines have risen from 440 in 2015 to 716 in 2024,


Noting that only about 16% of Spain’s high-speed rail spending from 2018 to 2022 was allocated to maintenance and renewal, compared with 34% to 39% in surrounding countries like France, Germany, and Italy,

Deeply concerned and devastated by the recent high-speed train collision in Adamuz, Córdoba in January 2026, which resulted in 45 fatalities and over 290 injuries,

Calls upon the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE) to encourage the use and installation of continuous, predictive monitoring systems using track and fiber-optic sensors along Spain’s high-speed rail network to detect wear, fractures, and other technical issues;

Emphasizes the importance of quarterly railway inspections conducted in collaboration with Administrador de Infraestructuras Ferroviarias (ADIF), the agency responsible for Spain’s high-speed railway infrastructure, using data from the new monitoring systems;

Requests that the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) support annual training programs for operators and maintenance staff on safety procedures, operating the monitoring systems, and interpreting data to prevent malfunctions and accidents.

Improving Access to Clean and Safe Drinking Water in Turkmenistan

The General Assembly,

Recognizing that Turkmenistan’s reliance on the heavily polluted Amu Darya river poses a serious threat to public health nationally and regionally,

Considering the importance of proper water sanitation in supporting the health of a combined population of over 90 million people from Turkmenistan and its bordering countries Afghanistan, Tajikistan, and Uzbekistan, whom all rely on the Amu Darya as a water source,

Recalling United Nations resolutions 64/292, 70/169, 74/141, among others, which declare and reaffirm access to safe and clean drinking water and sanitation as a fundamental human right,

Recognizing that the lack of access to clean and safe drinking water faced by the people of Turkmenistan, and the bordering countries previously mentioned, constitutes a violation of the human right established in the resolutions mentioned above,

Acknowledging that the Government of Turkmenistan has made efforts to improve insufficient sanitation and filtration systems, but continues to lack the resources and long-term planning necessary to achieve nationwide or regional change,


Calls upon the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) and the United Nations Children’s Fund (UNICEF) to support Turkmenistan’s water sanitation efforts by providing technical assistance, logistical support, and implementation guidance for new sanitation systems;

Requests financial support of US \$110 million from the UNDP Water and Ocean Governance Programme to decentralize waste treatment facilities across Turkmenistan to prevent further pollution from entering the Amu Darya river, making future filtration manageable for Turkmenistan and its bordering countries;

Further requests an additional US \$40 million to implement sand filtration systems nationwide to rid water sourced from the Amu Darya of sediment, pathogens, and pollutants, to better increase access to clean and safe drinking water in Turkmenistan;

Encourages the government of Turkmenistan to regularly monitor the quality of drinking water sourced from the Amu Darya river and prioritize meeting the World Health Organization’s (WHO) standards for water quality; and

Further encourages Turkmenistan to cooperate with its bordering countries on pollution control and resource management of the Amu Darya river.

Strengthening Emiratization in the Private Sector of the United Arab Emirates

The General Assembly,

Convinced that the United Arab Emirates has experienced rapid economic growth largely driven by foreign labor, resulting in Emirati nationals comprising a minority of the private-sector workforce,

Aware that Emiratization policies have demonstrated significant success within the public sector but remain comparatively limited in effectiveness in the private sector,


Concerned that high levels of youth unemployment among Emirati nationals pose long-term economic and social risks, including reduced workforce participation and underutilization of national talent,

Recognizing that private-sector employers frequently identify skill mismatches, wage expectations, and training costs as primary barriers to hiring Emirati nationals,

Bearing in mind the importance of balancing national workforce development with economic competitiveness and sustainable private-sector growth,

Emphasizing that effective Emiratization requires cooperation between government institutions, private enterprises, and international partners,

1. Calls upon the Government of the United Arab Emirates to expand graduated Emiratization quotas for private-sector companies employing more than fifty (50) workers, with incremental annual increases designed to minimize economic disruption;
2. Encourages the United Nations, in cooperation with relevant UN labor and development agencies, to support government-funded wage subsidy programs for private-sector employers who hire Emirati nationals, thereby reducing financial burdens while maintaining market competitiveness;
3. Recommends the establishment of mandatory vocational training, certification, and apprenticeship programs developed in partnership with private industries to better align Emirati workforce skills with labor market needs;
4. Urges the implementation of performance-based incentives, including tax reductions, preferential government contracting, and public recognition, for companies that consistently exceed Emiratization targets;
5. Further recommends the adoption of proportional and transparent fines for companies that repeatedly fail to meet Emiratization requirements without valid economic or operational justification;
6. Encourages public-private partnerships to create structured mentorship programs pairing experienced professionals with Emirati youth to enhance skill development and workforce readiness;
7. Requests the Government of the United Arab Emirates to conduct annual labor market assessments to adjust Emiratization targets based on economic conditions, industry demand, and workforce preparedness;
8. Calls for the reporting of progress on Emiratization efforts to appropriate national and international bodies in order to promote accountability and continuous improvement.

A Call To Enforce the Exile of Child Marriage and Increase the Minimum Age Range of Marriage

The General Assembly,

Noting with deep concern, of the 32.9% of women, ages 20 to 49, having been married before the age of 18. Africa has 15 of the 20 countries in the world with the highest rates of child marriage. According to UNICEF, if the current trend continues, the number of child brides in Africa is expected to double by 2050,

Deeply regretting the child marriages, which cause young girls to be exposed to domestic violence. Considering Dr. Nyaradzayi Gumbonzvanda strongly condemns the practice, he states that “child marriage” is child sexual abuse, sexual exploitation, and child labor. Some child brides, Human Rights Watch interviewed, had experienced violence such as beatings or verbal abuse from their in-laws or other relatives,

Bearing in mind that few laws, institutions, and policies have been established by the government and courts of Zimbabwe, have been created to protect and guard young children from harm. There have been minimum age requirements, in Zimbabwe, that were set for young boys to marry at 18, and young girls could marry at 16,

Taking into consideration the Declaration of Human Rights, Article 16, mentions that men and women of full age, without limitations based on religion, are entitled to equal rights to marriage, during, and at the end. However, high-ranking officials are pledging to end the practice, which has been described as a violation of children’s rights

Calls upon UNICEF, UN Women, and the OHCHR to assist Zimbabwe in strengthening judicial enforcement and legal training related to the prohibition of child marriage.

Recommends that UNICEF provide technical assistance in monitoring and evaluating child marriage prevention programs to ensure accountability. Marriages in Zimbabwe are governed by two statutes, the Customary Marriages Act [Chapter 5:07] and the Marriage Act [Chapter 5:11];

Encourages UN Women to help protect any young child in need, and provide them the security they need to feel safe, secure, and comfortable in their own homes;

Further recommends that the OHCHR strengthen the implementation of existing laws prohibiting marriage below 18 years and ensure that offenders, including parents or guardians complicit in such marriages, are held accountable

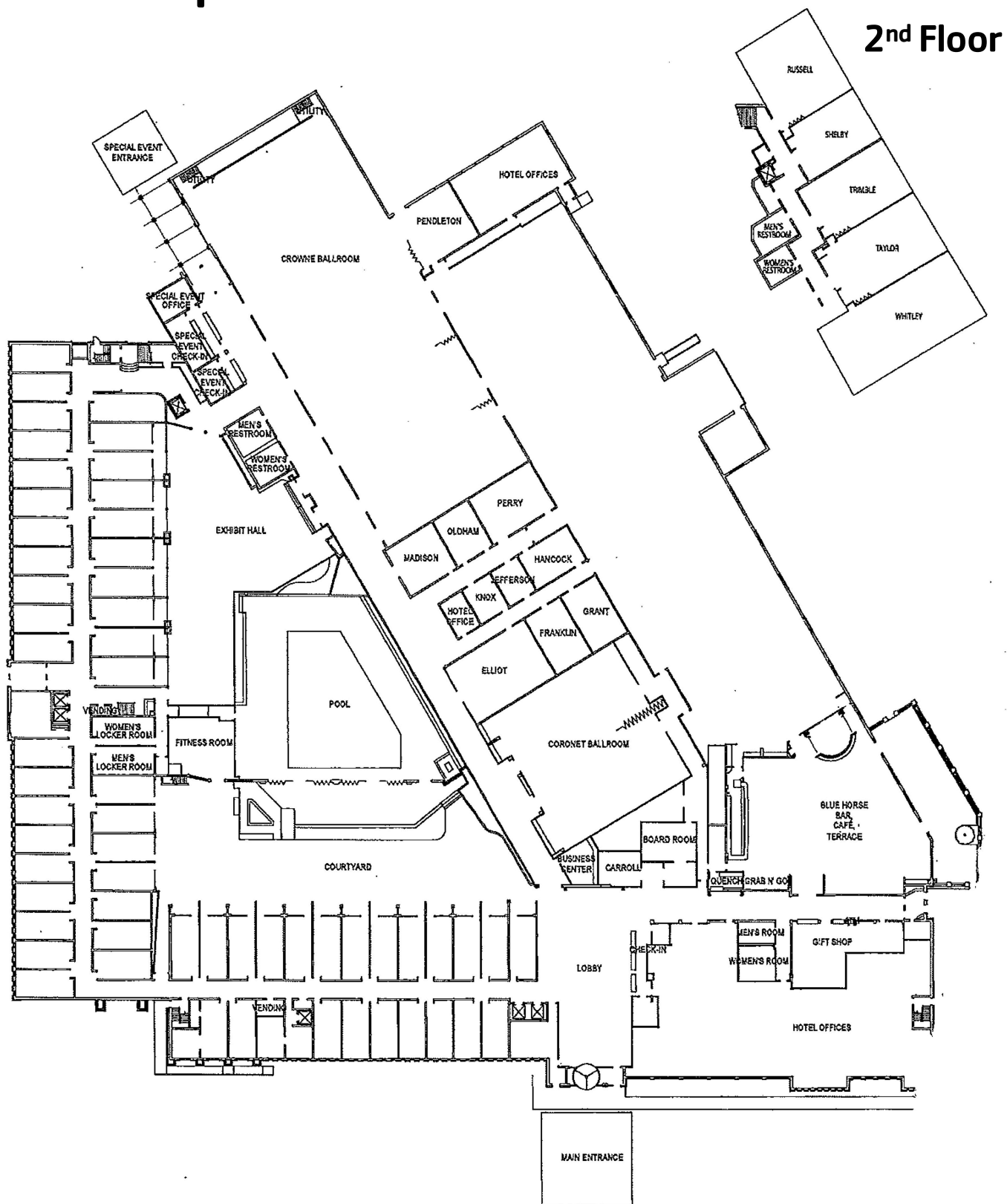

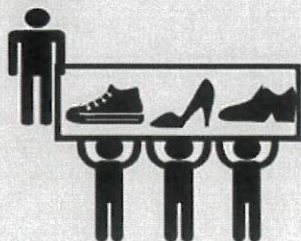
