Resolution to Protect Humanitarian Aid Workers

- 2
- 3 The General Assembly,
- 4
- 5 Deeply disturbed that 2024 was the deadliest year for humanitarian aid workers globally; a total of 281 aid workers
- 6 were killed.
- 7
- 8 Alarmed by the fact that the number of humanitarian aid workers attacked has steadily increased since 2008.
- 9
- 10 Expecting that 300 million people (1 in 27 people) will need humanitarian aid this year due to conflict and climate
- 11 disasters.
- 12
- 13 Recalling UN Resolution 2175, focusing on improving measures to protect humanitarian aid workers and strongly
- 14 condemning violence against aid workers in conflict zones.
- 15
- 16 Keeping in mind that humanitarian aid workers are afforded protection under International Humanitarian Law
- 17 (IHL), which prohibits attacks against them.
- 18
- 19 Convinced that stronger police presence for humanitarian aid workers will lower the threat of danger,
- 20
 - 21 1. Urges an increase in the budget and resource requirements from member states in order to increase UN
 - 22 Police forces to accompany humanitarian aid workers in high danger zones.
 - 23 2. Requests the UN Department of Safety and Security establish new protocol for UN Police to enforce
 - 24 International Humanitarian Law (IHL).

- 1 Convention of the dehumanizing prisoner conditions in the Czech Republic
- 2
- 3 The General Assembly, Alarmed by the dehumanizing prisoner conditions in the Czech Republic.
- 4
- 5 Addressing the fact that there have been countless reports of inhuman treatment and abuse towards Czech
- 6 prisoners from police and prison guards.
- 7
- 8 Deeply concerned that prisoners in the Czech Republic are overlooked and not provided with basic human rights
- 9 or ample sustenance.
- 10
- 11 Emphasizing the need of funding so that authority figures will oversee the prisoner’s conditions to ensure they
- 12 have their basic human rights, including proper food, sleeping quarters, access to recreation, etc.
- 13
- 14 Seeking the implementation of a program to ensure prisoners’ safety and guarantee their human rights as Czechia
- 15 civilians in order to create a safer world.
- 16
- 17 Conscious that these problems are not improving and need to be addressed immediately.
- 18
- 19 Deeply disturbed that several prisons have been at over 110% capacity
- 20
- 21 Emphasizing the need for change within these prisons in order to make conditions safer for inmates.
- 22
- 23 Acknowledging the fact that the authority figures in the Czech Republic treat the prisoners with brutality and
- 24 hostility.
- 25 1. Calling upon the UN to fund a program where prisoners are provided proper care and are given
- 26 supervision so that their basic needs are met.
- 27
- 28 2. Encouraging the UN to take action starting in January of 2026

Discrimination In Denmark

- 3 The General Assembly,
- 4
- 5 Alarmed that 8 out of 10 people coming from ethnic minorities have experienced racism or discrimination, and
- 6 around 40% of people from ethnic minorities consider leaving Denmark,
- 7
- 8 Concerned that around every other person coming from an ethnic minority has to always be cognisant of what
- 9 they are doing in public to make sure they are not discriminated against,
- 10
- 11 Aware that groups of people are protesting due to discrimination, but have gotten no results,
- 12
- 13 Confirming that laws are in place against discrimination yet people still illegally discriminate,
- 14
- 15 Deeply worried that police have arrested around 30% of people from ethnic minorities for no real reason,
- 16
- 17 Deeply concerned that 90% of transgender people have been discriminated against or experienced harassment or
- 18 violence of some kind,
- 19
- 20 Deeply disturbed that the suicide attempt rate is about 8 times higher in transgender people and the suicide death
- 21 rate is about 4 times higher in transgender people due to the Denmark social environment,
- 22 1. Request the UN to start a study reviewing the effects of discrimination in immigrants and the LGBTQ
- 23 community, and see how this affects the amount of people able to take refuge in Denmark.
- 24
- 25 2. Call upon the UN to request more strict anti discrimination laws, and more lax asylum policies to lower
- 26 discrimination rates and increase refugee capacity of Denmark. We also want them to increase laws and
- 27 emphasize this problem specifically in their police of military force.
- 28
- 29 3. Call upon the UN to request a new mandatory education cost on discrimination and the negative effects of
- 30 it to reduce the amount of discrimination seen in future years.

- 1 Funding and Support for Egypt’s Police Background Checks and Police Training
- 2
- 3 Recognizing the fact that the Universal Declaration of Rights states, “No one shall be subjected to torture or to
- 4 cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment,”
- 5
- 6 Bearing in mind that Egypt suffers from 212 deaths each year which are caused by police brutality. This is a direct
- 7 violation to Article 5,
- 8
- 9 Convinced, police brutality is becoming a widespread issue far beyond what Egypt can resolve on its own. Egypt
- 10 ranked 35 on the Corruption scale, one being the most corrupt, (100 being perfectly clean.) This displays that Egypt
- 11 is facing massive problems regarding corruption,
- 12
- 13 Taking into consideration, Egypt is also economically struggling so we cannot afford to install a program that would
- 14 have monthly to yearly checks on the government officials in the streets and in prisons,
- 15 1. Calls upon the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime to provide legal and policy expertise to help
- 16 establish new laws and policies;
- 17
- 18 2. Requests the UN Office on Drugs and Crime to help in the creation of handbooks and manuals for
- 19 government officials and officers;
- 20
- 21 3. Requests the UN Office of Drugs and Crime to help establish a database to help fight corruption in the
- 22 police force
- 23
- 24 4. Encourages the UN Police Division to provide assistance in rebuilding the relationship between the
- 25 community and law enforcement agencies.

- 5 Recognizing that artificial intelligence (AI) has the power to change the world and help improve things like
- 6 technology and society, AI also could be used in the wrong way, such as spreading misinformation, invading
- 7 people's privacy, or treating certain groups unfairly,
- 8
- 9 Understanding that countries around the world need to make sure AI is used in a way that protects people's rights,
- 10 treats everyone fairly, and helps society as a whole.
- 11
- 12 Remembering that Germany is a leader in AI research and has promised to make sure AI is developed and used
- 13 responsibly,
- 14
- 15 Make global rules to make sure AI is clear, fair, and respects privacy. Set up a team to check that AI is used safely
- 16 and helps everyone,
- 17
- 18 To teach and use AI the right way the UN will encourage countries to work together on using AI fairly.
- 19
- 20 Teach people about AI and make sure countries follow the same rules to use it responsibly,
- 21 Call upon the UN to form research groups to ensure AI is used in the correct way.

1 Implementing better working conditions in Zonas Francas in Guatemala
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Conscious of the efforts made by the laws already in place by the constitutional government, Guatemala is seeking
6 to improve working conditions in trade zones, for the betterment of all Zonas Francas employees.
7
8 Considers these economic zones, otherwise known as Zonas Francas, are established in poorer areas of
9 Guatemala. Many people, especially women have accepted these working conditions to flee from poverty. Though
10 Guatemala has established many treaties regarding workers rights, they're not being enforced by authorities.
11
12 Draws attention to the many issues arising within these trade zones. These issues include poor labor practices,
13 environmental abuse, failure to increase exports sufficiently, and liberal use of zones by money launderers and
14 narcotic traffickers.
15 Requests \$1 million from the UN to create a new branch in Guatemala's National Health Department to
16 have one government official per every Zonas Francas factory to supervise working conditions within the
17 factory, and conduct health inspections to reaffirm conditions within the factory itself are safe. These
18 inspections will occur every week.
19
20 Further proclaims, if the law is violated, a sum of \$1,000 dollars will be charged. If the fine is not paid within
21 one week, another \$1,000 will be added every week it is not paid. This will be ongoing until the total sum
22 of the fines are \$10,000, or the factory is given 10 strikes. If the fines are not paid within 10 weeks, the
23 factory will be shut down until the penalties are paid, and the working conditions in the factory are up to
24 standards.

1 A Proposal to Require the U.N. to Compensate Haitian Victims of Cholera Outbreak

3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Determined to acquire what was promised to the people of Haiti after the cholera outbreak of 2010 caused by the
6 U.N. peacekeepers and caused the deaths of at least 10,000 Haitians,
7
8 Recalls that the U.N. just accepted responsibility of causing this outbreak in 2016 and promised Haiti \$400,000,000
9 to be split amongst the victims, Emphasizes, that the U.N. has not paid this promised amount,
10 Requests that the money be paid in 5 years time and in monthly increments of 6.7 million and,
11
12 Seeking a commitment from the U.N. to build new water and sanitation infrastructure that will eliminate
13 further cholera outbreaks in the future.

- 1 Convention Relating to Improving Healthcare Through Telehealthcare Services
- 2
- 3 The General Assembly,
- 4
- 5 Draws attention to the fact that the quality of healthcare is quickly deteriorating due to the overwhelming wait
- 6 times,
- 7
- 8 Proclaims that as of January 29, 2025, over 20,000 people are waiting in Irish hospitals for medical treatment,
- 9
- 10 Further proclaims that many of the people who are facing these wait times often have minor issues and require a
- 11 less intense healthcare examination,
- 12
- 13 Noting with deep concern that many people struggle with their health in both Ireland and other countries due to
- 14 the lack of affordable and accessible healthcare,
- 15
- 16 Declares accordingly that this service will allow citizens to call these providers in order to confide with a medical
- 17 professional to receive medical advice, guidance, and a referral to a hospital, if needed,
- 18
- 19 Bearing in mind that Article 25 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights states, “Everyone has the right to a
- 20 standard of living adequate for the health (...)”,
- 21 1. Call upon the UN for funding regarding these matters: 1. 165,550 euros (172,070 dollars) in order to fund
- 22 equipment including computers and microphones for these Telehealthcare Service Providers;
- 23
- 24 2. This resolution will go into effect on November 20, 2025.

Lebanese Immigration Act

3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Having received a million refugees, Lebanon has been plunged into poverty,
6
7 Determined to stop the refugees from taking over Lebanese land and natural resources,
8
9 Noting with deep concern, in the past 6 years the poverty percentage in Lebanon has gone up from 25% to 44%,
10
11 Emphasizing the rights of Lebanese-born citizens would be advantageous in enabling Lebanese citizens to stop
12 refugees from taking over their territory,
13
14 Recognizing Lebanon faces its worst socio-economic crisis in decades, hosting the highest number of refugees per
15 capita worldwide, which is a major problem for Lebanese people,
16
17 Bearing in mind their refugee problem it is causing ethnic tensions,
18
19 Condemns the illegal immigrants for bypassing the legal system for citizenship,
20
21 Confident that the UN and Lebanese government can control the immigrant population by developing a border
22 patrol,
23 Further resolves to assist the Illegal immigrants who are taking natural resources from real Lebanese
24 citizens,
25
26 Deplores the amount of people that are crossing into the country of Lebanon without following legal
27 procedures to gain citizenship.
28
29 Urges the UN to work with the Lebanese government to create and strengthen a border patrol;
30
31 Calling upon the UN to fund the initial two-year training for the Lebanese border patrol;
32
33 Seeks assistance to cap the amount of people who illegally enter the country for refuge;
34
35 Further recommends that the amount of funding for refugees be reduced;
36
37 Expresses its hopes for assistance from the UN in establishing humane refugee camps for migrants wishing
38 to become legal Lebanese citizens.

1 A Resolution to Address High Housing Costs and Homelessness in the United Kingdom
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Recognizing the critical issue of high housing costs and its direct impact on the increasing rates of homelessness in
6 Great Britain,
7
8 Noting that in 2023, over 271,000 people were estimated to be homeless in England alone, including those living in
9 temporary accommodation or in unsustainable accommodation,
10
11 Understanding that affordable housing is a fundamental human right and essential for the well-being of individuals
12 and communities,
13
14 Acknowledging that nearly 4 million households in the UK spend more than a third of their income on housing,
15 placing them at high risk of homelessness,
16
17 Recognizing the commitment to fair and affordable housing for all citizens,
18 1. Recommends that the Parliament of the United Kingdom along with the United Nations to implement
19 rent control measures to stabilize housing costs and prevent exploitative practices by landlords,
20
21 2. Encourages the Parliament of the United Kingdom, along with public-private partnerships to create
22 innovative housing solutions, including the use of vacant properties and mixed-income housing
23 communities with tax initiatives for developers hoping the increase the number of affordable units by 15%
24 over the next five years while also revising zoning laws to allow for the aforementioned to happen while
25 reducing housing costs and increasing availability,
26
27 3. Calling upon the Parliament of the United Kingdom and the United Nations to support the expansion of
28 social services for individuals and families facing homelessness, including job training, mental health
29 services, and substance abuse programs,
30
31 4. Encourages the Parliament of the United Kingdom and the United Nations to implement educational
32 programs to raise awareness about homelessness and foster community support for affordable housing
33 initiatives,
34
35 5. By the United Nations assisting with the Parliament of the United Kingdom, significant strides can be made
36 in addressing the high housing costs and homelessness crisis in the United Kingdom
37
38 6. Encourages the UN to implement this resolution along with the Parliament of the United Kingdom no later
39 than January of 2026
