Convention to Counter Wildfires in Austria

- 3 The General Assembly,
- 4
- 5 Conscious of the fact that wildfires in the Alps have and continue to be a raging issue,
- 6
- 7 Reaffirming that the wildfires in the Alps contribute copious amounts of greenhouse gases, one of the most
- 8 significant contributors to climate change, and are detrimental to the atmosphere, tree regeneration, soil
- 9 erosion, and water quality;
- 10
- 11 Emphasizing that The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Developments 15th goal works to Protect, restore and
- 12 promote sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystems, sustainably manage forests, combat desertification, and
- 13 halt and reverse land degradation and halt biodiversity loss and states that; Target n.1 of SDG 15... explicitly
- 14 mentions mountains among the ecosystems to be conserved, restored and sustainably used in line with
- 15 international agreements,
- 16
- 17 Having examined that The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Developments 13th goal aims to Take urgent action
- 18 to combat climate change and its impacts, and denying aid to the wildfires in the Alps would go against
- 19 Target 13.1 to Strengthen resilience and adaptive capacity to climate related disasters and Target 13.2 to
- 20 Integrate climate change measures into policies and planning,
- 21
- 22 Bearing in mind that during the 2018 Greece fires, the UN Special Representative for Disaster Risk
- 23 Reduction expressed that, Investing in disaster response and preparedness are vital to this effort
- 24 considering that global losses from wildfires reached record levels last year and few parts of the world are
- 25 spared from this risk as climate change multiplies the threat,
- 26
 - 27 1. Calls upon the United Nations Conference on Environment and Sustainable Development to activate
 - 28 the help of firefighters, and provide equipment, transportation, and logistics;
 - 29 2. Draws the attention to high population-dense eastern and southeastern regions of the country in
 - 30 order to prioritize the safety of residents;
 - 31 3. Designates the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs to report analysis results
 - 32 every month on progress being made and to provide an evaluation of any further wildfire destruction
 - 33 and reevaluate preventative measures in place;
 - 34 4. Requests that 2 million USD from the United Nations Environment Programmes budget is allocated
 - 35 towards the mobilization of international help and designates that this cost will be reevaluated each
 - 36 year;
 - 37 5. Calls for this resolution to go into effect January 1st, 2026

5 Emphasizing the involvement of the United Nations in humanitarian efforts concerning gang violence.

7 Recalling that the US Embassy in the Bahamas stated that Retaliatory gang violence has been the primary

8 motive in 2024 murders.

9

10 Recognizing at-risk youth often come from impoverished communities and lack a strong educational system.

11

12 Acknowledging the youth2030 agenda to engage the youth across the UNs three pillars Calls upon UNESCO

13 to allocate funds towards programs engaging at-risk youth against gang violence Encourage aid in the future

14 creation of beneficial gang violence prevention programs in the Commonwealth of the Bahamas and other

15 affected nations.

16 Further requests that the UN promotes international cooperation concerning gang-related violence

The General Assembly,

Recognizing that Bangladesh has one of the highest rates of child marriage in the world, with 38 million child brides, disproportionately affecting young girls and subjecting them to significant health risks, limited education, and poverty,

Recalling the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly Goal 5 on Gender Equality and Goal 4 on Quality Education, which highlight the importance of empowering women and ensuring access to education,

Noting with concern that child marriage perpetuates poverty, limits education opportunities, increases domestic violence, and subjects girls to emotional and physical trauma,


 Calls upon UNICEF to provide training programs for public employees, including judges and law enforcement, to strengthen enforcement of child marriage laws and prevent exploitation;

 Encourages UNESCO to collaborate with Bangladesh in funding and implementing educational initiatives that incentivize families to keep girls in school;

 Urges member states and NGOs to support awareness campaigns that address the harmful effects of child marriage and promote gender equality and girls' education;

Requests annual reports from the Bangladeshi government to the UN on progress in reducing child marriage rates and improving enforcement of existing laws.

Resolution on Securing the Black Sea Against Destabilizing Forces

- 3 The General Assembly,
- 4
- 5 Alarmed by the growing militarization in the Black Sea, which directly threatens the security and economic
- 6 interests of regional states,
- 7
- 8 Deeply concerned by the disproportionate influence of powers, including the Russian Federation and Ukraine,
- 9 whose actions have destabilized the region,
- 10
- 11 Recognizing Bulgaria's historic role in the region as a defender of peace, stability, and international law,
- 12
- 13 Recalling the 1997 Black Sea Naval Cooperation Task Group (BLACKSEAFOR) Agreement, which sought to
- 14 maintain security and cooperation among regional states but has been undermined by aggression in the
- 15 region.
- 16
- 17 Emphasizing the need for a strong regional framework to ensure freedom of navigation and security,
- 18
 - 19 1. Declares the Black Sea a zone of exclusive regional control, wherein only littoral states with a proven
 - 20 commitment to stability - Bulgaria, Türkiye, Romania, and Georgia - are authorized to lead security
 - 21 and cooperation initiatives.
 - 22 2. Demands the immediate withdrawal of all non-peaceful military forces and naval operations from the
 - 23 Black Sea, including those of the Russian Federation and Ukraine, to de-escalate tensions and
 - 24 restore regional stability.
 - 25 3. Proposes the creation of a Black Sea Security Council (BSSC), led by Bulgaria and Türkiye, to: a.
 - 26 Oversee all military activities in the Black Sea; b. Approve the presence of foreign naval forces in the
 - 27 region; c. Establish a unified command structure for joint maritime operations among member states.
 - 28 4. Condemns any state, including Russia and Ukraine, that engages in unilateral actions which disrupt
 - 29 regional peace.
 - 30 5. Calls for the immediate imposition of economic sanctions on any state or entity found to be
 - 31 destabilizing the Black Sea region through: a. Unauthorized military activities; b. Violation of
 - 32 international maritime law; c. Disruption of maritime trade routes critical to the region.
 - 33 6. Requests that all international organizations fully delegate Black Sea security matters to the
 - 34 proposed BSSC, acknowledging the region's ability to self-govern and maintain stability without
 - 35 external interference.
 - 36 7. Requests the Secretary-General to convene a special session to review and formalize the BSSC
 - 37 framework and provide a report on the implementation of this resolution within 90 days.
 - 38 8. Reserves the right for Black Sea littoral states to take unilateral defensive measures if external

powers violate this resolution.

1 A Resolution Relating to the Opening of Trade Agreements with Underdeveloped Countries in East Asia

3 1: Recognizing the Democratic People's Republic of Korea is a nation that produces vast amounts of
4 Tungsten Ore, the amount produced has the ability to aid not only their current trade partners, but also
5 other countries, such as Bangladesh, Cambodia, and Myanmar which are some of the poorest countries in
6 East Asia. Yet, they are some of the largest hubs for things like Natural gas, oil, and textile production.

7

8 2: Recognizing the Democratic People's Republic of Korea welcomes smaller surrounding nations to discuss
9 trade agreements that will mutually benefit both countries. As the Democratic People's Republic of Korea, we
10 are open to trading varying amounts of our production of tungsten ore, refined petroleum, ferroalloys,
11 molybdenum ore and other commodities. - Smaller surrounding nations are specifically nations that have a,
12 as of 2024, GDP of 70 billion or less in East Asia.

14 3: Reaffirming if the Democratic People's Republic of Korea fails to meet the standards that are mutually
15 signed upon pre agreement, then the value of the trade will continue to be distributed to said countries
16 without anything in return until the trade commences.

17

18 4: Noting further, if the other country fails to meet the standards that are mutually signed upon pre
19 agreement, then they are susceptible to seizures of government for the amount of time it takes the country
20 to pay back the quota that they originally agreed upon.

21

22 5: This resolution will go into effect on May 4, 2025.

A Resolution to Strengthen Rural Communities in Denmark

The General Assembly,

Recognizing the vital role that rural communities play in preserving cultural heritage, ensuring economic stability, and promoting environmental sustainability,

Acknowledging the challenges faced by rural areas, including depopulation, limited access public services, and reduced economic opportunities,

Emphasizing the need for equitable development to ensure that all citizens, regardless of location, can contribute to and benefit from national and global progress,


Reaffirming its commitment to the United Nations 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the principle of leaving no one behind,

Noting with appreciation the efforts of Member States such as Denmark in addressing rural development challenges through innovative strategies that can serve as a model for global implementation,

Calls upon member states to take the following actions to strengthen rural communities and promote sustainable and inclusive development,


1. Requests member states to allocate increased funding for the development and maintenance of critical infrastructure by implementing a tax of .005% of a countries GDP to be given to the UN Economic and Social Developments Board to be allocated to countries who apply for UN rural assistance;
2. Encourages investment in affordable housing initiatives to attract young families and skilled workers to rural areas;
3. Recommends funding for community carters and local initiatives that promote citizen engagement in decision making processes for rural development and cultural activities to preserve heritage and identity;
4. Proposes the creation of a Global Rural Development Task Force. This resolution will go into effect February 1, 2026.

1 Supporting the Prevention and Reduction of Child Abuse and Trafficking Worldwide
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Deeply concerned about the prevalence of child abuse and sex trafficking within Fiji and the globe,
6
7 Noting that, in 2022, 1 billion children worldwide have experienced physical, sexual, or emotional violence
8 and neglect,
9
10 Emphasizing the problem of selling minors under 18 for the purpose of exploitation in Fiji,
11
12 Gladly noting the efforts of countries such as the United Kingdom, Sweden, and Brazil in reducing child abuse
13 and sex trafficking,
14
15 Alarmed by the fact that approximately 5 children die each day as a result of child abuse,
16
17 Taking into consideration the existing yet largely ineffective laws against child abuse and trafficking in Fiji,
18
19 Determined to make a positive change in the global situation,
20 Calls upon the UN General Assembly and member states to increase severity of punishment for those
21 participating in, contributing to, and benefiting from the various forms of child abuse and trafficking;
22
23 Condemns the existence of any form of child abuse and child sex trafficking worldwide;
24
25 Requests the UN General Assembly dedicate efforts to reduce the prevalency of child abuse and
26 trafficking across the world.

1 A Resolution To Ensure Humane Living Conditions for Prisoners Across the World
2
3 Recalling that France has been condemned by the European Court of Rights for inhuman and degrading
4 treatment due to the conditions of detention imposed on a detainee in an overcrowded prison,
5
6 Bearing in mind Article 5 of the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights which states No one
7 shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment ,
8
9 Understanding that there are currently 76,258 people being held in detention centers in France, with only
10 62,000 reported openings to hold those people,
11
12 Noting that overcrowding in prisons can cause or exacerbate mental health problems and increase rates of
13 violence, self-harm, and suicide, which does not ensure the rehabilitation of detainees once let out of prison,
14
15 Draws attention to a study that concluded that there may be up to 2.5 detainees per staff member at French
16 prisons like Fresnes meaning that there is chronic understaffing,
17 Calls upon the UN to alter Rule 43 of the United Nations Standard Minimum Rules for the Treatment
18 of Prisoners (UNSMRTP) to include basic cell measurements of 48 square feet (6.5m²).
19
20 Suggests the UN establish a pilot program beginning January 1st, 2026 which works to both expand
21 and reform prison structure in France by; A) Allocating \$340 million to expand both Fleury-Mérogis
22 and Fresnes Prisons to hold 8,000 new inmates each. B) Allocate \$350,000 to pay 500 new
23 employees to manage the new space for three years. C) Implement a monthly wellness check for all
24 prisoners by a qualified mental health professional. If the pilot program proves to be successful
25 over the course of three years, it will be implemented into willing countries which have a Prison Life
26 Index (PLI) of less than B-.

- 3 The General Assembly,
- 4
- 5 Recognizing the need to modernize the UN Security Council to reflect 21st-century realities,
- 6
- 7 Noting Germany’s position as Europe’s largest economy and second-largest financial contributor to the UN,
- 8
- 9 Acknowledging that France’s permanent membership was based on a post-WWII power structure that no
- 10 longer aligns with current global dynamics,
- 11
- 12 Emphasizing Germany’s commitment to multilateralism, peacekeeping, and international diplomacy,
- 13 1. Proposes the removal of France as a permanent member of the UN Security Council;
- 14
- 15 2. Recommends that Germany be granted the permanent seat in recognition of its global contributions
- 16 and leadership;
- 17
- 18 3. Calls for the formation of a task force to facilitate the transition and ensure smooth implementation
- 19 of this reform;
- 20
- 21 4. Urges all member states to support this necessary step to ensure equitable representation and a
- 22 more effective Security Council.

1 Protection of Public Health and Safety against Mining and Industrial Pollutants
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Deeply Concerned about the negative effects caused by mining on water sources, public health and safety,
6 and wildlife,
7
8 Keeping In Mind mining’s damaging effects on aquatic habitats critical to the survival of species of concern
9 including Black Cayman, Green Sea Turtles, and more,
10
11 Recalling Article 25 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights which states that everyone has the right to
12 access adequate water for public health, sanitary need, and human life,
13
14 Alarmed By the fact that a mass increase in industrialization has also led to harmful effects on water
15 sources, thus bringing risk to public health and safety,
16
17 Emphasizing resolution 64/292 of the United Nations Charter that recognizes the right to safe and clean
18 drinking water and sanitation is a human right and essential for the full enjoyment of life and all human
19 rights,
20
21 Recognizing efforts made by the Guyana Costal Adaptation and Resilience Project instituted by The World
22 Bank in negating effects of water pollution and flooding to public safety in Guyana,
23 Calls Upon the United Nations to address water pollution solutions with member states for
24 worldwide public safety and health;
25
26 Urges member states to work in partnership for worldwide water safety against mining and industrial
27 risks;
28
29 Seeks the United Nation’s support in developing a partnership to begin water filtration projects
30 throughout Guyana and other affected member states;
31
32 Encourages the use of water filtration systems which trap pollutants, remove bacteria, and extract
33 metals near major industrial hubs to prevent damaging effects to surrounding water sources;
34
35 Expresses Its Hope that organizations like Health Goes Global and Mountain Safety Research Global
36 Heath can support such efforts financially and politically..

1 Convention on Green Dikes and Nature-Based Solutions to Combat Rising Sea Levels
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Convinced that rising sea levels, driven by climate change, threaten over 680 million people in coastal zones,
6 with projections of 1 billion at risk by 2050,
7
8 Recalling UN Secretary-General António Guterres’s statement at COP27: Our planet is fast approaching
9 tipping points that will make climate chaos irreversible, Aware that global sea levels have risen by 20 cm
10 since 1900, accelerating to 3.7mm/year as of 2021, and could rise by 0.6 to 2 meters by 2100,
11
12 Noting that the estimated cost of constructing green dykes and nature-based solutions in vulnerable
13 nations ranges from \$1-5 million U.S. Dollars per kilometer, depending on local conditions, with a global need
14 for thousands of kilometers of such infrastructure,
15
16 Guided by the Paris Agreement and UNFCCC, which emphasize climate adaptation funding and nature-based
17 solutions for vulnerable nations,
18
19 Noting with appreciation efforts by the Netherlands, Bangladesh, and Pacific Island states in implementing
20 green dikes and mangrove restoration to mitigate rising seas,
21
22 Confident that green dikes and nature-based solutions can protect vulnerable populations, restore
23 ecosystems, and promote sustainable development.
24 Recommends that all UN member states prioritize the construction and maintenance of green dikes
25 and nature-based solutions in coastal and low-lying regions, with the goal of protecting at least 50%
26 of vulnerable populations by 2035;
27
28 Establishes a Global Fund for Coastal Resilience (GFCR) with an initial commitment of \$20 billion over
29 the next decade, to support the construction, maintenance, and scaling of green dykes and nature-
30 based solutions in vulnerable nations;
31
32 Calls for international cooperation between governments, NGOs, and the private sector to accelerate
33 the deployment of nature-based solutions and share best practices globally;
34
35 Urges governments to adopt districting policies that prohibit further construction in high-risk coastal
36 zones and encourage the gradual, community-supported relocation of vulnerable populations to
37 safer areas.

Combating Human Trafficking

3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Alarmed by the UNODC 2022 report identifying Honduras as a major transit and destination country for
6 human trafficking in Central America, particularly affecting women, children, and marginalized populations,
7
8 Concerned that poverty, economic instability, weak law enforcement, and corruption fuel human trafficking in
9 Honduras, Recalling Article 4 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and SDG 8.7, which call for the
10 eradication of forced labor, modern slavery, and human trafficking,
11
12 Recognizing Honduras' existing efforts, including the Inter-Institutional Commission Against Commercial
13 Sexual Exploitation and Trafficking in Persons (CICESCT), but stressing the need for greater resources,
14 international collaboration, and education,
15
16 Affirming the need to protect and rehabilitate victims while tackling the root causes of trafficking,
17 Requests the establishment of a Central American Task Force on Human Trafficking to enhance
18 cross-border cooperation, intelligence-sharing, and enforcement against trafficking networks;
19
20 Calls upon UNODC to increase funding for law enforcement training to improve identification,
21 investigation, and prosecution of trafficking cases;
22
23 Proposes a nationwide awareness campaign targeting vulnerable populations, educating them on
24 trafficking risks and prevention; Encourages UNODC and IOM to provide technical and financial
25 assistance for victim support, including shelters, legal aid, and reintegration programs;
26
27 Calls upon UNESCO and UNICEF to incorporate anti-trafficking education into school curricula,
28 empowering youth with knowledge of their rights;
29
30 Supports initiatives addressing root causes of trafficking by promoting job creation, education, and
31 sustainable development in high-risk areas;
32
33 Advocates for stricter enforcement of anti-corruption laws to eliminate collusion between traffickers
34 and corrupt officials;
35
36 Requests an annual review by the UN Special Rapporteur on Trafficking in Persons to assess
37 progress and recommend improvements;
38
39 Calls for an international fund to support anti-trafficking initiatives in Honduras and affected
40 regions, backed by member states and global stakeholders.

1 Convention on Strengthening Water Purification and Sanitation Infrastructure
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Alarmed that 1.7 billion people globally, and 53% percent of Indonesians lack access to basic sanitation and

19 Emphasizing that existing UN programs, including SDG 6, have improved water access but still face

21 Calls upon the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and UN-Habitat to assist member states
22 in developing stronger water purification policies and monitoring systems to ensure water is both
23 accessible and safe for consumption;

5 A report in 2024, by the United States Department of State, stated that, in the Netherlands, an initial 213
6 human trafficking incidents had been reported, with 325 suspected traffickers orchestrating these events, a
7 51.87% increase from the 214 reported suspected traffickers in 2022. The institution of slavery is still here.
8 Men, women, and children are kidnapped and often forced to commit acts qualifying as heinous that work
9 against their human dignity, respect, and nature. This is not only subject to the Netherlands but to the
10 entirety of the EU and UN nations. We pledge to look past differences and realize that human dignity and
11 lives are dying as we speak and that we can do something to secede from these operations continuing
12 immediately.

14 The following requirements for this resolution are as follows:

- 15 1. Expanding national security patrolling (beginning with an additional 10% for financial and resource
16 deposit increase before the 1st of December of 2026), for any suspected and documented behaviors
17 regarding human trafficking at ports and airports, including any related or connected activities on the

20 2. Minors and sex workers have the highest probability of being trafficked, so special protections are

24 3. Those forced to commit crimes or heinous acts while imprisoned will not be prosecuted (unless
25 provided evidence is substantial in amount and is registered as legitimate by the court showing that
26 acts committed in captivity were not forced or coerced), regardless of the individual's sex, gender,
27 pigmentation, nationality, sexual orientation, or ethnic group.
- 28
29 4. The absolute negotiated agreement for the aforementioned requirements and contribution needs by
30 all EU countries and UN countries for a larger and more effective effort to stop global human
31 trafficking. Human trafficking could disintegrate before our very eyes as we witness the
32 fundamentals of human life for our people of the world having been spared the horrors of the
33 industry only if this resolution is passed and becomes an established law of the United Nations'

Convention on the Integration of Asylum Seekers into their Host Country

The General Assembly,

Alarmed by the increasing number of asylum seekers in developed nations and across the world who face significant barriers to language education

Noting with concern that first-world nations, despite having greater funding, often lack sufficient programs to provide asylum seekers with essential language education, limiting their ability to integrate into society and contribute economically,

Recognizing that language proficiency is a key factor in granting asylum seekers the ability to seek employment opportunities, access proper healthcare, and secure general social support,

Bearing in mind that developed nations receive a significant share of global asylum seekers and have a responsibility under the Convention Relating to the Status of Refugees, to provide adequate resources for their integration,

Emphasizing the role of existing UN organizations like UNESCO and the IOM in promoting equitable access to education for migrants and refugees,

Calls upon developed nations to take the lead in expanding national funding for asylum-seeker language education, in collaboration with relevant UN bodies to ensure broader accessibility and efficient implementation;

Requests that first-world nations establish national frameworks to allocate qualified language instructors to asylum centers based on demand, with financial support from both national education budgets and international contributions;

Encourages the creation of a standardized language education curriculum for asylum seekers, allowing for consistency across developed nations and ensuring asylum seekers receive quality instruction regardless of host country;

Urges first-world nations to integrate language education into broader asylum-seeker support systems, including employment training programs and public service access, to facilitate long-term integration and reduce dependency on social welfare systems;

Recommends that developed countries report progress on asylum-seeker language education initiatives to the United Nations, allowing for periodic assessments and knowledge-sharing on best practices to enhance program effectiveness worldwide.

5 Recognizing that in 2022, Vietnam ranked 22nd in countries with the most polluted air,

6

7 Acknowledging that air pollution is the second leading risk factor for death worldwide and costs the global

8 economy \$8.1 trillion per year,

9

10 Seeing that on average in 2023, Vietnam's particulate matter 2.5 (PM 2.5) readings were nearly six times

11 the World Health Organization recommended levels leading to an increase in lung and heart disease,

12

13 Further noting that cement factories in Vietnam can produce up to 30,000 tons of particulate matter

14 annually and Vietnam is the third largest cement producer in the world,

15

16 Emphasizing that electrostatic precipitators (ESPs) can remove over 99% of particulate matter, We call upon

17 the UN to:

18 1. Encourage the use and installation of efficient and high-capacity ESPs in cement factories through

19 the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP).

21 2. Ensure that factory workers are well-trained on how to safely operate and maintain the electrostatic

22 precipitators with the addition of required training programs held throughout the installation process


23 and in the months following.

25 3. Protect workers' compensation by requiring their respective companies to either reassign workers to


26 other preparatory tasks that are essential during the installation period or guarantee paid leave

27 during downtime.

8 Recalling previous resolutions, particularly Resolution 70/237, which seeks to prevent information resources
9 and technologies for criminal use and terrorist purposes, as well as ensure use of information and
10 technology does not affect the integrity of a country's infrastructure,

12 Recognizing that continuous violations of Resolution 70/237 undermine international peace, security, and
13 stability,

15 Concerned by the lack of adherence for certain member countries, despite repeated calls for compliance,

17 Reaffirming the commitment of the United Nations to uphold international law and enforce its resolutions
18 effectively,
19 1. Enforcement Mechanism: a. Establishes a monitoring body under the authority of the International
20 Telecommunication Union to oversee compliance with Resolution 70/237; b. Directs the Secretary-
21 General to submit regular reports on compliance levels and violations; c. Requests all Member
22 Countries to cooperate in providing intelligence, resources, and support for enforcement efforts;

35 appointed review board;

37 5. Implementation: a. Calls upon all Member States to align their national policies with the enforcement
38 measures outlined in this resolution; b. Decides to remain actively seized of the matter.

Alarmed by the decriminalization of forms of domestic violence in Russia in 2017, which weakened protection for survivors,

Reaffirming the principles of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination against Women, to which Russia was a witness to,

Emphasizing the importance of government accountability their responsibility for the involvement of civil society when combating gender-based violence,

1. Urges the Russian Federation to ensure adequate legal protection for survivors, while outlawing all forms of domestic violence;
2. Calls for the establishment for national call lines, shelters, and counsel accessible to all women in Russia;
3. Encourages collaboration with international organizations to implement law enforcement training for identifying and handling domestic violence cases;
4. Recommends a campaign be held to raise public awareness about the negative impact of domestic violence and the importance of gender equality;
5. Supports the creation of a monitoring body to collect data and report on cases of domestic violence, ensuring transparency and accountability.
