3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Deeply concerned with unbalanced vegetation and urbanization due to water stress and supply resulting in
6 droughts and lack of water preparedness in Brussels,
7
8 Believing that Belgium as a whole experiences extreme water stress and the water supply they have is vulnerable
9 to drought. Water stress can cause water shortages, flooding, pollution and ecosystem damage,
10
11 Recognizing that this issue is the reason that demand for water in cities is not met, and considering that 97% of the
12 Belgium population lives in cities, this is a major cause of water stress,
13
14 Keeping in mind that Belgium has attempted to solve this problem by implementing the blue deal. The blue deal is
15 mainly focused on getting rid of any obstacles that might be prohibiting water reuse but there is not one specific
16 method or solution that they have resorted to for their efforts,
17
18 Determined to resolve this problem, the Belgium government reached out to the UN to take action,
19 1. Calls upon UNDEF (United Nations Democracy Funding) for the implementation of these green areas,
20 requesting a grant of \$150,000 to reduce the strength of floods and promoting absorption of rainwater
21 that was originally restricted by the roads and pavement.

- 1 Addressing Violence Against Women in Bosnia and Herzegovina Through Education and Awareness
- 2
- 3 Recalling the principles set forth in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (1948), the Convention on the
- 4 Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW, 1979), and UN Security Council Resolution
- 5 1325 on Women, Peace, and Security (2000),
- 6
- 7 Acknowledging the enduring impact of armed conflict and post-conflict environments on women in Bosnia and
- 8 Herzegovina, including gender-based violence, systemic discrimination, and limited access to justice,
- 9
- 10 Noting with concern reports of persistent violence against women, including domestic violence, sexual violence,
- 11 and human trafficking, as documented by international and local monitoring organizations,
- 12
- 13 Commending the contributions of the United Nations Peacebuilding Fund (PBF) in advancing initiatives to promote
- 14 peace, human rights, and gender equality,
- 15
- 16 Affirming the need for enhanced international cooperation and national efforts to protect women's rights and
- 17 ensure accountability for acts of violence,
- 18 1. Urges the Government of Bosnia and Herzegovina to integrate educational programs focused on gender
- 19 equality and violence prevention at all levels of education, including incorporating gender sensitivity
- 20 training in school curricula, training teachers and educators to recognize and address signs of gender-based
- 21 violence, and promoting educational campaigns that challenge harmful gender stereotypes.

- 23 2. Encourages local authorities and civil society organizations to collaborate with international partners to
- 24 deliver public awareness campaigns aimed at preventing violence, dismantling harmful gender norms, and
- 25 empowering women and girls.
- 26
- 27 3. Calls Upon the United Nations Peacebuilding Fund to continue its engagement in Bosnia and Herzegovina
- 28 by supporting education and awareness initiatives designed to prevent violence against women, allocating
- 29 resources to community-based workshops, media campaigns, and educational programs, and facilitating
- 30 professional development for educators, law enforcement, and social service providers.
- 31
- 32 4. Requests the UN Peacebuilding Commission to provide periodic assessments of the effectiveness of
- 33 education and awareness interventions supported by the Peacebuilding Fund in reducing violence against
- 34 women and fostering a culture of equality.
- 35
- 36 5. Encourages Member States and international donors to increase financial contributions to the UN
- 37 Peacebuilding Fund to ensure sustained efforts in education and awareness campaigns to combat gender-
- 38 based violence.

1 A Resolution on the Environmental Conservation and Sovereignty of the Amazon Rainforest
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Recognizing that the Amazon Rainforest serves as a vital ecosystem, containing approximately 10% of all known
6 animal species and over 80,000 plant species, while playing a crucial role in carbon sequestration by storing an
7 estimated 150 billion tons of carbon,
8
9 Deeply concerned by the exploitation of the Amazon Rainforest through unsustainable farming expansion and
10 deforestation, resulting in the loss of over 1.98 million hectares of forest between 2017-2022 and the
11 displacement of Indigenous ethnic groups,
12
13 Recalling previous international legislature aiming at preserving the integrity of the Amazon Rainforest, notably the
14 1978 Amazon Cooperation Treaty, as well as goals established by the UN towards the sustainability of the Amazon
15 Rainforest, including the Paris Agreement, outlining the efforts to protect the rainforest as part of Brazil's
16 Nationally Determined Contribution (NDC) under Article 4.1,
17
18 Emphasizing the implications of Amazon Rainforest degradation towards goals outlined in UN frameworks and
19 agendas, including the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, Determined to maintain the heritage of the
20 Amazon Rainforest,
21 1. Calls upon the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development to reintroduce endeavors
22 that shall facilitate enhanced financial and technical support to Amazonian countries to establish a global
23 precedent of sustainability;
24 2. Urges Brazil, Ecuador, Peru, Colombia, and Bolivia to enhance transnational cooperation via the Amazon
25 Cooperation Treaty Organization (ACTO) and introduce priorities towards identifying critical areas of
26 concern promoting sustainable land-use practices;
27 3. Urges international states/entities to cease deforestation in the Amazon by reducing/removing the
28 influence of multinational corporations responsible for its degradation and providing new eco-friendly
29 opportunities;
30 4. Recommends that the United Nations seeks partnerships with various international entities such as the
31 World Bank and Green Climate Fund to establish further financial and technical support towards
32 Amazonian nations needing continued environmental policies;
33 5. Requests creating a government body to enforce accountability towards outlined policies;
34 6. Requests the Conference on Environment and Development to submit biennial reports to the General
35 Assembly detailing financial allocations and advancements towards the implementation of the resolution
36 towards the conservation of the Amazon Rainforest.

- 3 Recalling the challenges the United Nations faced in responding to COVID-19 and the urgent need for better
- 4 preparedness.
- 5
- 6 Conscious of the global threat of emerging infectious diseases and their pandemic potential.
- 7
- 8 Acknowledging the United Nations Comprehensive Response to COVID-19, funded by WHO and the UN Central
- 9 Emergency Response Fund, as a step toward coordinated action.
- 10
- 11 Recognizing the success of initiatives like COVAX and China’s pandemic relief contributions in promoting equitable
- 12 healthcare access.
- 13
- 14 Emphasizing the role of advanced technology, AI, and genomic research in improving disease detection, response
- 15 efficiency, and vaccine development.
- 16
- 17 Calls for the creation of the Global Health Research Collaboration (GHRC) under WHO and UNDP to enhance
- 18 global pandemic preparedness, research, and response.
- 19
 1. Proposes a Global Pandemic Rapid Response Fund (GPRRF), supported through voluntary contributions,
 - 20 to provide emergency resources for nations facing severe outbreaks;
 - 21
 - 22 2. Requests the establishment of regional health research hubs in collaboration with WHO to improve
 - 23 localized pandemic response and foster international medical cooperation;
 - 24
 - 25 3. Encourages all nations to participate in an international early-warning system, ensuring transparent and
 - 26 timely information-sharing on emerging diseases;
 - 27
 - 28 4. Urges stronger global cooperation in medical research, vaccine development, and treatment innovations,
 - 29 particularly through partnerships with leading research institutions;
 - 30
 - 31 5. Encourages investment in biomedical research and equitable vaccine distribution, ensuring all nations,
 - 32 regardless of economic status, have access to life-saving treatments;
 - 33
 - 34 6. Recommends standardized global health protocols for early detection and containment, developed in
 - 35 consultation with WHO and national health agencies;
 - 36
 - 37 7. Calls for nations to uphold international health transparency through collaboration and data-sharing while
 - 38 respecting national sovereignty in public health responses.

A Proclamation to End Female Genital Mutilation

1
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Intensely concerned that 200 million girls and women have been subjected to female genital mutilation (FGM/C)
6 in 31 African, Asian, and Middle Eastern countries, which continues to occur globally despite its pervasiveness,
7 violent nature, and negative effects on female reproductive health such as bleeding, painful urination, cysts,
8 infections, and childbirth complications,
9
10 Cognizant that FGM/C includes the partial or complete removal, cauterizing, or repositioning of any external
11 female genitalia including the labia majora, labia minora, and the clitoris,
12
13 Recognizing that FGM/C is most commonly performed on minors aged 0-15 years and typically before the victim
14 hits puberty,
15
16 Highlighting that the UNOCI (United Nations Operation in Cote D'Ivoire) was informed of the commonality of
17 FGM/C during their station in Cote D'Ivoire from September 19, 2002 to October 16, 2004 which was reported as a
18 violation of international humanitarian law with no further action leaving the issue of FGM/C in Cote D'Ivoire
19 overdue for comeuppance,
20
21 Aware that the United Nations plans to eliminate FGM/C by 2030 as part of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable
22 Development by urging States to oppose, prevent, and curb violence against women and girls, empower and
23 comfort those violated, encourage new policies, increase access to justice systems, and educate youth,
24
25 Emphasizing that any violence towards women and girls is a violation of human rights,
26
27 1. Calls for all Member States that have not done so already to outlaw the practice of FGM for any reason;
28 2. Proposes a religiously conscious, age-appropriate reproductive health education course be made available
29 for all Member States at all levels of education, for all children to be informed about FGM, its risks,
30 consent, and reproductive health,
31
32 3. Firmly suggests that the organizations ACCAF and ARROW as well as the aforementioned health education
33 courses be funded by the 31 Asian, African, and Middle Eastern countries FGM is most commonly
34 practiced in, as well as the 10 wealthiest members of the UN and any other Member States with concerns
35 about violence against women,
36
37 4. Recommends that the WHO, UNICEF, and UN-WOMEN collaborate to determine the thresholds that
38 progressive levels of reproductive education should be introduced while being sensitive to the cultural and
39 religious customs of Member States.

- 3 The General Assembly,
- 4
- 5 Recalling that Turkey is an earthquake prone area, Bearing in mind that the countries around Turkey are also
- 6 heavily impacted by earthquakes,
- 7
- 8 Observing that the current amount of funds being directed towards earthquake relief in and around Turkey are
- 9 insufficient,
- 10
- 11 Desiring that the people of the area be able to rebuild after earthquakes,
- 12
- 13 Recognizing that the people afflicted by these earthquakes are suffering more than they should have to,
- 14
- 15 Expecting this program to help people rebuild their communities,
- 16
- 17 Declares accordingly that a fund be created to spend money on earthquake relief for the countries near Turkey
- 18 that are afflicted by the same earthquakes as Turkey, the fund shall be named Earthquake Relief In Cyprus or ERIC;
- 19 Calls upon the member nations of the United Nations to donate towards the ERIC fund;
- 20
- 21 Designates that a committee made up of representatives of the nations from the area afflicted by
- 22 earthquakes in the region in and around Turkey shall have the power to spend the ERIC fund;
- 23
- 24 Encourages wealthy individuals to donate to ERIC;
- 25
- 26 Approves the ERIC to spend its funds for earthquake infrastructure repairs, health care, community
- 27 rebuilding efforts, and housing.

Ensuring Lasting Stability and Security on the Korean Peninsula


The General Assembly,

Convinced that the military instability within Korean borders could result in disarray in the Korean peninsula,

Reaffirming that peace is needed throughout the Korean Peninsula between the Democratic People’s Republic of Korea and the Republic of Korea,

1. Urges for the establishment of a South Korean unified governing body assisted by the Democratic People’s Republic of Korea. This new governing body will ensure consistent leadership, without corruption, emphasizing the need for firm guidance;
2. Encourages the extermination of the Korean demilitarized zone. This will make the border between the two states occupying the Korean Peninsula peaceful and non hostile;
3. Recognizing a Unified Military Administration for the integration of military command structures under a joint council made up of experienced leadership committed to safeguarding all citizens of the Peninsula from external aggression. This alliance will be a partial integration of each nation’s military;
4. Confident in the removal of foreign military presence and influence in the South to allow for a self-sufficient and peaceful Peninsula, free from external manipulation. This will happen over a 10 year period;
5. Confirms commitment to long term stability in the Korean Peninsula. A specialized oversight committee, chaired by representatives from the Democratic People’s Republic of Korea and the Republic of Korea, which will ensure that all measures are implemented effectively;
6. Emphasizing emergency governance protocols will remain in place until full security and order are established, at which point a permanent leadership structure will be solidified;
7. Requests the international community to support these measures in the interest of regional peace and security, ensuring that the Korean Peninsula remains free from foreign intervention and internal discord.

1 Allocation of Funds to the Tigray Region of Ethiopia

3 The General Assembly,

4

5 Deeply concerned by the restrictions of humanitarian aid in the Tigray region of Ethiopia on objects such as food,

6 medicine, and fuel,

7

8 Recalling Article 2 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which states, Everyone is entitled to all the rights

9 and freedoms set forth in this Declaration, without distinction of any kind, such as race, colour, sex, language,

10 religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. Furthermore, no

11 distinction shall be made on the basis of the political status of the country or territory to which a person belongs,

12 whether it be independent, trust, non-self-governing or under any other limitation of sovereignty.,

13

14 Further recalling Section 1 of Article 25 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which states, Everyone has

15 the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food,

16 clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services,

17

18 Deeply concerned by the living conditions of the people in the Tigray region of Ethiopia,

19

20 Bearing in mind the recent civil war in the Tigray region in which over 1 million people died and approximately

21 \$20,000,000,000 (20 billion) worth of damage to essential infrastructure in the region,

22 1. Allocates \$50,000,000 (50 million) USD out of the approximately \$3,700,000,000 (3.7 billion) USD 2025 UN

23 budget to humanitarian aid in Tigray,

24

25 2. Urges UN member states to send additional aid to the Tigray region of Ethiopia,

26

27 3. Seeks the reconstruction of infrastructure including, but not limited to deep water wells, roads and power

28 lines/grid, and housing,

29

30 4. Requests the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) to work to

31 accomplish the aforementioned goals,


32

33 5. Invites non-profit organizations such as the Red Cross to work together to achieve these goals,


34

35 6. Condemns the actions of the state of Ethiopia in which humanitarian aid was restricted to the Tigray


36 region.

- 5 1. Recognizing the fundamental human right to dignity, autonomy, and self-determination as outlined in the
- 6 Universal Declaration of Human Rights,
- 7
- 8 2. Recalling Article 12 of the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights, which emphasizes the
- 9 right to the highest attainable standard of physical and mental health,
- 10
- 11 noting that physician-assisted suicide (PAS) is currently legal in several nations and jurisdictions, including
- 12 Switzerland, Canada, the Netherlands, Belgium, and certain U.S. states, under strict regulatory frameworks,
- 13
- 14 3. Recognizing that the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR) emphasizes the inherent dignity
- 15 of all individuals and the right to freedom from cruel, inhuman, or degrading treatment, which may include the
- 16 prolonged suffering of terminally ill patients,
- 17
- 18 affirming the right of individuals to make informed decisions about their medical care, including end-of-life choices
- 19 in accordance with ethical and legal safeguards,
- 20
- 21 4. Conscious that steps have been taken to address PAS while it remains highly polarized, with some nations and
- 22 organizations advocating for expanded end-of-life autonomy while others emphasize palliative care and
- 23 protections for vulnerable individuals,
- 24
- 25 5. Calls Upon the UN Conference to create guidance on Physician-assisted suicide to reach an agreement
- 26 on an international convention level.

3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Deeply concerned with the increase retirement age for pension reform as of 2023 in France with decreased
6 pension amounts,
7
8 Having considered the public rejection of law no. 2023-270 Social Security Financing Adjustment resulting in
9 dangerous public protests,
10
11 Which states four components: Raise the minimum retirement age from 62 years to 64 years in 2030, increase
12 contribution period to 43 years to receive full pension in 2027, minimum contributory pension level will be
13 boosted, and special regimes will be closed for new hires in September of 2023,
14
15 While also bearing in mind the increasing average life expectancy of 82.23 years and the continued reliance on
16 pensions,
17
18 Conscious of the fact that France New prime minister Francois Bayrou has stated they will bring the issue back up
19 for discussion,
20
21 Realizing that France's government is still destabilized from complete new government take over,
22
23 Requests that the United Nations work with the French Parliament to construct a new law that both
24 laborers and government agree on, which specifically limits the increasing retirement age and limits the
25 working contribution period;
26
27 Encourages the United Nations specifically the department of Economic and Social Affairs implements
28 restrictions on increases of retirement age or amount of years worked to receive full pension;
29
30 Further Recommending increased studies on the effect of increased retirement in correlation to quality of
31 life and life expectancy.

3 The General Assembly,

4

5 Recognizing that improper waste management and inadequate recycling practices significantly contribute to

6 global pollution, harming ecosystems and human health, Reflecting on Sustainable Development Goal 12 of the

7 United Nations, which emphasizes responsible consumption and production, Iceland has established one of the

8 world's most efficient and comprehensive recycling systems. It achieves a high recycling rate for household waste

9 and consistently ranks among the top countries in environmental sustainability.

10

11 Convinced that adopting Icelandic recycling practices globally could drastically reduce pollution, conserve natural

12 resources, and mitigate the effects of climate change

13 1. Calls upon all United Nations member states to adopt standardized recycling regulations modeled after

14 Iceland's system, including mandatory waste sorting, public education campaigns, and government

15 incentives,

16

17 2. Asks the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) to collaborate with Iceland in creating global

18 guidelines for sustainable waste management, detailing best practices and strategies,

19

20 3. Encourages the establishment of an international coalition to monitor the recycling regulations and

21 provide technical and financial assistance to nations in need,

22


23 4. Recommends that nations implement recycling education in their national curriculum to help educate

24 children and spread awareness.

26 5. Requests that the United Nations allocate resources to support the development of recycling


27 infrastructure in under-resourced countries,

- 3 The General Assembly,
- 4
- 5 Convinced that the current structure of the UN Security Council has led to a culture of inequality in the current
- 6 arrangement of the United Nations' Security Council that disproportionately benefits a select few current
- 7 imperialist powers at the expense of the world as a whole,
- 8
- 9 Realizing that due to the Power of Veto, which allows one of the Power 5 countries to strike down an idea or
- 10 resolution at will, has led to a system of tyranny within the UN Security Council,
- 11
- 12 Bearing in mind the power and influence that the Security Council possesses over the other organs of United
- 13 Nations , due to its ability to approve Secretary-Generals, admit new members to the United Nations General
- 14 Assembly, and form the International Court of Justice,
- 15
