The Decreasing of Human Trafficking

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned that the Bengali government does not meet the minimum standards in several key areas for the elimination of human trafficking As of 2021 Bangladesh is Tier 2 in the human trafficking spectrum that affects 20 to 65 million Bengali,

Having examined the United Nations Tier Classification for Global SDG Indicators,

Nothing that Tier 1 countries are those with internationally established procedures and that regularly produce data, Tier 2 countries are those which have established procedures but do not regularly produce data, and Tier 3 countries are those which either do not have any established procedures or are currently developing those procedures,


Conscious of the United Nations Global Plan of Action to Combat Trafficking in Persons, which urges governments to take well thought out and consistent measures to try and eliminate human trafficking,

Emphasizing that under article four of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, it states that “No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and servitude shall be prohibited in all their forms,”

Recalling that in resolution 73/146, the sponsors called upon all world governments to criminalize all forms of human trafficking,

1. Affirms the previous call for all governments to criminalize all forms of human trafficking;
2. Calls upon all governments to meet the established minimum standards put into place globally;
3. Recommends that all governments with existing consequences for traffickers increase the severity of those consequences;
4. Expresses its appreciation to all countries who have achieved Tier 1 status according to the Tier Classification;
5. Expresses its hope that all countries not yet classified as Tier 1 will make significant efforts to attain Tier 1 status and/or demonstrate improvement;
6. To aid in building capacity, we will work through UNESCO (The United Nations Educational, Scientific, Cultural Organization) to promote public safety in regards to human trafficking.

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The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned that the large quantities of immigration into Canada for both education and citizenship purposes hurts the Canadian economy.

Acknowledging that in 2022, 334,000 housing units began construction. However, approximately 500,000 new immigrants relocated to Canada. These 500,000 migrants make up roughly 20% of the entire country's population.


Noting that this resolution will not affect current legal residents of Canada entering and exiting Canada.

Recognizing that an immigration restriction would help the Canadian's economic problems regarding housing and poverty.

1. Calls upon the UN to require that the Canadian government temporarily restrict its immigration, limiting the number of people entering the country annually from 500,000 to 350,000.

2. Calls upon the UN will assist those who are not eligible for citizenship and are denied immigration to Canada, through the refugee and immigrant relief fund through individualized Humanitarian Funds.

2  
3      Guided by the creation of the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) in 2006, which is a humanitarian fund  
4      established by the General Assembly to enable more timely and reliable humanitarian assistance to people  
5      affected by natural disasters and armed conflicts.  
6  
7      Bearing in mind that the Fund is replenished annually through contributions from governments and the private  
8      sector. It constitutes a pool of reserve funding to support humanitarian action.

10     Realizing that humanitarian needs have skyrocketed due to armed conflict and intensifying natural disasters and  
11     that the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) remained an indispensable element of the global humanitarian  
12     architecture.  
13  
14     Expressing its appreciation to the generous support of its donors, CERF allocated \$735 million for humanitarian  
15     assistance in 42 countries, the second highest amount in the Fund’s history. This enabled UN agencies and  
16     partners to provide life-saving assistance and protection for 32.7 million people across the globe, despite donors’  
17     fiscal pressures related to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, the global economic slowdown and the war in  
18     Ukraine.  
19  
20     Having endorsed the Secretary-General’s call to expand CERF’s annual funding target to \$1 billion. In its resolution  
21     A/RES/71/127 of December 2016, the General Assembly called upon all Member States and the private sector to  
22     ensure a fully funded \$1 billion CERF commensurate with today’s humanitarian needs.  
23  
24     Alarmed that, 7 years later, we have failed to meet the CERF funding goal of \$1 billion and that in 2022 CERF  
25     allocated \$123 million more than was in their annual fund, having received \$612 million in paid contributions from  
26     member states, corporations, and individual donors.  
27  
28                      1.    Calls upon the United Nations General Assembly to renew efforts to meet the \$1 billion yearly fund goal  
29                                      established in 2016 by the General Assembly for the Central Emergency Relief Fund to meet unmet need.

31                      2.    Seeks to increase the yearly number of donating countries from 56 to 75. Encourages member states to  
32                                      launch a capital campaign within their sovereignty, appealing to government, private sector, and citizens

Alleviating the Degrading Conditions of Cobalt Mining

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The General Assembly,

Deeply Concerned by the inhumane and unregulated conditions of artisanal mines in the DRC and the dangers associated with it, with an estimated 200,000 people, including children, working with inherently toxic minerals having little to no protective equipment,

Keeping in mind that more than 70% of the world’s cobalt is sourced from the DRC and is used in the making of lithium-ion batteries, a required resource for electric cars, computers, and cell phones,

Recognizing that the World Bank estimates nearly 62% of Congolese lived on less than \$2.15 a day in 2022,


Bearing in mind that the DRC experiences malnutrition and food insecurity rates of up to 76% in rural areas according to the International Fund for Agricultural Development, yet has more farmland available than any other African country,

- 1. Calls upon the International Labour Organization to aid in the creation of the Agency to Oversee Congolese Labor, which will be implemented by April 2025
  - a. Sets in place a standard for health and safety for workers
  - b. Enforces the protection of artisanal miners and formalization of artisanal mines, including but not limited to the implementation of strict safety protocols, promotion of open-pit extraction, distribution of safety gear, and creation of fences
  - c. Oversees the restriction of child labor and human trafficking in artisanal and industrial mines
  - d. Negotiates with and puts pressure on companies to increase wages for artisanal miners

- 2. Urges the International Fund for Agricultural Development to renew their country strategic opportunities program (COSOP) for 2025-2030 for the DRC.
  - a. Increases their current projects from 10 to 20 and expands financing from \$258.81 to \$350 million USD to encourage long-term agricultural transformation and economic growth
  - b. During the expansion of the agricultural industry, all labor created adheres to the newly developed Agency to Oversee Congolese Labor
  - c. Continues to utilize the country’s vast arable land only and leaves the Congo Basin undisturbed.

10   production. According to data from the government of Iceland in 2022, Iceland generated almost all of its

11   electricity from renewable sources, with hydropower accounting for 73.3% and geothermal power for

12   26.5%(Government.is). The country has been successful in utilizing its renewable energy sources, making it a global

13   leader.

15   Reaffirming that geothermal energy is a beneficial resource for the world, it’s better environmentally as well as in

16   cost. By using geothermal energy it will be better than a gas furnace though at first the cost will be high, in the

17   future it will become cheaper and overall more efficient than natural gas. Adding to that it will help the average

18   homeowner with the future bringing down the cost of energy bills by over 50%. Where natural gas usage varies

19   between 55 to 60 cents per kilowatt hour, but by using geothermal energy and heating it will bring that cost down

20   to 30 to 35 cents per kilowatt hour (ThinkGeoEnergy, 2024).

22                   1.Realizing some current uses of geothermal energy being “heating for homes using geothermal heat

23                   pumps, which transfer heat from the ground to the air or water” as well as “ greenhouses that use the

24                   heat and moisture from geothermal sources to grow plants”(surgeaccelerator, 2021).

26                   2. All this may help determine that geothermal energy, although more costly upfront, will be very helpful

27                   in the long term by reducing reliance on fossil fuels, as well as sharing Iceland's expertise and technology in

28                   geothermal energy development and providing technical assistance and training to Ring of Fire countries

29                   in the exploration, development, and operation of geothermal energy projects use which will all result in a

- 13    Noting that The United States is responsible for causing \$1 trillion in economic and infrastructural damages over
- 14    the past 15 years and is also the foremost culprit for the regression in the Iranian Nuclear Program.

- 16         1.   Calls upon the UN to encourage the United States to pay \$500 billion in compensation to the Islamic
- 17            Republic of Iran over the next ten years for the Stuxnet cyberattack, which caused significant regression of
- 18            the Iranian Nuclear Program.

28 2. Requests the UNHCR be granted increased funding for the supplies to aid in the relief of refugees;

30 3. Urges the Members of the United Nations to make voluntary contributions in funds and/or supplies to the  
31 UNHCR;

33 4. Recommends the High Commissioner for Refugees to submit an annual report on the efforts of the UNHCR  
34 including an audit of funds.

3 The General Assembly,  
4  
5 The Russo-Ukrainian War has been an ongoing conflict since 2014 which has resulted in several casualties from  
6 both sides, and has led to tensions rising over Europe ever since the Russian invasion of Ukraine in 2022. It is within  
7 both countries best interests to put an end to this war.

9 We propose to put an end to this conflict by the following:

11           1. Ukraine will withdraw any current foreign military from its borders with Russia  
12  
13           2. Ukraine will be able to join NATO and or the European Union, but will not allow NATO or EU military  
14 forces into the country  
15  
16           3. Ukraine will not let any foreign nations intervene between Russian and Ukrainian affairs As long as  
17 Russia agrees to the following: 1. Return all claimed land since the Russian Invasion back to Ukraine 2. Pay  
18 for all damages caused from the invasion 3. Withdraw all Russian troops from Ukrainian Territory If by any  
19 case Russia does not comply to following and attacks Ukraine again, Ukraine will have the right to declare  
20 war on Russia with the aid of its allies from NATO and the European Union.

1                                  A Resolution to Protect the Freedom and Decency of the Yemenis  
2  
3    The General Assembly,  
4  
5    Recalling that the UN's 16th sustainable development goal is to "Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for  
6    sustainable development, provide access to justice for all, and build effective, accountable, and inclusive  
7    institutions at all levels."  
8  
9    Conscious that the Houthi civil war in Yemen has resulted in an estimated 377,000 deaths due to violence and  
10    famine and that the Houthis denied the Yemenis a democratic say in their government.  
11  
12                    1. Condemns the humanitarian violations by the Houthis and calls for the liberation of the Yemenis.  
13  
14                    2. Establishes a UN effort to ship humanitarian materials (food, clothing, medicine) into war-torn areas of  
15    Yemen until the humanitarian crisis is declared over. 2a. Calls upon NGOs to collect humanitarian  
16    materials for donation to the UN, which will ship the materials collectively. 2b. Humanitarian supplies will  
17    be shipped through the Suez Canal and into government-controlled ports in Southwestern Yemen. From  
18    here, the materials will be given to Mosques, who will diffuse the materials into areas affected by warfare.  
19    2c. Allocates \$1,500,000 annually to cover the cost of hiring privately owned container ships to transport  
20    these goods.

22                    4. Calls upon UN countries to assist the Saudi coalition in liberating Yemen from Houthi occupation.
