LETTER FROM OUR CEO

Dear Y Friends,

Every year, I am reminded that our work is about so much more than programs or participation numbers; it is about people. It is about the young person who discovers their voice, finds a place where they belong, and begins to believe in the difference they can make.

This year, we celebrated meaningful growth across our organization. The Kentucky Youth Assembly, Go for It conference, Commonwealth Teen Advocate program, and the Leadership Training Conference all welcomed more teens. With each new school, community, and county represented, we move closer to our vision of ensuring every teen in Kentucky has access to transformational leadership experiences.

Behind every program we run is a story. One student shared that she had become comfortable with going through high school without friends. Through our programs, she found not only friendship, but confidence and connection that changed the course of her high school experience. Another participant discovered a passion for service through Y-Corps and left inspired to pursue AmeriCorps because she had experienced the joy and purpose that comes from serving others.

Throughout the year, we watched students cast their first ballots, debate ideas with confidence, learn about countries they had never heard of, engage thoughtfully with elected officials, and discover that their voices matter. These moments remind us why this work is so important. We are not simply preparing young people for their professional life; we are preparing them for citizenship, leadership, and lives of service.

None of this would be possible without you. To our staff, volunteers, teachers, and advisors, thank you for investing your time and talents in Kentucky's young people. To our donors and partners, thank you for making it possible to say "yes" when financial barriers might otherwise keep a student from participating. Your generosity opens doors that change lives.

Y-Corps empowers young people to discover that leadership begins with service. Through meaningful, hands-on projects in communities across Kentucky and beyond, participants tackle real challenges while developing resilience, teamwork, and a lifelong commitment to civic responsibility. Whether restoring natural spaces, supporting local nonprofits, or responding to community needs, students leave understanding that they have the power to improve the world around them. Y-Corps service hours amount to \$113,000 in terms of time and talent given Y-Corps transforms service from something students do into part of who they become.

KENTUCKY YOUTH ASSEMBLY

For eight decades, the Kentucky Youth Assembly has inspired students to believe that their voices belong in the democratic process. Through immersive simulations of the legislative, judicial, and executive, branches of state government, participants move beyond learning about civics to experiencing it firsthand. They develop the confidence to debate ideas, defend their perspectives, collaborate across differences, and lead with integrity. Long after the conference ends, students leave knowing they are not simply future leaders, they are capable of making an impact today. KYA hosted 240 schools from 77 Commonwealth counties.

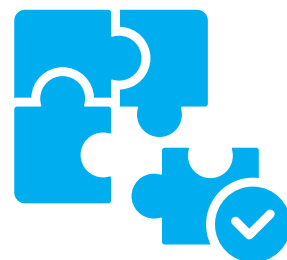

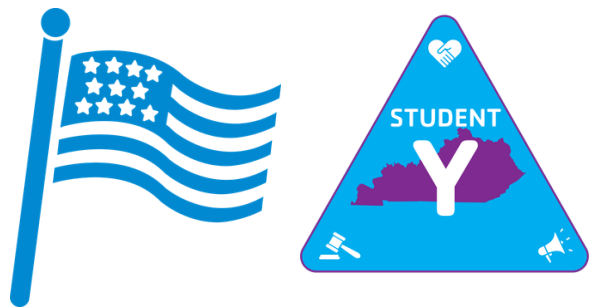
