The Decreasing of Human Trafficking

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned that the Bengali government does not meet the minimum standards in several key areas for the elimination of human trafficking As of 2021 Bangladesh is Tier 2 in the human trafficking spectrum that affects 20 to 65 million Bengali,

Having examined the United Nations Tier Classification for Global SDG Indicators,

Nothing that Tier 1 countries are those with internationally established procedures and that regularly produce data, Tier 2 countries are those which have established procedures but do not regularly produce data, and Tier 3 countries are those which either do not have any established procedures or are currently developing those procedures,

Conscious of the United Nations Global Plan of Action to Combat Trafficking in Persons, which urges governments to take well thought out and consistent measures to try and eliminate human trafficking,

Emphasizing that under article four of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, it states that "No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and servitude shall be prohibited in all their forms,"

Recalling that in resolution 73/146, the sponsors called upon all world governments to criminalize all forms of human trafficking,

- Affirms the previous call for all governments to criminalize all forms of human trafficking;
- 2. Calls upon all governments to meet the established minimum standards put into place globally;
- 3. Recommends that all governments with existing consequences for traffickers increase the severity of those consequences;
- 4. Expresses its appreciation to all countries who have achieved Tier 1 status according to the Tier Classification;
- 5. Expresses its hope that all countries not yet classified as Tier 1 will make significant efforts to attain Tier 1 status and/or demonstrate improvement;
- 6. To aid in building capacity, we will work through UNESCO (The United Nations Educational, Scientific, Cultural Organization) to promote public safety in regards to human trafficking.

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The General Assembly,

Alarmed that 1.6 billion people worldwide live in inadequate housing conditions, with about 15 million forcefully evicted every year.

Bearing in mind that this is a violation of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights which states that everyone has the right to adequate housing.

Formation of a UN Agency Implementing the Housing First Approach

Recognizing that in Finland the homeless rate decreased by 88% and improved housing stability by 40% after implementing the Housing First approach.

Acknowledging that Belgium has been condemned over 7,000 times and has been charged over 500,000 euros in fines for not having adequate housing for asylum seekers

- 1. Requests that United Nations members cooperate in order to create an international agency, Housing First International (HFI), of economic professionals and willing workers.
- 2. Calls upon this agency to turn homeless shelters into individual and family housing units for homeless and refugees to utilize while they seek a sustainable job, and build new temporary shelters for those who are waiting to be placed in a housing unit.
- 3. Further invites all United Nations member states interested in implementing such an initiative to aid in the funding of such an agency.
- 4. Declares accordingly that the amount contributed by each state shall be in accordance with the approximate cost of implementation within that state as determined by HFI in communication with the United Nations Economic Network.



Petitioning for Increased Funding for the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF)

Guided by the creation of the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) in 2006, which is a humanitarian fund established by the General Assembly to enable more timely and reliable humanitarian assistance to people affected by natural disasters and armed conflicts.

Bearing in mind that the Fund is replenished annually through contributions from governments and the private sector. It constitutes a pool of reserve funding to support humanitarian action.

Realizing that humanitarian needs have skyrocketed due to armed conflict and intensifying natural disasters and that the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) remained an indispensable element of the global humanitarian architecture.

Expressing its appreciation to the generous support of its donors, CERF allocated \$735 million for humanitarian assistance in 42 countries, the second highest amount in the Fund's history. This enabled UN agencies and partners to provide life-saving assistance and protection for 32.7 million people across the globe, despite donors' fiscal pressures related to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, the global economic slowdown and the war in Ukraine.

Having endorsed the Secretary-General's call to expand CERF's annual funding target to \$1 billion. In its resolution A/RES/71/127 of December 2016, the General Assembly called upon all Member States and the private sector to ensure a fully funded \$1 billion CERF commensurate with today's humanitarian needs.

Alarmed that, 7 years later, we have failed to meet the CERF funding goal of \$1 billion and that in 2022 CERF allocated \$123 million more than was in their annual fund, having received \$612 million in paid contributions from member states, corporations, and individual donors.

- 1. Calls upon the United Nations General Assembly to renew efforts to meet the \$1 billion yearly fund goal established in 2016 by the General Assembly for the Central Emergency Relief Fund to meet unmet need.
- 2. Seeks to increase the yearly number of donating countries from 56 to 75. Encourages member states to launch a capital campaign within their sovereignty, appealing to government, private sector, and citizens to assist with reaching CERF funding goals through donations.
- 3. Notes that the ability of individuals, corporations, and countries to donate may change yearly.
- 4. Trusts that member states, the private sector, and global citizens will donate yearly, when able, to meet the funding goal of CERF, therefore allowing CERF to allocate more money to further aid people experiencing the effects of war and/or natural disaster.

Alleviating the Degrading Conditions of Cobalt Mining

The General Assembly,

Deeply Concerned by the inhumane and unregulated conditions of artisanal mines in the DRC and the dangers associated with it, with an estimated 200,000 people, including children, working with inherently toxic minerals having little to no protective equipment,


Keeping in mind that more than 70% of the world's cobalt is sourced from the DRC and is used in the making of lithium-ion batteries, a required resource for electric cars, computers, and cell phones,

Recognizing that the World Bank estimates nearly 62% of Congolese lived on less than \$2.15 a day in 2022,

Bearing in mind that the DRC experiences malnutrition and food insecurity rates of up to 76% in rural areas according to the International Fund for Agricultural Development, yet has more farmland available than any other African country,

1. Calls upon the International Labour Organization to aid in the creation of the Agency to Oversee Congolese Labor, which will be implemented by April 2025 a. Sets in place a standard for health and safety for workers b. Enforces the protection of artisanal miners and formalization of artisanal mines, including but not limited to the implementation of strict safety protocols, promotion of open-pit extraction, distribution of safety gear, and creation of fences c. Oversees the restriction of child labor and human trafficking in artisanal and industrial mines d. Negotiates with and puts pressure on companies to increase wages for artisanal miners

2. Urges the International Fund for Agricultural Development to renew their country strategic opportunities program (COSOP) for 2025-2030 for the DRC. a. Increases their current projects from 10 to 20 and expands financing from \$258.81 to \$350 million USD to encourage long-term agricultural transformation and economic growth b. During the expansion of the agricultural industry, all labor created adheres to the newly developed Agency to Oversee Congolese Labor c. A Resolution on Combating Sex Trafficking and Sexual Exploitation in France

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The General Assembly,

Recognizing the inherent dignity and equal rights of all individuals as enshrined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and other relevant international instruments,

7 8 9

Concerned by the prevalence of sex trafficking and sexual exploitation in France, which undermines human rights, perpetuates gender inequality, and poses significant challenges to the rule of law and social cohesion,

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Deeply alarmed by the detrimental impact of sex trafficking and sexual exploitation on the physical and psychological well-being of victims, especially women and children, and the proliferation of organized crime networks involved in these illicit activities,

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Affirming the obligation of all states to prevent and combat sex trafficking and sexual exploitation, in accordance with their international obligations and commitments,

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Acknowledging the efforts made by the Government of France to address sex trafficking and sexual exploitation, including legislative measures, law enforcement actions, and support services for victims,

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Recognizing the importance of international cooperation and assistance in addressing transnational organized crime, including sex trafficking networks operating across borders,

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1. Calls upon member states, international organizations, and civil society actors to enhance collaboration and coordination in combating sex trafficking and sexual exploitation in France, including through information sharing, capacity building, and technical assistance;


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2. Urges member states to strengthen legislative frameworks and law enforcement mechanisms to prevent, investigate, and prosecute sex trafficking offenses, including by enhancing penalties for perpetrators and dismantling criminal networks involved in these illicit activities;

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3. Encourages member states to prioritize the protection and support of victims of sex trafficking and sexual exploitation, including by ensuring access to comprehensive services such as medical care, legal



assistance, psychosocial support, and safe housing, taking into account the specific needs of women, children, and other vulnerable groups;

- 4. Calls upon member states to promote public awareness and education campaigns to challenge the demand for commercial sexual exploitation and raise awareness about the rights and dignity of all individuals, with a particular focus on vulnerable populations and communities at risk of exploitation;
- 5. Requests the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) and other relevant entities to provide technical assistance and capacity-building support to the Government of France and other stakeholders in their efforts to combat sex trafficking and sexual exploitation, including through the development of specialized training programs for law enforcement officials, prosecutors, and victim support service providers;
- 6. Encourages member states to strengthen international cooperation and mutual legal assistance in investigating and prosecuting transnational sex trafficking cases, including through the exchange of information, evidence, and best practices, and calls upon member states to ratify and implement relevant international instruments, such as the United Nations Convention against Transnational Organized Crime and its Protocol to Prevent, Suppress and Punish Trafficking in Persons, Especially Women and Children.

Improving Access to Healthcare for Asylum Seekers

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The General Assembly,

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Appalled by the lack of access to essential healthcare in refugee camps,

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Concerned for the health and safety of children and adults living in refugee camps,

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Acknowledging that nearly half (47.2%) of asylum seekers living in camps assessed the access to emergency medical care as minimum to non-satisfactory,

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Conscious that the lack of access to healthcare violates multiple resolutions passed by the United Nations, including the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which states "Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services"

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Emphasizing that healthcare is a fundamental human right, which every person, regardless of status or citizenship, deserves access to.

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1. Calls upon the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) to provide 1.5 billion US dollars, to establish healthcare clinics within refugee camps in Greece to provide easily accessible, quality healthcare to asylum seekers/refugees.

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2. Requests that the UNHCR manage the organization and operation of the healthcare clinics to ensure that accessible care is provided.

The General Assembly,

Convinced that fossil fuel used as a predominant source of energy would be devastating to the environment in the Ring of Fire countries, Geothermal and hydropower resources would be a natural alternative within those countries.

Recognizing that Iceland relies heavily on Geothermal and hydropower accounting for the majority of its energy production. According to data from the government of Iceland in 2022, Iceland generated almost all of its electricity from renewable sources, with hydropower accounting for 73.3% and geothermal power for 26.5%(Government.is). The country has been successful in utilizing its renewable energy sources, making it a global leader.

Reaffirming that geothermal energy is a beneficial resource for the world, it's better environmentally as well as in cost. By using geothermal energy it will be better than a gas furnace though at first the cost will be high, in the future it will become cheaper and overall more efficient than natural gas. Adding to that it will help the average homeowner with the future bringing down the cost of energy bills by over 50%. Where natural gas usage varies between 55 to 60 cents per kilowatt hour, but by using geothermal energy and heating it will bring that cost down to 30 to 35 cents per kilowatt hour (ThinkGeoEnergy, 2024).

1.Realizing some current uses of geothermal energy being "heating for homes using geothermal heat pumps, which transfer heat from the ground to the air or water" as well as "greenhouses that use the heat and moisture from geothermal sources to grow plants" (surgeaccelerator, 2021).

2. All this may help determine that geothermal energy, although more costly upfront, will be very helpful in the long term by reducing reliance on fossil fuels, as well as sharing Iceland's expertise and technology in geothermal energy development and providing technical assistance and training to Ring of Fire countries in the exploration, development, and operation of geothermal energy projects use which will all result in a cleaner and healthier environment for decades to come.

Deeply concerned about the UN's response to the 2011 cyber attack known as "Stuxnet," which was conducted by United States intelligence agencies. The attack disabled a vital part of the Iranian nuclear program but unexpectedly spread to outside computer systems, raising questions about its design and purpose.

Recognizing that Iran considers this an act of war and blames the United States for causing severe issues to its infrastructure by attempting to delay the production of nuclear energy in the Republic. Since the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action expired in October 2023, Iran is free to research and produce nuclear energy.

Noting that The United States is responsible for causing \$1 trillion in economic and infrastructural damages over the past 15 years and is also the foremost culprit for the regression in the Iranian Nuclear Program.

- 1. Calls upon the UN to encourage the United States to pay \$500 billion in compensation to the Islamic Republic of Iran over the next ten years for the Stuxnet cyberattack, which caused significant regression of the Iranian Nuclear Program.
- 2. Calls upon widespread understanding that failure to pay these reparations will lead Iran to retaliate against the 2011 act of war.







The General Assembly,

Deeply Concerned that migrants, refugees, and citizens have been subjected to various forms of abuse, including forced labor, sexual exploitation, and extortion due to the issue of human trafficking.

Conscious that globally, out of all human trafficking cases, 71% of victims are women, typically for sexual exploitation, 25% of victims are men, mostly used for exploitative labor, and 28% of victims are children.



A Resolution to Protect the Freedom and Decency of the Yemenis

The General Assembly,

Recalling that the UN's 16th sustainable development goal is to "Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all, and build effective, accountable, and inclusive institutions at all levels."

Conscious that the Houthi civil war in Yemen has resulted in an estimated 377,000 deaths due to violence and famine and that the Houthis denied the Yemenis a democratic say in their government.

1. Condemns the humanitarian violations by the Houthis and calls for the liberation of the Yemenis.

2. Establishes a UN effort to ship humanitarian materials (food, clothing, medicine) into war-torn areas of Yemen until the humanitarian crisis is declared over. 2a. Calls upon NGOs to collect humanitarian materials for donation to the UN, which will ship the materials collectively. 2b. Humanitarian supplies will be shipped through the Suez Canal and into government-controlled ports in Southwestern Yemen. From here, the materials will be given to Mosques, who will diffuse the materials into areas affected by warfare. 2c. Allocates \$1,500,000 annually to cover the cost of hiring privately owned container ships to transport these goods.

4. Calls upon UN countries to assist the Saudi coalition in liberating Yemen from Houthi occupation.
