1 A Resolution to Implement Drip Irrigation Systems and Sustainable Agriculture Awareness
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Acknowledging that about 85% of Egypt’s water resources are used for agricultural irrigation systems that are
6 characterized by high levels of water losses and low efficiency,
7
8 Recognizing that Egypt is facing an annual water deficit of around seven billion cubic meters and could be
9 categorized as water scarce by 2025,
10
11 Seeing that agriculture accounts for 70 percent of all freshwater withdrawals globally and by 2050, 40 percent of
12 the world population will live in areas of severe water stress,
13
14 Emphasizing that by 2030, the global middle class is estimated to grow from 2 billion today to 4.9 billion and this
15 will significantly increase the water required for food production,
16
17 Further noting that only 6% of total irrigated areas in Egypt use improved irrigation systems and Egypt is in the
18 bottom 10% of Middle East and North Africa (MENA) countries in terms of irrigation efficiency,
19
20 1. Calls upon the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) to promote the use and installment of
21 efficient and sustainable drip irrigation systems in Egyptian agriculture as other countries rely on their
22 exports for daily life;
23 2. Stresses the importance of raising awareness among local communities about the responsible use of
24 water resources and promoting water-saving practices in agriculture;
25 3. Develop international programs facilitated by UNEP to train farmers on modern irrigation techniques,
26 water-saving technologies, and best practices in sustainable agriculture;
27 4. Facilitate the collaboration of countries surrounding transboundary major bodies of water, like the Nile,
28 in order to create agreements about the use of water for sustainable irrigation systems and food
29 production;
30 5. Utilizes the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) to assist in establishing a monitoring and
31 evaluation mechanism that is shared among various countries to track progress in water management and
32 irrigation projects.

1 The Implementation of Universal Healthcare Standards for the Improvement of Psychiatric Patients as Citizens
2
3 The General Assembly

4
5 Having considered the steady influx of struggling refugees within French borders, and the diverse mental health
6 services that they require after fleeing violence in their homelands, the rising rates of youth suicide around the
7 globe, and the exponential developments in psychiatric care worldwide,

8
9 Conscious of the likelihood that these trends will continue with present violence in Gaza, gradual improvements in
10 medical technology, and further research on psychiatric care,

11
12 Reaffirming that the natural rights of man, as protected by the UN, condemn dehumanizing acts of psychiatric care
13 and unethical procedures,

14
15 Recalling resolutions 2000/268 , 1997/19, and 2000/10, and the fact that any dehumanizing form of psychiatric
16 care is a direct attack on the values and standards so denoted by these resolutions,

18 1. Calls upon the United Nations Educational, Social, and Cultural Organization, to issue the following
19 criteria in relation to global psychiatric care, a. All practicing psychiatrists, psychologists, therapists,
20 counselors, and miscellaneous mental health specialists should refer to the most recent DSM-5 when
21 diagnosing, treating, and experimenting with patients, b. All psychiatric patients, or their guardians should
22 they be unable to make an informed decision independently, should retain the right to refuse a service,
23 treatment or medication, c. All documented facilities, institutions, and organizations, are to ensure that
24 their provided care is consistent with modernized health standards as established in Article 12 of the
25 International Covenant on Economic, Social, and Cultural Rights, d. A facility or organization’s first offense
26 that so violates these standards will result in an initial fine of \$1,000 USD, fined to the detention center if
27 it’s a facility-wide violation or to an individual if it’s a personal violation, both will prompt facility-wide
28 inspections for the aforementioned standards, e. A second offense that so violates these standards will
29 result in a fine of \$2,500 USD, fined to the care center if it’s a facility-wide violation, or to an individual, if it’s
30 a personal violation, both will prompt facility-wide inspections for the aforementioned standards,
31 2. Trusts the UN to implement the aforementioned actions with urgency, so as to ensure that pre-
32 established human rights are granted to every patient,
33 3. Encourages the UN to implement this resolution no later than April of 2025.

1 Strengthening UN coordination in fortifying the legal framework of sexual violence cases in Guatemala
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Reminding all nations sexual violence is a prevalent issue in Guatemala,
6
7 Affirming the Guatemalan government has taken steps to combat violence against women, in 2021, the Public
8 Ministry reported that 6,307 women were victims of rape from January to August, compared with 3,684 women
9 in all of 2020
10
11 Emphasizing that the lack of an effective legal framework in Guatemala when dealing with sexual violence has
12 resulted in the lack of seriousness in the handling of these cases.
13
14 Having considered that a detailed legal framework would require that these cases be taken more seriously and
15 reduce sexual violence in Guatemala, we propose:
16
17 1. The United Nations call upon the Republic of Guatemala to ensure the criminalization of all forms of
18 sexual violence, ensuring appropriate penalties commensurate with the severity of the offense;
19
20 2. The United Nations call for a more effective set protocols to be set in place and enforced by prosecutors
21 for dealing with sexual violence cases;
22
23 3. The United Nations call for the Guatemalan government to designate mandatory training for law
24 enforcement, judges, prosecutors, and defense attorneys. Educating them on sexual violence and
25 enhancing the level of importance attributed to sexual violence cases;
26
27 4. The United Nations to encourage relevant agencies in Guatemala to collaborate in aiding in the
28 protection of sexual violence victims by providing access to counseling, legal assistance, and medical care;
29
30 5. The United Nations to emphasizes a streamlined confidential reporting system, put in place by law
31 enforcement, to ensure the safety of victims and facilitate a quick prosecution
32
33 6. The United Nations to allocate funds for the purpose of implement training of Guatemalan civil
34 servants, ensuring the most optimal support for women/victims of sexual violence;
35
36 7. The United Nations review this legislation, to assess its effectiveness and relevance, every other month
37 for the first year after implementation.

1 Resolution to Implement a Specialized UN Program to Increase Access to Assault Education
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 Recognizing the lack of accessibility to assault education in many countries,
6
7 Reaffirming that access to education leads to generally better life situations for many,
8
9 Recalling resolutions 75/161, 73/148, 48/104, on assault and the protection of human rights,
10
11 Bearing in mind the remarks made by UN Secretary General on violence against women being a "horrific violation
12 of human rights, a public health crisis, and a major obstacle to sustainable development,
13
14 Emphasizing that when assault education is provided to individuals and communities, it vastly decreases the social
15 stigma, reduces assault rates, and improves bystanders ability to help,
16
17 1. Calls upon the United Nations to create a program specializing in assault education and offer services to
18 countries in need;
19
20 2. Requests funding from UN Trust Funds surrounding assault, voluntary contributions, and the Human
21 Rights Council.

1 An Act to Denounce Hamas in the Effort to Declare Peace Throughout the State of Israel
2
3 The General Assembly,
4
5 In order to protect and secure the basic rights of Israelis and Palestinians in Gaza,
6
7 Denouncing any violence directed at Israeli and Palestinian civilians, including terrorism, indiscriminate assaults,
8 incitement, or destruction,
9
10 Bearing in mind that since 2007 the organization of Hamas has occupied the Gaza Strip and invaded Israel, killing
11 over 25,000 civilians, displacing 2.3 million people, and acknowledging that those statistics are quickly escalating, a
12
13 Deeply concerned that in the past year, we have seen a large escalation of human rights violations, and murders in
14 the Gaza Strip, that are continuing to take place,
15
16 1. Implores the United Nations to condemn Hamas, establish them as a terrorist organization, and
17 demand that all nations immediately and fully comply with the UN’s obligations under international law in
18 order to cease aid of any kind to Hamas; a. Calls upon involved parties to cease violence in order to
19 promote peace, in order to prevent further negative impacts on civilians, particularly women, children and
20 refugees;
21
22 2. Strongly suggests the distribution of United Nations Peacekeepers from the (United Nations Truce
23 Supervision Organization) UNTSO department within conflict areas to ensure the protection of United
24 Nations facilities and humanitarian organizations and the unimpeded movement of aid, as well as
25 guaranteeing civilian safety; a. Seeks financial reallocation of the funding recently rescinded by UN
26 members from the UNRWA United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees) to aid the
27 UNTSO department in funding peacekeeper missions across Israel and Palestine;
28
29 3. Stresses; the importance of ensuring the safety of all civilians while working for an agreed treaty
30 between Israel and Palestine;
31
32 4. Requests the compliance of other UN member states in denouncing Hamas and defunding violence in
33 order to achieve a more stable global environment and reduce violations of the Universal Declaration of
34 Human Rights, specifically Articles 3 and 5.
